Amherst, July 28—Rev. P. A. Walker, who for the past eight years has been pastor of St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church, delivered farewell sermons Sunday morning and evening. Rev. Mr. Walker, who resigned his charge some weeks ago, will take his departure on Wednesday for Middleton, where he will take the pulpit in the United Church.
