

Control of Immigrants

Drastic Provisions of New Immi gration Law-Extensive Powers to Forbid Immigration Vested in Gavernment-Anarchists and erally effective on September 1. Revolutionaries, if Not Cana-dian-Born, May be Deported.

The amendments to the Immigration act were among the most im-portant enactments of the late session of the Canadian parliament. These amendments, as a whole, provide for the exclusion of additional classes regarded as undesirable for a more efficient examination of immigrants, and for deportation of immigrants whose continued presence in the country is not regard. ed as desirable.

The prohibited classes to whom admission is refused have been enlarged by the following additions: (1)—Persons on the border line

between sanity and insanity. (2)-Persons afflicted with chronic alcoholism

(3)-Persons who believe in or advocate the overthrow, by force, or violence, of government.

(4)—Persons connected with any organization which entertains or teaches disbelief in or opposition to organized government.

(5)-Enemy aliens who were, or may be, interned on or after No- TWO ELEVATORS ARE vember 11, 1918.

(6)--Persons guilty of espion age, high treason or conspiring against His Majesty or assisting

(8)-Persons who are illiterates. The literacy test is not applied to persons under 15 years of age, nor yet to relatives of persons already in Canada.
