They have 10,000 cres of land under lease and have at he present time 30,000,000 feet of gas in sight. 

A DEPORTATION CASE.

While the Canadian immigration department has been accused by partisans of opening the door too widely to line between Europe and the Orient. newcomers, a case is before the Imperial Parliament which will give the enemies of the Canadian Government an opportunity to try a new tack. An Englishman named Hedges, his wife, and seven children, after being in Canada for two years, were deported some months ago at the request of the authorities of Oshawa, who complained that the family was not a desirable one and had become a public charge. Hedges became an applicant for char-Ity in England after his return, and told a story in court which was brought to the attention of the colonial secretary. The latter is in communication with the Canadian Government.

A dispatch from Ottawa says that the agent of the Canadian immigration department, who had the case in hand, made careful inquiries before ordering the deportation of the family and had abundant evidence that the complaints against the Hedges were well founded. No doubt the whole matter will be cleared up in an official statement. An examination of the two-years' record of the family in Canada should be sufficient to show what sort of people they are.

Municipalities must not get the notion that they can rid themselves of their responsibility to the deserving poor by shipping them from the country at the general expense. Apar, from the inhumanity of such conduct, it would create an impression in the old land injurious to Canada, if many such cases were brought to public attention there. The deportation law must be enforced with tact and discrimination. and in a humane spirit. It is well that this particular case is being ventilated, and the facts may fully justify the immigration department and the Oshawa Town Council.

The Floors.

In the hallways the floors are of cement, but in the wards there are three floors. The first is of cement. Above this there is a hardwood floor Over this is laid a thick covering of paper, and after leaving an air space of an inch, another floor has been

laid. These floors have been the cause of considerable discussion, and at one time Engineer Graydon issued an order lumber in so splendid a building.

Palpitation of the Heart.

One of the first danger signals that announce something wrong with the heart is the irregular beat or violent throb.
