

A WIND HARP

Here Is the Way to Make One With Very Few Materials.

One day as I was out shooting with my catapult I saw that when I pulled the rubbers back the wind blowing on them made them hum. I began to wonder if I could not make an instrument on the same principle.

I secured a pine board 2 or 3 inches shorter than the width of my window and



B Bridge across the center of the board (A in the picture). I then stretched 11 rubbers across the board lengthwise and fastened them by cutting notches in ends of the board with my knife. To raise the rubbers from the board I used three cornered bridges (B). To make lower and higher notes fixed these bridges diagonally (C). Then I the wind blew on it it gave me a fine tune.

A Poisonous Food Plant.

There is a shrub called manioc, or manihot, or cassava, which grows in South America, the West Indies and Africa. It has a great bulbous root, and it is this root which is interesting. In that species of the plant which is most used the root has a bitter, acrid juice, which is dadly poisonous. The strange part of the matter is that both the root and the poisonous juice are used for food, and probably every boy or girl who reads this has eaten both. The natives of hot countries dry the root and make good, wholesome bread out of it. It is only the juice which is poisonous or disagreeable in taste. But the juice itself contains a kind of starch, and when the liquid parts of it are evaporated there re-

Pour a spoonful of alcohol on a plate and set it in the air or sunshine. Then look for it an hour afterward. The plate will be dry and not even a smell of the alcohol will remain. Liquids which evaporate easily and completely in this way are called volatile, and the acid which renders manioc root poisonous is extremely volatile. When the least heat is applied to any mixture containing it, the acid quickly and completely evaporates, and this is the way in which it disappears in the process of making tapieca or drying the root to make arrowroot of it. There is a small quantity of bitter material in the manioc juice which is removed by washing the tapioca as soon as it is made. - Detroit Free Press.

Desite the implacable weather of a winter trip across the Atlantic, and the fatigue of a railway journey, Sir Donald Smith, High Commissioner for Canada, who arrived this morning from England, seemed as fresh and alert as if he had been living for the past few weeks in slippered ease. He laughingly calls one of his roughest experiences a "little trip," and, with clear eye, strong voice and robust appearance, discloses a buoyancy and elasticity nothing short of wonderful. Sir Donald, chatting pleasantly after apartments of his Dorchester street residence, had many interesting things to say upon a variety of subjects. His reference to the school and tariff questions was highly significant, Naturally, Sir Donald, while in England, was interested in the immigration question. "What we want, after all," as he says, "to make a nation

Sir Donald never for a moment re-garded his position as a sinecure. He started to work upon taking office with all that energy which has ever marked his course in life. He spoke in publi upon all possible occasions, established agencies, distributed magic lantern views for the purpose of interesting the young; and succeeded in arousing the attention of large masses of the English people to the advantages of




