



WOMEN FREEMASONS

Founded by French Lady Under Title of "Human Rights."

London, Feb. 25.-In no other country but France would it have occurred to a lodge of Freemasons that not only was it well to admit a woman into their numbers, but that they would count it a distinct honor. they determined, to use a Masonic expression, "to put it to sleep"; that is to say, they forbade it to hold meetings, and, in fact, broke it up altogether. Nevertheless, Maria Desraismes remain-

ed the only woman Freemason. She was admitted, however, into no other lodge, and had no means of meeting the fraternity.
