London, Feb. 5.—The German cabinet has declined to send another note to the Allies calling attention to the fatal consequences which would ensue upon extradition of the Germans demanded for trial by the Allies for war crimes, according to a Berlin dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph.

REVIVING THE TORY PARTY.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson's declaration that Unionist Government has served its purpose and should cease is significant in that it constitutes a rallying cry to the old line Conservatives of the Dominion to get together if they are hoping to save anything at all of their party. It is a question if the call has not really been inspired from Ottawa, where the absolute hopelessness of the Unionist party has been made manifest by the impossibility of agreeing upon a leader to succeed Sir Robert Borden. The inside facts of what happened at Ottawa are beginning to come out and it is now known pretty definitely that the friends of Hon. Arthur Meighen thought they had made the premiership absolutely sure for him. They forgot something, apparently, for when the test came there developed a good deal of opposition to Meighen and he has since then been at odds with a number of his colleagues, and, according to rumor, ignored by them in council.

The Meighen following, which probably constitutes the most important of the several elements entering into the contest, has realized at last that Unionist Government is about ended and the next step that may be looked for will be the booming of Meighen for leader of the old Conservative party, made over to suit conditions of 1920. Hon. G. Howard Ferguson's blast is probably one of the signals to rally the faithful and it will be interesting to watch the manoeuvring that will take place during the next few months in the effort to unite the shattered remains of Conservatism under one of the high lights of Unionism. Meighen is probably as good a "hope" as the party can muster at the present time; at any rate he will have a chance to see if he can reconstitute the party.

Now that its own friends and backers are predicting its early decease Unionism may be regarded as more of a lost cause than ever. The hopes that were raised in some of the ministerial minds at Ottawa that in Unionism would be found a sort of fountain of perpetual youth for their party fortunes have been dashed to the ground, and as far as the cabinet is concerned it is simply a matter of how much longer they will inflict themselves on the country. Their helpless condition is shown by the way they are avoiding anything in the shape of a by-election. Ministers who six months ago were slated for dismissal from the cabinet are now being trotted out and given important portfolios, while similar evidence of ministerial trepidation is shown by the linking up of departments so as to reduce the number of ministers required.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson and his friends have another reason, too, for dislike of Unionism. They realize quite well that it was Unionist connections that was largely responsible for the disaster that overtook them in the last provincial election. They are, therefore, losing no time in endeavoring to clear their skirts for the future and to have no Ottawa affiliations that will prove adverse in the day of testing. Ontario will likely be the first province to attempt the reconstitution of the Conservative party and will find the Ottawa crowd that is behind Hon. Arthur Meighen thinking along similar lines now that the prospect of their hero leading a Unionist party has fallen through.

IGNOBLE EIGHT HUNDRED,

The list of 800 Germans to be delivered to the Allies is the blackest list of criminals ever put together since the life and times of Cain. Was any crime omitted by these men whom their fellow-citizens hate to render up? But leave that to the courts that will try them.

There should be a round-up of the whole collection at the French frontier or some other assembling point. A special train should convey the party en masse to Paris. Strictly, the cars should be not pullmans but cattle-cars, like those in which the kindly Teutonic humorists sent to Berlin the British prisoners with such placards as "To the Zoo." "Hell Women" (for the Highlanders.) All that need be pasted on the train for the 800 would be labels of their own devising, their own epitaphs for themselves, "Nach Paris," "Huns." But the courtesy of the Allies will not stoop to treat these rogues in their own way. They are sure of politeness and a fair trial, a trial intended not only to clear or convict them, but to write history with colors of truth. Ludendorff and the rest will suffer no such treatment as was meted to Nurse Cavell and Captain Fryatt. But tried they should be, if any criminal deserves trial.

IMMIGRATION FIGURES.

Immigration figures just issued show that during last year there were 117,650 newcomers to this country. Of these the greater number were British or American, fresh arrivals from the United Kingdom slightly exceeding those from across the border. The figures show an increase over 1918 of more than 100 per cent. According to the statistics 25,000 would-be new citizens from the United States were turned back by the immigration authorities through being unable to provide the necessary qualifications as to money, literacy or physique.

That the immigration department is carefully sifting the applicants from other lands for Canadian citizenship is commendable. We have immense spaces to be filled up, vast natural resources that will require millions of workers of one kind or another to produce in a degree that measures up to the possibilities, but it is imperative that we let in only such as are

stable if we are to get a right start for the stupendous expansion that is our destiny. There must be no room in Canada for the criminal or those who are agents, official or otherwise, of disorder and discontent. We bar the gates to the destitute and the law breaker and those who may be diseased, but it is equally as important that the professional agitator and his kind be kept out.

The whole machinery of the immigration department of the Government should be used to encourage the coming of such as approve our social and political system, those who are willing to conform to our laws and regulations. Any other kind will handicap and hamper. Twenty thousand newcomers of the type that will fall in heartily with the development of this country as we wish it to progress is preferable to three times twenty thousand not intensively selected. Never in the history of Canada has it been so vital that quality rather than quantity be the guiding light for those who pass on the immi-

MENTAL MALADIES IN CANADA.

At the annual convention of the Canadian National Committee of Mental Hygiene held in Toronto a few days ago, the startling statement was made that in Canada today there are 150, 000 persons suffering from maladies of the mind. In this number are those who are insane, those afflicted less acutely and the feeble-minded. This is an alarming condition and one that should enlist immediately the services of the best alienists the authorities can secure. Per haps it would be well if a thorough investigation of the country's insane asylums be made The unfortunates who are immates of these institutions must be given the very best attention and care their happier fellow-citizens can provide. The Quebec Telegraph points out the necessity for reform as follows:

These most unfortunate of God's creatures as they have more than once been called, deserve everything that can be done for the possible amelioration of their condition, and there is no doubt that up to the present time they have not received these deserts. Our asylums have simply been detention institutions for the herding of the insane and the feeble-minded, without any serious scientific study of their condition or careful treatment the cure of mental maladies. There is now a strong agitation for reforms in this direction, which are not likely to go unheeded, and on the other hand there is also an insistent demand for stricter vigilance in the mental examination of all immigrants, not only at the borders of the Dominion, but also at the point of embarkation. There must be no relaxation of any precaution that it is possible to take in order to prevent the entrance into the country of any more of these weak-minded immigrants.

On grounds of both decency and national efficiency nothing should be left undone that would bring relief to the victims of mental diseases or help cure where such is possible.

submitted: 1. A no-license resolution, which will be carried if 55 per cent of those voting, and 35 per cent of the voters on the roll, are in favor of no-license. 2. A limiting resolution—which means a reduction of one-quarter of the licenses-will not be carried unless a majority of those voting, equal to 35 per cent of the voters on the roll, are in favor of it. If no-license is not carried, those in favor of it will have their votes added to the resolution in favor of

3. No change-if a majority of the voters are in favor of no change that resoclution will be carried. The temperance organizations are co-operating and co-ordinating their efforts to achieve a victory for the first proposition. Pamphlets, newspaper clip-sheets and posters are being extensively used in a well-organized publicity campaign. In addition to this, there has been arranged a program of public meetings, which have begun now and will run on until the opening of the polls. This educational campaign in the cities, towns and villages of Scotland is being aided by some of the most brilliant speakers and able exponents of prohibition of the old land and of America.

TIMELIEST HITTER IN THE AMERICAN

Drives in 112 Runs-Veach Ranks Second in List of Runners Batted In.


