Ottawa, Sept. 19.—The Franco-Canadian trade treaty will be signed to-day in Paris by the British ambassador and the ministers of finance and marine. W. S. Fielding will then leave for London to interview the foreign office and will sail for Canada on the Victorian on

The Paris correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette referring to the treaty says: The treaty grants a new tarfif on a large number of articles, concessions b large number of articles, concessions be-ing nicely balanced as between the two parties. There is in usage in the Cana-dian customs a maximum, intermediate, and preferential tariff. 


