

The example set by Lord Dufferin between 1872 and 1878, when he splurged all over the country at the public expense and introduced the fancy dress ball and other 1872 and 1878, when he spiurged all over the country at the public expense and introduced the fancy dress ball and other dizzinesses into Ottawa society, is responsible indirectly for a good deal of the high flying with the accompanying impecuniosity. It is obvious, however, that extravagant living is not the sole cause of the rottenness in the departments. Every intelligent officer must have suspected Uncle Thomas and his swagsmen and Sir Hector and his boodlers of being a thieves' confederacy; and the sight of persons in high places going wrong, and apparently profiting by it, is apt to corrode the virtue of those beneath them. Otherscandals (of amoral character) involving Ministers have been noised from the house-top, though their nature has been such as to keep them from being ventilated in Parliament or the newspapers. A contemporary says gambling is carried on to a great extent and that officials who cannot afford it frequently lose large sums of money. What is certain is that the genius loci at Ottawa for some years back has not been a very clean spirit. Ministers with reptile funds, contractors with claims for extras, members dividing upvailway subsidies, Tory agents working for Government bonuses on commission, manufacturers buying and paying for protective duties—it must have been difficult in such an atmosphere for many a poorly-paid official to adhere to the belief that honesty an atmosphere for many a noorly paid official to adhere to the belief that honesty was the best policy, especially if he happened to be in the clutches of the cent-percent man from carrying too much sail in the social swim."



It reads: "London, July 13.—Mr. Duncan McIntyre's election to the Grand Trunk Board has sent the price of the company's shares up with a bound. All manner of wild rumors have been afloat concerning the meaning of the election. I learn from the best informed circles that the election is a direct outcome of the recent shareholders' discussion respecting the prospects of the company. 'We have,' they say, 'all that we want in the way of connections. We have a good plant, good lines, and immense receipts, but quite inadequate profits.' It is felt that this last deficiency is to be affected materially by serious changes in the London Board. The management in Canada, it is claimed here, has naturally fallenito a groove and needs bringing more into line with modern methods, hence when Sir Robert Gillespie resigned some of the largest shareholders, whose only desire is to secure a more profitable investment, urged upon the board and Mr. McIntyre that his election would just supply the new spirit needed in the Canadian control.
