ROYALIST LEADERS PLAN MASSACRE

Portuguese Government Takes Steps to Frustrate Plot of Monarchists

Lisbon, Sept. 19 (via the Frontier).—The recent monarchist conspiracy unearthed at Vienna de Castello appears to have been more serious than was reported. A great part of the troops and many civilians were implicated. The conspiracy reached as far as Braga and Oporto. It was planned to start a rising of the people of Vienna de Castello, Braga and Oporto, and massacre the garrisons in those cities the moment the Royalists crossed the frontier. The leaders of the movement were confident that such action within the country would demoralize the Republican troops on the frontier and thus make easy the conquest of the north by the Royalists.

Exaggerated reports have been published throughout this period of the impossibility of his task, varied with premature reports of his success. But it is only within the past six months that Mr. Edison has sealed his long battle with the conviction that he has perfected his invention. The new storage battery, after an elaborate private testing period of three years, has at last become in America the property of the general public, and at the electrical exhibition which will be opened at Olympia on the 23rd of this month England will have its first glimpse of seeing for itself at close range the incredible little marvel which is the latest evidence of the unconquerable advance of electric power.

LOST IN WOODS FOR THREE DAYS

Forced to Spend Nights Without Shelter—Subsists on Wild Berries

Prince Rupert, Sept. 19.—To be lost in the woods of Graham Island for three days and nights, was the experience of Mr. White, a seventy-year-old retired carriage-maker from Vancouver. Mr. White, who has been spending his declining days by the seaside, went to Graham Island a few weeks ago to look for a small pre-emption for himself and wife. He started out for a little walk inland following a survey line. He lost the line and could not pick it up again. At night he built a fire and slept. Next day he set out again, but only covered a few miles before the breakers on the shore, but could not find any path out. At last on the third day he found the trail to the Pigeon where he was picked up by the surveyors.

CITY ENGINEERSHIP

J. W. Astley, Winnipeg, Has Confirmed by Mayor Morley. J. W. Astley, the gentleman who was offered the position of construction engineer here last spring, is in the city and has held several conferences with Mayor Morley re the city engineership. It was noted in the paper at the time that although the Victoria offer was \$4,000 a year, it was announced in the Winnipeg papers \$5,000, and the strength of it Mr. Astley's offer was \$5,000 by the board of control to state.
