Rojestvensky's Great Armada Practically Wiped Out Five Warships and Three Others Sunk or Taken

Tokio, May 29---2:15 p.m.---It is officially announced that Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet has been practically annihilated. Five warships have been sunk and three others captured, according to Admiral Togo's official report. Rear Admiral Nebogatoff and 3,000 men made prisoners. Rojestvensky believed to have escaped. The Japs are in pursuit of the remnants of the fleet.

FLOWER OF BALTIC FLEET PRIZE OF TOGO'S GUNNERS

Gallant Attempt of Rojestvensky to Battle Path Through to Vladivostock Ends in Disastrous Defeat.

Tokio, May 29, 3 pm-Rear Admiral Nebogatoff, former commander of the fourth division of the Pacific fleet, and recently commander of the information squadron, composed of scouts and merchantmen, with 3,000 other Russians, is among the prisoners captured by the Japanese. The battle began Saturday morning and the Japanese are still in pursuit of the Russians.

Washington, D. C., May 29.-Official announcement of the result of the naval engagement between the Japan-ese and Russian fleets was received at the State Department today in the following cablegram from Minister Griscom, dated Tokio, May 29:

"Admiral Togo has informed his Government concerning the fight which took place on Saturday afternoon and Saturday evening. According to his report the Japanese Government Not Tampering in was manifested in the speeches, especially in the explanation of the autonof the Northwest since 1870. In that fleet under his commaed destroyed and sunk one battleship of the Borodino class and four other large Russian war vessels. Two or three more were captured. None of the large Japanese men-of-war received serious injury.

"The battle was still in progress on Sunday. A great Japanese victory is announced here as the general result of the engagement, but few details have been received."

Washington, May 29 .- An official telegram from Tokio states that Admiral Togo reports to his Government that the total losses sustained by the Russian fleet Saturday and Sunday were: Two battleships, one coast defense armorclad, five cruisers, two special service ships, and three destroyers-all sunk. In addition, there were captured, two battleships, two coast defense armorclads, one special service ship, one destroyer, and over 2,000 prisoners. Admiral Togo adds that the Japanese squadron was undamaged.



PERE MARQUETTE AND UNCLE SAM

To Protest Against Deportation Might Be Embarrassing, Says Taft.

Detroit, Mich., May 29. — In an interview, President Harding, of the Pere Marquette Railway, hinted that if the Canadian Government went so far as to deport the Pere Marquette St. Thomas officials, and took no similar steps towards other roads, the matter would be called to the attention of the Washington Government. There was a further hint that the case might be carried so far that Canadian officials on American roads would be compelled to quit, but President Harding did not believe that Canada would go so far as to deport the Pere Mar-quette officers. Advices from Washington indicate that the United States Government may find difficulty in making a protest against the deportation with good grace

Mr. Gray As the "Friend" Of the Working Classes

"The same night the St. Thomas old boys were meeting, and Mr. Marks dropped in on them, only to find Mr. Gray on hand. Mr. Gray, who now poses as the friend of the workingmen, urged the St. Thomas old boys to ignore the strike and patronize the Springbank cars.

"On the other hand, Mr. Marks did his utmost to have the old boys to stay away from Springbank, and he and Mr. Gray had a warm debate for the better part of two hours. In fact, Mr. Gray as much as told Mr. Marks that he was a curse to the city.

"Mr. Gray also tried to lead the St. Thomas old boys to believe that Londoners were not in sympathy with the strike?



JAPAN CLAIMS GREAT VICTORY.

Washington, May 29 .- A cablegram received here from American Minister Criscom, at Tokio, dated this morning says that Admiral Togo is claiming a great victory. It says that Admiral Togo reports that the results of the fighting of the fleets Saturday afternoon and evening were one battleship of the Borodino class sunk, and four other large vessels sunk and two or three more vessels captured. 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· RUSSIA PLANS TO · INVADE CHINA

By Entering Mongolia Will Embroil Powers in Neu-

trality Mixup. London, May 28.-There is only one opinion in diplomatic circles of Russia's action in enlarging her field of operations to Mongolia. It is officially announced at St. Petersburg that by a special treaty arranged with troops will cross the Manchuria frontier into Mongolia in order to prevent

the Japanese flanking movement to the west. This is regarded as the gravest

menace to general peace which has arisen since the war began. Taken in connection with the developments in St. Petersburg in the last few days it is interpreted as the deliberate intention of those in control of Russia's policy to cover her defeat by embroiling the other powers. Such certainly has been the desire of important leaders of the Russian rectionaries since they recognized the helplessness of Russia arms. They strove first to embroil Great Britain by intolerable interference with British commerce. Then they tried to compromise their own ally by conduct of Rojestvensky's fleet. Dilomacy succeeded in defeating both attempts. Count Lamsdorff succeeded in gaining the Czar's suport in his

pacific attitude, and the militant party failed for the time being in their nefarious designs.

Now, however, the Russian foreign office admits negotiations which will nardly fail to result in the destruction of Chinese neutrality, the object which Sec-etary Hay and the European diplomatists successfully preserved until the present moment. It is not to be wondered that the diplomatic corps in Pekin and St. Petersburg are consternated by situated thus created. It was this development which caused the interruption f the French ambassador's journey from St. Petersburg, and which has now brought all the resources of diplomacy throughout the world into action to combat the peril which has arisen.

The foreign office at St. Petersburg to-day issued a statement to the effect that the Russian armies, in making preparaas for the forward march into Mor will avoid any action that would bring on a conflict with Gen. Ma or the intervention of the pow ers, and that Russia is resolved to enlarge the radius of her operations toward Mongolia solely for the purpose of defending herself against Japanese enterprise in this region. This utterance is as mendacious and un-

justifiable as was any of Russia's declara-tions which led to the present war. It is Russia herself, not Japan, which has overstepped the agreed limits of opera-tions during the war. The Japanese have kept strictly within the ring from the start to the present day. Russia now boldly and unnecessarily proposes to invade China, not for a genuine military purpose, as everyone acquainted with the military situation recognizes. A desire to raise international complications is, therefore, regarded as complications is, therefore, regarded as Russia's obvious motive in making this move. The immediate effect will be a prompt protest from the powers. Wall this avail anything? Some optimists think or hope that Russia will seize the occasion of such protest to say she cannot hope to wage a successful war if her operations are circumscribed in this nope to wage a successful war it her operations are circumscribed in this fashion, and must, therefore, seek peace, not because she is defeated, but for the reason of international interference. This is such a transparent pretext that few see in it any serious resort for saving Russian prestige.

The difference between the proposals of the Government and Opposition on the educational clauses is no greater. Let us see what they are, after they are simmered down and the froth is taken off. Much is said about the British North America Act in its relation to the matter. The interpretation of this act may be for the lawyers, but, as they differ, the layman, who is to vote, may wish to know what it is about. Here are the clause of the B. N. A. Act:

EDUCATION.

93. In and for each province the Legislature may exclusively make laws in relation to education, subject and according to the following propositions:

1. Nothing in any such law shall prejudicially affect any right or privilege with respect to denominational schools which any class of persons HAVE BY LAW AT THE UNION.

2. All the powers, privileges and duties at the union by law conferred and imposed in Upper Canada on the separate schools and school trustees of the Queen's Roman Catholic subjects shall be and the same are hereby extended to the dissentient schools of the Queen's Protestant and Roman Catholie subjects in Quebec.

3. Where in any province a system of separate or dissentient schools exists by law at the union, or is thereafter established by the Legislature of the province, an appeal shall lie to the Governor-General in Council from any act or decision of any provincial authority affecting any right or privilege of the Protestant or Roman Catholic relation to education.

4. In case any such provincial law as from time to time seems to the Governor-General in Council requisite for made, or in case any decision of the Governor-General in Council on any appeal under this section is not duly executed by the proper provincial authority in that behalf, then, and in every such case, and as far only as the circumstances of each case require, THE PARLIAMENT OF CANfor the due execution of the provisions of this section, and of any decision

Comparison of the Japanese and Russian forces now in battle in the Straits of Korea, is almost impossible because of reticence of the Japs. Suppression of news about their land operations is as nothing compared with what they have failed to make public should recommend the make publi to make public about Togo's strength and movements. FIGHTING OVER

Many Claims.

A very interesting investigation into the land claims of certain Indians was held at Mount Brydges by Mr. J. M. McCrae, inspector of Indian agencies. last week. The inquiry revolved around the estate of the late Sam Plain, an Indian of the Chippewa Reserve. The parties were represented by the following counsel: Mr. Chisholm, London, the Henry claim to 60 acres; E Meredith, K. C., of London, the claim of Lydia Reilly. a daughter of Sam Plain, also the interest of John Plain. Sam Plain's father; Alex. Stuart, K. C., the Fisher heirs; John C. Elliott, of Glencoe, James Cobban and Lucy Jane Balc-den, a sister of Sam Plain; and J. A. son, of St. Thomas, the interests of Sam Plain's two children, now in possession of Julia Waucosh, his Indian wife for fifteen years before his

Sam Plain held about 400 acres of the reserve under location ticket, and made a will, leaving the land to Julia Waucosh, except 50 acres left to Julia Reilly, his daughter; the personal property, except insurance Music, is the gu money, to Julia Waucosh, and John 470 King street. Plain, his father, who is a white man, and the \$2,000 of life insurance to John Plain, and his 3-year-old child

in equal shares. The department of Indian affairs under their powers disallowed the will as to real estate, but it is contended that the improvements on the land under the Indian act go as personal property, and so pass under that part of the will which dealt with personal

property. Lucy Jane Balsden claimed, as the sister of Sam Plain, his lands, but the act says that only an Indian, nearest of kin, can inherit, and it was contended that the woman was not within the term Indian, as used in that seetion of the act dealing with descent and under another, that she having the reserve, was no longer an Indian, although she draws an allowance as an Indian woman. No less than five conflicting sections of the act were discussed as applicable to her claim. Mrs. Henry, a venerable old Indian lady, full blooded, claimed 60 acres. because she once held it about 30 years ago, and it was sold by her husband without her authority, and

Mr. Robinson, on behalf of Julia Waucosh and her two children, opposed all other claims, and contended an allowance to his clients of the half of the improvements under the will, and that the department in the exercise of their discretion should re-store the will or locate his client on


