CAIRO, June 11.—Fifty convicts, while returning from the quarries to Lourah prison, near this city, yesterday, overpowered the mounted guards and tried to escape. They constituted the last quad of a gang of 500, and the guards ahead did not know of the mutiny until the man had captured the rifles of the rear guards. As the 50 convicts fled, all of the advance guards started in pursuit. The guards overtook the fugitives and ordered them to surrender. The convicts answered with a volley, which wounded two men and killed three horses. The return volleys of the guards killed 39 convicts. The other eleven convicts ascaped. The convicts are believed to have been convicted to their charge.

Now for the Vote.

BERLIN, June 11.—At the general elections for members of the Reichstag, to be held on Thursday next, and at the bye-elections there are sure to be required 397 members of the House, and the full complement will be returned. The week closed with 1,550 candidates in the field. Not only new aspirants for scats, but new political factions appear daily, and as election day draws nearer the confusion grows worse confounded. Little can be done in the few days that will elapse before the pelling to disentangle the intricate web that has been woven by the many factions. Instead of the eight recognized parties in the late Reichstag holding the electral field, in the present campaign there are about twenty factions, each fighting for its own programme. These programmes often agree on some one common point, but on other points they cross and recorass in such confusing demands that it would be a difficult, if not impossible task to say

what any single faction really wants. It seems impossible now that the result of Thursday's balloting will decide how the Reichstag will be constituted. Judging from the present outlook it is shought that the vote in most of the constituencies will be so split up that re-ballots will be necessary in two-thirds of them.

The confidence felt by the Government recently that it would find a majority of the new Reichstag ready to accept a compromise army bill, has vanished gradually before the approach of the decisive day, and its newspaper organs now speak in an uncertain tone which is interpreted generally as ominous of Chancellor Von Caprivi's defeat.

Prince Bismarck's Hamburg News avoids all discussion of the constitutional question, although urging the inexpediency of starting a struggle between the Government and the representatives of the people. It warns the Emperor and Chancellor that even though they be supported by the Federal Council they would shake by such a struggle confidence in the stability of the Empire both at home and abroad. "Nothing in the constitution prevents the Reichstag from refusing to vote the budget," says the News, "although such action might be contrary to the spirit of the constitution." The prevalence of such discussion of a possible conflict between the Government and Reichstag is regarded by the Liberal and Radical politicians as a sure sign that the Emperor will not yield on the Army Bill no matter how great may be the majority against in the new Parliament. They say he and his Chancellor are determined to take their stand upon the letter of the constitution and there to hold fast until the Reichstag gives up.

Hot Biaze in Strathroy Lumber Yards

STRATHROY, June 11.—Fire was discovered last evening about 7:15 in J. Ivor & Sons' packing houses just north of the depot. Dr. Bowdler Sharpe suggested in a recent lecture on the geographical distribution of birds before the Royal Institution of Lonbirds before the Royal Institution of London that there was once a great continent with its center at the South Pole, now submerged under 2,000 fathoms of ocean. It embraced, he said, South America, Madagascar, Mauritius, New Zealand, and Australia; and thus is explained the existence of the cognate struthious birds that now exist, or once existed, in those countries.

BLUENOSE TAXATION.

Report of the New Brunswick Tax Commissioners.

They Like the Ontario Law—Don't Want to Tax Mortgages—Want Less Taxation on Personal Property—Think the Time is Not Yet Ripe for Single Tax on Land Values.

The Local Government of New Brunswick lately appointed a commission of three members to collect information and make suggestions on the subject of municipal taxation. The scoretary was Mr. W. B. Chandler and he has just issued an interim report, from which we take the following interesting particulars:

On several points the commission considers the present law of Ontario superior to that now in force in New Brunswick, and recommends that the latter be changed accordingly. The following are the changes recommended in this connection:

1. The exemption of moneys invested in mortgages, and that only the interest received from such invested moneys be assessed as personal property.

2. The exemption of all horses, cattle, sheep and swine owned by farmers.

3. The total exemption of the incomes of merchants or other persons derived from capital liable to assessment.

4. As to vessel property, that only the income derived from it be assessed.

5. That municipal councils be given the option of imposing a "business tax."

The report contains significant indications of the growing importance of the single tax movement. Two references are made to the question. In their opening paragraph the commissioners say:

One of the strongest arguments in favor of this exemption is the fact that it is almost impossible to discover the amount invested by any one person in mortgages apart from whatever information may be furnished by the individual assessed. When it is considered that the lander will always protect himself against assessment either by an increased rate of interest or by the covenant of the mortgagor to pay all taxes upon the property mortgaged and the money lent, it is manifest that the exemption of such investments is, at all events, in favor of the borrower, and encourages the investment of money in mortgages within the Province. These and other considerations have induced the commission to recommend this change in the present law."

In their concluding paragraph the commission briefly summarize matters, and they have this further remark to make:

"The commission have found the subject of assessment an ever widening and extending one. It is one which is now engaging the attention of many persons in the United States and Canada, who have given and are now giving the matter special study and attention, and even in England there is a strong movement in favor of a change in the principles of taxation now existing so as to attack the ground rent system in the City of London. The increasing number of persons advocating the single tax principle shows that final results upon the question of assessment have been by ne means yet attained."

The Toronto Evening Star comments on the report as follows:

"Reading the details of the way in which the commission have been struggling with intricate and complicated details of efforts to get at the un-get-tatable—that is, to tax capital in its protean and shifting forms, and to do so with tairness—one realizes forcibly the overwhelming advantage of a system which sweeps away all this cumbersome mass of botheration, and reverts to the simple principle of collecting all revenue from the value which attaches to land from the more working presence of population.
