MR. SHERMAN PASSED AWAY LAST NIGHT

Vice-President of the United States is Dead

LENGTHY ILLNESS

Complication of Diseases Gradually Undermined His Health—Members of His Family Are Present to the End.

Utica, N. Y., Oct. 30.—After a long illness Vice President James Sherman died at his home in this city at 9:42 o'clock tonight of uremic poison caused by Bright's disease, complicated by heart disease and arterio sclerosis.

The \$500 "Ball of fate" as she described the great crystal ball globe into which she peered in the seclusion of a sombre draped room to look afar into the future and where she, as a result of the fate of several of her relatives whose deaths are subjects of investigation, was put in evidence today.

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MONTREAL HAS TOO MANY BARS

License Commission Hears Arguments for Reduction of Number of Drinking Places—Question Threshed Out.

Montreal, Oct. 30.—That facilities for drinking increased drunkenness, that Montreal's drinking places were places of danger to the youth of the city and the land, and that there should be a large decrease in the number of the city's drinking places, were views strongly expressed by the Right Rev. J. C. Farthing, bishop of Montreal, speaking at the opening session of the provincial license commission this morning. His lordship declared that the laws regulating the sale of liquor in the city were not enforced enough in some parts and that the daily story in some parts and that the daily story of what drink did in Montreal was sufficient warrant for reducing the number of licenses held.

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CONFIRMING REPORTS OF OPERATIONS OF THE TURKS AND BULGARIANS

Will Have to Purchase Metals for Transcontinental Line at High Rates--Trade With Canada.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Oct. 30.—This week's issue of the weekly report of the Department of Trade and Commerce contains a communication from D. H. Ross, Trade Commissioner in Australia, in which particulars are given of the Transcontinental Railway which has been started to connect the state railway systems of south and western Australia. The line will be 1,063 miles long, will cost approximately \$20,000,000, and will require 146,000 tons of steel rails and 146,000 tons of steel rails and 146,000 tons of steel rails.

"None of the tenders received by the commonwealth government were accepted," Mr. Ross writes. "A special effort was made by this office (through the Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa) to interest Canadian rolling mills in regard to these orders, for which the Australian government agreed to accept great deliveries."

"Heavy forward contracts and a strong domestic demand precluded Canadian makers of steel rails from submitting offers for even a portion of this large tonnage. Up to this date (Sept. 21, 1912), the contract has not been placed, but to proceed with construction, it seems imperative that the government will be compelled to order a considerable quantity of rails at the higher rates now ruling."

Mr. Ross notes that a financial stringency has been prevailing in Australia, it being part due to drought.

W. A. Hedde, Trade Commissioner in New Zealand, gives particulars of the direct trade between Canada and New Zealand. When the vessels of this service leave St. John in winter nearly the whole cargo is of Canadian origin. In the summer months over 30 per cent. of the cargo carried in American ships is of Canadian origin.

Mr. Hedde reports that as years ago by New Zealand will call upon British Columbia and (with the completion of the Panama Canal) upon eastern Canada for increasing supplies of timber.

During the season from September last to May next, reservations have been made for 124,985 boxes of butter from New Zealand to Canada; of this 101,285 are to go to Vancouver, and 23,700 by way of San Francisco.
