Distressing Calamity at Deer Island, Motne.—The schonner Mary, of Deer Isle, Capt. York, was at anchor in that harbour on the night of the P2th 10th. The cabin being damp a large fire was kept in the stove, and left burning when Capt. York, his son about 15 years old, and Mr. Benjamin Cole, all of Deer Isle, retired to rest at a late hour. About 2 o'clook next morang, they awake enveloped in flames, the vessel having probably caught fire from the faunel. They rushed through the fire upon deck, and attempted to swim for the shore, five or six rods distant. Capt.
