REPORT

OF THE

N. B. B. H. M. BOARD.

Presented to the Society at its Fifth Anniversary, at Springfield; July 1858.

Your Board is again called upon to recount the labours and successes of another year. They cannot boast of ample funds placed at their disposal by the churches of the denomination, or of arge expenditures in the cultivation of the great mission field; but they can thank God that the handful of corn scattered upon the tops of the mountains, has yielded its fruit to the praise and glory of God. We begin with:-

REV. J. BLAKENEY'S MISSION.

This esteemed Missionary reports ten months and one week pent under the direction of the Board since April 1st, 1857. His see was devoted principally to the Miramichi district, embracing Ludlow, Blissville, Blackville, and the adjoining settlements. all these places our Brother preached the gospel of the blessed od, and the word preached was attended with a rich blessing. setsliders were reclaimed, and many precious souls were saved. is reports to the Board :- 234 meetings, 393 visits, 54 persons plized, the administration of the Lord's supper 11 times, 6,422 as of Tracts distributed, and £64 2s. 5d. collected in aid of mission.

THE NEWCASTLE MISSION.

Rev. George Seeley spent 7 months upon this circuit. Your

Board cherished the hope that he would feel it his duty to devote himself permanently to this field; but he found it too extensive and laborious for his constitution, he was therefore induced after much prayerful deliberation to resign the mission and to return to Woodstock. In his report to the Board he says :- "The tollowing places were occupied, viz:-Newcastle, North Esk, Little South West, Black River and occasionally Chatham. During the time he travelled 979 miles, made 196 ministerial visits, held 107 meetings, mostly for preaching, and collected in aid of the funds £27 8s. 4d. Our young Brother's labours were highly appreciated by the people, and much regret was felt by them that they could not induce him to continue his services. From all the information received your Board has reason to believe, that the impression made by his administrations was highly salutary and useful, and that the good seed of the Kingdom sown by him found a lodgement in many hearts.

From the time Bro. Seely left the Board was unable to obtain a successor until Rev. Isaiah Wallace was induced to make a Missionary visit to that section. He became so much interested in its spiritual necessities, and received such earnest solicitations from the people that he was disposed to accept an appointment from the Board; has removed his family to Newcastle, and has already entered upon his work. The people have given encouragement that at least two thirds of the expense of this mission will henceforth be borne by them, and there is reason to believe that if Bro. Wallace continue to occupy the ground permanently, it will very soon become entirely self-sustaining. The Miramichi County is fully open to the preaching of the gospel by Baptist Ministers, and the "Macedonia" appeal from that section is loud and urgent. The antecedents of Brother Wallace afford much encouragement to hope that his efficient labors will be crowned with abundant success. For this let all fervently pray.

BRO. TRIMBLES MISSION.

This valued Missionary in his report says :-

June 10th, 1858.

"During the past year I have spent 6 months in the service of the Board. In that time I have preached 122 sermons, attended 24 prayer and conference meetings, 146 in all, paid 164 visits, organized 3 Sabbath Schools, circulated 1,350 pages of tracts, and numbers of the Family Casket, travelled 400 miles, organized 1 total abstinence society, and I auxiliary to the parent Missionary Society in St. John, baptised 8 persons and collected £20 for the Board. Part of this labour was spent with the Fourth Baptis ehurch, in the Parish of Sprigfield, visited a district in Waterboro', and made 4 Missionary tours in Albert County, breaches in

E.B. DeMill to enter upon this field under their direction. After due onsideration the invitation was accepted, and he entered upon his work in the month of September last. Previously, however, to is coming to the city, a mutual arrangement was made between rour Board and the Board of the Juvenile Missionary Society of he Bressel Street Baptist Church, by which he was to be regarded stheir missionary for such a portion of the year as they could stain him, the parent Board' holding themselves responsible at he same time to meet any deficiency of salary. LAY AGENCY.

The usual missionary labor in the Loch Lomond and South Bay districts, have been continued by the gifted lay brethren of the city churches during a good portion of the year, and havaererted we doubt not, a most healthful influence. Circumstances have occurred to interrupt their labors for the time being. It is haped, however, that they will soon be resumed.

THE FRENCH MISSION.

The following report has been received from Bro. Knight:-

In compliance with the Missionary Board's request, I beg to give you a statement of my Mission during the last eight months. I have visited Buctouche river and its environs, I trust with some degree of auccess; I have also spent several weeks at St. Francis; there I have met with much encouragement; I preached to large congregations of French people in French houses and in the French language; and was cordially received and listened to by the people; and the letters which I have received from Bro. Slocomb at different periods, show the work is still progressing. Bro. S. states, the French are very desirous to see and hear me again, and mentions two individuals who have declared their determination to renounce popery. May the Lord be with them. I have been strongly urged to return to them by the English families; having preached in both languages alternately. In Dorchester I have preached in the Baptist meeting house in the French language to some 18 or 20 French people, and I intend, God willing, to preach to them again as soon as I can see an

GENERAL AGENCY.

It is known that the RevalJames Newcomb was appointed at the last Anniversary of the Society to labor permanently as the General Missionary of the society. The hope was fondly cherished that our brother would be able to very much increase the funds of the society and in various ways extend its influence for good, but owing to the financial pressure upon the County, associated with the action of some of the Auxiliaries preventing the collection of funds in sections where they were established for geneal purposes; our brother became disheartened and gave up his Agency. In consequence of this disarrangement of the plans of the Board they have not been able to meet promptly their liabilities to their missionaries; in the field, or to supply other sections alling urgently for help. Your Board has felt from the beginning that without a constant agency in the field, to excite general interest, and to harmonize the churches in one combined! Missimary movement it would be impossible to carry forward Home Missions to the extent which the interests of the cause demands. They would therefore again urge upon the society to duly consider this subject, and select some competent man for this importaant work.

It would be the pleasure of the auxiliary to keep one Missionary employed during the year, but on account of the scarcity of money, their desire can not be realised. It is the policy of this auxiliary not to employ more laborers then their means will admit of, and we therefore govern ourselves accordingly at each meet-

The Committhe of the N. B. Baptist Education Society's in posenting their 22nd Annual Report beg to submit the following

I. The operations of the Seminary have been conducted during the past year under the efficient supervision of the Rev. Isaiah I. The number of studies.

1. The number of students attending the Seminary during the whas been 65; the average number has been somewhat less man previous years, owing chiefly to the uncertainty and lateman of the date of the commencement of the Summer Term.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

N. B. BAPTIST SHOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Article 1. This Society shall be called the "New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society."

Article 2. The design of this Society shall be to promote the aithful preaching of the Gospel of Christ, and to spread Bible Caristianity throughout the destitute sections of New Brunswick.

Article 3.—Any person may become a member of this Society, by centributing 5s. or upwards annually to its fands. Seven pounds ten shiftings paid at any one time shall constitute a life member; and any person paying a sum, which in addition to previous contributions, shall amount to twenty-five pounds, shall be a director for life; and any Baptist Church or Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be mittled to be represented by one delegate for every five pounds to contributed.

Article 4.—The officers of this Society shall be a Presidente Vice Presidents, a corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society.

Article 5.—The Society shall appoint an Executive Committee, udusive of the officers above named, residing in the City of kint John and its vicinity. The officers above named shall be

members ex officio of the Executive Committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum at any meeting regularly convened. This Committee shall have power to call its own meetings, from its own rules of business, and fill any vacancies which may occur during the year, and convene special meetings of the Board and of the Society; shall appoint Missionaries, and instruct them as to their sphere of labours; shall expend the funds for the objects of the Society, providing that all amounts contributed for any specific object shall, as far as possible, be faithfully applied in accordance with the wish of the doners; shall employ such agency or agencies for the collection of funds, and for all such purposes as the interests of the Society may demand, and shall make an Annual Report of their proceedings to the Society.

Article 6 .- Every Auxiliary Society who shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of this Society, shall be entitled to receive missionary labour in such field as it may designate to an amount at least equal to its contributions; provided such de-

signation be made at the time of payment.

Article 7.—The officers of Auxiliary Societies shall be ex officio Directors of this society, and their members shall be members of this society.

Article 8.—The annual meeting of this Society shall be held at such time and place as shall be determined upon at a previous

annual meeting.

Article 9.-No deteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present at an annual meeting.

OF THE

EASTERN N. BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. This association composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of the churches which they represent, shall be styled "the Eastern N. B. Baptist Association."

Art. 2. The Association shall meet Annualy, at 2 o'clock, P. M., on the second Saturday of July, at such a place as they shall appinit; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The Meeting shall be opened with Social Conference, after which the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjoarnment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by prayer.

Art. 3. Each church shell have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be entitled to agreater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

Art. 4. At each meeting of the Aassociation, the Delegates shall deliver to the Clerk of the preceding year immediately on their arrival, the letters from the Churches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Clerk, their names shall be called, and they shall take their places. The Moderator of the preceding year shall call the vote for a Moderator, and the person who shall be chosen by a Majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, to preside in all transactions of the meeting, nomintate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of same for the Press.

Art. 5.—It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messenger a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminution within the last year; and generally of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

Art. 6. When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, application must be made by letter and satisfactory evis dence furnished of their faith and order; this being done and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, in behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messengers, if any be present, the right hand of fellowship.

Art. 7. When a church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association for three years successively, it shall be tonsidered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members shall request its continuance, and rhall engage to inquire into its standing, and

report at the next meeting of the Association.

Art. 8. Although as an Association, we disclaim all power over the Churches, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church or Minister in our connexion, which to us shall appear to be unscriptural in principle or irregular in practice. In order, however, that we may not withdraw our fellowship without sufficient reason from any Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made by two members of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a Committee to investigate the points of complaint, and report the result of their inquiries to the Association, that they may decide as duty shall appear.

Art. & Alterations or amendments may be made in this Constitution from time to time such as experience may dictate.
