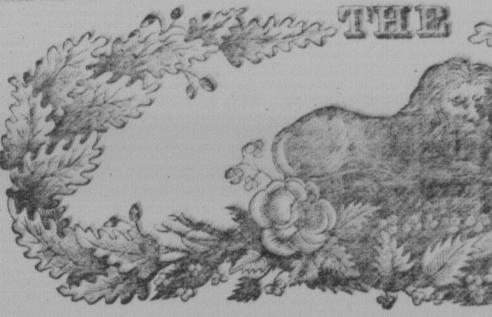

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much to look after the interests of the manufacturer. This disposition it would be impossible to remove, and he should trouble them no further on the subject. The scale he supposed, must remain as it passed the committee; but it did not correct that on that account it was more correct than the one originally submitted with the Bill.

Mr. Partelow said that objections had been raised by hon. members against the scale brought in by his hon. colleague (Mr. Street), that it was said that there could be more lumber in boards cut from the larger sized logs than the quantity given of deal. What he would ask was the practice. This excess contained in the log would pay the expense of sawing, and he would ask the hon. member from Queen's, (Mr. J. Earle), who had practical knowledge of this matter, if it was usual to cut up such logs in the manner spoken of by those who objected to the scale.

Mr. J. Earle said that he was well acquainted with the business, and got the greater part of the logs which he used himself. When logs came to his mill he took very good care that if the lumber was in them he would have it out. He could easily enlighten the hon. member from St. John (Mr. Partelow) on the reason for not including in the measurement of logs, used in their steam mills, and other large establishments, any such lumber that could be had of deal. They had circular saws, lathe machines, and other contrivances, which enabled the large manufacturer to turn the spare lumber to pretty good account. (Hear, hear.) The lumber could be used, and if he was not very much mistaken, there was not much waste lumber remained after a log had gone through all the different processes to which it was subjected. The lumber was there and ought to be paid for, and if the manufacturer did not choose to get it out it was his own fault.

Mr. Brown went into some curious calculations, showing that the scale in the printer's Bill could be no altogether correct. We were unable to follow the hon. member through his figures; but he contended strongly that the scale which had passed, should not be disturbed.

After a few observations from Mr. Work the question to reconsider the scale was put, and passed in the negative. The remaining provisions of the Bill did not elicit much debate.
