QUESTION IV.

What Ministers have died since last Conference?

ANSWER.

THOMAS SMITH, who was born February 17th, 1812, and died June 1st, 1874.

He was a native of Bermuda, and from that Island called to the work of the Christian Ministry when twenty-two years of age. He labored under the direction of the Missionary Committee in Liverpool, Halifax,

and Maitland, and was ordained in Charlottetown, P. E. I. From this province he was sent to the West Indies. On one of his stations in the Island of Dominica he was prostrated with sickness, from the effects of which he never fully recovered. He next spent four years in Hamilton, Bermuda, and from thence was sent to Newfoundland. He preached with acceptance and success on the Port De Grave, Bonavista, St. John's, and Brigas Circuits. In Bonavista he witnessed a great revival, the fruit of which remains to this day, as numbers are there who were converted through his ministry, and to whom his name is fragrant with blessed memories. He was next sent to Nova Scotia in the year 1861, and stationed at Truro, then Mill Village, then Barrington.

Six years ago he was compelled to retire from the more active work of the ministry, to do what he could as far as his strength would permit. He preached occasionally, assisted in the prayer-meetings, and took part in the various services in the town. During the winter he grew feeble, and only once came to the house of God to attend the service of song. He was impressed with Bunyan's words: "After that they shut up the gates, which when I had seen I wished myself among them," he said, "I wish myself among them." His last public act was at the funeral of a friend, when with tremulous voice he prayed for the bereaved family, and touchingly breathed forth the hope of reunion in heaven. For a few days only he stood on the brink of the river of death. He responded fervently in prayer, as a few hours before he died he was commended to God. He was trusting on the atonement. His last words were, "Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel, and afterward receive me to glory." And then he calmly slept in Jesus, in the sixty-second year of his age, and the fortieth of his ministry.

He was a good man. He manifested a deep interest

in the welfare of the Church of Christ. He was fervent in his prayers. He preached only Christ—Jesus and him crucified. To say there were no infirmities,—no errors of judgment, would be to say he was not human. His sermons and prayers were filled with the words and spirit of the Bible.

But his weariness is over. His protracted sufferings are ended. The warrior is disarmed. The victor is crowned. The aching, the pain, the watching have ceased. The pilgrim has passed over Jordan, he has entered into rest. The servant has gone to his account. The memory yet lingers.

“How beautiful it is for man to die
 Upon the walls of Zion! to be called,
 Like a watch-worn, and weary sentinel,
 To put his armor off and rest in Heaven.”

HOME MISSION FUND.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the resolutions of Conference respecting the Home Mission Fund?

ANSWER.

The Conference has great pleasure in recording the continued and steadily increasing success attending this important department of our work. It recognizes with great satisfaction the deep interest felt by our people in the Home Mission Cause, as evinced by their liberal contributions to its funds; and is thankful to be able

to report a gratifying advance in the receipts of the Society from the various circuits during the year. It also records with devout gratitude to God that the past year has been one of great spiritual prosperity on our Home Mission stations, and that a large increase in our membership in those stations has been realized. The Conference again commends this enterprise to the prayerful and practical sympathies of the Methodist public, and trusts that in the new relationships into which we are about entering this valuable interest of our church will continue to receive the attention and support it deserves.

SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

QUESTION XV.

What does the Conference resolve respecting the Supernumerary Ministers, and Ministers Widows Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference most gratefully observes that this important Fund has received, during the past year, increased attention from its supporters, as indicated by an increase of contributions in most of the districts.

2. Our Supernumerary Ministers and their families are committed to the Church as a sacred trust; and we feel assured that according as they are sustained, who have been worn out in the service of the Master, and are confidently reposing upon the benevolence of a people whose interests are to them an increasing and exhausting responsibility, God will bless and prosper our cause.

3. The Conference once more appeals to the Church

for such an augmentation of pecuniary gifts and annual contributions to this Fund as shall render its resources ample to meet all the demands which the Providence of God may permit in the future to fall upon it.

4. The 15th of the established "Rules and Regulations" of this Fund having been suspended, for the time being, by the unanimous vote of the Conference, in order that the modifications in them, which are rendered necessary by the impending separation of this Conference into three annual conferences, it was resolved:

1. That hereafter the committee shall consist of the General Treasurers of the Fund and the Ministers and Laymen, who, according to section 40 of the articles of Union, are appointed from time to time from the annual conferences of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, P. E. Island, and Newfoundland as members of the Central Missionary Board of the General Conference, and that the committee so constituted shall meet annually at or about the time of the said Central Missionary Board.

2. That local or Conference Treasurers for the Fund shall be appointed by each of the aforesaid Annual Conferences—one Minister and one Layman in each.

3. That Mariner Wood, Esq., and the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., are requested to continue in office as General Treasurers of the Fund until others may be appointed by the General Committee.

4. The Conference gratefully acknowledges the devoted attention which the Treasurer, Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., has given to the working of the Fund, and his success in promoting the interests of its members for many years.

The thanks of the Conference are hereby presented to Rev. A. W. Nicolson, the Secretary of this Fund.

CHILDREN'S FUND.

What are the resolutions of the Conference respecting the Children's Fund?

This Conference gratefully recognizes the goodness of God in being able to report some increase in this department of the church's work, but deeply deplores that the actual falling off in nearly half of the districts of the Conference, renders the nett increase much smaller than it would otherwise have been.

1. Resolved that this Conference reaffirms its conviction of the importance of this institution of our church, recommends to its members their most earnest and prayerful effort to increase its efficiency by establishing new schools wherever it is possible, and by giving all possible encouragement to the officers and teachers of those already in existence, by the frequent presence and kindly counsels of the superintending ministers, that the Sabbath Schools may be in reality what it is in name, the nursery of the church.

2. The Conference would express its approval of the introduction, wherever practicable, of the international series of Sunday School lessons, as affording valuable assistance to the teachers in imparting instruction, and

to the scholars in an intelligent apprehension of the teaching of the Holy Scriptures.

EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

QUESTION XVIII.

What are the resolutions of Conference respecting the Conference Educational Society?

1. The Conference call the special attention of the friends of our church to the increasing importance of the cause of Christian Education.

2. The rapidity with which stirring events transpire among the nations of the world, and the persistent and invidious efforts of the enemies of the cross to subvert

the principles of christianity, render the subject of education one that must commend itself to every enlightened mind and philanthropic heart.

3. The Conference directs that the constitution of this Society shall be so amended that the aims of the Society shall be confined to supporting our Educational Institutions at Sackville, and assisting young candidates for the ministry, and trusts that this important enterprise of our church will commend itself more warmly in the future than it has done in the past to the sympathy and liberality of the friends of our church.

For Reports, &c., see Appendix A.

The Conference directs that the constitution of the Educational Society, as amended, shall be binding upon each of the Conferences, viz.: the Nova Scotia, the New Brunswick and P. E. Island, and the Newfoundland Conference; and that each of the Conferences shall appoint a committee, with a secretary and treasurer, who shall report and remit at the close of each Conference the amounts collected to the General Treasurers.

In consequence of the division of the Conference of E. B. America into three annual conferences, and in order to provide for a central committee, it is resolved, that hereafter the General Committee shall consist of the General Treasurers of the fund and the ministers and laymen, who, according to section 40 of the articles of union are appointed from time to time from the Annual Conferences of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island and Newfoundland, as members of the Central Missionary Board of the General Conference, and that the committee so constituted shall meet annually at or about the time of the meeting of the said Central Board.

That Rev. C. Stewart, D. D., and Wm. B. McNutt, Esqrs., be requested to continue in office as General Treasurers of the fund until others may be appointed by the General Committee.

PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN AND BOOK
ROOM.

QUESTION XIX.

What are the resolutions of Conference respecting the Provincial Wesleyan and Book Room?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference is gratified to learn that since the removal of the Book Concern to more eligible premises in Granville Street, the business has been largely increased, and believes that with improved facilities the Book Steward can place within the reach of our people sound and wholesome literature at prices decidedly advantageous to them.

2. The Conference highly approved of the action of the Book Steward in giving special attention to books suitable for Sabbath Schools, both in regard to quality and price, and believing that good guarantee is hereby afforded of diffusing among our families a safe literature, cordially recommends to those responsible for the selection of Sabbath School libraries, when practicable, that they should obtain them from the Book Room.

3. The Conference has heard with great satisfaction of the steady increase, during the year, in the circulation of the "Provincial Wesleyan," and most cordially recommends our connexional organ to Methodist Families, and believes that its weekly perusal will greatly promote among our people an intelligent appreciation of all the general interests of our church.

4. (1.) The Conference recognizes with great satisfaction that a Colportage Fund has been established during the past year, in connection with the Book Room, for circulating sound and cheap literature in poor and destitute localities, and gratefully appreciates the benevolence of the friends who have contributed to its support.

(2.) Deeming it of great importance that the fund should be fully sustained for the advantage of Home Mission interests, particularly in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, the Conference most earnestly recommends this fund to the sympathy and liberality of all people.

(3.) The Conference tenders to the Rev. A. W. Nicolson, Book Steward and editor, its most cordial thanks for the arduous labor which during the year has been devoted to the management of the Book Room and "Provincial Wesleyan;" and greatly rejoices in the marked ability and success with which those important connexional interests have been administered.

MOUNT ALLISON INSTITUTIONS.

QUESTION XX.

What are the resolutions of Conference with respect to the Mount Allison Educational Institutions?

ANSWER.

1. That the reports of the Mount Allison Wesleyan College and Academies have been received with great gratification.

2. That we record with thankful recognition of the good hand of God that the efficiency of these institutions is to-day as great as it has ever been; that the gentlemen presiding over them continue to give proof of eminent adaptation to their work and are assisted by thoroughly competent associates; that the number of students in attendance during the year has been much larger than for several years past; and that the year has been distinguished by successful work in the various departments, by freedom from the visitation of

death, and also by the gracious influence of the Holy Spirit, especially in the students in the Ladies' Branch.

3. That the Reports of the Professor of Theology, and of the examining Committee respecting the Theological Institution for the past year have given us unmingled pleasure, and that the laborious and responsible position of Professor of Theology has been filled to the perfect satisfaction of the Conference by our beloved brother, the Rev. Charles Stewart, D. D., whom, together with his work, we commend to the sympathy and prayers of the members of our church.

4. That we are pleased to learn from the Report of the Rev. Dr. Pickard, agent of the Educational Fund, that the fund has now reached the sum of fifty-four thousand dollars; that we do now renew the expression of our earnest conviction recorded in the minutes of Conference last year, that, while an endowment fund of from seventy-five to one hundred thousand dollars is exceedingly desirable, one of at least sixty thousand dollars is immediately indispensable for the maintenance and advancement of our educational work; and that, in accordance with this continued conviction, we accede with pleasure to the request of the Board of Trustees and Governors, and do hereby reappoint the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D. D., to the special work connected with the raising of this fund, pledging ourselves to assist him in our several circuits to the extent of our ability.

5. That the Conference learns with pleasure that the change in the constitution of the Board of Trustees and Governors, sanctioned by the last Conference, has been accomplished by act of Provincial Parliament, and believes that the change will increase the interest of the alumni in the welfare of their alma mater, and promote the prosperity of our educational institutions.

6. That the following shall be the course of study appointed for probationers for our ministry, and they

are required to be examined upon it by written papers in answer to questions to be furnished by the secretary of the committee for the examination of candidates at the Annual District Meetings:—

QUESTION XXIII.

What Miscellaneous Resolutions are adopted by the Conference?

ANSWER.

I.—THANKS TO THE DELEGATES TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE.

The Conference has heard with much satisfaction the reports of its esteemed Representatives to the British Conference, and desires to express its sense of great obligation to the Rev. C. Stewart, D. D., and the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., for the judicious and effectual manner in which they have discharged the duty devolved upon them; and the Conference would further record its gratitude to Almighty God for His Gracious Providence over these dear brethren, by sea and by land, while absent on these delegations, as also to the success which He has vouchsafed to their important mission.

II.—GENERAL CONFERENCE.—M. E. CHURCH, U. S.

That this Conference has been greatly pleased to receive and hear read the address of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in the United States of America—so cordial in its spirit and highly encouraging and instructive in the intelligence it conveys, and would most warmly reciprocate the paternal greetings of our American Methodist brethren, as expressed by their honored representatives, the Rev. Wm. R. Clark, D. D., and the Rev. Wm. H. Elliot, to whose eloquent, affectionate, and suggestive utterances we have been privileged to listen, and for whose future happiness and success in the cause of our common Master we most earnestly pray.

III.—BRITISH CONFERENCE.

Whereas the preliminary arrangements for the intended union of the Conference of Canada and Eastern British America, with altered relations to the British Conference are now completed.

And whereas, this is the last opportunity which in the present relation to each other we shall have of expressing our regard for the fathers and brethren of the British Conference, and our sense of the obligations under which we are laid by the kind consideration we have ever received at their hands, it is resolved:

1. That we gratefully record the fact that before and since the organization of the Conference of Eastern British America, in 1855, down to the present time, we have been most affectionately regarded by our fathers and brethren in the British Conference and by the Missionary Committee, as evinced not only by the loving and encouraging words which they have sent us from time to time, but by the substantial aid they have continually and so readily granted us in the prosecution of our work.

2. That we heartily appreciate the cordial reception given to our representatives at the last meeting of the British Conference, and the generous treatment of our proposals to change our relation to that body, by entering into a union with the Canada Conference, involving an independent Canadian organization; and that the resolutions on the subject of this union passed by the British Conference, together with their cheerful consent to assist for some time the work of our missions in Newfoundland, Bermuda, and Labrador.

3. That we sincerely reciprocate the well wishes expressed in the above named resolutions, and do earnestly pray that upon our fathers and brethren of the British Conference the prospering blessing of God may ever abide, and that Methodism in the old country, in the

Dominion of Canada, and wherever she may now or hereafter exist, may be true to the mission to which God has called her, and which our fathers so zealously fulfilled, of spreading scriptural holiness throughout the land.

IV.—SYMPATHY.

1. The Conference desires to express its deep sympathy for the Rev. G. M. Barratt, Rev. R. Weddall, and Rev. G. W. Tuttle, in their retirement from the active work of the ministry, after a long and faithful service in the Lord's vineyard, and to assure these esteemed brethren of its earnest wish and sincere prayer that that gospel which under their instrumentality has been made a blessing to thousands, may be a means of continued and abundant consolation to their own souls, and that under its cheering influences they may abide until at length they hear the master say, "well done."

2. The Conference also deeply sympathizes with several other ministerial brethren, who on account of failure of health are compelled for the present to take a Supernumerary relation, and while remembering their useful labours in the past would earnestly pray that these brethren beloved may be in a short time so far restored as to be able to resume the full work of the ministry.

V.—THANKS, ETC.

1. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. John McMurray, President, for the faithful and successful discharge of the duties of his office, and also to the Rev. Geo. S. Milligan, A. M., Co-Delegate, for the performance of his duties.

2. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. James Taylor, Secretary of the Conference, and the Rev. R. A. Temple, Journal Secretary, for the services rendered by them,

3. That the Conference of Eastern British America cannot conscientiously close its present session without having upon record a clear and grateful recognition of the important services rendered by Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., on behalf of the Conference generally during the whole period of its existence. It now acknowledges its indebtedness to Dr Pickard for earnest labors in all the official relations he has sustained, and especially for those of the past year, as Financial Secretary and Conference Agent.

4. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. C. Jost, A. M., Rev. J. A. Rogers, Rev. A. D. Morton, A. M., Sub-Secretaries; to Rev. J. Pike, Assistant Journal Secretary; Rev. J. G. Angwin, Assistant Financial Secretary; to Rev. Robert Duncan and Rev. H. Sprague, A. M., Conference Letter Writers, and Rev. Jonathan Borden, for their valuable services, rendered by them at this Conference.

5. That the thanks of the Conference are due and are hereby given to the Rev. S. F. Huestis, and the Rev. W. Sargent, Secretaries for the Home Mission, for their faithful and efficient labours in connection with this fund, believing that the success of our Home Mission enterprise has been largely owing, under God, to the zeal and energy of the senior Secretary of the Fund.

6. That the most cordial thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby presented to D. Henry Starr, Esq., for the hospitality and unremitting kindness and care shown by him to the young men, candidates for our ministry, on their arrival in Halifax, receiving them to his home, and at great sacrifice of time and means forwarding them to their Circuits.

7. That the thanks of this Conference are hereby tendered to George H. Starr, Esq., of Halifax, for his munificent donation of \$800 to the funds of the Educational Society of the Conference, and the Conference regrets that this expression of thanks was inadvertently omitted in the Minutes of last year.

8. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the executors of the late Hon. J. H. Anderson for the prompt payment of the instalments of Mr. Anderson's bequests, made for the benefit of our Conference Funds.

9. That the thanks of the Conference are due and are hereby presented to Joseph Lawrence, Esq., East Keswick, Wetherby, England, for the very great interest he has continued to take in the progress of our beloved Methodism in these provinces during the past year, and would especially acknowledge his important services to our connexion by finding suitable candidates for our ministry, in some cases furnishing them with scholastic advantages at his institution, and supplying them with valuable theology and other standard works, and by sending to Newfoundland religious tracts and other periodicals for circulation.

10. That the thanks of the Conference are due to the Superintendent of the Charlottetown, P. E. I. Circuit, for the satisfactory arrangements made by him for the comfortable accommodation of the Ministers attending this Conference.

11. That the ministers of the Charlottetown, P. E. I. Circuit, be requested to express from the pulpit next Lord's day the thanks of the Conference to the members of our Church and other friends, for their kindness and Christian hospitality in entertaining the ministers who have attended the present Conference.

12. The Conference presents its thanks to the proprietors of the railroads, steamboats and coaches, for the special advantages afforded in journeying to and from this Conference.

VI.—TEMPERANCE.

1. The Conference, deeply impressed with the conviction that intemperance is a sin against God, and most destructive to the best interests of our race, and

that the use of alcoholic liquors, even in moderation, tends to the increase and perpetuation of drunkenness :

Resolves—(1.) That in view of this great evil, we would reiterate and earnestly enjoin upon all our people the most careful and conscientious observance of that rule given by the Rev. John Wesley to the societies under his care, respecting the use of intoxicating drinks, viz:—“Neither buying or selling spirituous liquors, nor drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity.”

(2.) That we hail with delight all well directed efforts of individuals and organizations to promote the cause of Temperance, and, so far as practicable, will heartily co-operate in those laudable efforts.

(3.) That as the Church of Christ should be the most effectual promoter of moral reform, we pledge ourselves to renewed efforts to purify and preserve her from reproach by discountenancing all complicity of her members with the great evil of intemperance, whether by drinking, manufacturing, selling, signing petitions for license, or furnishing or renting places for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

QUESTION XXIV.

When and where shall our next Conference be held ?

ANSWER.

Those members of the Conference, who by the station sheet just read, are appointed to Nova Scotia, shall meet, or as many of them as can attend in this church this afternoon at 3 o'clock, to organize as the Nova Scotia Annual Conference of “the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada;” and in like manner those who are appointed to New Brunswick and P. E. Island, in the school room of this church at the same time to organize as the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Annual Con-

ference; and those appointed to the St. John's, Newfoundland, and Carbonear Districts, as soon as practicable, at the call of the Co-delegate of this Conference, to organize as the Newfoundland Annual Conference, and that the minutes of these meetings be published with the minutes just read, as authorized supplements thereto.

FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Report (No. 2) of the Special Committee on our Financial Economy was adopted, and is as follows:—

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several Circuits the following plan, by which it is hoped they may the more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowance of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money hereafter unnecessary.

1. Let the Quarterly Boards at the beginning of each financial year estimate the amount needed for the year.
2. Then ascertain from each member of the church, and, as far as practicable, from each attendant of the congregation, what each proposes to give as his or her weekly or monthly contribution.
3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for that purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.
4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the amount needed, then let the stewards appor-

tion the deficiency among all such as are willing, for Christ's sake, to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his or her consent, the additional amount which they think he or she ought weekly or monthly to pay.

5. Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly or of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him or her. Let these contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them, and be brought up by him to the quarterly meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all these pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the quarterly meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.

6. That quarterly meetings adopting the envelope system be recommended not to include in their estimates the claims of Foreign and Home Missions, but to provide for these funds as in time passed by special collections and subscriptions.

7. That in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum salary of the ministers should be \$750 instead of \$650 as heretofore.

8. That in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum amount of Young Men's salary should be \$200 instead of \$150 as heretofore.

9. That in the opinion of this Conference the salary of ordained, but unmarried ministers, should be \$520.

STANDING ORDERS.

I.—DISTRICT MEETINGS.

1. The Chairmen of Districts are peremptorily re-

quired to procure three complete copies of the minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary ; one of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records, the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the committee. Furthermore, it is required that the last mentioned copies be handed in on the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory committee meeting may be appointed to be held, that the secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined that when the minutes of the several districts shall have been signed by their respective chairmen and secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by the special permission of the Conference.

II.—PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

3. That in regard to subscriptions for the *Provincial Wesleyan*, enquiry be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such monies—the accounts being previously sent to the chairmen, and distributed at the Annual District Meetings

III.—CANDIDATES RECOMMENDED.

4. Each District Chairman is required to instruct young men recommended by the District Meeting as probationers for our work, to attend the meeting of the Committees for the examination of Candidates.

IV.—MISSIONARY LISTS.

5. Each superintendent is required to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper, and made up in Canada currency, a perfect list of all Missionary monies collected on his Circuit; and each chairman is required to present such lists to the Missionary Secretaries in a state ready for publication, on the day previous to the meeting of the Missionary Committees.

V.—CHILDREN'S FUND.

6. The Financial Secretaries of the several districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Annual District Meeting, the names of all the ministers in their respective districts who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed; and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each of the said children.

VI.—SPIRITUAL REPORTS.

8. *Resolved*, That at the Annual District Meetings, a summary of the Spiritual Reports, and of the Sabbath School Reports, for the respective Circuits, be prepared and entered in the District Minutes, to be laid before the ensuing Conference. The Chairmen of Districts are made responsible for the execution of this order.

VII—BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

8. *Resolved*, That every Minister and Preacher is peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward each year, at or before the meeting of Conference.

The Annual Meeting of our Conference again calls for a retrospect of the workings of our different Institutions, and among them of the Education Society.

Perhaps there is no branch of our Church work that affects more closely our personal welfare than this. Viewed in its social, political or religious aspects it is indeed many-sided in its scope and influence, and possesses claims that deserve to be heard and supported.

In looking at our past history as a connexion, we find that the value of Education has always been rated high. Taken from the busiest and most engrossing occupations of life our fathers in the ministry were always abreast of the advancing intelligence of the age. And knowing well that an enlightened mind always grasps and holds the truth with the greatest tenacity, they laboured earnestly to provide the means by which their people might grow in knowledge as well as in grace. In the mother country, as well as on this continent, large and commodious buildings give evidence of their solicitude to make provision to conserve the interests of christian education.

And to us is given the work of perpetuating the truth, and of handing down to our successors such a record of work performed as will make them to act in this matter even more nobly than ourselves.

The labor that we have already expended has not been useless. Our institution at Sackville has made its influence felt in our midst, and now stands second to no similar institution in the maritime provinces; but although much has been done more remains to be com-

pleted. The governors of our institution desire to make improvements, in harmony with the increasing demands of the age, and we appeal for a nobler sustentation in the future, that their laudable efforts in this direction may not be thwarted for lack of means. Here the children of Methodism may receive a liberal education, in which, whilst being led through the branches of earthly knowledge, they may at the same time be directed to the fount whose living waters they may drink, and drinking find that they shall never thirst again.

Moreover we desire to provide means by which those young men who feel themselves called of God to preach the everlasting gospel, may be assisted in securing such instruction as shall make them able ministers thereof. The age demands an educated ministry, men, who like the careful householder are able to bring out of the treasury things new and old, able to "hold forth the word of life," with such wisdom and zeal that the indifferent may be aroused, scorners rebuked, and believers edified and built up.

With profound gratitude to Almighty God, the Home Missionary Committee beg to state that the past year has been one of special and most encouraging success in connection with the operations of this Society.

It has been a year of satisfactory financial advancement. Our people have responded with even more than their accustomed liberality to the appeals addressed to them on behalf of this noble and increasingly important cause, and the contributions to the funds of the Society are far beyond those of any previous year. The Home Mission circuits have themselves creditably sustained the financial interests of our Church. Many of them, besides contributing largely to the support of their own ministers and to the Home Mission Fund, have also manifested commendable activity and zeal in the erection of churches for the worship of God, and parsonages for the accommodation of those who labor among them in the Word and doctrine. Others have added needed repairs to existing edifices, while in several cases debts which had long crippled and embarrassed the work of God have been removed.

THE PAST YEAR HAS ALSO BEEN ONE OF TERRITORIAL
EXPANSION.

For the first time since the organization of this Society all the Circuits placed under its supervision have been supplied during the greater part of the year—many of them by ministers appointed at the last Conference, and others by candidates for the ministry who arrived from England last autumn, and by efficient hired local preachers. Several of these Circuits comprise localities and sections of the country that have seldom or but rarely been visited by the Methodist Evangelist. Some of them having been almost entirely without the services of any Protestant minister.

The following facts are gleaned from reports furnished by Missionaries stationed in these new fields of labor will be found interesting.

Sheet Harbor and Eastern Shore, which for a year or two past has been occasionally visited from Middle Musquodoboit, has since October last enjoyed the services of Bro. J. W. Shepherdson. He describes his Circuit as extending over 62 miles and having six preaching places, and over this ground the preacher travels every three weeks. Considerable opposition has been experienced, but our cause is gradually gaining favor with the people, and there is some prospect of a society being shortly formed.

Deer Island in the St. John District is another entirely new field of labor entered upon during the year. The labors of Bro. Lawson on this station have been greatly blessed to the reclaiming of backsliders and the conversion of the impenitent, and a number of persons have professed themselves anxious to be identified with our Church.

Goldenville, which was referred to in our last Report as presenting a promising opening for Missionary effort, was supplied during the summer months by a Student from Sackville and subsequently by Bro. Craig from England. Two new preaching places have been recently opened on this Circuit—one at Port Beckton where there had been no religious service for nearly a year, and another at Fisherman's Harbor, at which place but sixteen sermons have been preached since its settlement sixty years ago. Bro. C. is the first Methodist minister who had visited this place.

Ingonish, on the Island of Cape Breton, is an entirely new and a most interesting field of missionary operations. It comprises a population of about 150 families, fifty of whom are Protestant. With the exception of Bro. Purvis, who was sent thither in November last, there is no Protestant minister on the ground. Shortly after his arrival he formed a small class, which has since been largely increased in numbers by a gracious revival. A promising Sabbath School has been organized; a commodious Church for the accommodation of all Protestant denominations is in course of erection; and the people have raised a very respectable sum for the support of the minister.

Shediac, having been separated from the Moncton Circuit, was supplied during six months of the year by Bro. Jas. Elder, an esteemed local preacher. He found many of the people destitute of the means of grace; one person stated she had not heard a sermon for 17 years. He was successful in gathering quite a number into the Church of Christ.

The Tobique Mission in Fredericton District has received the appointment of a Home Missionary—and presents encouraging prospects of success.

Dalhousie Circuit which has remained vacant and destitute of Methodist preaching for many years, has been energetically worked by an esteemed local Brother, and bids fair to become a flourishing and prosperous station.

The Mission in connection with the Bridgetown Circuit embraces a number of settlements situated on the North and South Mountains. Special services held in one of these places resulted in the conversion of about forty persons, many of whom united with our branch of the Church.

The Hebron Mission, near Yarmouth, is composed almost entirely of places not hitherto occupied by us. A Church is in process of erection at Darling's Lake, and a blessed work of grace seems to prevail.

Bridgewater is a new and a most promising Station. Two or three new preaching places have been established, and a goodly number in these localities have united with the Church, The entire expenses of this Mission have been raised upon the Circuit.

In Newfoundland new Missions have been opened at the following places, viz: St. Anthony, French Shore, Flowers Cove on the French Shore to the extreme North of Newfoundland, from which station places on the Labrador will be regularly visited, Placentia Bay, Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay, St. Pierre, Green's Harbor and Musgrave Harbor.

From the first mentioned place Bro. McGregor writes three months after his arrival there: "There was no class meeting when I came, we have now three small classes, numbering in all twenty-eight members. We have three Sabbath Schools and I expect to commence another next Sabbath. The number of classes has since been increased to five, and every month souls have been converted to God.

At Bonne Bay the labors of Bro. Hill have been blessed to the conversion of a goodly number of persons, and a class of six members formed shortly after his entering upon the duties of his circuit now numbers over thirty.

From Placentia Bay Bro. James reports great prosperity. Special services held at the commencement of the year were instrumental in the quickening of the church, and the conversion of sinners.

Among the most important of our recently opened Missions is that at St. Pierre. This island, a dependency of France, is inhabited chiefly by French Roman Catholics, but among them there are quite a number of English and American settlers, who have long desired the services of a resident Protestant Minister. Their wish having been brought to the notice of Conference, St. Pierre was placed on the Home Mission list at the beginning of the present year, and instructions were given to the Chairman of the St. John's District to furnish it with a suitable supply at the earliest possible period. In accordance with these arrangements, Bro. Joseph Parkins, a gentleman whose knowledge of the French language and other qualifications peculiarly fitted him for the position, was sent thither early last Autumn, and entered upon his work with encouraging prospects. Services have been held twice a Sabbath in a building that has been temporarily fitted up for that purpose, and the congregations are generally good and very attentive. A Sabbath School has also been organized, and is attended by all the Protestant children of the town. Arrangements are being made for the erection of a more commodious place of worship, and the connexion at large is appealed to in behalf of this most commendable enterprise.

Green's Harbor, a place where much spiritual destitution prevails, has been satisfactorily worked during

the year. The Missionary reports having preached in a locality where no message of mercy had been heard for *twenty years*. On one part of the Circuit the number of classes had been increased from one to three, and many souls have been converted to God.

Trinity, after having for many years remained vacant, has recently been reoccupied. Much opposition was at first encountered, but the effect has been to render our cause the more stable and prosperous. The number of church members has been doubled, and the congregation tripled during the year.

In connection with Newfoundland Missions special recognition ought to be made of the services of Joseph Lawrence, Esq., of Weatherby, Yorkshire, England, through whose influence, and in some cases at whose expense, about twenty young men have been secured for our work in that Island.

From the facts above presented it will be seen that the year now closed has been one of GREAT SPIRITUAL PROSPERITY, and that this is the case appears still further from reports furnished by brethren laboring on some of the older stations.

Salisbury, in the Sackville District, has enjoyed a work of grace exceeding in power and extent anything previously known in that region, resulting in the conversion of many precious souls, and the addition of a goodly number to the church.

Advocate Harbor, in the same district, has enjoyed a similar situation, and about eighty persons have been brought to Christ.

Caledonia, in the Liverpool District, has also been the scene of a very gracious revival. Bro. Parker writes from this place under date of November 20th, "After days of darkness and coldness it has pleased the Lord to visit us in a very gracious manner.

* * * * * Heads of families have

been soundly converted to God, backsliders have

been reclaimed, and numbers of young people have been brought to God." At one place the membership has increased from *one* to twenty-five, and the membership for the circuit has been more than doubled.

New Germany has been visited in a similar manner. The spirit has been copiously poured out, scores have been convinced of sin, and made partake of saving grace, and about forty have been added to the church.

Revivals more or less powerful and extensive have also been experienced on the Hantsport, Welsford, Port Hawkesbury, Murray Harbor and Kingsclear Stations. Several other of our Missions, though not showing so largely in revival influences as those above mentioned, nevertheless report gratifying progress.

On the Onslow Station, in the midst of difficulties, somewhat peculiar and trying, our cause has been successfully maintained, and we believe consolidated and extended. From Digby Neck Bro. Dobson reports, "While there has been no special awakening, yet we are encouraged to know that Methodism is every day taking firmer hold upon the community. Many who have been its bitterest enemies are now its friends."

Brier Island, formerly visited occasionally from the last mentioned Circuit, has had the labors of a stationed minister during the past year, who has been successful in winning souls to Christ, and building up the cause of God.

On the Stellarton Circuit monthly preaching has been established at the Vale Colliery. There are a number of French families at this place who are accessible to us, and hail our visits with gladness. Services were established at New Glasgow at the beginning of the year, but the destructive fire of

April last made it necessary to suspend them for the present. Bro. Morton, our missionary here, strongly recommends the appointment of a man to labor in New Glasgow and the surrounding country, and is confident that his support would be largely provided for by amounts contributed by the people.

Labrador was, as usual, visited during the summer by Bro. J. S. Currie, of Carbonear, N. F., and, as above intimated, will this year enjoy the visits of an additional missionary.

CONCLUSION.

From the review thus furnished of our Home Missionary operations, it will be seen that the design originally contemplated by this department of Christian enterprise has been more fully realized than at any previous period. Through the labors of this Society not only has the work of God been strengthened and promoted in Circuits where previously it had been very feebly and inefficiently sustained, but it has been extended to communities hitherto but sparingly furnished with the services of our own church, and in some cases almost entirely destitute of the appliances and privileges of any form of Protestant Christianity. Moreover the efforts put forth in this direction have been followed by substantial and glorious results. Congregations which had been scattered by years of neglect and religious privation, have been re-gathered; churches that had long languished for lack of spiritual nourishment have been quickened and revived; and not a few, who in their relations to the Christian Church had long been "strangers and foreigners," have become "fellow-citizens with the saints, and of the household of God." May we not therefore with increased earnestness and confidence call upon our people to render

"Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to the harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal, that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together."

APPENDIX **D.**—ADDRESSES AND REPLIES.**PASTORAL ADDRESS**

Of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America, to the Members of the Churches under its care.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—

The Conference in which we are now assembled is one of more than ordinary importance, and constitutes a point of historic interest in our existence as a Church.

Originally planted in these Colonies by means of missionary agency, during the first period of its growth, in which the apostolic William Black and his coadjutors and successors, with heroic and devoted purpose, traversed the length and breadth of the land to make known the message of salvation, the work was carried on under the direction and immediate control of the Missionary Committee in London.

In 1855 the Rev. Dr. Beecham was deputed to visit these Provinces for the purpose of constituting the Mission Districts a Conference organization in affiliation with the British Conference. It was then determined, that, for the time, our Foreign Missionary work should be continued in connection with the Parent Society; and it was also stipulated that in consideration of the large number of dependent and Home Mission Circuits placed under our care, we should receive financial assistance from the Missionary Committee. This affiliated relation has continued for nineteen years. We are now entering upon a third period of our Church history. The Conferences of British North America have been so altered as to form one General Conference, and several annual Conferences—to constitute the Wesleyan

Methodist Church of Canada. Former arrangements were always understood to be temporary, but the organization of which we now become a part is designed to be permanent. It is believed to be capable of adaptation to the most expansive and widely extended growth.

Our confidence in the plan of union was greatly strengthened by the cordiality with which, after thorough examination, it was concurred in by the cautious and eminently conservative British Conference. We have also deemed it a coincidence worthy of note, and one that seemed to indicate a common guidance—the presence of Him who was with the ancient Church, as a pillar of cloud and flame, and who still walks in the midst of the golden candlesticks, holding the stars in his right hand—that the Australian Methodist Churches, without any thing of concerted action beyond their bounds, are for the accomplishment of like objects effecting an organization, the same in principle and similar in details to that which we have inaugurated.

It was thought necessary, in a movement of such great importance, involving fundamental change, bringing us into closer relationship with more distant parts of the Dominion, not only to reach unanimous conclusions amongst ourselves, as the united Pastorate of the Church, and to obtain the sanction and approval of the Parent Body; but also to secure the full concurrence and co-operation of the membership of our Church as represented by the official meetings. It was therefore provided that the "scheme of union" should be submitted to the judgment of the quarterly meetings in March last. Had the vote been adverse the whole previous action, so far as our conference was concerned, would have been nullified and made void. The result of that appeal has, however, been almost unanimously in favor of union. We regret the necessity of moving in so important a measure in the face of a single

adverse note. The much esteemed brethren who constitute the minority will, however, we doubt not, cheerfully acquiesce in the decision; and we cannot but believe that in this matter the good hand of our God is upon us for good.

When the Conference, now in session, shall have completed its work, the brethren assembled will, according to appointment, arrange the several annual Conferences of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island and Newfoundland. The ministers residing within the boundaries of these Conferences will meet annually. The General Conference composed of Delegates from the Annual Conferences with an equal number of lay representatives will meet quadrennially in the chief centres of the Dominion.

The most important change consequent upon Union will take place in the department of Missionary work, instead of dual organization Foreign and Home, and contributions to the funds of the parent society, the mission work of our Church will be placed under the direction of a Board composed of representatives from each Annual Conference. The extensive and prosperous Home Missions of the Church, East and West, will be sustained with continued and augmented vigor. Foreign Missions will be prosecuted as fully and multiplied as rapidly as the financial resources of the Church become available for that purpose.

"Arrangements have been completed," says the last report of the parent society, "for the financial and ecclesiastical independence of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada. It has been agreed on our part to defray for the present certain expenses connected with the missions in Newfoundland and the Bermudas. With this exception, all payments from the Society's funds on account of the British Dominions in North America will cease; and the widely extended missions to the native Indians, and to the immigrant settlers

throughout those vast regions, will be carried on by the Canadian Methodist Church exclusively. These arrangements have been effected in a spirit of perfect harmony; and the parent society, looking at the wonderful growth and development of this her giant child from the West, invoking the Lord's continued smile and blessing upon Canadian Methodism, may well thank God and take courage."

We cannot, without recreance to our trust, discredit to ancestral distinction and disloyalty to the Great Head of the Church, relax in Missionary work and enterprise. The great commission is imperative in its requirements. Only in the measure to which responsibility and obligation are realized and acted upon can we hope for the continued and abundant blessing of Him who, for the accomplishment of His purpose, the gospel is preached to all nations promised, "Lo I am with you always even to the end."

The unity and consolidation of the several branches of Methodism, into one strong and influential Church, is an essential object contemplated in the plan of Union. As Churches we have a common origin. We have the same doctrinal standards. Our ecclesiastical organizations are framed according to one pattern. We sing the same glorious hymns. We proclaim alike a present, free and full salvation. We have a common mission, "to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land." The same importance is attached to distinctive provision for Christian fellowship. To exist as separate bodies is to loose strength, and it involves unnecessary expenditure of means. We cherish the hope that union of forces will constitute new power and higher efficiency, and that in due time not only the Wesleyan and New Connexion, but other important Methodist Churches may be comprehended in the one United Methodist Church of Canada.

We have been compelled to look at a united Method-

ism from a national as well as an ecclesiastical point of view. This great country of ours has entered upon a new history. Its vast and varied resources are being rapidly developed. It must soon become the home of many millions of people. We cannot be insensible to the fact that the legislative action of the next few years must inevitably give character and complexion to the future destinies of this Dominion. A united and consolidated Methodist Church, extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific, constituting the most numerous and influential denomination in British North America, would readily centralize its strength, and when great principles, equally dear to all protestants are at stake, speak with a clearness and distinctness that would compel the attention of politicians and statesmen. It is not desirable that, as a Church, we should commit ourselves to any one political party, but when questions of vital importance are to be determined, we ought to be in a position as one complete organization, to speak in language sufficiently explicit for the Legislature of the country to hear and heed.

It is known to you that a powerful hierarchy, stripped of temporal supremacy, no longer able to dominate over the political destinies of nations, is seeking control of Public Education, and has declared a policy of bitter and strenuous opposition to the Canada school system. We strongly and earnestly deprecate any attempt to deprive this country of what we believe to be a common right and an inalienable heritage.

The record of our Educational Institutions has been for the past year one of great satisfaction and encouragement. At no period of their history have they been so liberally patronized, and never have they, we believe, been more deserving of the confidence of our people and of the Public in these Provinces, than at the present time.

We are gratified to find that the Book concern, long

a source of solicitude, is entering upon a new course, with every promise of financial prosperity and of connexional usefulness.

With unfeigned gratitude and joy we acknowledge the special favor and abundant blessing of God, in this last of the Conferences of the United Eastern Provinces. The sessions have been characterized by great harmony. The several meetings both of devotion and business have been pervaded by an atmosphere of spiritual life. An "unction of the holy One" which challenges afresh our confidence in the resources of an earnest and faithful ministry, has eminently rested upon all our assemblies.

While compelled under present circumstances to give much attention to ecclesiastical questions, and to pass over many subjects of practical interest and importance, usually embraced in the annual address of the united pastorate to the beloved people of our charge, we do not overlook the great spiritual and evangelical aspects of our work. Effective organization and abundant resources are all insufficient without personal godliness and the accompanying power of the Holy Ghost; "Not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts."

From different parts of our Conference field we have been gladdened by tidings of revival power and blessing; and by larger accessions to the membership of the Church. The increase reported is 1,600, with over *three thousand* persons on trial for membership. To God be all the glory. The past is richly fraught with encouragement for the future. With renewed strength and higher resolve, we go forth in the prosecution of our great mission. "Thanks be unto God who always causeth us to triumph."

In order that these cherished anticipations may be realized, we earnestly solicit your co-operation; to the Lord Jesus Christ your love and loyalty have been

We covet for the ministry and membership of our Church alike, the spirit which finds expression in the inspired declaration: "If I forget thee O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget her cunning. If I do not remember thee, let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth; if I prefer not Jerusalem to my chief joy."

TO THE

Address of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church
IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1873.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,—

In the name of our common Lord and Master we convey to you the expression of our brotherly esteem

and love. It was highly gratifying to us to find, both from the language of your Address, and the oral testimonies of Dr. Stewart and Dr. Pickard, that the good hand of our God was still upon you for good in the prosecution of those hallowed labours to which you have devoted your lives. In this you will readily discern proof of the Divine faithfulness. Ever mindful of his word, the great head of the church sustains his servants in their arduous toil by supplies of His Holy Spirit.

We joy with you in reviewing the tokens of prosperity with which the Holy Spirit has gladdened your societies and missions during the year, especially that most grateful sign of the Divine favour, the accession of many new-born souls to the church. We earnestly pray that in the anxious work of preserving the sheep you have gathered, you may be able so to watch over them that not one may escape from the fold. If these new converts hold fast their confidence, you will, in future days, gather from their ranks a supply of faithful labourers whose charge it shall be to carry on the work now entrusted to your own hands. Be assured also that we account any occasion for praise to our Redeemer which may be given to you, an opportunity granted to ourselves of joining with you in the Apostolic Doxology, "Now, thanks be unto God who always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place."

At this our annual Assembly, we have not, as last year, to report a decrease in our numbers. The returns from the Districts show a net increase on the preceding year of one thousand seven hundred and thirty. We have now three hundred and forty-eight thousand five hundred and eighty members; with twenty thousand eight hundred and forty-four who have been admitted on trial. We accept this token of the Divine favour as a challenge from our Heavenly Lord to renew our zeal

and devotion, and a powerful incitement always to stand in readiness,

“ To help the souls redeem'd by Him,
In what their various states demand ;
To teach, convince, correct, reprove,
And build them up in holiest love.”

The Minutes of our Conference will inform you of the removal by death of honoured fathers and brethren, each of whom in his own sphere was a faithful steward of the manifold gifts of God. The names of men of renown are found among them. The venerable Thomas Jackson has entered into rest. His saintly character, and christian gentleness, maintained through an unusually lengthened period, endeared him not only to ourselves, but also to thousands of our people. You have known and valued, equally with us, his public ministry, and the eminent services he rendered to Methodism in every department of its work.

William Shaw, a man of God, justly entitled to the appellation of “ The Apostle of Southern Africa,” and of whom the Churches in that country have abundant reason to retain an affectionate remembrance, has closed his career of usefulness in peace. Two veterans in the field of Irish Methodism, Thomas Waugh and Daniel Macafee, have also departed this life. These eminent men were well known and highly esteemed amongst ourselves, and by not a few in the provinces of British America.

We regard your deep concern for the extension of Christian education, and your zealous efforts to promote it, with great joy ; and most earnestly pray that your highest expectations concerning it may be fully realized. It has, moreover, given us much pleasure to hear of the liberal sustentation of your Funds, especially that connected with your Home Missionary operations.

We doubt not dear brethren, that the conviction of minds touching the pressing spiritual necessities of your

home population, and the adaptation of Methodism to meet those necessities, is as powerful as amongst us. Perishing souls demand our sympathy and help, and, by God's grace, the demand shall not be made in vain.

An influential Committee of this Conference has given to your proposal for union with the Canadian Conference its most careful consideration. We have full confidence that this most important measure will issue in the much wider extension of the work of God among you; inasmuch as it will enable you to meet the forces of evil against the truth as it is in Jesus with an united army of faithful men. The fulfilment of your hopes concerning it may be looked upon as certain, for "the battle is the Lord's."

We have agreed to certain resolutions relating to the proposed Union which, we trust, will enable you and the Canada Conference to adopt such measures as, by the Divine blessing, may conduce to the growth, consolidation and increase of Methodism in the extensive regions within which the proposed Union will carry forward its operations.

To the addresses of the beloved brethren who have represented you we have listened with much interest; and we most willingly accede to your request that the Rev. John McMurray should be appointed the President of your next Assembly; and that the Rev. George S. Milligan, M.A., should act as Co-Delegate. You will rejoice to hear that in the several sessions of our present Conference, and in the public services connected with it, we have been favoured with manifest tokens of the Divine presence. Our people have been edified. We ourselves have been strengthened, and shall return to our several Circuits with purposes of renewed consecration to the duties of our sacred calling. As sharers in the blessings of "the common salvation," and as one with you in all that concerns the prosperity of the kingdom of our great God and Saviour Jesus Christ,

THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1874.

REV. AND VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—

The emotions with which we approach you for the last time, in our relation, as the affiliated Conference of Eastern British America, are too thrilling to allow effective utterances or ever to be forgotten.

The communications of Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., and Rev. C. Stewart, D. D., our representatives in your last Conference have greatly gladdened our hearts. The cordial welcome extended to them by your venerable body we heartily appreciate, and your painstaking consideration of our interests is highly encouraging.

We have listened with deep interest to the address with which you have been pleased to favor us. We thank you cordially for the renewed assurance of fraternity and good will which it contains; and with pleasure we avail ourselves of the opportunity now afforded us of conveying to you an expression of the respect and love we have ever cherished towards you, and of the satisfaction with which we have treasured up your affectionate and judicious counsels.

We joy with you in the tokens of success with which the head of the church has crowned your labors in the interests of a soul-saving christianity, and we pray for the souls committed to your watch-care, that their love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment; that they may approve things that are excellent, that they may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness which are by Jesus Christ unto the glory and praise of God.

We sympathize with you in the loss your connexion has sustained during the past year, by the death of so many honored Fathers and Brethren, who having finished the work assigned them, have gone to receive the fulfilment of the Master's promise, "Where I am there shall also my servant be." It is with chastened feelings we have received the tidings of the death of the late Dr. Scott, who by his administrative ability, his courteous demeanour, his eminently appropriate pulpit ministrations, and his devout and hallowed spirit while among us, as President of the Conference, won our esteem and love; and who from that period to the time of his death, continued to serve us as the representative of our interests in your midst. Of him and of his services we shall ever cherish most grateful recollection.

You will rejoice to know that in many parts of the wide field over which our labors extend, there have been gracious seasons of religious revival, some of

which have not been equalled in the history of our Conference. As the result we are able to report a net increase of one thousand six hundred and forty-six members, with three thousand three hundred and thirty on trial.

In our connexional funds there has been generally a gratifying increase, especially in that of our Home Missions, which is two thousand two hundred and twenty dollars in advance of last year. There is still much spiritual destitution among our home population. Appeals for ministerial supply are continually reaching us, and to these, our people, by their liberal support of our Home Mission movement, are enabling us in some measure to respond. We regret that the amount raised for Foreign Missions is in arrears of that of former years. This doubtless has arisen from the fact of the largely increased contributions to our home work. Nevertheless the cause of Foreign Missions is dear to our people's hearts, and their earnest desire and prayer to God is for the salvation of those who still live amid the darkness and desolation of heathendom.

Events of recent occurrence have served to deepen the impression we have long entertained as to the important relations which our Educational Institutions sustain towards the general prosperity of the work of God in the Provinces; and we rejoice to inform you that these institutions, despite opposing influence, have been during the past year, more largely patronized than ever before, and their prospects of usefulness are in the highest degree encouraging. The Endowment Fund which last year amounted to forty thousand dollars, has this year, through the indefatigable labors of Dr. Pickard, and the liberality of our people, reached the sum of fifty thousand dollars, and we have reason to believe that ere long, it will be so augmented as to place these establishments in a position of independence, and more successful operation. The labors of our beloved brother,

Rev. C. Stewart, D. D., as Theological Professor, during the past year, have been in the highest degree acceptable. Ten of the candidates for our ministry have this year been permitted to attend our institution at Sackville

Under the able management of the Rev. A. W. Nicolson, our Editor and Book Steward, the "Provincial Wesleyan," our Conference organ, still maintains its efficiency, and is acquiring more extended circulation. Our book-room you will be pleased to learn has so far improved in its financial condition that it is now free from the burden of debt which for so many years crippled its operations, and is to a larger extent than ever instrumental in diffusing our Methodist literature throughout the land.

Thirteen promising young brethren having honourably completed their probation, and by gifts, graces, and fruits, having given proof of a Divine call to the duties of the christian pastorate, have this year been cordially admitted into full connection with us, and solemnly set apart to their great work by ordination; while twenty-nine have been received as candidates for the same sacred office.

Two of our aged brethren, Rev. G. M. Barratt and Rev. R. Weddall, are obliged to ask for supernumerary relation. These honoured senior members of our Conference who have been laborious, exemplary and useful for a long series of years, we commend to your undiminished affection, as only infirmity, the inevitable consequence of the rush of years, compels them to seek such a relation. Several of our young brethren have obtained permission to desist wholly, or in part, from Circuit work this year, in order that they may thereby regain their wonted strength to labour in the future.

Through the sparing mercy of God our death roll this year is brief. One aged minister, the Rev. Thos.

Smith, has passed from the militant to the triumphant Church. He was a good man. The gospel which he had preached to others, he found to be the power of God in sustaining and comforting him amid the last struggles of expiring nature.

We have been favoured with a deputation from the General Conference of the M. E. Church of the U. S. of America, consisting of the Rev. Wm. Clark, D.D., and the Rev. Wm. Elliott. These honoured ministers of the Lord Jesus have delighted us by their able and richly evangelical ministrations in the pulpit, and we have been encouraged and profited by their counsels and admonitions on the Conference platform; while their narrations of the struggles, the progress and glorious triumphs of our common christianity in that vast country have tended to strengthen our confidence in our own ecclesiastical system as being adapted to meet the spiritual necessities of this Dominion.

Our Conference session has been one of great harmony, and all our discussions and deliberations have been marked by manifestations of brotherly confidence and affection and by great unanimity in the conclusions to which they have led.

It is not without feelings approaching those of sadness that we now terminate the correspondence in our affiliated relation, which, under such happy auspices nineteen years ago, it was our privilege to initiate.

In adverting to our former connection with you we cannot refrain from giving emphatic expression to our fervent gratitude for the many favors you have conferred upon us through the agency of your noble Missionary Society. And we shall ever hold in endeared recollection the valuable services rendered to the cause of Christ among us by the agency of that honored institution for the diffusion of the light of Divine truth in these colonies.

Yet though it affords us much satisfaction to give

expression to our gratitude for the fostering care and generous support which have been accorded to us by you in the past, we may reiterate our opinion that the time has arrived when the work of God among us in this Dominion should be placed upon a more comprehensive and commanding basis. We are pleased to be able to inform you that our Societies have adopted almost unanimously the scheme of Union with the Conference of Canada.

THE ADDRESS
OF THE
Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada,
TO THE
CONFERENCE OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:—

We desire to express our sense of profound regret that the usual Address, through some misunderstanding on the part of the Committee appointed for its preparation, did not reach you by the hands of our Representative.

To send you at this time fraternal greetings affords us unmingled satisfaction and joy, especially in view of the fact that we now sustain to each other a closer relationship than ever before. And as by the system of Transfers adopted by the two Conferences in the scheme of Union, arrangements can be made for the mutual interchange of ministers, some of these now labouring in the East finding their way to the West, and others in the West seeking the cool sea-breezes and bracing atmosphere of the East, we trust that the bonds of Christian and Ministerial Brotherhood will be drawn closer still, stimulating to increased devotion to God, and renewed activity in the work of saving souls, that while one *always* in ancestry, in Church government, in the earnest and fearless proclamation of Gospel truth, we are now virtually one in a great Church organization reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific shores.

We are also happy to inform you that by the action of the last Conference of the New Connexion Methodist Church all difficulties are apparently removed

which stood in the way of union of their Body and ours, which we trust will be consummated at an early day.

You will be glad to know that in all things pertaining to the temporalities of the Church, we are, by the blessing of God, in the enjoyment of abundant prosperity. During the past year many new churches, most of them of a fine style of architecture, have been opened for Divine worship. The income of the Missionary Society, of the Superannuation and other Funds, exhibit a gratifying increase, and our people are more than ever impressed with the importance of increased ministerial support, recognizing the value of that Scriptural maxim "The labourer is worthy of his hire."

Neither are we untrue to the traditional character of Wesleyan Methodism, in providing for the education of our young people upon Christian principles. The Wesleyan Female College at Hamilton continues to enjoy a large share of public patronage. During the past year a Collegiate Institute at Dundas, in the West, another at Stanstead, in the East, and yet another at Winnipeg, in the Far West, have been opened under the most encouraging auspices; and at this Conference arrangements have been made for the establishment of a second Female College at Whitby, Ontario. We are happy also to know that, with the payment of the amount now subscribed to the Endowment Fund of Victoria College, the Endowment itself will be an accomplished fact.

Nor have we had to mourn over the absence of spiritual power, without which sinners cannot be converted to God. But while your hearts have been gladdened by the presence of revival influence in different parts of your widely extended field of honourable toil, we too have cause for adoring gratitude and thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church,

for the out-pourings of the spirit and the ingathering of many souls, enabling us to report an increase in our membership of more than three thousand.

Cheering intelligence too has reached us from Japan, our far distant mission station. Already have the hearts of our missionaries been cheered by the conversion of two precious souls—the first fruits of what we trust will be a glorious harvest; while in the Providence of God, the way has opened for the preaching of Christ in the interior of the country, and in the very centre of superstition and idolatry, where the Gospel was never preached before. Surely the language of the blessed Saviour is applicable to this distant field of labour, “The fields are white unto the harvest.”

We cheerfully consent to the transfer of the Rev. John Burwash, M.A., to your ministerial ranks, with a view to his employment in your Institution at Sackville, where he has so successfully laboured in the past.

And now in the closer relationship we sustain, bearing each other's sorrows and sharing each other's triumphs, we have great joy and consolation in your love, and entreat the co-operation of your prayers, that the enlarged copious out-pouring of the Holy Ghost may descend and rest upon the united Methodist Church of this Dominion, hallowing all our ordinances, fertilizing and gladdening every field of labour, and cheering the hearts of His servants by the salvation of thousands and tens of thousands of souls.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN :

We were glad to hear of your state, and to receive the kind words sent to us by the hands of your representative, Rev. Henry Pope, Jr. His able, interesting, and very cordial address gave us the highest satisfaction, and we respond with the deepest sympathy and love. We rejoice in the fraternal union that exists between us, and all the members of the Methodist family in Great Britain and her Provinces. We regretted very much that the venerable and excellent Dr. Richey could not, as we had hoped, visit us again, but Mr. Pope endeared himself to us by his christian bearing, and his eloquent and excellent address. It has pleased God to afflict us greatly during the last four years in the removal from us of many of our most eminent men, but his mercies have abounded towards us, and we rejoice in the rapid extension of our work in every part of our vast field. Our membership has increased two hundred and seventy-five thousand two hundred and forty-two, and our churches two thousand one hundred and thirty-nine since our last General Conference, and our people have contributed for church buildings, \$5,256,615 a year during the same time, and every department of our work has been sustained with increasing liberality. In our country the prejudices of caste are rapidly giving way, and christian fellowship is extending over all nationalities without respect of per-

son. We regret that any occasion has arisen which could by any possibility imperil the peace of our respective governments. We are brethren of the same stock, the same literature, religion, the same God and Saviour. We cannot think without horror of the possibility of war between Great Britain and the United States, and we most earnestly join you in the prayer that our heavenly Father would grant us perpetual peace. Let us rejoice in the unity of faith, and the bonds of love.

We congratulate you on the progress you have made throughout the Dominion of Canada, and especially upon your great success in building up the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are pleased to see the different bodies of Methodism in your country coming nearer together, and we hope that you may at last all be united in fact as you are in spirit, and that God may give you still greater success in winning souls to Christ. We are conscious that no material prosperity can compensate for the loss of spirituality in the church, and hence depend on the influence of the Holy Spirit in carrying forward the work we have to do. We believe that our people are drawing nearer to God, through Christ, and that they are devoting more and more their substance to his service. The work of holiness is increasing, and numerous revivals prove that God is still with us. With love unfeigned we send to you these fraternal words, praying that the richest blessings of heaven may ever descend upon you.

Our beloved brethren, William R. Clark and William Elliott, will tell you more of our present work, and bear to you our christian salutations. "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all."

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN :—

With great pleasure we now reciprocate your fraternal greetings. We felt ourselves greatly honored by the kind words emanating from so distinguished a branch of our common Methodism as the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States. The visit of your worthy representatives, Rev. Wm. R. Clark, D.D., and Rev. Wm. Elliott, was an occasion of great joy. We listened with mingled emotions of delight and admiration to their eloquent addresses, bearing to us the assurance of your deep and abiding interest in our welfare. As well in their pulpit ministrations as in their appearance before our Conference, these beloved brethren in the Lord enriched our minds by their noble utterances, and stirred our hearts by their fervor of spirit.

We have rejoiced with you, in the greatness of your work, in its territorial expansion, its material development, in the millions comprising your congregations, but above all, in the vast number of precious souls gathered to Christ and worshipping at your altars. We have a Conference of two hundred and five ministers, with a membership of twenty one thousand, including probationers, while our min-

istrations reach one hundred thousand of our population. Nearly twenty-four thousand of our youth are under instruction in our Sabbath Schools.

In this work neither the moral destitution in our own lands, nor the call from foreign climes, has been disregarded. As an evidence of this we point to our missionary income of twenty-two thousand dollars, being an average contribution to this purpose of more than one dollar per member. Toward these spiritual and material results the success of the past year has largely contributed.

The higher educational interests of our country have also enlisted our attention and found enlightened expression in the Institutions we have established for a complete academic, collegiate and Theological course of training. This most important department is entrusted to gentlemen whose high Christian character, scholarly attainments, and progressive policy, commend them to our fullest confidence.

Before this shall have reached you, our present ecclesiastical organization will have united with the Canada Conference, in forming the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada, the area of which will comprise the entire British possessions in America. The Church thus constituted will, in its numerical strength and general resources, rank among the very first in our Dominion.

The triumphs of high international arbitration, which has at once satisfactorily adjusted intricate questions pending between our two great countries, and given to the world an illustrious precedent, is our common pride and pledge of perpetual amity. Henceforth we anticipate only a glorious emulation in the divine mission of nations.

Rejoicing greatly in the unprecedented success with which the great Head of the Church has

crowned the wise administration and interesting devotedness of your Episcopate and pastorate, we unite in praying that the God of all grace may prosper you yet more and more in your manifold undertakings to evangelize the many millions of your own vast territory and to carry the Gospel to the regions beyond.
