The German government has finally

determined to subject all professes curers who are not recognized medical practitioners to the severest surveillance. They will be given a month secure other employment, and if the end of that time they persist practice they will be prosecuted. The Government is in possession statistics which show that more than 100,000 men and women are illegally practicing medicine and the art of healing in Germany, and that this number is rapidly increasing. One medical statistician says he has found 150 cases of cancer in his province. Of these twenty-five are attended by authorized physicians and 108 by quacks. He maintains it is nearly as bad in other diseases which particularly call for trained medical

Most of these quacks allege that they have occult powers, personal magnetism, "magnetic eyes and hands," and that a cure will be the immediate consequence of implicit re liance in this treatment. German doc tors are indignant at the incomes enjoyed by some of these rivals. In the large cities of Saxony, Dresden, Leipsic, and Chemnitz, it is not unusua for an ignorant quack to receive from provoke a fight or inaugurate a cut \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year, an income be youd the average earnings of the scientifically equipped medical man
