

**THE LESSON OF THE TIMES.**

Increased wages obtained by labor were based on higher prices paid by the public. With prices forced down by public sentiment, a new condition will obtain bearing down upon the wage scale. A standard of living for labor higher than that of before the war is desirable. To maintain it in the face of falling prices, requires bigger production. To make industry profitable in time of low prices there must be bigger sales. Production must pursue the retreating consumer. These facts admit of no dodging. Now is the time for spirited acceptance of the lesson they teach. Ignoring them will lead to disillusionments soon as economic laws operate. If labor has learned to live more comfortably, the new advantages it has earned are worth keeping.—Montreal Star.

**THE DOWNWARD TREND.**

Further downward movements in prices are shown by the monthly report prepared for publication in the October Labour Gazette by the Cost of Living Branch of the Labour Department. This report shows that the retail prices of foods averaged lower during October than in the previous month, the decrease being particularly marked in sugar and potatoes. Smaller decreases were reported in the price of beef, bread, flour and rolled oats. There were advances in prices of hog products, eggs, milk and coal. The weekly good budget averaged \$15.88 in sixty Canadian cities at the middle of October, as compared with \$15.95 in the middle of September, \$14.21 in October 1919, and \$7.93 in October 1914. According to the report, substantial decreases occurred during the month of October in the prices of grain, cattle, sheep, butter, vegetables, cereals, sugar, cotton, hides, some lines of metals and lumber, linseed oil, turpentine, chemicals, raw rubber and laundry starch.—Ex.

The British Food Ministry is looking to the abundant harvests in Canada, Australia and India to enable it in the early spring to wipe out the broad subsidy and substantially reduce prices.

**A Great Canadian Mining Region**



The Province of British Columbia is fifty per cent larger than the state of Texas; and Kootenay is a 40,000 square mile block. It is covered with mountains throughout, there are dozens of peaks exceeding 10,000 feet in height. And these mountains are alive with wealth; nearly all the lead and zinc and much of the silver and gold of Canada come from Kootenay, and it is the leading bituminous coal producer of Western Canada. But the surface has only been scratched; it will sometime produce a hundred-fold what it at present produces.

Kootenay has the minerals, the timber, and the pulp, and it has the waterpower to turn the wheels of a thousand mills. On the Peak d'Ocellie 200,000 horse power can be developed, and on the lower Kootenay 100,000 horse power, with half a million more scattered throughout the district. Many mountain streams are power generators.

The district is well supplied with railroads. The main line of the Canadian Pacific crosses the north part of the Kootenay and the Crow's Nest line of the same railway crosses the southern part. The Lake Windermere branch, running north and south through the beautiful Windermere region, connects two lines in East Kootenay and the Crow's Nest line on the Lakes. Branches at the Great Northern, crossing the American border, connect with the Crow's Nest line at Grand Forks, Trail, Nelson and Fernie; a branch of the Crow's Nest runs from Yakk across the border to Spokane.

The leading industries of Kootenay are lumber, mining and fruit raising. At present other lines of industry are in their infancy.

Eighty per cent of the total area is covered with forest. The question of wood-pulp is intimately associated with the lumber industry.

The demand for pulp and the scarcity of paper are felt in Canada and elsewhere. Canada has 25 pulp mills, but there is not a mill between the west coast of British Columbia and Rocky River, a distance of over 1,000 miles.

For the purpose of mining, Kootenay is divided into two distinct parts: the coal mining field and the metal mining field. The coal measures are limited to the extreme eastern part of the district and there are no metals there. The rest of the district is rich in metals but has no coal.

There are three known bituminous coal areas in Canada, two of them on islands at the extremities of the country, Cape Breton Island at the eastern end of the country and Vancouver Island at the western end, and the third is the Kootenay. The district also possesses rich deposits of fluorite and manganese.

Agriculture takes a secondary position in the Kootenay. Only along the river and the shores of the lakes are unproductive; not 2,000 square miles out of the 30,000 can ever be brought beneath the plow.

At the present nearly all of the cultivated land is devoted to fruit raising, and trainloads of fruit—apples, pears, plums, cherries, and strawberries—are shipped from the neighborhood of Nelson, Creston and Grand Forks to the prairie provinces.

The Kootenay is a sportsman's paradise. All the streams of that region team with mountain trout and the mountains are alive with four-footed game. The district is famed for its big game; the mountains are full of deer, mountain goats, black bear, and smaller game of many sorts. Big game and grouse are extremely plentiful. In the upper reaches of the Elk Valley, the sheep ranches of the Elk Valley, the necessary facilities for reducing lead, zinc, copper, and gold, and its Sulphur mine at Kimberley is the greatest and most productive in the Dominion. Practically all the lead and zinc produced in Canada come from the Kootenay. The district also possesses rich deposits of fluorite and manganese.

**METHODIST PAPER ON THE MOVIES**

Thinks Greater Care Should be Exercised in Censuring Moving Pictures.

That the movies are here to stay there can be no doubt. That they can be made a great source of pleasure and edification is questioned by none. That many of the pictures, at present being shown, are of a demoralizing and vicious character is much to be regretted. During the past week, in this community, the chief features have been the display of numerous practically nude girls, with little more apparel than the heathen loin-cloth or the traditional fig-leaf, the same performing evolutions called "rhythmic motions" to show to best, or worst effect the unbecoming female body. At matinee sessions as many as two or three hundred young children were seen in attendance witnessing such exposures with all the attendant follies.

Besides these, recent pictures "for men only" and "for women only," shown ostensibly to warn the public against sexual evils, have been nothing more nor less than a prurient pandering to the morbid salacious propensities of portions of the public for the sake of gain.

Many of the pictures seem to have as their chief feature the display of illicit intrigues between the sexes.

When the last moving-picture censor was appointed in Nova Scotia the promise was made that greater care would be taken in giving approval to pictures than had previously prevailed. We fail to see that there has been any improvement. On the contrary, there is evidence of greater laxity, and pictures of the most vicious tendency are common.

Is it not about time the Government waked up to the seriousness of this matter?

Now, also, that greater privileges have been given than ever before, should they not assume corresponding responsibilities, and as electors demand from the Government a better control, a purging of this whole movie business?

There are many temperance, patriotic, philanthropic, and moral reform associations, amongst the better thinking women, that might combine to lessen this evil, especially as it is largely their sex that is exploited in these sensational and vicious presentations. They might also be appealed to engage in such a crusade as being especially the guides and guardians of the younger children whose plastic natures are being exposed to such ruinous revelations.

Is there not also some responsibility resting upon the Mayor and town councillors in this matter, especially, as in some cases the halls of civic buildings are rented to these picture show vendors? They put their names and whole families in quarantine if one member of them should happen to have the measles, or some other ailment, and pay money to prevent the breaking of the quarantine. If it were a matter of choice, far better let a whole family of small-pox patient have the liberty of the streets, than to allow some of these demoralizing pictures to pollute the eyes and hearts of hundreds of the children of the town.

It is to be hoped that an indignant public will not permit this evil to continue.—Wesleyan.

**NEW YORK DRY IN THIRTY DAYS**

Drive By Federal, State and City Authorities—Seizure in Hamilton.

New York, Nov. 19.—A concentrated drive is planned by federal, state and municipal authorities in an effort to make New York city dry within thirty days.

The tentative plans, a city official said, which were formulated at secret conferences during the last week, aim to end illicit buying, selling, drinking or carrying of any beverage stronger than half of one per cent. Every policeman in the five boroughs, it is said, virtually will become a prohibition enforcement agent.

**HIS WILDEST RIDE**

An old locomotive engineer who is rated as a good mixer by his brother workmen tells how he got excited at a piano recital when he was passing through the yards, over the switches and away down the main line in a manner that put Casey Jones to sleep, according to H. H. Hicks, of Moose Jav, in a communication published in a recent issue of the Saskatoon Daily Star. Brother Ernest W. Haworth, member of Lodge 33 has sent us a clipping of the communication, which is as follows:

"I was loitering around the streets one night," said A. Lemming, one of the old and best known engineers, at one time out of Moose Jav, "and as I had nothing to do I dropped into a concert and heard a sleek-looking Frenchman play a piano in a way that made me feel all over in spots. As soon as he sat down on the stool I knew by the way he handled himself that he understood the machine he was running. He tapped the keys away up one end, as if they were gages and he wanted to see if he had water enough. Then he looked up as if he wanted to know how much steam he was carrying, and the next moment he pulled open the throttle and sailed into the main line as if he was half an hour late. You could hear thunder over culverts and bridges and getting faster and faster, until the fellow rocked, about in his seat like a cradle. Somehow I thought it was the old 935 pulling a passenger train and getting out of the way of a general manager's special. He worked the keys on the middle division like lightning, and then he flew along the north end of the line until the driver went around like a buzz saw as if he got excited. About the time I was fixing to tell him to cut her off a little he kicked the jumpers under the machine wide open, pulled the throttle 'way back in the tender, and how he did it! I couldn't stand it any longer and yelled to him 'but he was pointing on the left side and if he wasn't careful he'd drop his ash pan. But he didn't hear. No one heard me. Everything was flying and whizzing. Telegraph poles by the side of the track looked like a row of corn stalks, and trees appeared to be a mud bank, and all the exhaust of the old machine sounded like the sound of a tumble bee. I tried to yell out, but my tongue wouldn't move. He went around the curves like a bullet, slipped an eccentric, blew out his safes, plunged down grades fifty feet to the mile, and didn't touch the air once. He went the meeting point at a mile and a half a minute and called for more fogg. My hair stood up straight, because I knew the game was up. Sure enough, dead ahead of us was the head light of a 'Special.' In a daze I saw the cars shivered into atoms, people smashed and mangled and bleeding and gasping for water. I heard another crash as the French professor struck the deep keys away down on the lower end of the Sutherland division, and then I came to my senses. There he was at a dead standstill, with the door of the fire-box of the machine open, wiping perspiration off his face with a chunk of waste, and howling to the people before him. 'If I live to be a thousand years old I'll never forget the ride that Frenchman gave me on a piano.'"

**DEFRAUDING THE KING.**

In the French days in America a very profitable business was carried on by most of the rulers sent out from France in defrauding the King. Little information had the monarch of the real conditions prevailing in the land that had been found across the sea for the officers he sent to represent him there saw that only the information they had arranged reached the royal ears. So they were in a position to reap the rich harvest they saw everywhere and do so to their own personal advantage.

Trade arrangements were sold by the rulers of New France so that a big share of the profits went to the governor or the intendant. Anything that was of unusual value was taken from the settlers at a price far below its value; they had only one place of sale—and in turn sold to the king at a profiteering rate. The prices often doubled and trebled in the various transactions made, with a fine share of the cash coming to the governor. They controlled all sales to the King of France and they made sad inroads upon the royal treasury.

For a time Bigot, the intendant, used the name of Claverie in his trading. He started a warehouse near his Quebec home that was known locally as "The Cheat," because of his commercial practices. It was a money maker for the governor but a source of trouble for the monarch. In spite of all his plans, however, Bigot was far from satisfied, for there was another Frenchman in the community, called by name, who was the greatest plunderer ever suffered. He succeeded in buying from the French stores goods for which he paid 400,000 francs; later he sold them to His Majesty for one million, four hundred thousand francs. This action roused the better animosity of Bigot, who desired the first place.


AMTOS HAD SURVIVED

Proof Found in Remains in a Pueblo Ruin.

Among the interesting relics in the Pueblo ruin at Anasazi, New Mexico, is the skeleton of a two-year-old girl bearing the evidences of a severe injury and of primitive surgical treatment. Carl H. Morris, who is in charge of the excavation, states that the remains found on the floor of room 39 of the ruin, had been wrapped in three layers of material; the first, in excellently woven cotton cloth; the second, a mantle of feather cloth; and the third, a mat of plaited reeds. The skeleton lay on its back, tilted somewhat toward the left. The left hip was badly fractured, portion of it having been broken away as a unit. In the neighboring region there was one broken and discarded. In addition, the left forearm showed two breaks and extreme displacement. Concerning this interesting find, Mr. Morris writes: "At least six splints surrounded the broken arm. The two on top were made of wood and were of the region beneath. These splints are of wood that average 7 inches in length, 1/2 an inch in width and 5-16 of an inch in thickness. They are of fairly uniform size throughout their length, being not mere splinters but pieces of wood dressed to the desired form. Each is set on its inner surface and curved on the outer side. All the bindings which had held them in place were decayed beyond recognition. From the condition of the skeleton the conclusion must be drawn that the treatment of the fracture of the pelvis, if it was recognized at all, beyond the skill of the primitive surgeon. The treatment of the broken arm, however, was within his province. As detailed before, sufficient time had elapsed to permit healing to begin, the skill of the surgeon must remain in doubt. The bones overlap, at the point of fracture, in a way to leave involved the question of the accuracy with which they were set. In an ordinary fracture of this kind, the tension of the muscles would not retract the extremities a full two inches. But in a fracture resulting from a fall from a considerable height where the force of impact was received by the palm of the open hand so that the shaft of the bone must be driven out through the flesh, such extreme displacement would not be unexpected. If the treatment was of this character, it is a rude and bungling technique. There is equal probability, however, that the overlapping took place after death. It would be interesting to know definitely whether or not there was an attempt to place the ends of the bones in apposition, in order that an estimate might be made of the skill of the surgeon. The major fact, however, is established—namely, that Puebloan practitioners of the Stone Age had already learned to use splints in the treatment of fracture."
