REV. P. A. WALKER INDUCTED INTO UNITED CHURCH CHARGE

The induction of Rev. P. A. Walker into the United Church charge took place in Middleton last Friday evening. The service being held in the United Church, Middleton.

At eight o'clock the auditorium of the enlarged and beautiful church was filled with an expectant audience, and on the platform were Rev. John H. Harkin, chairman; Rev. A. D. MacKinnon, secretary; Rev. C. M. Mack and Rev. John MacKay, while in the front seat of the church were Rev. P. A. Walker and Rev. W. H. Turner.

It was the first service of the kind ever conducted in the Middleton United Church. The first part of the service was conducted by Rev. A. D. MacKinnon, who read from Isaiah 61, and whose sermon was based on Hebrews 12, part of v. 27 "That these things which cannot be shaken may remain." After this address the choir rendered an anthem.

At this stage of the programme Rev. John H. Harkin proceeded to induct the new minister. To the solemn questions addressed to the minister, appropriate answers were given, and then followed the prayer of dedication. Rev. C. M. Mack, of Bear River was then called on to address the minister. It was revealed that Mr. Mack and Mr. Walker had labored together at Amherst, and so it seemed fitting that Mr. Mack should give this address. The points stressed were that the minister should be a man of God, a student, a pastor and a preacher.

Rev. John MacKay of Waterville, then addressed the congregation. He congratulated the minister and congratulated the members of the church, which they had entered, and solicited the heartiest co-operation on the part of the members and adherents to make the new pastorate an unqualified success.

The meeting throughout was enthusiastic, and the address of Rev. W. R. Turner indicated that the step taken in the call to Rev. Mr. Walker was in good form. The hymns selected by the choir were all most appropriate, and the choir leader, under the leadership of Mrs. W. H. Turner, after the benediction had been pronounced by Rev. W. H. Watts, the members of the Presbytery met for a short session to complete business left over from the meeting of July 15th.

Rev. P. A. Walker will commence his ministerial duties on Sunday.

REV. P. A. WALKER CONCLUDES AMHERST PASTORATE OF EIGHT YEARS

Amherst, July 28—Rev. P. A. Walker, who for the past eight years has been pastor of St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church, delivered farewell sermons Sunday morning and evening.

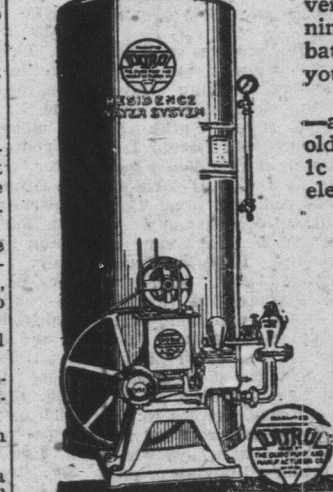
