MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRIME MINISTER:

Re Press Clippings.

I received your letter of Documber the 8th, and the envelope of elippings.

Whenever elippings are returned by you, after reading, they are properly sorted and classified and filed. This practice has, of course, been followed with the elippings sent from Lake Wales.

Clippings of a personal and biographical nature, or relating to Mackensie, and other similar subjects, are, as a matter of routine, sent up for file at Laurier House. In the case of specially important elippings of this category, which may be required for speech and reference purposes, duplicates are also obtained and filed at the East Block. In addition, Mr. Measures is compiling, in ring binder form, special collections of elippings relating to personal and biographical items; specially interesting comment on speeches and statements; and personal photographs.

A card index is kept in the clipping room.

I attach a list of the newspapers received in the office, showing those which are read carefully, both for news items and editorial comment, and those which are read only for editorial comment and news items local or provincial in character.

The Toronto Star, like the Ottawa papers, the Gazette, Globe and Mail, Winnipeg Free Press and others, is read fully and carefully. The reason that more elippings from the Toronto Star are not sent to you, from day to day, is that, being an evening paper, it is not received in Ottawa until the day following publication. The Gazette and Globe are available in Ottawa the same morning they appear in Montreal and Toronto. As a consequence, in order to include them in each days elippings, the current items are obtained from the Ottawa papers, the Globe and Gazette. From the Star are sent to you only those news items which have not

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appeared in the papers raplier received. The editorial page of the Star is earefully matched, but it contains much fower articles of importance than other leading papers.

Speaking generally, any outstanding editorial appearing in any paper is included in the elippings sent to you. In order, however, to evoid sending too great a quantity each day, when an important subject is receiving a good deal of discussion in the press, throughout the country, a brief presis is prepared and each instead. As, for instance, was done in the case of the following subjects:

MEMORANDUM FOR MISS ZAVITSKE:

Re: Special book of clippings for the Prime Minister.

I send, herewith, for your information and retention, a copy of a memorandum dated December the 20th, setting forth the procedure on this subject.

It will greatly facilitate the work of dealing with clippings if any clippings released by Mr. King for fyle, were sent immediately to me, whether they are to be fyled eventually at Laurier House or at the East Block, this is necessary to ensure Mr. Measures: special collections being as complete as possible. After the clippings released by Mr. King have been sent up here and gone through for this purpose, those which should be fyled at Laurier House will be sent up to you marked for this purpose.

My understanding is that all personal biographical clippings and all clippings relating to William Lyon Mackenzie are to be fyled at Laurier House, except, of course, duplicates which are kept in duplicate fyles here.

I shall be obliged if you will bring the subject matter of these two memoranda to the attention of Mr. Handy and Miss Moore and ask their co-operation in the return of clippings released by Mr. King.

MEMORANDUM FOR MISS ZAVITSKE:

Re: Clippings

As it may be well to put down in writing the arrangement with respect to those subjects of clippings which are to be fyled at Laurier House, my understanding of your requirements is that, in the case of the following subjects, the main fyle will be kept by you at Laurier House:

personal biographical clippings; Mackenzie clippings; Governor General's clippings.

In the case of each of these subjects, a fyle will also be kept at the East Block, but it will contain only duplicates, or perhaps casual items which are not of sufficient importance to keep at Laurier House. The clippings on these three subjects will be sent up from the Clipping Room direct to you, marked "for fyle at Laurier House". This will distinguish them from the clippings sent up by me, from day to day, for Mr. King's perusal, all of which, when released by Mr. King (whether eventually to be fyled at Laurier House or the East Block) are to be sent back direct to me, in accordance with my memorandum of December the 28th.

In addition to these three subjects, one duplicate copy of each of Mr. King's speeches will be sent to you direct by Miss Shields, for reserve purposes.

In accordance with our conversation, I shall be glad if you, Miss Moore, and Mr. Handy will communicate direct with me or Mr. Fredenburgh if, at any time, you wish to have special subjects of clippings sent to Laurier House, as a matter of routine. Day to day requests for specific clippings should, of course, continue to be directed to the Clipping Room itself.

Will you, Miss Moore and Mr. Handy please initial the attached carbon copy and return it to me?

Memorandum for the Prime Minister:

Re Personal Biographical Clippings

I have sent up to illss Zavitske, today, the special collection of clippings prepared by Mr. Measures, covering the year 1937, under three heads:

- 1. Personal biographical items;
- 2. Cartoons;
- S. Photographs.

It has taken a few days in the New Year to check for items in papers coming in from other parts, and there may still be an occasional one to be added. The collection for 1937 does not contain any items regarding the Coronation and Conference. These, together with photographs, have been assembled in special volumes for binding. Together with samples of material for covers, they have been on your table in the East Block, and I have been hoping for an opportunity to show them to you for some time past.

I have also sent up to Laurier House the beginning of the collections for 1938, corresponding to the three mentioned above. There is not a great deal of material in any of these thus far, but Mr. Measures will call for the volumes and revise them once a week.

I attach herewith a memorandum dated December the 14th, which I prepared at the time I received your letter, written from the Bouth, regarding clippings. I went into all the matters mentioned in your letter, very carefully, at the time of its receipt, with a view to seeing that your instructions are carried out to the fullest possible extent from day to day. I had thought it would be preferable to talk the matter over with you, but there has been no opportunity thus far.

In this regard, it will be recalled that, last year, there was some difficulty when, on the evening of December the 17th, the Prime Minister desired to have a sentence or two of this character included in the Canadian Press news broadcast.
