If a three element vacuum tube is connected, as shown in the diagram, with a grid coil in inductive relation to the plate coil, it is found that when the key "K" is closed thereby impressing the high potential from the battery "B" on the plate of the tube, socillations occur as a result of the feeding back of the energy from the plate circuit into the grid circuit and a con-sequent change in the plate circuit current.
