

## THE BAPTIST CONVENTION

OF THE

## Maritime Provinces.

Organized 1846.

#### CONSTITUTION.

(Adopted 1879 and amended 1885 and 1886.)

I.—This Convention shall be known as the BAPTIST CONVENTION OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

II.—The objects of the Convention shall be to maintain the educational and missionary operations of the body, and to advance the general interests of the denomination.

III.—The membership of the Convention shall be as follows :----

1. Each of the Baptist Associations in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention, two of its own members as delegates to represent it therein.

2. Each Church connected with any of the above-named Associations, and contributing annually towards the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its own members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional delegate for every twenty dollars contributed to those objects, during the year; but no church shall be entitled to send more than five delegates.

3. Every ordained Baptist Minister connected with one of the churches above mentioned, either in the relation of pastor or member, shall be a member of the Convention.

4. Any member of any of these churches who shall have contributed towards the objects of the Convention fifty dollars at any one time, previous to the 27th of August, 1879—or one hundred dollars at one time after that date, shall be a life-member of the Convention.

5. The President and Faculty of Acadia College, being members of any of the churches above mentioned, shall be *ex officio* members of the Convention.

IV.—The officers of the Convention shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretary, and an Assistant-Secretary; all of whom shall be elected annually from among the members, except the Secretary, who shall be elected triennially.

7.—The Convention shall meet annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body, and shall commence its session on the first Saturday after the 18th of August, at ten o'clock, a. m.

A special meeting of the Convention may be called at any time by the President, on a requisition signed by the Officers of the Convention and the Secretaries of the three Boards, viz : of Governors of Acadia College, of Foreign Missions, and of Home Missions, in the Convention.

VI.—There shall be a Board of Home Missions and a Board of Foreign Missions, appointed by the Convention, each consisting of fifteen members of the body, five of whom shall retire each year in the order of their appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. It shall be the privilege of the staff of Foreign Missionaries to appoint annually one of their number who may be at home on furlough to be a member of the Foreign Missionary Board, in addition to the number of members appointed by Convention. Five members shall form a quorum of each Board In case of the resignation, death or removal of members of the Foreign Missionary Board, between the meetings of Convention, it shall be the privilege of the Board to fill the vacancies thus caused until the next meeting of Convention.

VII.—The Convention shall, once in three years, appoint six new members of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, in place of six who will then go out of office, in rotation, in accordance with the resolution passed by the Convention in September, 1850, and with the Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, 14 Vic., Cap. 37.

VIII.—The Convention shall also appoint a Ministerial Education Board; and a Board for the management of a Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund, each of which Boards shall consist of nine members of the Convention, three of whom shall retire annually, in the order of their appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. Three members shall form a quorum for each Board.

IX.—Vacancies occuring in the Secretaryship, or in any of the foregoing Boards, may be filled by the Convention at any session.

X.—This Constitution shall not be altered or amended except by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any meeting; written notice of the proposed alteration or amendment having been given at the last preceding annual meeting.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Persons invited to a seat may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.

3. No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body.

4. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.

5. The government of the body, and the regulations of its proceedings, shall be strictly in accordance with parliamentary usage, so called.

6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention, these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

King, President, the Chair was taken by Rev. J. A. Gordon, Vice-President. After singing, and reading of Psalm 125, prayer was offered by Rev. Edward Hickson, of Carleton, N. B. In absence of the Secretary, the list of members was read by Rev. G. R. White, Assistant Secretary.

Upon motion of Bro. H. C. Creed, it was

#### MINUTES OF CONVENTION.

The Report of Committee of Arrangements was read by Rev. G. R. White, and adopted.

The Report of Committee on Obituaries was submitted by Rev. J. H. Saunders, Chairman. It was referred to the Committee for amendment, and subsequently adopted as follows :---

#### REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

The roll of departed ones from our ministers' list for the past year is an unusually long one. If it were in the power of death to cast a dark shadow on the Church of Christ, that shadow would be upon us as we meet in our Convention to-day. It is our sad duty to report that no less than nine of our ordained pastors have been called from their appointed services on earth to places prepared for them in our Father's House of many mansions. The word "sad" in this connection may very properly express the record of vacancies in our homes and churches, but "joyous" is a more fitting word for us to use as we record the ascent of these elect ones to their rest and glory, and crowns of righteousness in heaven.

As it is the duty of your Committee to report of so large a number of the departed, the record to be made of each one o them must necessarily be very brief. The first to depart was

#### THE REV. J. F. KEMPTON, B. A.,

who died October, 27, 1889. This dear and devoted brother was born in Kempt, Queens Co., N. S., in 1835. Feeling a desire to prepare for enlarged usefulness, he attended Acadia College, from which he graduated in 1862. His first pastorate was at Mira and Sydney, Cape Breton. The first convert he baptized was Rev. C. H. Martell. After a pastorate of four years he accepted a call to the Margaree field, where for about four years he labored with the fidelity for which he was ever noted. After another pastorate of four years at Billtown, he studied at Newton for two years, to fit himsels for more efficient work for the Saviour and for men. Since his return from Newton he has had pastorates at Sussex, Parrsboro', and surrounding churches, Freeport, Chester, and finally in Hopewell, from which the summons of God has called him to the higher service.

During the years of his ministerial labor, he was privileged to baptize over 500 believers, brought to their Saviour in connection with his work. His pastorate in Chester was wonderfully blessed. During the four and a half years stay here, he baptized 200, and was the means of establishing a strong interest at the Western Shore. During the most of his life, he has labored on fields too extensive for the strength of one man to meet the demands. Too devoted to allow the cause to suffer, if it were possible for him to prevent it by overwork, he has worn out his life and come to the end at an age when many are prepared to do years of the most effective service.

No one who has had any acquaintance with Bro. Kempton can have failed to have been impressed with his piety and devotion. He was instant in scason and out of season in personal, hand to hand work with and for souls. His humility was equal to his consecration. He was ever ready to wait upon the sick and the dying by night or by day. His self-forgetfulness in self-sacrifice was so complete that he was not conscious of it. His example should stir us all to greater

fulness of surrender to Christ and His work. Multitudes will feel that they have sustained a personal loss in his death.

#### REVEREND SILAS TERTIUS RAND,

who held the degree of D.D. from Acadia College, the degree of LL.D. from Queen's College, Kingston, (Presbyterian), and the degree of D.C.L. from King's College, Windsor, (Episcopalian). was born in Cornwallis, N. S., May 18, 1810, and died at Hantsport, N. S., October 4, 1889. His education was procured, as far as it was obtained from the schools, at Horton Academy, Wolfville; but he was by nature a student and indebted for his scholarship mainly to his independent study. His efforts to obtain knowledge were persistent and, though made under discouraging circumstances, from the first so successful as to stamp him a man of ability and destined to wield a large influence. He was ordained in 1834, A. D., and had pastorates at Parrsboro, Liverpool, Windsor. and Charlottetown. About 1853 he removed to Hantsport, where his home was until his death. As a *preacher*, as a *missionary*, and as an *author* he has left a worthy record.

In his preaching Dr. Rand's individuality was apparent both in his ideas and in his style. In power of illustration he excelled while his thought was biblical, spiritual, highly instructive. His knowledge of the Word was extensive and his love for language and fine discrimination of thought so strong that his expositions of Scripture were often rarest treats. The narrative or psalm was made to glow with interest and beauty by his poetic imagery and penetration, while his sensitiveness to the spiritual import enabled him to commend the Word of God to the conscience of his hearers. He preached a great deal throughout these provinces, and through a long life was welcomed to pulpit and platform by a large number of admirers and For many years he took a prominent place in public friends. movements, being interested in the philanthropic enterprises, as well as the religious work of his generation. The journals of by-gone years show how diligently he labored, by voice and pen, for the good of his fellow men, and how truly those labors were appreciated. In recent years he has moved freely among our churches and uttered words of wisdom at our denominational councils. But a year ago, at the sessions of our Baptist Institute, he addressed the brethren present, and in the meetings of Convention showed his interest in the work of the body. As he has so long mingled with us at our homes and in our churches, ever lifting us by his prayers and kindly exhortations, what inspiration has he given to many a weary Christian. He will be missed and mourned by hosts of our fellow Christians of every name.

His work as missionary to the Indians has a tender interest altogether unique. The story cannot here be repeated in detail. How he gained a knowledge of the international struggether gathering words one by one from wandering groups of semi-avages; how he patiently collected sentences, and therefrom obtained the grammar; how he sought from one and another those legends the knowledge of which gave him power in his work; all this, with the self-sacrifice and even peril it often involved, only he and his Lord know.

For many years this work went on in patient study and unwearied efforts to commit to the immortal custody of the types the language, and, it possible, the folklore of the people he loved so well. Says Dr. W. S. McKenzie, in *Baptist Review* for April, 1888 :--

#### MINUTES OF CONVENTION.

"But Dr. Rand's chief work as a linguist, the work to which he has made all his other acquisitions subsidiary and which entitles him to high rank in philological studies, is that which he has pursued and accomplished with the language of the Micmac Indians, an and accompliance when the language of the language the Mariitme aboriginal tribe of the Algonquin family, inhabiting the Mariitme Provinces of British North America. When about 35 or 40 years ago he entered upon that task, he stood face to face with difficulties with which few men would have had the courage to grapple. But difficulties, so far from intimidating, have always made him more intrepid and persistent. With the aid of phonetics he at length succeeded in snatching from the lips of those aborigines and committing to writing their wonderful language, not a syllable of which tongue had ever before been written. In this way he collected, classified and prepared for a dictionary, over 40,000 Micmac words. That work is now going through the press under the patronage and at the expense of the general government of Canada. Dr. Rand has also constructed a Micmac grammar and reader, made a religious catechism and several versions of English hymns for the use of the Indians. He has also translated into Micmac the whole of the New Testament and several portions of the Old. His version of the New Testament is printed. Only a few parts of his renderings of the Old Testament Scriptures are in type. In the prosecution of these labors Dr. Rand has also been pursuing with a characteristic religious zeal, missionary effort in behalf of the Micmacs. Eminent linguists have been watching with peculiar interest his contributions to their special branch of learning. They pronounce the Micmac language, and indeed all the aboriginal languages of North America, as among the most regular, copious, rythmical and complete languages known; and they regard Dr. Rand's contributions on Indian legends and linguistics, and especially his Micmac dictionary. as invaluable additions to the science of philology. The story of his pursuits and achievements in the line of American aboriginal dialect is a thrilling one."

His work as an *author* is more than respectable. His articles in the periodicals have been frequent and always full of energy and thought, cast in a good literary form. His translations have been widely noticed. Indeed his work as a scholar and writer has been generally recognized. Says Dr. McKenzie: "Dr. Rand's activity in literary labors is unflagging. In linguistic lore his attainments are quite extraordinary, almost incredible. He is a master in the language and literature of Latin, both the classic and the ecclesiastic. He is equally familiar with the Greek, both the ancient and the modern. Nor is he less versed in Hebrew and in Syriac. He can read and compose, and even think, with considerable facility in a dozen or more foreign tongues." He thought in Latin, when it suited him he dreamed in Micmac; he wrote poems in other languages as readily as in his own.

His acquisition of the Micmac language and legends is one of the marvels of literary adventure. We can see him sitting in the camp of the Indian, asking them the names of things, the meaning of this English word in Micmac, pronouncing it till the Indian was satisfied; or listening enraptured to the long stories of Glooscap and other legends, and committing them to orderly English.

But the results of his work for the Indians no one can know. As he has not gathered churches and organized converts, there may not appear much to directly point to as the fruits of his labors; but

if we remember that he has preached to thousands of them in their own tongue, that he has ministered to them by prayer and personal work in their deep experiences of pain and death, that many have shown deep interest in the Gospel, we may be sure that the Word has not been in vain. If one soul has been saved out of the dense darkness how great is his reward, how deep should be our gratitude —and beyond his direct effort is what he has done to condition future efforts on their behalf.

Dr. Rand's piety was of a simple type, was indeed New Testament Christianity. His faith was unbounded, his doctrinal views clear, his devotions habitual. Prayer seemed to be his native atmosphere. He offered his petitions, expecting them to be answered. For these many years, he was in receipt of no solary. So firm were his convictions on this point, that he severed his connection with the old Micmac missionary party, and looked direct to heaven for support, and he was not disappointed.

A unique character has passed on before us. His make-up was altogether out of the common lines. He had the air of the sage, as his personality presented itself to us anywhere, on the street, on the platform, or in our homes. Instinctively the feeling arose, this man cares nothing about the common pursuits of men, and the intuition was not at fault. For dress, equipage, display of any kind, he seemed not to have the slightest desire. He lived in a world of ideas, rather than in the actual world. His mind was literary to a degree unknown to most men. He was the only soul in all the world who held all this aboriginal wealth—language, legends, history, and related subjects. But the Micmac oracle will speak no longer. It is utterly improbable that another will arise to succeed him.

#### THE LATE REV. J. F. MCKENNIE.

Another of our older ministers has lately passed away, the Rev. John F. McKennie, of Ragged Islands, Shelburne Co., N. S. Our late brother was born at Port Medway, Queens Co.. in 1816. When about seven years of age his parents moved to Brookfield, where he spent his youth. It was not until he had grown to manhood that that change came which is described as "passing from death into life." This momentous event took place at Mill Village, whither he had removed after being united in marriage with Sarah A. Hunt. This companion of his joys and sorrows preceded him to the better land about four years ago.

He was converted under the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Pope a zealous Methodist minister, and received into the Methodist Church. The change in his character and conduct after his conversion was so obvious and permanent, that in relation thereto it might be truly said, "Old things are passed away, behold, all things are become new." He was soon led to exercise his gifts in prayer and exhortation, and ultimately became a local preacher in the Methodist Church.

When he had been engaged as a local preacher for eight years, and a member of the church for about sixteen years, he was led, in the providence of God, to study the subject of baptism. This question to him was no light matter, but one which drove him to his knees, and he would often retire to the woods and wrestle in prayer that he might know and follow the Lord's will. He finally came to the conclusion that believers alone ought to be baptized, and that Sc lea rel fel for wa by

Scriptural baptism was by immersion. It was no easy matter to leave the church he had first joined, and to which most of his relations and friends belonged, and join a Baptist church. But he felt a divine command was laid upon him, and he must be willing to forsake all and follow Christ. And in spite of much opposition, he was enabled by the grace of God to follow his Lord, and was baptized by the Rev. R. R. Philp, at Port Medway. He was soon after ordained by the Baptist Church, his first pastorate being at Greenfield, Queens Co., where he labored for two years.

From Greenfield he removed to Ragged Islands, taking the oversight of the 1st Sable River, the 2nd Ragged Islands and Louis Head churches, where he labored until his death, a period of twentynine years. For the first six or seven years he also ministered to the Jordan Bay and Sand Point churches, but finding so large a field too much for his strength, he gave that church up and confined his labors to the other three.

His death was very sudden. He had spent the afternoon of Wednesday, Oct. 9th, with a few friends. Before leaving for home we knelt in prayer and led at the throne of grace, praying for the spiritual and temporal welfare of all who knelt with him, and finally asking that if we never meet again on earth, we might all meet around the throne in heaven. He left accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. Freeman, in good spirits and in his usual health. He sang a hymn as he drove along, which was a great favorite with him years ago, which commences with the lines,

> "His wisdom's vast and knows no bound, A sea where all our thoughts aredrowned."

and seemed quite happy. He arrived home safely and was just going into his own door, when he fell down and expired without a struggle. He always wished to pass away without having a long period of sickness and his wish was granted. He died in harness having preached twice the previous Sunday.

He has done a good solidwork on the field where he labored so long and was privileged to reap much of what he had sown.

#### REV. DANIEL MCLEOD.

Our Brother, the Rev. Daniel McLeod, has done with the things of time and gone to his eternal rest. He departed this life peacefully on the evening of Thursday, Feb. 6th, at his residence at Tracadie, Antigonish County. N. S. Though not in roburst health, ne faithfully continued his labors until the opening of the present year, and it was only during the last week or two of his life that his case was considered serious. He charged his sorrowing family not to weep for him, but put their trust in God

He was one of God's humble and unpretending servants. His last charge was a church of colored people. They loved him tenderly.

He had been in his last charge some sixteen months, during which time the blessing of the Lord manifestly rested upon his labors; twenty-one were baptize !, five were restored to fellowship, and five received by letter. A plain and serviceable church building with seating capacity for 100 persons was finished, and, with outside assistance, virtually freed from debt.

Bro. McLeod had previously labored at New Harbor, Ingram

River, and other places. He was ordained in 1873, but had preached for a number of years previously in Cape Breton, mostly in Gaelic. His wife. after two years' illness, died last summer. He was born at St. Ann's, Cape Breton, and had reached the age of 63 years.

#### REV. G. F. MILES

was born September 9, 1821, in Maugerville, N. B. He was the youngest son of Col. T. Odbur Mites, M.P.P., whose father received a large grant of land from the British Government in lieu of services rendered during the rebellion of the colonies, 1773-83. The family belonged to the Episcopalian Church ; but in his young manhood, during a powerful work of grace in York Co., Brother Miles, while on a visit to some relatives, passed through the narrow gate into the Kingdom of God, and was shortly after baptized by Rev. I. E. Bill. Almost immediately the young man began to call sinners to repentance ; and in 1846 was ordained to the work of the Gospel ministry at Newcastle, Queens Co. He held pastorates at St. George, Sackville, N. B., Maugerville, Moncton, Amherst and other places.

During the latter years of his life he has ministered according to his time and strength in a number of places, doing work more akin to that of the evangelist. No record remains of the number of persons admitted by him to the fellowship of the churches to whom he ministered, but as he was anxious to make full proof of his ministry, the aggregate must be large The great day alone will disclose the number of those who have been aroused from the slumber of Nature, and led to fly for refuge to the hope set before them.

Although of a powerful frame and a constitution naturally excellent, it has been evident for the past few years that the strong man must fail. The keepers of the house began to tremble, the wheel at the cistern with difficulty performed its office, and at last the golden bowl was broken. Paralysis, which had smitten him twelve days before, had loosed the silver cord and the spirit returned to God who gave it. The tongue which had thundered out the law, or exhorted men to flee from the coming wrath, or poured out the balm of consolation to the afflicted, was silent. The kind father, the head of a large family, was no more with them, for God took him.

Bro. Miles, contrary to our hopes that he would rally, passed away to the better country on Wednesday morning, February 19, 1890, at 5.30 o'clock. The end was very calm; no groans, no strife, just a gradual sinking, until he ceased to breathe.

Mr. Miles was one of Nature's favorites. Endowed with a fine physique, his presence was commanding, his leonine appearance compelling the respect of th beholder. His voice was of great compass, powerful enough to be heard above the roar of battle, yet gentle and soothing as that of a mother. In preaching, his impetuous nature led him to use this noble instrument to the utmost. Indeed he was prodigal of all his powers and never reserved his strength, not seeming to imagine that there was a limit to his strength. He was a plain, downright preacher of the Gospel. He saw certain vital truths, held them tenaciously, and proclaimed them boldly. Spiritual subtleties had no charm for him. He had been stamped by Baptist fathers, and bore the impress of their theology, not of such wide range, perhaps as that of the present generation, but probably as effective. It was a G spel "mighty to the pulling down of strongholds," as that of the present is to the building up of the Kingdom of God.

#### MEMORABILIA.

The delay in publication of the Year Book demands a word of explanation. So far as the committee, the publisher and the printer are concerned, it could easily have been in the hands of the members of our churches two months ago. "Copy" has not been furnished promptly by the parties to whom that duty was entrusted. The Secretary of the Convention, always prompt and painstaking, has never delayed the work of publishing a single day. The Convention matter was all in print early in October. Then commenced the worry and struggle, and weeks of waiting, and the annoyance of unanswered letters ! It was, comparatively, an easy task to obtain information from the churches in British Columbia; our chief difficulty was with the clerks of the Eastern and Western Associations of the New Brunswick churches. Three distinct notices in the columns of the Messenger and Visitor-the first having been published as early as July last-utterly failed of response ; and some six letters and post cards had to be written before the Minutes of the N. B. Western Association came to hand, some two weeks ago ! The minutes of the P. E. I. Association are always forwarded with business-like promptness. This year they were sought and obtained by the chairman of the Committee on the State of the Denomination, early in August, and when wanted were not forthcoming. It required two letters to Toronto and three to St. John, and weeks of annoyance and delay to the committee and the publishers to find these in Brother Goodspeed's private drawer, in the office of the Messenger and Visitor. If the readers of the Year Book for 1890 feel inclined to complain, we beg to remind them that they are not the only sufferers.

The contents of these pages are of great value. The statistics of the eight Associations and the Minutes of their meetings, convey much local information. The reports of the Mission Boards (Home and Foreign) and of Acadia College, the Academy and Seminaries, are of great interest and value. The page of Baptist Statistics of the world is worthy of study. Our Advertisers, whose names and announcements are given between the covers, show business push and energy well deserving the patronage of the general public.



life it, the Bro. Miles had the gift of consolation. His sympathies were strong, and the mourner felt that the heart of the minister was beating for him. In the chamber of affliction he had the faculty of encouraging the sick, and of presenting the Saviour to the dying. He was naturally a helper of men; and in former days his benefactions were large. His house was always open, his horses were at command of the stranger. His remains are in the beautiful cemetery of the Amherst Highlands.

#### REV. SAMUEL J. ARCHIBALD.

Bro. Archibald was born in Stewiacke, Sept. 8, 1850. He died at Jacksonville, N.B., May 29. Of his earlier years we have no record. As a teacher he obtained a well-earned reputation. He was an adherent of the Presbyterian Church. A change of views led to his baptism at Lower Economy, March 27, 1881, by Rev. G. F. Miles. Shortly after his baptism he became exercised with reference to the Christian ministry, and after prolonged and prayerful consideration he yielded to the divine promptings. He was licensed by the Lower Economy church in Sept., 1882. In 1884 the Missionary Board gave him an appointment to New Ross and adjacent settlements, and, after a few months, the brethren were so well pleased with him that they called for his ordination, which took place in Oct., 1884. He was on this field more than three years, after which he removed to Newcastle, N. B. Here he remained one year and nine months, and then settled at Jacksonville, where he remained till the time of his death. Early last winter he had an attack of la grippe, from which he never fully recovered. He had special services every night during the last two weeks of March, when so weak that he had to be helped to the place of meeting. He who had never missed a Sabbath appointment during the seven years of his ministry, could not easily be persuaded to take the needful rest. But the the call came in a way that could not be resisted. At the Sabbath monning service, the 6th of April, he fainted away and had to be assisted to his home. He had, however, an afternoon appointment at Jacksonville. Most men, in his circumstances, would have yielded to the seeming necessity of the case, and the brethren would have cheerfully excused the failure. He however undertook the service and got through it comfortably, but that was the last. The resolute spirit must yield. He must now quit the field of strife, as the warrior who has won his laurels and lays his armour by. Medical skill was of no avail. His disease was pronounced decay of the blood. For the sake of his family he would have preferred life; he would like to have had more time in which to serve the Master; but he saw that his work was done, and that it only remained to endure what was left to him of suffering.

"He was perfectly resigned and committed his family to the great Father of all, and although he suffered a good deal during the last few days, he bore it with the greatest patience, and passed away as if going to sleep."

A good man has fallen, in the prime of early manhood. But the life so soon ended has not been in vain. The world is the better for it, and heaven is now the richer. May we who survive learn to be the more diligent in improving what of opportunity yet remains.

#### REV. OBED PARKER.

From memos, left behind and other sources, the following facts are gleaned: Rev. Obed Parker was the son of William and grandson of Major Nathaniel Parker, who served under General Wolf at the siege of Quehec.

The ancestors of the Parkers in Nova Scotia, located in Nictaux, were Congregationalists, but travelled through the woods to Horton (now Wolfville) to be baptized by Rev. Mr. Parsons. They then returned home, opened their house for public worship, and Henry Allen was the first to preach in it. Then ensued a revival under Father Edward Manning, and the commencement of the Baptist cause in Nictaux and Annapolis Co.

In 1855, this "pioneer" family had over 1,000 descendents, including about twenty Baptist ministers.

Obed Parker, converted in youth. continued in the faith, became one of our most devoted and successful home missionaries was honored as the means of the conversion and baptism of hundreds probably a thousand, during his life. He organized a number of small churches, which still exist and have become strong, so "though dead he yet speaks." <sup>1</sup> Bro. Parker was also pastor over a number of churches. In the fields where his earnest labors seemed the most successful may be named Barrington, Ragged Islands, Pubnico, Chelsea, Greenfield, Middlefield, Rawdon, Jeddore, Dartmouth, River John, Albany, Springfield, Hillsborough, and Melvern Square, where he spent the last years of his useful life. He was evidently a " man of God," suitable for the times in which he did most of his efficient work for his loved Master, Jesus.

Though but an ordinary preacher he was not easily excelled in the more important requirements of pastor and missionary.

Bro. Parker's visits to the sick and dying, his kind and comforting words to the bereaved, and his "prayer-pleadings" are still fiesh in the memories of hundreds.

When bent under the weight of years our aged brother might be seen—staff in hand—hobbling his way to the house of prayer, near by, and on his last visit, over two years ago, sat in a chair and delivered his "farewell," and give his parting blessing, especially to the young people he loved so much.

Probably but few of our older ministers have a more really interesting record of their life work than has had Obed Parker.

A large amount of "foundation work" was the result of his pastoral and mission labors. The "unwritten" record—yet to appear—will more fully reveal the facts. Rev. Obed Parker was ordained Feb. 22nd. 1844, was called to his reward, after a protracted illness, July 1st, 1890, aged nearly 87 years—truly "an ear of corn fully ripe." He leaves three daughters out of five. His companion —a true mother in Israel—carefully cared for our worthy brother during the former part of his sickness, yet preceded him to the "golden shore," in October, 1888, aged 88. As the deceased may be considered one of the connecting links between the "Fathers" and the present older ministers. it would seem proper that a somewhat extended notice of his life and labors should be recorded.

#### MINUTES OF CONVENTION.

#### REV. WILLIAM M. EDWARDS

departed this life at Blissfield, Northumberland County, N. B., July 9th, A. D., 1890. In the autumn of 1860 he took charge of the churches and mission stations in Blackville, Blissfield and Ludlow on the Miramichi River. For thirty years he labored most faithfully and efficiently in the interests of the people physically, morally, and religiously. In connection with his gospel ministry he labored zealously in the temperance cause, and to the sick of his flock he was not only pastor but physician, giving thoroughly matured counsel and dispensing medicine.

He was ordained to the gospel ministry at Hampton, N. B., in March, A. D., 1855. He was also pastor in Gagetown, and being assisted by Rev. A. B. Earle, a powerful revival was enjoyed by the church. His first wife died young, leaving one daughter, Mrs. H. Travess, of Blissfield.

His second wife, who survives him, was Miss Isabella Rigby, of Portland, St. John, who lived and labored with him for some forty years.

At the Association in 1865, the committee on missions report that "Blissfield, Doaktown, etc., under the ministry of Rev. W. M. Edwards, are sharing in the tokens of revival mercy; some 30 candidates having been immersed......and are now numbered with the Lord's redeemed....... A new church was organized at Blissfield." On June 1st, 1873, he reported to the H. M. Board : "During the year I travelled 1,689 miles, preached 99 sermons, conducted 45 conference and prayer-meetings, made 243 religious visits, delivered one temperance lecture and administered the Lord's Supper 14 times."

He was moderator of the Western Association, at Newcastle Sept. 20th, 1866.

At the last Association, at Gagetown, held 25th of June last, he reported the cause of Christ as prospering on his field of labor, and said, "We have now three new chapels, and we invite the Association to meet with us next year." The invitation was accepted. He also said, "Brethren, I feel as if my work is about done, and I may not be with you next year." He returned home, and, after a few hours' illness, retired to his eternal rest.

#### REV. J. OTIS REDDEN.

Rev. J. O. Redden, died at Chicago, 23rd July. He was the eldest son of Deacon Henry Redden, of Windsor, N. S. He was graduated from Acadia College in the class of 1876. In 1878 he took charge of the Rawdon church, Hants Co., where he remained until he entered upon theological studies at Crozer, Pa. He was graduated from Crozer Seminary in 1882. He was ordained at Alexandra, P. E. I., Nov. 29, 1882, and for three years served faithfully and successfully as pastor of the Alexandra. Uigg and Belfast churches.

During these years he endeared himself to his people by his deep piety and his earnest, efficient discharge of the duties of a good minister of Jesus Christ. He had rare executive ability, and led his people successfully in Christian service. A commodious meetinghouse was erected at Uigg and remains as one of his monuments. It was a hard struggle for him to decide to leave his native land to go to a strange country, but physicians strongly advised a Southern climate, and he accordingly went to California in December, 1885.

His work there was principally in Santa Barbara and Ventura There were a few weak interests in those counties which Counties. he strove hard to foster, and God blessed the labor. They were situated within a radius of more than one hundred miles, so that he had much driving to do, which involved great self-sacrifice. He was devoted to the interests of the Santa Barbara Association, and had the joy of seeing it grow in numbers and strength. For the last year his work was confined to the church in Lompoc town. During his ministry the church increased in membership from about four or five to fifty. A snug church building was erected and dedicated free from debt. He engaged in full pastoral work until February of this year, when he had an attack of la grippe. From this he never rallied sufficiently to admit of his preaching again. He desired greatly to recover his wonted strength, but rejoiced in God's goodness through all. When talking of the future, he exclaimed: "O, the exceeding richness of His grace. I cannot think of these things as when I was strong, but I know that underneath are the everlasting arms, and that is enough."

Bro. Redden was a man of good intellectual ability, clear and correct in his views of Scriptural truth, and, according to the testimony of those who were in a position to know, his sermons were well constructed and rich in thought. He was an excellent man an exemplary Christian, and a consecrated minister. He was earnest in endeavors for the progress of Christ's cause in the churches with which he was associated and in connection with our Associations and Convention. He was highly esteemed by his brethren in the ministry to whom his name will always be sweet. O that God may raise up many more possessed of the same spirit of unselfish devotion to the Saviour of men.

By some one's oversight the notice of the death of our aged bro.

#### REV. D. P. HARRIS,

of New Brunswick, who passed away on January 7th, 1889, was not reported last year. He was one of our most devoted and useful ministers. He came to the close of his services on earth reioicnig in his Saviour's love and power.

#### REV. JEREMIAH BANCROFT.

The Rev. Jeremiah Bancroft, of Walton, so long known in Hants county as a Christian minister, having labored at Rawdon, Newport, Kempt, Maitland, and Walton, after some six weeks sickness, passed peacefully to his reward on the 12th of June at midnight.

> The voice at midnight came, He started up to hear, A mortal arrow pierced his frame, He fell but felt no fear.

Although he was nurtured in a Christian home, he did not yield to the claims of the gospel till a family began to gather about him. It was at a time of religious awakening at Digby Neck, under the preaching of J. C. Morse, that he was converted, by whom he was baptized and received into the church. Not pleased with his business prospects in that place, he returned to his old home at Roundhill to try his hand at farming. There also his way seemed to be hedged up, and he was led to believe that the Lord had other work for him to do. Feeling deeply impressed that he ought to preach the gospel, and receiving encouragement from Rev. John Chase and others, he preached his first sermon at Roundhill. His first regular work was commenced at Rawdon, where he was ordained in 1849.

Those Bible teachings which have distinguished Baptists from other religious bodies were firmly held by him. He believed that all Scripture was given by inspiration of God. His personal appearance was good. His form was erect, his eye was full of expression, his voice distinct, he was held to be an able preacher and many souls where gathered by him into the fold.

#### SECOND SESSION.

#### SATURDAY AFTERNOON, Aug. 23.

Session opened with prayer by Rev. I. E. Bill, Jr., of Chegoggin, N. S.

The report on the state of the Denomination was read by Rev. Dr. Goodspeed as follows :

#### REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE DENOMINATION.

Your Committee are unable to give the usual statistical statement of the progress of the churches during the past year. Two Associations are not held until after the meeting of Convention. From four of the Associations already held, the statistics from the letters of the Churches have not been sent in. It may be added that another association has decided to hold its sessions hereafter, after Convention. This suggests the inquiry whether it may not be necessary to adopt some plan by which statistics may be obtained for the Convention direct from the Churches. Were this suggestion adopted, fuller information might also be sought on other most important points touching the deeper springs of individual and church life and growth in grace.

New churches have been organized at Granville Ferry, Gibson, Apple River, and Truro.

Houses of worship have been dedicated at Dorchester Cape, The supply of ministers does not keep up with the demand. The latter is not diminishing. The occupation of new ground more than makes up for any economizing of force through better grouping of the churches. On the other hand there has been no small loss to our active ministerial forces during the year. Ten brethren have ended their earthly labors, seven of whom were acting as pastors of churches. Five have left the Maritime Provinces for work in the United States and in other parts of the Dominion. Two have been laid aside from overwork or illness and three have engaged in other kinds of service. To make good this loss, seven brethren have been ordained, of whom six are at work within the bounds of our Convention. There is thus a total loss of eleven to our force of active pastors. It is gratifying to know, however, that never was there a larger number of earnest young brethren preparing for the high calling of the Christian ministry and that the outlook in this direction is bright with promise.

From what we have been able to gather from the reports from the churches in the Messenger and Visitor and from those from the Associations already held, the results of the year's work in additions to the churches have not been large. The gain which has been made, however, has been through quiet work and regular growth, and not by means of extensive revivals. While we should covet the latter, when they are evidently the work of God, the regular growth furnishes the best index of the spiritual condition of our churches. This has been a year, also, in which there has been much pruning away of unfruitful branches. It is to be hoped that this, with the patient and persistent seed-sowing of our pastors generally, may be the preparation for enlarged ingathering in the near future.

As will appear by the report of the treasurer of the Convention there is a respectable increase in the beneficence of our people during the year. This is one of the most hopeful features of our work, not so much as affording funds to support the imperative needs of our great denominational enterprises, as in furnishing one of the best indexes of the reality, depth and vitality of the christian life of our people. It cannot be too strongly insisted upon that there can be no high standard of christian character reached through a training which overlooks and overleaps the plainest duty to give means as well as prayers to the Lord's work, and which either leaves unstirred and unexercised the best and most unselfish impulses of the regenerate life. We believe our denomination can never have its full prosperity and power until our pastors determine, by the plainest and most faithful instruction, as well as by the wisest planning, to develop this fundamental grace of giving to the Lord.

On motion the report was adopted and Rev. A. Cohoon was appointed to take the place of the chairman and to furnish the statistics necessary to complete the report for publication. (For Statistics see Index.)

A letter of greeting from Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., was read and the Secretary ordered to extend to Father Bill the love and greeting of the Convention.

Rev. W. J. Stewart, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, read his annual report, and Bro. John March submitted his report as

Treasurer of the Board. The report of the Secretary was considered clause by clause and adopted. (See Index.)

Rev. Dr. Day, General Treasurer of Convention Fund, read his annual report, which was laid on the table for future consideration.

The Report of the Committee on Publication of the Year Book was read by Bro. B. H. Eaton and adopted as follows :

#### REPORT OF THE PUBLICATION COMMITTEE.

#### To the Baptist Convention :

Your Committee beg to report that the proceedings of last year's Convention with the Reports of the Boards, the statistics of the denomination and digest of proceedings of the eight Associations in the Maritime Provinces, were published in our "Year Book," comprising 200 pages, in less than two months after the close of the Convention.

As you ordered last year that the books should be sold, we deemed it advisable to send them by mail direct to the Church Clerks, informing them of your decision. We sent to each of the 384 churches books as follows :-

#### THE PUBLICATION COMMITTEE.

2000 books were thus sent to the Churches, and another 1000 to the Associations, Boards, Colleges, Newspapers, Missionaries, &c. 121 churches have paid for the books sent to them, \$75.12. Some 24 churches sent for additional supply, while 263 churches have not yet paid.

Bro. Selden, in addition to distributing the books, has kept the accounts with the churches. He will have the account book with him at this Convention for reference if you wish, and for payment as far as possible.

As there were 1000 books on hand in March last, the contents of which are exceedingly valuable as an educator for the members of

our denomination as well as for the general public, your Committee made a special effort to get them distributed, even at a great sacrifice. So a notice was printed in the Messenger and Visitor offering to send the book to any person who would forward a 3 cent stamp. As a two cent stamp is required to mail one copy, this offer was the lowest possible to effect a sale, and was only made in view of the large number on hand and likely to become unsaleable. However, only a small number was sent for, and we found 800 copies remaining in Bro Selden's office last week ; so he was instructed to forward 200 more copies to the Convention for the members and their friends at home, and we request you to instruct us in disposing of the remainder. It may be possible that 4000 copies are too many for the 44,000 Baptists you represent.

The book contains 44 pages less than that of the preceding year. The material and general work of the printer are satisfactory. The printer's bill (\$570.56) has been paid. Items are :--

The Report of the Secretary of Board of Governors of Acadia College was taken from the table and discussion resumed upon the clause relating to Theological Education. After remarks by Rev. E. J. Grant. Rev. W. E. Hall, Rev. Dr. Higgins, Rev. C. E. Baker, Rev. W. H. Robinson, Rev. B. H. Thomas, L. D. Morse, (Lic.,) Bro. W. F. Parker, Bro. G. J. C. White and J. B. Morgan. The clause was adopted.

The next clause of the report, relating to the Charter of the College, was discussed by B. H. Eaton, Judge Graham, H. H. Bligh, Rev. J. B. Woodland, H. C. Creed, Hon Dr. Parker, Rev. Dr. Saunders.

The clause relating to Horton Collegiate Academy was spoken to by Prof. Wolverton and adopted. The report was then ordered to lie on the table for the present.

Rev. Dr. Saunders read the Report of the Committee on the Grande Ligne Mission which was, on motion of Hon. Judge Graham, adopted as follows :----

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GRANDE LIGNE MISSION.

The origin and history of the Grande Ligne Mission are well known to the Baptists of these Provinces. The late Dr. Cramp was first introduced to us as its agent. From that day till the present time there has been a steady increase of sympathy for this great work. Madame Feller has become a household name in all our families. Again and again the denomination has read and heard of the thrilling events in the history of this mission, now more than a half century old.

Years ago, when the Rev. Mr. Lafleur was on an agency in England, he told the people there, "that the work of the Grande Ligne Mission extended over forty parishes, every one of which contained French Canadian converts; that their members amounted

to about three thousand, of whom seven hundred were in church fellowship; that the mission comprised twenty stations, employed some twenty labourers, eight ministers, six of whom were the fruits of the mission, and others were evangelists colporteurs and teachers."

In the historical sketch of the first fifty years of this work, Mr. Lafleur says: "The Grande Ligne Mission has been the means of bringing about five thousand persons to the knowledge of the Gospel. They are now scattered over Canada and the United States. Of this number about three thousand passed several years in the schools connected with the mission, and afterwards went abroad to spread the knowledge of the spiritual life they had received."

At present there are on the grounds at Grande Ligne three buildings connected with the mission—the school house which accommodates one hundred and thirty pupils, (this, will be filled with students in the coming year)—the chapel at which there is an attendance of about one hundred persons, and the house for the minister. At Montreal there is a chapel and a church of about one hun lred members. The Rev. A. L. Therrien is pastor. There are four other stations, at each of which there is a chapel and parsonage. These are at points varying from twenty-three to fifty-five miles from Grande Ligne. The congregations range all the way from forty to one hundred persons. Besides these churches, there are six preaching stations. At present there are eight ordained and four unordained ministers in the mission. The entire church membership is about three hundred and sixty. This would give in all about twelve hundred, young and old, who regard the Grande Ligne Mission as their religious home.

The hand of Providence has been distinctly visible both at the commencement, and at exery stage of this prosperous mission. There are evidences year by year of God's continued favour. The prayers and labours of its founder, and all others who helped during her life, and since her day, together with the world wide sympathy it has had, and the gifts that have been made to it, and the supplications that have been offered on its behalf, have not yet produced their full fruitage.

The million and a quarter of our French fellow citizens, who are still in the bondage of mediaval superstition, and who are held there by the consummate scheming and tireless labours of the Romish Hierarchy, have claims not only upon the Baptists west of them, but also of the Baptists who are their neighbors on the east. Their spiritual and eternal welfare is, of course, the prime object in view in giving them the Gospel; but the intellectual, social and civil interests make demands upon us. They can never be delivered from their present bondage into the liberty of christian citizens till they have an open bible, and the preaching of the Gospel. Without irrigating with the waters of life this great moral and spiritual saha: a which touches the western borders of the Maritime Provinces and stretches to the eastern bounds of Ontario there never can be the best results of national prosperity.

As the claims are, therefore, many, and imperative; and as Quebec is a near portion of the world into which the Head of the Church bids us go and teach His word, the committee are of the opinion that some form of organic union with the Grande Ligne Mission will assist in rendering the services of the Baptists of this Convention more efficient in this important field. It is also possible, in the opinion of the Committee, that a union of the French Miss Lign reco men of th

Mission, managed by this body, may be effected with the Grande Ligne Mission, that will be satisfactory and of mutual benefit.

In view therefore of the above above considerations, it is hereby recommended that this convention nominate one of its own members to be appointed on the Board of Directors at the meeting of the Society in the month of February next. This recommendation is made without hesitation because the President of the Board, the Rev. A. G. Upham, in his correspondence, assures the committee that the Society and the Board are in hearty sympathy with such a movement.

The brother, so nominated should be instructed to attend the meeting of the Society in February, gain all the information he can about the present state and future prospects of the mission, and also make enquiries in respect to the feasibility of the reunion of our mission with that at Grande Ligne, and report to the next session of this Convention.

The Board consists of fifteen members who are all elected at the annual meeting in February. The qualification for voting for the appointment of Directors is secured by paying one dollar at some time into the funds of the mission. Each director must be a member in good standing of some Baptist Church.

At present there is an advisory Board one of whose members is resident in each of the following places, New York, Toronto, Montreal, Boston and Halifax,

Rev. John McLaurin delivered an address to young men on Foreign Missions.

Addresses upon Higher Education were delivered by Rev. D. M. Welton, D.D., Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D.D., and Rev. E. M. Saunders, D.D.

The President, Rev. Dr. Goodspeed, being obliged to leave Convention, delivered a brief parting address.

Bro. C. B. Whidden, Senior Vice-President, was called to the Chair, and, on motion of Dr. Sawyer, the thanks of Convention were conveyed to Dr.Goodspeed for the able, courteous and impartial discharge of the duties of President of Convention.

Rev. Dr. Day, Chairman of the Committee on the Resolution offered by Rev. C. W. Williams, submitted the following Report which was adopted :---

The Committee to whom was referred the motion of Rev. C. W. Williams, in regard to the method of raising Convention funds and the section of the Report of the Board of Governors of Acadia College on the proportionate distribution of Convention Funds, beg to recommend :—

That the plan proposed by Bro. Williams be placed on the records of Convention for the consideration of the churches during the year, and that further action thereon be deferred until next meeting of Convention. In the meantime, in view of the growing requirements of the Foreign Mission Board and the needs of the North West and Grande Ligne Missions, as well as other important interests, the Committee would urge upon the churches the necessity for a greatly increased liberality.

The Committee further recommend that, as far as possible, the contributions of churches and individuals for Convention funds be divided according to the scale adopted by Convention.

After prayer by Rev. John Rowe, the session closed.

#### SEVENTH SESSION.

#### TUESDAY MORNING, Aug. 26.

Convention resumed business with Vice-President C. B. Whidden in the chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. W. Manning.

Dr. R. V. Jones, Chairman of Committee on Correspondence, read a communication from the World's Christian Temperance Union.

Resolved, That said communication be referred to the Committee on Temperance.

Dr. Jones also read a communication on Baptist Union from Rev. I. E. Bill, D.D., which was referred to the Committee on Baptist Union.

On motion of Bro. H. H. Bligh, discussion of the Report of Board of Governors was resumed.

Bro. B. H. Eaton, on behalf of the Board of Governors of Acadia College and the joint Committee to consider the proposed amendment to the Charter, submitted the clause of the report on this subject with amendments proposed by the Committee. The recommendation was adopted and the clause passed.

Rev. J. E. Goucher, Chairman of the Committee on Temperance, presented his report which was adopted as follows :---

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report that they have examined the circular sent to this body from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, indorsed by the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, asking the co-operation of the churches of this Convention in petitioning the Dominion Parliament to give the country a law prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. Your

committee recommend that this Convention heartily commit itself to such co-operation by adopting the resolution passed by the above bodies, which is but a re-affirmation, of the resolution passed by this Convention last year at Fredericton, the wording only being different, viz, that,

Whereas, The traffic in intoxicating liquors is a recognized evil producing a large proportion of the poverty, suffering, disorder and crime in our Dominion, and unnecessarily adding much to the taxes of our people; and Whereas, We believe that a law enacted by the Dominion Parliament prohibiting the importation, manufacture, and sale of all alcoholic liquors, except for use in mechanical, medicinal, and sacramental purposes, and containing ample provisions for its stict enforcement by the proper authorities, will greatly diminish these and other evils, and largely increase the prosperity and promote the health, peace and morals of our country.

1. It is therefore Resolved, That in the opinion of this Convention it is now the duty of the Dominion Parliament to enact such a prohibitory law.

2. Resolved, That the form of petition accompanying the circular from the above named Bodies be adopted and that — number of copies be struck off for circulation among our churches, the expense incurred to be met by this body.

3. That such petitions be signed by members and adherents of our churches, who are not less than sixteen years of age.

4. That a Committee of one be appointed to co-operate with the Committee of the bodies above named, in arranging and carrying out all necessary details, and that G. J. Coulter White be that Committee.

In reference to the document from the W. C. T. U., referred to this committee, your committee recommend, that this Body heartily endorse the noble undertaking of this great organization, to influence the governments of the world to frown down those twin abominations, the Liquor Traffic and the Opium Trade, and to protect our homes by the *Total Prohibition* of this two-fold curse of civilization throughout all the territory over which government extends.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BAPTIST UNION.

Your Committee on Baptist Union beg leave to report :--

That the Union Baptist Seminary, established at St. Martin's, is proving to be a most important factor on the union line. The two denominations are working most harmoniously and successfully in the cause of Christian education; and this success indicates the advantages that will result from a union in Home and Foreign Missions, in church building, and Christian work generally. But as our Free brethren have not yet adopted the "Basis of Union," prepared by the Union Committee and received by our Convention, the responsibility of separation must remain with them.

All Apostolic precepts are on the side of Union; they are sanctioned and emphasized by the touching prayer of our dear Lord, as recorded in the seventeenth chapter of St. John's Gospel: "That they all may be one, as Thou, Father, art in me, and I in Thee, that they may be one in us; and that the world may believe that Thou hast sent me." For this unity let all diligently labor and earnestly pray.

We would suggest the appointment of the usual Committee to guard the union movement.

# REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD.

# To the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces :

DEAR BRETHREN,—Your Board submit this their 20th Annual Report with peculiar thankfulness for special blessings during the year.

We feel deeply grateful to Almighty God for the preservation of the lives of all our missionaries during the year, and for the blessings which have attended our work both on the home and foreign field.

It is a matter of gratification to your Board to observe the growing interest among our Churches and especially our young men both in the ministry and those preparing for the work, in our Telugu Mission. We hope that ere long we may have in active service on the field the full quota of workers asked for in the appeal of the missionaries.

1. The Annual Meeting of the Board was held on the 4th of September '89 when the following list of officers were elected for the year: Bro. T. S. Simms, President; Bro. C. P. Baker, Vice President; Rev. W. J. Stewart, Secretary and Bro. John March, Treasurer.

A committee was appointed to take into consideration the action of Convention with reference to the appointment of a man to devote the whole of his time to the interests of Foreign Missions. This committee to select and recommend a man for that purpose, no one thus far has been secured.

#### ORDINATION.

The first matter of importance after organization was the ordination of the missionary elect, Bro. W. V. Higgins, which took place in Wolfville, N. S., on the 10th of September, Bro. Gates was delegated by the Board to attend and reported on his return that the ordination services were deeply interesting and that Bro, Higgins was looking forward to his life work with strong and abiding confidence in Chri t and the success of the mission.

On the 23rd of October, '89, Bro. Higgins and his wife. and sister Nettie Fitch, sailed from Halifax for Vizianagram, followed with the prayers of all our people, and after a very pleasant passage arrived at their destination in good health.

#### ACT OF INCORPORATION

2. In accordance with the power granted your Board at the last Convention, the Act of Incorporation was amended to meet the difficulties produced by the change in name of Convention, from the Baptist Convention of N. S., N. B., & P. E. I., to the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.

In addition to the amendment of the Nova Scotia Act, your Board also sought and obtained legislation in New Brunswick similar to that obtained in Nova Scotia. Your Board would suggest the

importance of leaving the name of Convention in its present form, unless some good reason is given for change, as any change in the name of Convention affects the Incorporation of the Mission Board.

#### APPOINTMENT OF MISSIONARIES.

3. Early in the year our Secretary learned that Rev. M. B. Shaw, then in California, was deeply interested in mission work. The Secretary opened correspondence with Bro. Shaw which soon led to an application from him for apointment. This the Board cheerfully made after correspondence with persons well acquainted with Bro. Shaw's qualifications for the work and his medical certificate. Later in the ye'r Bro. Howard Barss of Wolfville, now a student at Newton Theological Seminary, made application for appointment, statin his deep interest in the work on the foreign field. Your Board made inquiries at the colleges where Bro. Barss had studied and also from triends well acquainted with his moral a 'd religious life, and in every case favorable reports were received, and so your Board unanimously resolved to place Bro. Barss' name on the list and after completing his course of study at Newton in '91 give him a place among our missionaries.

Early in July Abdul Aziz, a converted Mohammadan travelling in this country with the Salvation Army, left that body and sought admission into the fellowship of the Brussels St. Baptist Church. Abdul having been personally baptized was on profession of his faith in Christ and consent to the Articles of faith of the Baptist Churches received on his experience as a member of the above mentioned Church. Abdul then applied to your Board to be returned to India as a native helper under the direction of one of our missionaries. The Secretary having received a favorable letter from Rev. John McLaurin, who knew Abdul in India, this request was granted and Abdul will be sent out next month with Rev. M. B. Shaw.

We are now in correspondence with other young men who feel led of God to prayerfully consider the important work of preaching Jesus to the Telugus.

#### HOME WORK.

4. On the first of May Rev. M. B. Shaw was appointed to visit the churches in the interest of the mission. Bro. Shaw visited the Associations as far as he could. It was the desire of the Board that he should visit them all, but in some cases they came so close together that it was impossible for him to take them, all in. In addition to visiting the Associations, Bro. Shaw visited a large number of our churches. He reports a cordial reception everywhere and a deep interest manifested in our Foreign Mission work. We cannot leave this part of our report without referring to the valuably assistance rendered by the sisters of the Woman's Baptist Missionary Union. The amount pledged by the sisters, although in excess of other years, has all been paid, and, in quarterly instalments, a method of remittance which your Board earnestly hopes may soon be adopted by all the churches. The plan of waiting until the end of the Convention year has at least two evils, first it compels the Board to borrow money and pay interest thereon in order to carry on their work. In the next place there is no doubt that if four or more calls were made on the churches during the year rather than one, more money would be contributed. It is to be hoped that this suggestion

may receive the consideration of the delegates and through them be brought before the churches.

### SALARIES OF MISSIONARIES.

5. Owing to the fact that the American Baptist Missionary Union and the Canadian Baptist Missionary Society have readjusted the salaries of their missionaries. Your Board felt it to be their duty to take up the matter, accordingly, a committee was appointed to look into it and report. Their report which was adopted is as follows:

1. That for the present the salaries of married missionaries and single lady missionaries be continued at same rates as in the past, viz. For married men \$1000.00 per year for the first three years of service and each subsequent year \$1200, and the single lady \$500.

2. That a single man be paid at the rate \$750.00 per annum if he have a separate station, otherwise \$600 per annum.

#### APPEAL.

6. The Appeal which was sent by the missionaries last year and printed in our Annual Report has been sent out again this year from the same source. It is evident that our missionaries are deeply impressed that nothing short of the number of recruits called for by them will relieve us of our obligations to the Telugus. They added to their appeal this year a request that the 4th of April be observed as a Day of Prayer and fasting before God. This request was taken up by the Board and a statement published in the *Messenger and Visitor* calling attention to it. Many of the churches responded and reports of a most encouraging nature were received by the Board as to the interest manifested on that day. Earnest prayer to God accompanied by offerings for His work in India characterized the services; and eternity alone can reveal the good results coming from that Day of Prayer.

### RESIGNATIONS OF MISSIONARIES.

7. In the month of June the Secretary received a letter from Nettie Fitch tendering her resignation as a missionary of our Board and asking that her resignation take effect July 1st, '90, giving as a reason her prospective marriage with Rev. Mr. Laflamme of the Canadian Mission, and stating that our Board would no doubt be reimbursed for all exp nce in her case by the Canadian Board. This resignation was accepted and the Secretary was instructed to convey the congratulations of the Board to Sister Fitch and wish her all happiness and prosperty in her new sphere of labor.

# EXAMINATION OF MISSIONARIES.

9. A communication was received from the missionaries on the field asking that the Board appoint an Examining Committee before whom the missionaries shall present themselves and be examined in their knowledge of the Telugu before taking charge of station work. This request was thought to be a good one by your Board and it was

*Resolved*, That hereafter no missionary shall have charge of a station permanently until he has passed an examination in the Telugu.

And it was *Further Resolved*, That this Board seek to have a joint Committee apppointed, composed of missionaries of the Upper Canadian Board as well as our own Board, said committee to examine for both Boards.

#### RETURNED MISSIONARIES.

to. Your Board having received word from Bro. Archibald th 5 Sister Archibald was much in need of rest from her long and arduous trials in the foreign field telegraphed for her to come home as soon as possible. Immediately on receipt of this message Sister Archibald started and after a pleasant trip reached her native land early in May. We were very glad to welcome our sister home and trust her return may with God's blessing be a great benefit to her and that her health may be fully restored.

#### RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES.

11. The total receipts for the year including balance from last year was \$16,184.91, and the total expenditure was \$15,053.88, leaving a balance of over one thousand dollars which is a source of gratitude and indicative of the deep interest of our people in Foreign Missions.

#### FOREIGN WORK.

The Annual Reports of the Missions which are here appended are of a very encouraging nature. Bro Archibald reports that regular services have been held at his station. A good Sunday School and Boarding School larger than ever. His touring covered a period of 175½ days and encompassed 1530 miles. Sixteen persons have been baptized on a profession of faith in Christ, and many enquirers. Bro. Churchill is also much encouraged in his work. He has carried on extensive tour work and baptized six believers into the fellowship of the Church. The Annual Report from Bro. Sanford is not yet to hand, but from correspondence he is also hopeful in his work. From a recent letter from him we learn that the observance of the 4th of April as a day of prayer greatly cheered and encouraged the hearts of the missionaries. May we not here speak for our missionaries the earnest prayers of all God's children that the incoming year may be one of harvest for them after so many years of faithful service.

The full account of donations, legacies, receipts &c., expenditures and estimates will appear in the report of the Treasurer.

Brethren, the morning light is breaking, the darkness disappears. Let us rejoice in what has been done and look forward with hopefulness and courage to the work before us.

# STATION REPORTS.

### CHICACOLE.

I. C. ARCHIBALD, MRS. ARCHIBALD, (In Canada.) MISS H. WRIGHT, One Ordained Evangelist, Six Unordained Evangelists,

Six Unordained Evangelists, Two Christian Teachers, Three Colporteurs, Seven Bible Women.

Another year of persistent toil is over, and it is ours to consider what measure of success or blessing the Lord of the harvest has vouchsafed. He has preserved the lives of his servants, for which we would bless His holy Name. Mrs. Archibald was obliged to leave for rest and recuperation after more than eleven years service on the field. Ere this, I doubt not, she has arrived safely in Canada.

Since her departure, about the middle of March, Miss Wright has had charge of the Station School and of the Boarding Department in addition to her own work. During our absence from the station in December, as well as during Mrs. Archibald's illness in September, October and part of November, Miss Wright rendered in every way valuable assistance for which we are *deeply grateful*.

#### STATION WORK.

<sup>1</sup> he usual religious services have been regularly sustained. The average attendance at Sunday School has been about 36. A Library of 72 Telugu books is being carefully read. The Boarding School has been larger than ever before. It began the year with 15 and closes with 19. The highest number at one time was about 26. Several of whom were young men recently converted from heathenism. In the case of two of the houses on our Mission Compound grass roofs gave place to tiled roofs in April. So that we will be saved much trouble and expense from year to year in putting them in order.

#### TOURING WORK.

Unusual prominence has been given to this department of work. Seven tours have been made in all covering a period of 175½ days, during which time 1530 miles was travelled. An average of five visits have been paid to each of the six Sub-Stations. Work has been done beside from Julmoor, Suraramn Komanapilli; Kothurn, Singidi, Kapaguda, Varanasy and other centres.

One tour of 59 days ended June 7th. In this time Palconda, Akulathampara, and Kimidy were visited twice ond Tekkali and Kassibugga once. At Tekkali three Christian couples were married and at Akulathampara one couple. In the latter place one young woman of the Carpenter caste was baptized. On this tour a long cherished desire was realized. In company with six helpers a tour was made to the Gunapuram District. The farthest part reached was Gudari, about 80 miles north of Chicacole on the Calingapatam river. This district covers an area of about 1200 square miles, and has 950 villages with a population of 90,000—about half of whom can be reached only by the Oriya language. Kapaguda is a town of perhaps 6000 inhabitants, having a resident Justice of the Peace, Apothecary, Police Inspector and a Normal School. Large numbers came to the bangalow and heard our message attentively. We were able to visit Bathali, another large village, several times almost invariably we had an audience of two or three hundred grown men. The head man of the village has been an enquirer for years and may at any time eome and ask baptism.

Following the above tour was one made with Rev. H. F. Laflamme to the Sub-stations of the Field. At Akulathampara we had our Quarterly meeting by invitation of the Church at that place. Reports from all the Sub-stations and from Chicacole were given and prayer offered for a blessing upon the work. A praise service was held and also a successful Foreign Missionary Meeting.

At Tekkali while a meeting with the Christians was in progress, a heathen father of the Goldsmith caste came in, made his salaam and, striding across the room, took hold of his son, a young man grown, by the arm and dragged him out of the room. The Police Inspector of the place of whose conversion I have much hope, was present. He said, "Man could enslave the body but not the soul." At Carlingapatam Mr. Laflamme gave us a stirring gospel sermon in English which was lestened to attentively by a good number of Protestants and Roman Catholics,

#### PROGRESS OF THE WORK.

A larger number of converts have come from heathenism than in any preceding year. Total number of baptisms, sixteen. These came from the following classes of people: Weavers, Goldsmiths, Carpenters, Writers, Fruit-sellers, Barbers, Farmers, Savavas, from the London Mission and from the Church of England. We bless the Lord for this ingathering and would look to him for a yet more marve!lous manifestation of his power.

I am pleased to report great improvement in the Akulathampara Church. Its leading members have vowed a more careful observance of the Lord's Day, have agreed to give the one tenth of their income to the Lord and have called a pastor whom they expect to support in a large measure from their *tenth*.

The Tekkali Church has not done so well, but we hope that by another year we may have a like encouraging report to give of it.

More than twenty of the Christians have given up the use of tobacco entirely. I have for years given no permanent service in the mission to any man addicted to the use of tobacco in any form. By this rule the services of no man worth having have been lost.

The spirit of liberality among the Christians has grown quite perceptibly during the year. The leading church members have their "tenth" books in which they keep an account of the Lord's money. About \$450 have been contributed for all good objects. This was given chiefly by the members of our churches and congregations.

#### CLORPORAGE ...

This work is still prosecuted with vigor. All available mission books of value are kept in stock. The three colporteurs are constantly kept at work. They toured during the year an average of about 180 days each and sold 5504 for \$111.50, sales of missionaries 1002 books for about \$22.50. Total number 6506 books tor \$130. Converts very frequently date their awakening to the reading of some book obtained from these colporteurs. We are incited, therefore, not to relax our efforts in this direction.

#### SEMINARY.

Last year we had one young man in attendance. This year four have been sent as follows :-B. Sookriah, for several years a preacher in the mission, Lakshminaraina and wife and K. Naraina. These three have all been baptized within a few months.

#### SIZE AND NEEDS OF THE FIELD

Year by year I am coming to know the field more perfectly. It embraces a territory equal to a square, one side of which is about one hundred miles in length. At present we have none but Roman Catholics to dispute our right of occupation. This will not always be so. It should not long be so. If the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces will not send men of God to give these people the Gospel, others will. Already word has come that the Gunapmann District, referred to above, is to be occupied by the Lutherans. Brethren and sisters, I ask you in the name of our Master to send help soon that all of these eight or nine hundred thousands of people may have the Gospel in its *purity* and may be *saved* thereby.

# Report of Bobbili Mission Station for Convention year 1889-90.

# DEODANGAR, June 26th, 1890.

It seems hardly possible that another Convention year has so nearly passed away. My last report, if such it can be called, of work done on the Bobbili fields, was written amongst the clouds and rain of this "hill," to which we had come for a time for rest from work and for a respite from the heat of the plains. The time for writing another report finds us here again, much benefited by our stay of two and a half months. From our experience of the past and present seasons we feel sure that in this hill we have a desirable resort during the extreme heat of April and May. It seems to be quite free from malarial fever.

As I look back over the year just passed there seems to be but little material for a report that shall be interesting and profitable. The year has been a quiet one, marked by no special incidents and experiences. The goodness and mercy of our Heavenly Father have been round about us and to Him our gratitude and praise are due.

Our visit to our hill station last year was very beneficial, and we returned to Bobbili feeling strong and well, and ready for renewed effort. Shortly after my return, a visit of several days was made to our outstation at Pedda Penker and other short tours for the rainy season were planned. But soon after a very general outbreak of fever in Bobbili occurred, and both Mrs. Churchill and myself with some of our servants were prostrated by it. It was some time before I was able to resume work, while Mrs. C. did not recover from it fully till coming here again this season. As soon as I was able for work a tour of 19 days was made among villages lying near the road to Vizianagram, from which place I returned by way of Chippurapilli and Rajam. Most of the cool season was spent in touring among villages east of Bobbili, that had been visited previously, many of them several times. In most of these we had a very good hearing and in some of them there seemed to be a good degree of interest. There was less of opposition than ever before. Many of the people seem to have gained some idea of what our teaching really means, and are ready to assent to its excellence. But while admitting this much, there is little readiness to accept it and live according to its requirements.

Caste is the great outward obstacle, but the real hindrance is the evil heart of unbelief and opposition to God and His holy laws. In these tours I found but few who seemed desirous of learning of the way of salvation through Christ, though many seem to have lost faith in idolatry. In some of the villages I felt sure that if we could only secure earnest, faithful, native preachers to station there we should soon see good results. But where are such men to be found?

In some respects the most interesting part of the year's work was a tour up into the Jeypur country in company with Mr. Sanford. I have for a long time had a desire to visit the country and see with my own eyes the work we are trying to carry on there. It was not till the middle of February that we could start and this was rather late in the season for us to see and do as much as we desired.

At Kotapan, where we have been carrying on work for several years, we met most of our native Christians and did what we could to instruct and strengthen them. We found them on some points rather ioose and weak which is not to be wondered at when we consider their advantages. The man baptized at Bobbili in January was ill with fever and could not come to us, while his village was too far away for us to visit it. Jaysing, the old man baptized at Chicacole a year and a half ago lives at the same village and brought us a good report of him, and told us of others who were believing and desire to be baptized. If possible we ought to visit them next season. We decided to allow Jaysing a small monthly allowance so that he may give his whole time to preaching.

In his last report he tells of quite a large number of villages

visited and of many people who had listened to him. Satyabadhi our catechist at Katapaud seems to be a man of considerable note in that part of the country, and to have a good reputation so far as we know. A dispute had arisen between him and a Brahim about had written to the manager of the estate and the matter was under consideration when we were there. We visited Mr. Taylor the agent but he could give us no definite answer till he had seen the land and the parties himself. I am glad to say upon enquiry he gave the land to us for the use of our mission.

At Jerpur town we had a very interesting experience. One of our Christians who lives some distance from the town went to Kotapaud to meet us, and was very anxious that we should visit his village to baptize his wife, who could not walk so far to meet us.

We could not visit his village as it was too far off our road, so he left us promising to meet us at Jeyper with his wife next day. But when the time came for starting and they had not made their appearance we gave up seeing them. But a mile from the town they overtook us close to a small tank near the road.

Sending our bandies on we stopped to talk with them and found that she had a strong desire to be baptized then and there. At first we hesitated a little under the circumstances but as we talked with them the conviction grew upon us that we dare not refuse her request and so after as careful an examination as possible she was baptized, and after earnest prayer on their behalf she and her husband and little girl started for their village, while we hurried on aft r our bandies two or three miles ahead. The man appears to be earnest and active, spending part of his time without pay going about selling tracts and books, and talking to the people of Christ and his religion. We hope that he and his wife will be lights in that dark country. From what we saw I think we ought to be encouraged to go on with the work. The people seem less bound by caste and ought to be more accessible than the people of the plains. The Germans have established four stations in the country, but as yet seem to have accomplished little. Their only success seems to be the results of the work carried on by us. They teach the necessity of baptism in order to salvation, and that those dying without it are not saved. With this teaching they have frightened two women connected with families in our mission, who were afraid of dying, to have water poured upon them. One of these was an old ignorant woman, and the other is the wife of Satya Vadhi our catechist. She had refused to be baptized openly for fear of being seen by others and the secrecy of the German practice commended itself to her and she has all their arguments at her tongue's end. I have serious doubts whether sne has really been converted. This interference of the Germans is anything but helpful to us. While in some respects their teaching is good in others it is a caricature of the Gospel. It seems too bad that we should have to meet and fight error in the name of Christianity.

The other work of the year has been as heretofore principally in Bobbili and the villages near. Owing to Nursiah's long illness there has been less of this done than in other years. Still a great many have heard and have become somewhat familiar with our teaching, but I am sorry to say that as yet there does not seem to be any movement towards the light. Indeed in Bobbili there seems to

be increasing opposition. This is partly owing to the baptism of a man from the Telega caste. This man had often met our preachers and had argued with them in favor of Hindooism. But at length he seemed to become dissatisfied with it and thought of becoming a Mahommedan. Then he went to the Catholic priest to learn from him and finally came to us for instruction. He was intelligent and had travelled much about the country. After a while he professed to have found faith in Christ and came to us asking baptism. We examined him very carefully and he seemed so earnest and sincere that he was accepted and baptized without any opposition on the part of his people. But when it became known that he had really joined us they gathered round him and as far as we can learn by threats and promises did their best to hinder him from coming back to us, and from that time he has not visited us. Our Christians have met him from time to time, but he would not talk with them freely. He seems afraid to do so. Nursiah saw him lately and he told him that the mind he had when he came to us has gone from him. We have not given him up, but are praying for him and have been hoping he would return to us. But I fear he is a case of seed sown on rocky ground. So far his coming to us has seemed to be a great hindrance to our work. It has stirred up his own friends and relatives as well as the Brahmins. Some of the latter who have been away to school in other places, as they have come home for vacation, have done their best to keep the people from listening to us by distributing tracts of the Hindoo Tract Society and by making an uproar in the street when we have been talking. And so we see the battle is not won yet, and Satan means we shall not have an easy victory. But we propose to fight on till our Master shall arise and overcome the enemy.

We are in great need of more workers and are praying the Lord of the heavens to send them into the work. We do not like to import them from other places, but prefer to have them raised up on our own field. We hoped one man who came to us from the London mission would prove to be a helper, but he has turned aside from study to do secular work. This may be partly owing to the small amount of help we gave him. We wish to be extremely careful not to cultivate a mercenary spirit in those who come to us. It may be that we err in this respect in not making enough use of the "Mammon of unrighteousness."

It is very difficult to know just how far we should make use of worldly inducements in our work. At present we especially feel the need of more helpers. The young man Chamra Russavana is going to Samulcotta Seminary for a year, thus leaving me wth only one helper for all the work of this great field. What can we do to overtake it? There are so many centres where men could be placed to advantage if we only had them. Where are they? O that the Lord would send them to us. Let our people at home pray earnestly for a large number of divinely called and prepared native helpers. This is one of our most pressing vital needs.

We have really only one preacher now on the Bobbili field and two in the Jeypoor country and these two are quite untrained. With such a small force we cannot begin to do the work required to carry the Gospel to all parts of this great field. But even with such a small force we are thankful that God has permitted us to see some fruit the past year, during which seven have been baptized, though one of these is the Telaga of whom I have spoken.

Another young man seems now ready to be baptized and I trust he will prove to be a helper in the work.

We have employed two men during the year to sell and distribute tracts and books, one on the Bobbili field and one in the Jeypoor country. But I am sorry to say they have not been able to dispose of books and tracts to any large extent. There is little demand for them and the year has been one of drought and scarcity.

Mrs. Churchill's school for caste girls has been better sustained than ever before. 60 names were on the register at the close of the school year. Most of these girls attended the Sunday school and we trust that some are learning to love the Saviour. I regard this as a hopeful agency for spreading Gospel truth when it will take root and produce results in the future. Mrs. Churchill's illness during a large part of the past year has prevented her from doing as much among the women of the town as in some preceding years. This is work greatly needing to be done.

We were glad to welcome Miss Fitch to Bobbili, hoping that she would be soon able to take work up and carry it on effectively. But she is soon to leave us and who will take her place to tell these ignorant, hopeless women of a Saviour who loves them.

Another year of work is just before us. What are the results to be? What a burden of responsibility rests upon each one who can do anything to hasten the coming of a brighter and better day in this Teloogoo country. The responsibility of each is only limited by his or her ability.

We are glad to know that our mission is to be reinforced this year by the coming of Mr. Shaw. The need of his coming is absolutely imperative but almost equally great is the need of another family still for the northern part of the Chicacole field.

The Lord has given us a wide field to cultivate, but where are the laborers. May the Lord call forth and send out speedily some of those fifty for whom the "Appeal" was sent. We are glad that so many hearts seemed to be stirred by it but where are the practical results of it?

May the Master be present at the Convention that is soon to be held and May His love fill all hearts with a desire to glorify Him in every way the Holy Spirit may direct so that the coming year shall be one of great blessing.

# BIMLIPATAM, July 5th, '90.

DEAR BRO. STEWART,—The other missionaries are sending in this week their yearly reports. It occurred to me that the Vizianagram missionaries ought to report themselves. The effort I have decided to send some little statement of our work for the benefit of the Board. It is now six months since we landed at Binlipatam. The first year is generally admitted to be a trying one in many respects. Frequently the process of acclimation pretty thoroughly upsets one. Besides this the long months of hard study and rather impatient waiting are a weariness to the flesh. However we feel that we could hardily have wished things better than they were. As far as we can tell we have not suffered from the process of acclimation. As yet no evil effects whatever have been seen or felt. The six months have passed very pleasantly and the Lord has blessed us wonderfully.

We landed here January 3rd, but did not reach the station until the 25th. The meetings of our M. P. Conference, and those of the Gen. Conference at Cocanada, took up ten days or so. The other ten or twelve days were spent in nursing our first attack of fever, looking after delayed freight, etc. For various reasons we were not able to make any beginning at the language until we reached Vizianagram. On the 28th we had our first lesson. Since that time we have been able to prosecute our study almost without interruption. Of course during the intense heat study was rather irksome. The Board will be glad to know that we have been enabled to make fairly good progress in the language. After a month or two we began to stammer out a few thoughts in broken Telugu. My first efforts in speaking were in questioning the Sabbath School upon the lesson.

After coming to Bimli I acted as Superintendent of the Telugu S. S., attempting to say more and more each Sabbath. In a few weeks I ventured to lead a prayer meeting and conduct morning prayers. In this way during the past two months good opportunities for practice have come to me. On the 22nd of June I preached my first sermon. The encouragement which I have received from the missionaries and native Christians has been a great help to me. That they should listen so attentively to what must necessarily be uncouth Telugu speaks well for their patience. Like a nurse helping a child to walk, they seem ever ready to help us in taking our first steps in Telugu.

When we went to Vizianagrain we took hold of the English work and endeavoured to be useful. The weekly prayer meetings were attended by about twelve. These meetings were seasons of great blessing to us all. For years past our little Baptist church in Vizianagiam has been unavoidably neglected, therefore they appreciated any efforts put forth among them. On Sunday morning Mrs. H. and I used to attend the Telugu S. S. and preaching service. Then in the evening we held our English S. S. and preaching service. Every morning at 7 o'clock the natives (servants and the preachers families) came together for prayers. A weekly prayer meeting upon the verandah was also held. While I have been studying the language Mr. Sanford has kindly been attending to vernacular work upon the Vizianagram field. He brought quite a large part of his working force and set them to work upon our field. Of course we had no workers whatever for the Vizianagram field. When I am ready to begin full work Mr. Sanford will let me have some of his helpers. What work Mr. Sanford and his helpers have done upon the Vizianagram field Mr. Sanford will report. About the 25th of April owing to the intense heat at Vizianagram Mrs. H. and I came into Bimli where we have been since that time. Since coming here Mr. Sanford and I have arranged to distribute our forces so that when he was at Vizianagram for the Sunday services I would be here or vice versa. Thus both stations have been looked after. There was a young man (European) at Vizianagram who professed conversion some two or three months ago. He asked for baptism and we felt convinced that he was a fit candidate, but some hindrances have been thrown in his way so that he has not been baptized as yet. We can only pray that all the hindrances may be speedily removed and that he may be enabled to follow his Master in His own appointed way.

The interest in the English services here at Bimli has been good. Our meetings have been exceedingly beneficial. For about six weeks we missionaries at Bimli have been praying three times daily for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. We feel that our prayers

have not been in vain. God is working in the hearts of the people. Recently a very intelligent Brahmin enquirer came to the Mission House. He is a school teacher, has lost faith in idolatry and most of the Hindoo practices. But he cannot seem to accept the divinity of Christ. I talked with him for two or three hours (in English) and we prayed with him. He even prayed for himself, and Miss Gray remarked that his prayer was wonderful. She had never heard the like before from a Brahmin. He asked God to guide him into the truth. If Jesus was indeed God's son and his only Saviour he wanted to have that revealed to him. He also seemed burdened with a sense of great sin.

Let us not be faint hearted for "in due season we shall reap if we faint not." We rejoice in the coming of our brother Shaw and his wife. But we hope that another family and two lady missionaries also will be sent.

I have written this letter to the Board feeling that although not in full vernacular work yet they had a right to have some report of our work during the past six months. I hope to be fully at work preaching by the first of the year.

May God's rich blessing rest upon our Board, pastors, churches and missionaries.

# WORK AMONG THE WOMEN.

MISS A. C. GRAY. MRS. J. M. WHITE, Assistant. N. RATNAM, C. MARTHA, Bible-women. C. PAPPAMA, D. SUSIE, Christian teacher.

I can scarcely realize, that another year has passed away since last Convention; and that the time has come, for sending home our annual reports.

The year just closed has been one of uninterrupted work among the women on this field. At the beginning we were hopeful, that some would come out, and profess their faith in Jesus. We have not had the joy of realizing our anticipation; and as in the past it has been one of seed-sowing and patient waiting. The Lord is working and it is evident that the truth is having a deeper, wider and firmer hold upon the people. We believe that there are many secret believers, who have the desire, but not the courage to leave all and follow Christ. When a break is once made, there will be, no doubt, a great ingathering of precious souls. A change must come. The evil one has been reigning here for many years, and he is very powerful, yet the Lord is more powerful ; and He is on our side, and will surely come off victorious. He has not called us to a fruitless work ; and will reward us according to His promises, which " are yea and amen in Christ Jesus." "Be ye strong therefore, and let not your hands be weak; for your work shall be rewarded." And again, "In due time ye shall reap if ye faint not." With such

promises as these, can we doubt His willingness to bless; or can we quit the work before the blessing comes? No we will not give up. We will pray on, and trust on. "He giveth power to the faint; and to them that have no might be increaseth strength."

The goldsmith of whom I write in the "Link" has not come out yet. We have gained admittance to his brother's house, which has hitherto been closed; and find the family very willing to hear our teaching, and the brother one of our most interesting enquirers. He is convicted of sin, and is searching for the truth. The last day we visited them, he seemed to be much exercised about his soul's salvation, and asked us to pray for him, which we did in the presence of a number of his relatives, including his wife and daughter.

A widow at Raiga is asking for baptism. I met her, when on tour in September, and several times since; but did not think she was ready to come out, till a few days ago. when in Raiga, I went to see her, and found her rejoicing in her Saviour. She names October as the time for her baptism. She is of the Rajah caste and is very well educated in her own language. If she comes out, she will be an addition to our staff of helpers.

During the year, more of our time has been given to village work, than ever before. We have been out in all 124 days, making five tours, and visiting 145 different villages. In many of these villages, the high caste women had never heard the sound of the Gospel, or the name of Jesus.

There is much in connection with these tours, that is very interessing; and we look forward to repeating our visits, when the weather is a little less trying.

On our second tour, we visited Simhachalam, where there is an idol temple, the great stronghold of heathenism in this part of Southern India. But we did not attempt any work there, because of the intense darkness, and presence of the Evil One in human form. However, we remained two days, during which time, we went to see the temple—wending our way up the 1600 stone steps to the top of the hill, on which the temple is built. No sooner had we reached the summit, than we saw a priest running toward us, and motioning to us, to retreat, saying that it was impossible to see his God, for he was taking his food; after which, he would make a tour through the village; and if we should come near he would be defiled.

The village on the hill, contains a population of 600 persons, all engaged in the temple service. The one at the foot of the hill is much larger, and is also, given wholly up to idolatry. Here we see people from all parts of the country, bringing their offerings in money, cloths, cattle, sheep, &c., and placing them at the disposal of the priests, they go away feeling, that they have atoned for their sins, and merited a place in eternal bliss.

The following day we went on to Sabbavaram, where we had a most interesting time among the villages, being better prepared from what we had seen to tell the simple story of Jesus and His love. We found the people quite simple in their habits; and eager to hear our message. Many told us that they had never heard before; and from all appearance we thought they spoke truly. One evening on our way to the Bungalow we came through a field; and passing by a lonely hut we heard a voice calling' "Sing to us tell us too;" and looking back we saw an elderly man coming toward us. It was nearly dark, but we could not leave without granting him his

request, and there we sat down on a little mound, while he and his family stood before us with clasped hands, in breathless silence, listening to the words of eternal life. Then he told us of his great sorrow. His son had died in the village five years before, and he could not live there and be happy, so he had made a home for himself out in the field some distance away.

Our third tour was made in December, with tent, among the villages on the Vizagapatam, Vizianagiam and Chicacole roads.

The last two were in February and March, in which Ellenkey, Sontam and Chittivalsa were centres from which we worked in the surrounding village, with some degree of success. Since last July, I have had the care of the Station School. It is not large only numbering twenty-five, but the daily attendance is good. We have two teachers, one non-christian, and the other christian. Muttyelema the second teacher was married to a young man from Akulatampara, in May, and has gone there to live. Susie has taken her place, and is doing well. In the boarding department for girls, there is only one at present. She is a little orphan, about 8 years of age. Her father was a Mohammedan, in the police service, and having died about two years ago, she was left without any one to care for her her mother died some years before. She is a very bright intelligent child; and is getting along nicely in school. We hope, she will some day become a useful helper in the mission.

During the year we have kept up our regular meetings with the Bible-women for prayer and study; and in the sabbath school, have followed the International Lessons.

I close, wishing you a very happy and prosperous year in the Master's service.

To the friends who have prayed for the success of the Master's work in Chicacole, we address this, our report of the work of the year.

In India one realises how true are those words : "The dark places of the earth are full of the habitations of cruelty." However we are glad that we are among the privileged ones who are daily going in and out among these people carrying the message of salvation and pointing them to that Light which can lighten the "dark places."

Do not be disappointed when I tell you that another year has closed and not a convert has come from among the women to whom most of our time has been devoted. Many know of the Saviour's dying love, and of His power to save, which they gladly acknowledge; but to le ve all and follow Him, is what they have not felt able to do. The bible women have been very constant in their efforts and long to see some come and profess Jesus as their Master. They are firmly convinced that fear is the great chain with which Satan has bound many who are secret believers.

I have visited in the town as often as I possibly could and can see that many are growing in the knowledge of the Saviour of the world. It is very sad to see so many come almost within the fold and yet die outside.

Besides carrying on the work in the town I have made a monthly visit to twenty villages all within five miles of our home. The people listen well and often walk quite a distance from their village and talk on the way. "Pray for them that they may hasten to decide that" they will serve the Lord. In August I went to Palconda where our ordained preacher had been stationed. Then we had the wish to see B. Guranah and talk with his wife who did not give her heart to the Saviour when her husband did, and with sorrow we have to tell you that she still "halts between two opinions." There had arisen a great spirit of opposition in the town on account of B. Guranah becoming a Christian, and we had to take plenty of abuse and argument, but our helper being with us we did not fear and were cheered by some coming to the bungalow for private conversations.

About the middle of November we visited Gara and succeeded in going to more villages than at any previous time. After some days we moved on five miles and stopped at Calingapatam where Ruth works on alone. I found that she had been busy telling the "Old old story," for on questioning the women they could give me a very fair idea of what she had been teaching them.

A heavy cyclone accompanied with rain sent me to Chicacole and quite broke up my plan of a long tour and not until December did I get away from home. Then with tent I went forth once more. Kimedi was our first "tenting ground," and there we had an enjoyable visit. A woman of the Rajah caste who had been watching her chance to escape for some time, and who had said she had found the Saviour through Lizzie's (Bible woman) teaching who visited their house often, sent word to me saying that she would come to my tent that night. After much prayerful consideration I sent a message to her saying, that she might come, but we looked in vain. I have since ascertained that her relatives feared that she was about to leave them and they took her away to some other town or village. We can only pray and trust that she at last may be counted worthy to behold the "King in his beauty,"

All of us went over to Akuatlampara and the Christians gave us a hearty welcome and gladly would we have remained longer, but Tekkali was still before us.

In due time we arrived in the last named town, found our tent pitched in a fine mango grove. The Christians came to see us and before leaving did not forget to tell their trials and troubles and each one wanted "help." They are poor, and we did what we could for them, visiting them in their homes and tried to teach them more of the perfect way in which they should walk. We gave as much time as we found it possible to spare to work in the town and villages, and trust that some who heard the message of life, may be found before the throne of God when the elect are gathered in. Finally the time came for us to return to the station and like the arabs we folded our tent and moved on to Chicacole.

# TREASURER'S REPORT OF F. M. BOARD.

During the year I have spent 48 days on tour, visited 45 villages, travelled 672 miles, 11,642 Gospel hand-bills have been distributed. The story of the Cross has been told to about 20,000 hearers and 215 Bible lessons have been taught. Visits made by Bible women, 2,637. On account of Mrs. Archibald's necessary departure for home, the department of work that she so very effici ntly managed, has been entrusted to me, and has brought with it an extra burden which is by no means a light one.

In conclusion may I ask you to unite in prayer, with redoubled faith, for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit on your weary worker, needy Christians, and the perishing heathen.

# TREASURER'S REPORT.

The financial report for the year 1889-90 is in many respects an encouraging one, and shows that the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces have a deep and growing interest in the great work they have undertaken in the evangelization of the Northern Telugus of India. Yet, for the greater part of the year the outlook was anything but favorable, and called for the exercise of a strong faith in God, the cause, and the people of the churches, to believe it possible for the Board to present to Convention at this time a statement such as that now submitted. The regular and prompt remittances, by the Treasurer of the Woman's Baptist Missionary Union, of their generous grant-in-aid; the irregular but constantly recurring receipt of small donations from individuals and Sunday Schools and Mission Bands; and the payment into the funds of a considerable sum from legacies, kept hope and confidence alive until the bounty of the churches should flow in. Nor has our confidence been in vain, for within the past two months instead of having a large overdrawn Bank account we have come to see a gratifying balance in hand.

Remittances to India have been regularly made and the missionaries have received in addition \$168.39 from Government School grants, the sale of books and other minor sources. There remained in the hands of the missionaries on June 30th, unexpended balances to the amount of \$2311.40, to carry on the work until the arrival of the draft then on its way. That draft contained \$960 for general purposes, for the quarter ending Sept. 30th, as well as the salaries of the missionaries to that date.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF ACADIA COLLEGE, AUGUST, 1890.

Your Board has been called together several times since the last report. Once at Fredericton, August, 1889, after the Convention adjourned. Twice at Wolfville in November following. Five times in June during the Anniversary exercises. Seven times here in Yarmouth during the last few days. This makes in all 15 separate meetings of the Board during the year.

It is neither necessary, nor possible, to report to the Convention the various matters which have come up for discussion and settlement. But questions difficult and complex seem to multiply upon our hands as the years go by.

The meetings in November were given mostly to matters of routine. But steps were taken at that time to supply a long felt want.

The graduating class of '90 proposed to the Board the erection of a gymnasium building. They furnished plans and specifications, and although it could be of no special benefit to themselves, they promised to raise \$200 towards the object. The other classes also have engaged to raise \$100 each for the purpose.

A committee was appointed at the November meeting to select a site and proceed with the erection of the building. The work is now in progress and it is expected that it will be finished before the college opens in October.

The condition and wants of Horton Academy and Acadia Seminary, the relationship of the Board and the Senate, the necessity for Theological instruction to ministerial students and the enlargement of the present faculty in the college, are among the matters that have been dealt with. We believe that the time and attention given to these questions will result in good.

Some of them will come up in more practical form before the denomination as the plans contemplated are more fully matured.

In reference to the internal affairs of the college very little need be said. There was a time when our enemies could venture to make disparaging remarks, as to the value of the educat onal advantages of Acadia College. Not because the teachers were incompetent, but because they were too few and the work being done by them, had not yet been tested. That day has gone by, and although more teachers are still needed, it is now a recognized fact that the work done at Acadia, is not in any sense inferior to work of the same class, done any where else. Her graduates have no cause to fear a fair competition with those of other institutions. All that need be added to this general remark is that the last year may be regarded in every respect as one of the most prosperous years in the history of the college. The number in attendance was 134. This is greater than in any previous year. The graduating class was 19, the largest we have had. The honest work in the study and recitation rooms was fully up to the average. The anniversary exercises by common consent were quite equal to if not surpassing all the past records. And so there is cause for mutual congratulations, that in this educational work we are not spending our money nor our toil for naught. For each year seems to make a little advance upon its predecessor.

In noticing the intense interest which gathers around Acadia on Anniversary occasions, the following reflections were penned by one present in June last, and they are in harmony with the general views of the Board. "Doubtless the conviction which has gone abroad from the past history of the College, that it is a place of moral safety and religious power, has something to do in leading Christian parents to choose it as the intellectual home of their children. Denominational loyalty and the interest aroused by long struggle for its maintenance have counted for something in giving our College a hold upon her constituency. At the same time, both these factors could not have maintained for her the high status she holds as the most largely attended institution of our Provinces, were her work of instruction not done in the most solid and efficient way.

Our people will be pleased to know that, while not marked by any great revival, an earnest Christian life has prevailed during the past year, and it is confidently believed that many of the students have had their aims elevated and their purposes deepened."

Our report of last year referred to the fact that the Senate of the University was urging upon the Board the absolute necessity of increasing the teaching force of the College, both because of the constant increase of students and the growing tendency in these times toward options which makes a demand for more classes. The lack of funds was acknowledged to be the only hindrance in the way.

You will understand then the pleasure your Board experienced when in session at Wolfville, June 4th, the iollowing communication was received and presented :

#### WINDSOR, June 3, '90.

#### To the Governors of Acadia College,

GENTLEMEN,—This is to inform you that I have decided to become responsible for the future payment of the salary of the Professor of the Chair of History and Political Economy in Acadia College during my life, and provide in my Will for the permanent endowment of said Chair. Provided however that it is satisfactory to your honorable body.

#### M. CURRY.

The proviso in this communication may excite some curiosity as to the decision of the Board. After due deliberation the Board replied and said to Mr. Curry: "This Board begs leave to accept your proposal and to express to you its most hearty thanks for the magnanimous manner in which you have thus manifested your interest in the College and your devotion to one of the chief objects of the denomination."

The following resolution was also passed at the same meeting :-

Resolved, That the Chair to be supplied by Mr. Curry's donation be known as "The Mark Curry Professorship."

Frequent reference has been made to the valuable assistance rendered by the Alumni Association. At the meeting of the Board June 6th the following communication was received from the acting Secretary of the Association :

GENTLEMEN,-I am instructed by the Associated Alumni of Acadia College to convey to you the following resolution :

Resolved, That we request the Board of Governors to designate a new Professorship, the Alumni Professorship, and that the Alumni Association undertakes to pay to the Governors \$1,200 per year for the salary, beginning with the Collegiate year 1890–91.

This proposal was also accepted and after some discussion the following resolution was passed :

*Resolved*, That a Professorship of Physics be now established and that it be known as "The Alumni Professorship of Physics."

The Senate was duly notified of this action and requested to take the necessary steps in order to the nomination of a Professor to fill this new Chair. That body has taken action and Prof. F. H. Eaton of the Normal School, Truro, was proposed to the Board as a suitable person to fill the new Chair. The Board was pleased to confirm the nomination of the Senate and Mr. Eaton was appointed Professor of the Chair of Physics.

Your Board regret that they have to announce that Prof. Eaton has felt it to be his duty to decline the appointment.

# THEOLOGICAL INSTRUCTION.

For some time there has been manifest a growing desire, on the part of many of the Governors and a large number of other friends of the college, that something in the line of theological instruction should be undertaken at Acadia. Believing that the time has fully come when an effort should be made to meet this demand, the Board have decided to add another man to the staff of the college, with the p rpose of such a readjustment of subjects as will permit two or more of the Professors to give a considerable portion of their time to the instruction of classes in Theological studies. A committee has been appointed to present the nomination of such an additional Professor, and as soon as the appointment has been made, plans for classwork will be matured and announced to the public. The Board have undertaken the responsibility involved in this action, believing that the very general expression of desire that something of the kind should be attempted, indicates a willingness on the part of the churches to contribute the necessary funds.

This action has become all the more necessary because of the large number of the present students who are preparing for the work of the ministry.

Probably the proportion of ministerial students is larger than in any other college in Canada.

The sincere and earnest prayers of the churches of this Convention are asked in behalf of the Institutions generally, and in a special manner that the Spirit of God may continue to move upon the hearts of those, whose mental powers are being developed by education. For large knowledge with no grace is a doubtful good.

### THE COLLEGE CHARTER.

The Charter of the College and the various acts in amendment of it having been found in several points defective and inadequate to the present condition and needs of our educational institutions at Wolfville, it is proposed to petition the Legislature of Nova Scotia at ita un pr be

Printed copies will be handed to you in which, however, some slight alterations have been made to which your attention will be called.

# MO NEY FROM CONVENTION FUND.

We call your attention to the fact that the Convention Fund does not yield for our educational institutions the share to which they are by the Convention Plan entitled and we trust that steps may be taken to give these enterprises their just proportion of the benevolence of the denomination. We think the churches and all other contributors to the Convention Fund would most wisely bestow their and liberality by giving on the Convention Plan pure harmoniously and well.

# HORTON ACADEMY.

From the Report of the Principal Mr. Oakes, we gather various items of information :

The number enrolled during the year was 75. The number of candidates for matriculation was 12. Of these 7 have already received their Matriculation Diploma. Some of the others may by diligence in study during the summer vacation be able to matriculate matriculate

The matriculating class was reported smaller than it would have been on account of the changes made in the course of study. The standard having been raised we may hope that what the college looses in quantity it may gain in quality.

There is a prospect of a much larger matriculating class next

The receipts for room rents and for board-bills are a little in advance upon last year.

Mr. E. R. Morse who has been for two years a teacher in the Academy and who has given good satisfaction in every respect has resigned his position, and Mr. F. M. Shaw, of the graduating class of the present year has been appointed to fill the place. It is believed that the efficiency of the staff will thus be maintained.

So far as teaching ability is concerned the Academy is in a healthy and vigorous condition. The management and discipline have been good and the moral tone upon the whole healthy.

The Report of the Principal referred to, presented to the Board in June, is in some respects very hopeful. The attendance though too small was somewhat larger than in the Year previous, and the income, therefore, a little better. The business is well in hand. Bills are promptly collected. Although there was a small deficit on the year's transactions it was less than the deficit of the previous year. About S600 reduced to a little over \$200.

And when it is remembered that this department is carrying a burden of \$10,000 debt, with no endowment or income except what it earns, it must be acknowledged that the business is being carefully and skilfully managed.

Three things should be aimed at :

1. The removal of the debt on the Academy building; for the current expenses, alone, are more than this department should be expected to bear, and when the interest on the debt is added the burden is heavy indeed.

2. The number of students in the Academy should be doubled, if it is to constitute the main feeder of a college which this year reports 134 under graduates, with a graduating class of 19. Of course there are other feeders.

We hope that the St. Martin's Seminary will continue to send to Acadia her brightest and best students. There should be not less than from 300 to 400 young men and boys in training in our preparatory schools in order to furnish a yearly matriculating class of 30 or 40 for the college.

Perhaps there is nothing more needful just now, in order to secure the future growth and prosperity of Acadia College, than the building up of our Academies and other training schools.

3. There should be an Endowment Fund provided for the Academy.

It will be remembered that formerly aid was derived from Provincial Funds<sup>4</sup> to assist denominational schools. Horton Academy was for many years greatly helped in this way. Not only has this been withdrawn, but the school is now compelled to compete with high schools and academies all over the country, which had no existence in those earlier years.

With no endowment funds, but a burden of debt resting upon the school, it is utterly impossible for the Academy to take the stand it ought, as the department which is fundamental to all our educational work.

Who of our men of means will volunteer to present the first thousand or five thousand dollars towards an endowment fund for Horton Collegiate Academy ?

Your Board have full confidence however in the educational advantages of this school, and heartily commend it to all parents wishing good mental and moral training for their sons.

### ACADIA SEMINARY.

The attendance for the last year has been larger than it was the year previous. All the rooms have been occupied and excellent work has been done.

Miss Graves, according to the hopes expressed in our last report, returned, and took hold of the work at the beginning of the present year. With all her former experience in the school and all the advantages gained by her residence and study abroad, she devoted herself to the interests of the Seminary and very satisfactory results have followed.

84 young ladies have attended classes in the Seminary during the year, 53 of these being residents in the building. The graduating class numbered 9, two of whom completed the Classical course; five in the Literary, and one in the course in Vocal Music.

The exercises at the close of the last term were of unusual interest. One of the reporters stated, "Never were the manifestations of interest in the Seminary more marked." "It is cause for gladness that the report of the year's work is one of great and cheering success." "Miss Graves has lost none of her old time power to win the esteem and love of those under her charge. While her studies in I positi Sem prov

in Europe have added to her eminent fitness for her responsible position and work. Her return has given a great impetus to the Seminary. The eight ladies who assist her as instructors have all proved themselves efficient fellow-workers."

While all the examinations and exercises at the close of the year were satisfactory, reflecting great credit upon teachers and pupils alike, it may be added that the evidence of musical culture was especially pleasing.

A few extracts from the yearly report of the Principal, Miss Graves, may be added :

"Acadia Seminary now closes the tenth year of its existence, and it again becomes my pleasant duty to present to you a report of the year's progress not only in mere intellectual training but in that broader education, which develops the moral and spiritual faculties. In all these respects, during no year of my connection with the Seminary, has so high a standard been reached.

When I resumed charge of the Seminary in January, I found the School large and flourishing; enthusiastic to continue the work which had been so well prosecuted during the Fall Term, under the direction of Miss Harding and the other able instructors.

The number in attendance during the year has been 84. Of this number, 53 have resided in the building. This large number, together with the 10 teachers (including Matron) have crowded the building to its utmost capacity. The number studying French has been 46. German 9. Elocution 57. Painting and Drawing 29. Piano 46. Voice 25.

Miss Wallace returned from Boston to the Seminary in January, after three months additional study in the various lines of Elocution and the large number of pupils in this department shows the well merited popularity this important branch has enjoyed.

The study of French and German has maintained its usual prominence and success under Mme. Bauer, and I am pleased to note an increase upon previous years in the number pursuing German. The department in Drawing and Painting is flourishing in respect to numbers, but Miss Harding labors under great disadvantages from having no proper Studio, the room she occupies as such being too small. I would recommend a small appropriation as a means of enabling her to obtain articles for groups in "Still Life," the study of which has the past year received much attention.

The study of the Piano has maintained its past high excellence under the charge of Miss Reeves with Miss Eaton as assistant.

The department of Vocal Music I can confidently say, has never before attained such high excellence in both individual and in chorus singing as under the instruction of Mrs. Thompson, whose services have been highly appreciated in building up this important line of study.

The Literary Department has been materially strengthened through the appointment of Miss Fitch and Miss Crowell, ladies of high attainments in teaching, and who conscientiously discharge the varied duties incumbent upon them.

The Christian sentiment prevailing in the school family has been an exceedingly pleasant feature of our daily life.

In regard to our prospects, in no previous year have I had so many applications for rooms from old pupils and from those who wish to enter the Seminary next fall; so in this respect, the future is most encouraging.

I cannot close this Report without calling the attention of the Governors to the overcrowded condition of the Seminary and the consequent need of erecting a new building.

I submit it to your honorable body if the Seminary does not owe it to its patrons, to furnish rooms for school purposes, which shall be in comparison as suitable and comfortable as the dwelling rooms."

From all this it will be seen that the one great want just now is money to provide rooms and all the modern appliances of education. The spirit of progress is abroad in our land. We have the teachers. We have the pupils. But first class teachers and first class pupils cannot do first class work, except they have also first class advantages.

Your Board has been compell d to recognize these facts and to enquire for a way out of the difficulties which surround us in this department of our work.

A committee was appointed in June to look into the matter and report to the Board during this Convention. The report has been presented, considered and adopted. It contemplates a prompt and bold push forward.

# REPORT OF THE MINISTERIAL EDUCATION BOARD, FOR THE YEAR 1889-90.

The income of this Board for the last year has been the sum paid to it from the Convention Fund. This was \$558. The number of students accepted by the Board was forty-two. Of course the appropriation to each of these could be but nominal. The practice of specifically designating the money contributed by the churches seems to be on the increase. The amount of the Convention Fund reported for this year was about \$22,000. According to the scale adopted by the Convention, this should yield to the Ministerial Board over one thousand dollars. It received a little more than one half of that sum.

It should be a ground for thankfulness that so many candidates for the ministry are connected with our educational institutions. If it is the duty of the churches to do anything in the way of directly aiding these young men, it is clear that much more should be done. If it is really a matter of indifference whether a little or nothing be granted to aid them, then it would be better to abolish this Board at once. If the Board is to be continued, then larger funds must be granted for carrying on the work. In the judgment of the Board, the appropriation for each accepted applicant should be equal to one dollar a week for the college year.

The Board were requested to make a report on the general subject of Ministerial Education. This subject has now been presented to the Convention in connection with the report from the Governors of the College and appropriate action has been taken. The Board submit that in these circumstances, the purpose of the resolution instructing them has been accomplished, and therefore no farther report on the subject is needed.

#### THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND AID FUND.

It is with profound gratitude to Almighty God that your Board presents its Eleventh Annual Report. The life of each member has been preserved, though our brother the *chairman* has been called upon to pass through deep waters In the great sorrow which has come to his home, it has been a comfort to him to know that he has had the sympathy of his brethren with whom he has been associated in Christian labor.

Great gaps have been made in the ranks of the ministry. A number of good and tried men have fallen whose places it will be hard to fill. While it is true that no application for aid has been made to your Board in behalf of their widows and children, yet it may be assumed that if these do not have claims upon the Annuity Fund, it is more than probable that some of them will have to be assisted from the Convention Fund. The widows and children of deceased ministers must be cared for. It is not possible, in the

nature of things, for the ministers themselves to make an adequate provision for those dependent upon them. The salaries which are paid and the frequent changes in the pastorates render it impossible for them to do more than make a fairly comfortable living. Six hundred dollars a year without rent is the very least sum that any minister should be expected to receive. And this without any shrinkage. An honest effort—a united effort—and an effort it must be—to level up the salaries of our ministers is one of the imperative demands of the hour. The churches owe it to themselves to see that this thing is not only talked about and resolved upon, but that *it is done*.

There have been twenty-two of our brothers and sisters who have received more or less aid during the year. This is one less than in the preceding year. A brother and two sisters have each passed over the river to the better land where they will need no present help from us. And one sister has ceased to receive aid because it was not needed. Three brothers who have been helped by your Board in the past have become members of the Baptist Annuity Association of New Brunswick, and in consequence their names have been dropped from the list of beneficiaries and have received no aid from your Board for the last half year. During the year there has been added to the list one new name.

The amount expended for the year has been \$735.00. The appropriations have been made with a due regard for the circumstances of those to whom aid has been given and the means at the disposal of the Board.

Every member of this Convention and especially every minister ought to feel that some more adequate provision for meeting the needs of men who have grown old, or have become disabled in the Master's service, as well as for their widows and orphan children is an absolute necessity. Your Board is of the opinion that the "Annuity Fund" affords such provision and would urge, with greatest emphasis, every minister who can possibly do so, to make no further delay in joining this fund. The Rev. W. H. Cline who has faithfully served the Convention

Ine Rev. W. H. Cline who has faithfully served the Convention on this Board has left the Provinces, having entered upon a new pastoral relation in the City of Toronto. A vacancy has thus been created in the Board which it will be necessary to fill at this meeting of the Convention.

#### ANNUITY FUND.

The Board having this fund in charge have great pleasure in reporting that it is in a prosperous condition, but it is their painful duty to record the death of three who had qualified themselves by complying with the constitution to share in the benefits arising from the creation of this fund. The Revs. J. F. Kempton, D. G. Carpenter and S. J. Archibald have passed to their rewards leaving three widows and six children with claims for annuities. Five widows, eight children and four ministers have drawn the annuities in whole or in part during the past year. One of the ministers has resumed pastoral labor and so has withdrawn his claim on the Fund. One other minister is now out of health and is no longer in the pastorate, and will, at the beginning of the coming year, have a claim for his annuity. Seventy-five ministers have already paid their rates and secured for themselves the right to participate in this fund.

There have been added to the capital during the year by subscription more than two thousand seven hundred dollars. The amount available for paying annuities the past year was thirteen hundred and thirty-six dollars, and a surplus is left to add to capital of seven hundred and seventy-six dollars.

Last year the capital was four thousand, eight hundred and seventy seven dollars and sixty-eight cents. This year the capital is eight thousand and ninety-nine dollars and eighteen cents. When the Bradshaw Fund and this amount are united there will be a capital of more than eighteen thousand dollars.

There seems now no real difficulty in making these two funds one. We trust such a union may be consummated at an early day.

The treasurer has informed the Board that to his knowledge three brethren have provided in their wills *fifteen thousand dollars* for the Annuity Fund managed by this Convention.

It is now more apparent than ever that the Convention was none too early in establishing this fund as a protection to itself and to the ministers of the Maritime Provinces. If this had not been done, the demands on the Ministerial Relie: and Aid Fund would have been so large as to make the appropriations miserably small.

The brethren who were eligible for membership when this fund was created and who have neglected to connect themselves with it will find it difficult to pay back dues and interest and every passing year will only increase the difficulty. If brethren are wise they will delay no longer. It was the painful duty of the Treasurer to tell a widow who made enquiry that her husband had not paid any dues and therefore his family had no claim on the fund.

It will be found on examination that this institution supplements life insurance. In time of need it may be the only source from which means may be obtained to pay the premiums on life insurance policies.

The Board is glad to know that some of the ministers view it in this light and while they pay their annual dues to this fund they also carry small insurances on their lives.

Everywhere there is found the deepest interest in this undertaking. By the good Providence of God it was begun and by the same good Providence it has prospered and we believe will ever prosper.

#### REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON ANNUITY FUNDS.

Report of the Committee appointed to act with the Committee of the Baptist Annuity Association (of New Brunswick) in the matter of uniting the Annuity Funds of this Convention with the funds of said Association report jointly as follows:

1. That this Convention appoint a Board of Directors at this session to be named the Board of the Ministers Annuity Fund, and instruct them to obtain an Act of incorporation from the Dominion Parliament. 2. That the Act of incorporation shall provide for the reception and management of the funds, now held held by the trustees of the Annuity Association in New Brunswick and the Annuity Funds of this Convention. 3. That the two funds be united and managed as one fund. 4. That the act also provide for receiving and controlling the Minisetrial Relief and Aid Fund of this Convention. 5. That the Association in New Brunswick apply to the Legislature of that province for power to pass their funds over to the new Board, after it shall have been incorporated. 6. That this Convention direct their Board to transfer its Annuity funds to the same body when qualified to receive them. 7. That the Board of Management of the Ministerial Reiief and Aid Fund be instructed at the proper time to get legislation, if necessary, to enable it to transfer its funds to the new corporation. 8. That the Trustees of the New Brunswick Association pass over to the Board of Management of the Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund the proceeds of their capital and the names of their annuitants from the present date, and instruct said Board in respect to the amounts to be paid to each annuitant, the whole not to exceed the income from the said funds. 9. That the following brethren be the new Board appointed by this Convention: A. F. Randolph, S. Selden, D. McN. Parker, Rev. J. W. Manning, J. F. Parsons, Arthur Simpson, H. C. Creed, J. W. Spurden, Mont. McDonald, Rev. C. H. Martell, W. C. Delaney, J. C. Dumaresq, William Davies, Edgar D. Shand, E. M. Saunders. 10. And that the Constitution of the Annuity Fund of this Convention be the constitution of the new Board, subject. as at present, to any changes or additions that in the future may be made by this Convention. 11. That the Act of Incorpora-tion shall provide for the renewal of the Board by a certain number going out and new elections from time to time, as is the case with the other Boards of this Convention. 12. That it also provide that the new Board shallsubmit a full statement of its doings, audited, and in proper form to this body at each of its Annual Meetings.

# TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT

# HOME MISSION BOARD.

#### DEAR BRETHREN,-

The time has come, when according to the custom, we are called upon to make our report concerning the important department of our denominational work committed by you to our care. Feeling as we do that this work is important not only for what it is in itself, but from the relations it sustains to the other departments of our work and to denominational prosperity generally, we have felt constrained to ask ourselves, "Have we been faithful"? While recognizing the fact that we are your stewards in this matter, we have not forgotten that we are, even in a higher sense, stewards of the Lord, and while seeking to conduct the work in such a way as would merit your approval, have, we think, been especially desirous that the Master's approval might not be withheld. Before Him and you we can honestly affirm to-day, that if mistakes have been made, they have been errors of judgment, not of purpose; and whatever has been left undone is due to inability to carry out the desires of our hearts, rather than to the absence of enlarged desires. Could we but convey to you and to the members of our churches generally the intense longing that we have for the fuller development of this Home Mission work, we believe that some, at least, of the hindrances that now obstruct its progress would soon melt away.

Though, as it is well known, the past year has not been one of large ingathering by the churches generally, owing largely to the fact that so much sickness prevailed at a time when special effort is usually put forth, the figures to be submitted will show that our Missionaries have been permitted to welcome a considerable number to the churches they have served. These faithful brethren unite with us in giving God the glory for all that has been accomplished

#### OBITUARY.

Death has not made a breach upon the workers of our Board since 1880, until on the 6th of February last, Rev. Danie' McLeod, labouring as a faithful missionary to the African Church at Tracadie, heard the call "Come up higher." BIO. McLeod entered the ministry late in life and commenced his labors on Cape Breton Island, chiefly in the Gaelic language. He subsequently labored at New Harbor and with the second St. Margaret's Bay Church. His ministry to the church at Tracadie was richly blessed. Thirty were added during the 16 months that he labored with them and they were encouraged to finish their church building. On the other fields where he labored, chiefly as a missionary, his labors were not in vain in the Lord.

Another of the missionary pastors, Rev. I. J. Skinner, pastor of the Montague and Murray river churches, was stricken down by paralysis early in the Spring and we greatly fear may not be able to take up his loved work again.

#### HINDRANCES.

The hindrances to the work in the past year have been chiefly the old ones—lack of means and lack of men.

Brethren, we speak without any exaggeration when we say that the present annual income of the Board (\$6000.00) is only about half what is needed to carry on the Home Mission work within the bounds of this Convention. After the best possible grouping has been made and the dependent churches and mission fields have done all that can reasonably be expected of them, your Board needs an annual income of at least \$12000.00 to enable it to make anything like adequate provision for this work. With the present income we must refuse to occupy new fields; and even abandon some of the old ones; or do a little work on one field one year and a little on another, another year. This plan is most unsatisfactory to your Board. But what are we to do? When our Lord bids us go forward and plant New Test ment churches on new ground, we dare not refuse. Much less can we find it in our hearts to inform any of our weak churches that the denomination has decided to leave them to shift for themselves. Brethren, the only course open to us. if we would improve our opportunity and please our Lord, is to double our contribution for this work. If this seems too much let it be remembered that some of the other denominations are doing even more than this on the same territority occupied by your Board, and that \$12000.00 only means an average of forty cents per member from thirty thousand members.

With regard to the other hindrance—lack of men—sometimes it seems, that if the people would furnish the support, the Lord would supply the men. At other times we feel that if we could only find the right men and put them to work the support would be forthcoming. It is a fact worthy of notice however, that our supply of men has always been somewhat in advance of the supply of funds, as hitherto each year has closed with a deficit.

But without attempting to decide which is the cause and which the effect, here is one of the serious difficulties with which we have to grapple. For three-fourths of the year on several of our mission fields nearly all religious work is at a stand still because the churches are as sheep without shepherds. And what makes it the more deplorable is, that the time when they are without ministerial labor it is the time best suited to religious work. This state of things, which is not, we are sorry to say, confined to mission churches even, should awaken anxious solicitude and careful enquiry. Have we ceased to look to the Lord for pastors or in any way departed from the New Testament principles in this matter, or is it always to be true that " the harvèst is plenteous and the laborers few ?"

#### REVIEW OF WORK.

#### REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD.

Financial assistance has been given to 38 churches for the full year, to 40 for a part of the year, in most cases for a considerable part, 39 were supplied by student missionaries during the vacation of 1889, (the work of the present vacation is not included in this report,) and some 33 others were visited by general missionaries. Thus it will be seen that the Board has extended a helping hand to 150 of the 385 churches reported in the Year Book. Besides the above, assistance has been given to maintain the preaching of the Gospel on two fields where there are no church organizations, and a liberal grant was promised to assist the new interest at Gibson in supporting a suitable pastor. As yet the right man has not been found and the grant has not been drawn.

During the year now under review, 76 brethren have labored under the direction of the Board. some of them giving but a part of their time to the mission work, the remainder being spent with the self-supporting churches of the groups.

These workers may be classed as follows :--General Missionaries, 3; Ordained Pastors, 41; Student Missionaries, 27; and other Unordained Missionaries, 5. Together they have performed 1922 weeks of labor.

Without including the work of the General Missionaries; the Gospel has been preached more or less frequently at 249 stations, the total average of these congregations amounting to 13,000.

The work, done has been summed up as follows:—Sermons preached, 4632; other meetings held, 3571; religious visits, 13,227; pages of tracts distributed, 10,108. In connection with this work 401 have been received into the churches, 336 by baptism and 65 by letter and experience.

Houses of worship have been completed at Alberton, P. E. I., St. Francis, N. B., Fourche, C. B., Beaver Harbor, N. B., Jordan Bay and Tracadie, N. S. A large number more are in various stages of progress.

(For details see annexed table.)

The Corresponding Secretary has spent all the time that could be spared from other duties in visiting the mission fields. In the prosecution of this work he has gone over parts of Guysboro, Hants, Cumberland, Colchester and Annapolis counties in Nova Scotia; of York, Carleton, Victoria, Madawaska and Charlotte counties in New Brunswick and a part of P. E. Island. Also made a short visit to Cape Breton. In this way such a knowledge of the comparative importance, ability and needs of the several fields is obtained as is essential for the successful prosecution of the work. By means of these visits the mission churches become better acquainted with the desires and plans of the Board and a more cordial relation is established.

During the year he has preached 158 sermons, given 54 addresses, and made several family visits. Wishing to avoid cause of complaint that he was pushing the Home Mission work at the expense of the other objects of the Convention Fund, he has spoken to but a few of the independent churches, and when he has referred to the matter, has pleaded the cause of all the objects, rather than any particular one. The Mission Churches have also been urged to contribute to Convention Fund.

In respect to very many of the churches assisted too high commendation cannot be given. They are in many respects models for the strong churches. They do cheerfully all they can for the support of their pastors, they co-operate in upholding the religious work, and endeavor in every way to build up the cause in their midst. Some however seem content to go on receiving, and do not exert themselves to raise what your Board believe they might. Their idea of religion is, "to be ministered unto." As to working with their pastor for the upbuilding of the church they seem to know nothing. Of ways of tearing down they are not ignorant, and do not hesitate to practice.

How to deal with such churches is sometimes a difficult question. The first impulse is to leave them alone. But reflection shows that they are not likely to improve under such treatment and that they are the most in need of the faithful preaching of the word. We are glad to know that the number of such is not large and we trust is growing less.

#### AMONG THE FRENCH.

No direct work has been done among this people during the past year. In fact it seens difficult to know what to do for them. Bro. Rouleau the last missionary was of the opinion that little could be done except by the opening of a school as at Grand Ligne. As, under all the circumstances, this does not seem practicable at present, the only way seems to be to go on in the old way of sending a missionary among them. We are now in correspondence with Bro. Therrien of Montreal in reference to securing a suitable man. We are expecting that the report of the committee on the Grand Ligne Mission may have some bearing on this question.

As the mission property at Tusket was some time ago judged to be not well located for the work, it has been sold and the money placed on interest. The property at Saulnierville is at present rented to Mr. Crosby who is doing business at that place.

#### THE CHURCH EDIFICE DEPARTMENT.

The following rules have been adopted for this department of our work :

#### RULES.

I. Aid in the erection of Church Edifices shall be granted in three ways: (1.) By regular business loans, bearing interest at 4 per cent<sup>4</sup> secured by first mortgage on the property, payable in one to five years. (2.) By gifts properly secured against loss in case of perversion, or alienation. (3.) By loans and gifts combined as secured above.

II. The funds of this Department shall be appropriated only to aid in the erection or purchase of Church Edifices of moderate cost. As a rule \$300.00 shall be the limit of appropriation by loan or gift, and no application for aid for a building costing more than \$4000.00 will be entertained.

III. All applicants will be expected to secure at least twice the amount asked for before making application, and no money will be paid unless there is a reasonable prospect of the house being speedily con for

completed or at least sufficiently advanced to permit of its being used for worship.

IV. Before any gift or loan is promised in aid of the erection of a Church Edifice, the Board must satisfy itself on the following points: (1.) That the house that is being erected or that is to be erected or purchased, is necessary for the advancement of the interest of the church. (2.) That the work is undertaken with the general concurrence of the Church. (3.) That its location is wisely chosen, having in view the gathering of a good congregation and the general advancement of the Church. (4.) That the style and estimated cost of the house are in accord with the place, and people building it. (5.) That the lot on which the building is erected, or on which it is purposed to be erected, is secured to the denomination either by a deed direct to the Home Mission Board, or a satisfactory deed to the Church, so that in case the Church shall cease to exist or to conform to the doctrines and practices of Baptist Churches in union with the Baptist Convention, the property shall revert to the Home Mission Board, or to the denomination.

V. In the case of a church asking for a loan, in addition to the above, the Board will require before the money is paid: (1.) A first mortgage on the property, payable in from one to five years, as the circumstances may require with interest at 4 per cent. If preferred the principal may be made payable in five annual instalments. (2.) A satisfactory personal Bond, accompanying the mortgage. (3. A policy of Insurance on the Church Edifice in a company approved by the Board, to the amount of the loan endorsed on its face by a duly authorized agent "Loan if any payable to the Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, mortgagees, as their interest may appear." Additional insurance if desired may be included in the same policy.

VI. Application or requests for aid must contain full accurate information on the different points named in article 4; and application for a loan must in addition contain a pledge to furnish the papers in article 5.

VII. All applications must be signed by Pastor and Deacons and Clerk, or where there is no Bastor, by Deacons and Clerk.

From an examination of these rules it will be seen, that money contributed for church edifice building through this department, will be more likely to be wisely expended than if given to whoever may appeal, as in the past has been the custom.

A fuller acquaintance with the fields and the needs of the work generally, convinces your Board of the importance of this department. The Board propose making an appeal early in the year for donations for this work. A small sum has already been received.

#### FORMS OF DEEDS.

In our last report it was stated that the Board had under consideration the preparation of a form of deed for any church of our Denomination. Considerable attention was given to that matter. Taking as a basis a form pre; ared by a committee of the Central Association of Nova Scotia and published in the minutes of that Association for the year 1870, a deed was prepared which in the

the opinion of several lawyers was well suited for the purpose. Other legal authority considered it unsuitable and so the attempt was abandoned.

As there are on the statutes of both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Acts, prepared especially for the Incorporation of Baptist Churches, and as a simple form of deed is all that is required to make all property secure to the churches thus incorporated, your Board recommend that churches avail themselves of the provisions of those acts, and see that their properties are regularly deeded to Trustees appointed under those Acts. Where churches do not exist or are very weak we advise the deeding of properties to the Home Mission Board direct. A form of deed will be provided free of cost to all desiring to deed property to the Board.

#### CHANGE OF NAME.

As the change of the name of the Convention made it necessary to change the name of the Board, the following amendment to our Act of Incorporation was procured at the last session of the Nova Scotia Legislature:—

- AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 84 OF THE ACTS OF 1879, ENTITLED "AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE HOME MISSION BOARD OF THE BAPTIST
  - "CONVENTION OF NOVA SCOTIA, NEW BRUNSWICK AND PRINCE "EDWARD ISLAND."

Whereas, Since the passage of Chapter 84 of the Acts of 1879, "The Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island" has changed its name to "The Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces," and it is desirable that the corporate name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island," incorporated in and by srid Chapter 84 should be changed to "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces."

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows :---

1. The Corporation incorporated by said Chapter 84 of the Acts of 1879 and heretofore known as "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island shall hereafter be called and known under the corporate name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces." and all the real, personal or other estate held by the said corporation, and every conveyance, grant, bequest, devise or gift of lands or other real, personal or mixed estate whatsoever that may have been made to or in the name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island," or to or in the name of any of the Societies mentioned in the said Chapter 84, or that may hereafter be made to or in the name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island" shall be deemed to have been and to be made to and in the name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces," and such corporation shall have full power to receive and recover the same, either in law or equity, and to assign, transfer, sell, encumber, lease, convey,

charge or otherwise dispose thereof, in the said name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces," in the same manner, and as full to all intents and purposes as if specially given, granted, bequeathed, devised, or conveyed, to the said corporation by the said name of "The Home Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces."

#### DISTRICT MEETINGS.

The Board desires to make grateful mention of the assistance received from the District Meetings. Several of them have not only called attention to the wants of their districts but have aided not a little by advice and otherwise. As some of these meetings are not held oftener than once a quarter, and in order to bring them into closer relation to the general Board it is proposed to ask them to appoint a committee of three, one of them being the nominee of the H. M. Board, who shall be empowered to advise on all questi ns that may come up during the intervals of their meetings.

#### BEQUESTS.

The bequests received during the year are as follows :

From the estate of Ada O. Lovett, St John, \$5.00; from the estate of Mrs. Eunice P. Shaw, Milton, Yarmouth N. S. \$1600.00. It is understood that there is something more to be paid on account of this bequest.

From the estate of James Burgess Esq., South Maitland, Hants Co., N. S., one share of the Avon Marine Insurance Company, (Limited), Windsor N. S.

The conditions of this bequest are thus expressed in the will :

"To expend the dividend arising annually from the same in preaching the gospel at South Maitland, Hants Co., and to expend any income thereafter accruing for the same purpose in case the investment should by any means be altered ".

#### MANITOBA AND THE NORTH WEST.

Early in the year the churches were asked to take up a collection for the work in Manitoba and the N. W. The Secretary of their Convention sent circulars to all the churches giving information as to the work being done there. Frequent reference to the needs of this work and to the progress of the collection, have been made in M. and V. and at the meetings of the Associations. The result of these efforts will appear in the financial statement.

There can be no doubt as to the duty of the Maritime Baptists to contribute at least \$1000.00 a year to assist the Brethren who are striving so nobly to plant our principles in our great North West. It may be gratifying to the Convention to know that the past year has been one of considerable progress for our work in that country. Six pastors have been settled on mission fields so that they now have a force of nine ordained men in Manitoba and the Territories. They desire to settle six, and if possible nine more, during the present year. The Convention lately held at Brandon was the most enthusiastic in their history.

#### THE FUTURE.

The Board desires to push this work with greater vigor in the year to come than ever before. Steps have already been taken in that direction. More students are at work this vacation than in any former one. New ground is being broken and lost ground re-occupied- Other openings are being considered. A large increase in contributions will be needed, but we believe the churches are well able to make the increase. The contributions to the Convention Fund could be increased one-third and the Denomination still be far short of the high water mark of its ability. Brethren, we profess great love for our Lord and His truth, and to look for great things from Him, let us then attempt greater things for Him.

# CONVENTION FUND.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT.

A careful analysis of the subjoined Financial Statement shows that the total receipts to the Convention Fund were nearly \$1400 in excess of those of last year. The receipts for Home Missions including the Manitoba and North West Missions, were nearly \$1300 greater; for Foreign Missions about \$700 less; for Educational Institutions \$350 less; for Ministerial Aid a trifle less, for Ministerial Education \$72 more, while the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies gained on last year's receipts to the amount of \$1150. Nova Scotia contributed \$1435 more than last year, and New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island each gave about \$300 niore. The General Receipts fell off about \$400. In Nova Scotia 28 churches contributed nothing to the Convention Fund, nearly one half of which churches belong to the African Association. In New Brunswick 56 churches did not contribute, and in P. E. Island five churches failed to add to the Convention Funds.

The Treasurer regrets that he could not secure a copy of the Report of a Treasurer of one of the Associations until it was too late to give credit to the churches that contributed. He could only credit the money to the Treasurer of the Association to which those churches belonged. A star is placed opposite to the names of those churches which refers to a footnote at the close of the report, An incomplete statement was obtained from the officers of another Association, hence the churches connected with it cannot have in this Report the full credit that is due to them. list eml

#### REV. D. S. CARPENTER.

A woman of ordinary courage, afflicted with asthma as Mrs. Selden was during her entire active life, would have passed her days as an inactive invalid. But the Spartan courage and intense zeal of her nature surmounted her severe sufferings, and kept her in the midst of christian and benevolent work till the call for rest came. She ignored weakness and distress, and worked on as if in the enjoyment of good health and full strength.

Of Mrs. Selden it can be said, "She hath done what she could."

Circular Letter,—Revds. J. A. Bleakney, F.M.Young and T.Bishop. Denominational Literature,—Revds. D. H. Simpson, W. H. Robinson and S. H. Cain.

Education,—Revds. A. Cohoon, W. L. Parker, J. T. Eaton, Deacon Wm. Corning and Sisters Beals and Rowe.

Obituaries,-Revds. J. Rowe and I. E. Bill.

Sunday Schools,—Revds. A. F. Browne, S. H. Cain and Brethren B. Havey and H. Crosby.

Temperance,-Revds. P. F. Adams, F. H. Beals, S. H. Cain, and Brethren J. Chaloner and David Crosby.

The committee on Amendment to Art. 2 of the Constitution, reported through the chairman Rev. A. Cohoon, as follows:

That Art. II. of the Constitution be amended to read thus: "It shall be composed of delegates appointed by the churches they represent, who must be members of Baptist Churches, together with delegates from corresponding Associations. Each church connected with the Association shall have the right to send delegates, but no church shall have the right to send more than six. The pastor of a group of churches, when so appointed, shall be allowed, if necessary, to represent all the churches he serves, but can only have one vote.

On motion the report was adopted.

The report on Denominational Literature was presented by Rev. D. H. Simpson. The report was taken up clause by clause, and spoken to by Revds. A. F. Browne, J. Webb, A. Cohoon, Bro. B. Havey, Revds. J. H. Saunders, F. M. Yoang, E. P. Coldwell, J. Rowe, D. H. Simpson, W. H. Robinson, Bro. D. Crosby and Deacon Baker.

Resolved, That the report as a whole, be adopted.

Resolved, That Prof. I. B. Oakes be added to the Committee on Education.

Committee on Questions in Letters recommended the admission of the new church at Granville Ferry into the Association.

On motion the report were adopted and the hand of fellowship given to the pastor of the church, Rev. S. H. Cain.

Committee on Circular Letter recommend that it be read.

The Chairmen of County organizations having the interests of Convention fund in hand reported through Rev. I. E. Bill, Yarmouth; Rev. W. A. Barss, Queen's; Rev. F. Potter, Shelburne; Rev. W. B. Bradshaw, Annapolis; and Rev. J. L. Read, Digby.

On motion brethren Bill, Bradshaw, Read, Simpson, Young and Cohoon were appointed to take into consideration the reports of the County Chairmen.

## Saturday-Evening Session.

A meeting was held in the interest of Home Missions.

Bro. Goucher read the Report on Home Missions. This report embraced the main features of the work as embodied in the Report of the Home Mission Board at the Convention. Many of the smaller Churches are working amid the greatest discouragements. Some are without pastors, others have preaching only during the summer months; yet these interests need to exist and to be sustained.

Bro. Pineo was the first speaker. He showed that his heart was full of Home Mission work. He considered pastors responsible for the propagation of the Gospel in destitute places. No work will better fit him to prepare sermons for his own congregation. He gave some touching incidents from his own experience in this work during the past year. He had travelled a thousand miles, made many visits, besides preaching in different fields. He received seven dollars for his services, and that he had donated to Home Missions.

Bro. Thos. Todd, who was a delegate from the Western Association, said: The love of Christ should be the motive power in prompting us to answer the Macedonian cry. The strong oaght to bear the infirmities of the weak. If we show apathy in Home Mission work, we will likely treat Foreign Missions and Education with like indifference.

Bro. Mellick spoke of the difficulty in defining Home Missions. Emphasized the need of pressing converts to the observance of ordinances and connection with churches in order to carry forward the Lord's work. Must exercise the graces of giving, singing, speaking and praying in order to manifest the whole gospel.

Dr. Hopper being present, an opportunity was given him of presenting the claims of the U. B. Seminary at St. Martins. He spoke in his usual impressive and forcible manner. Dr. Hopper has given himself, soul and body, to the work of Christian education, and wherever he goes, he carries an inspiration.

The various Sunday services were of more than ordinary interest. In the morning at 10 o'clock, a prayer meeting of great spiritual power and blessing was held under the leadership of Bro. Thos. Todd. At 11 o'clock, Bro. Martell preached an earnest, practical gospel sermon to a crowded house, from Matt. 6: 28, with 2 Peter 3: 18.

In the afternoon a profitable Sunday school session was held, addressed by Rev. W. J. Stewart, Deacon N. B. Cottle and Rev. W. C. Goucher.

Dr. Hopper spoke eloquently in behalf of Christian education, after which a respectable sum was subscribed towards the liquidation of the debt on the Seminary—something over \$40. In the

evening Rev. H. G. Mellick preached to a large and deeply interested congregation from Acts 13:36. Bro. M's sermon was a strong appeal to the people to endeavour to serve God in this day and generation. A prayer meeting followed, in which many participated. All retired from God's house in the evening feeling that it was a day of the right hand of God.

#### Monday-Morning Session.

Opened with prayer by Bro. Mellick.

In the absence of the appointed preacher, the Association at Sermon was preached by Rev. E. J. Grant, from 2 Kings 7: 9.

It was voted that this excellent missionary sermon be furnished for publication. It was full of interesting and helpful facts, and was listened to with close attention.

Bro. Goucher presented a paper on the "Claims of the Sundayschool upon the adult membership of the Church."

It was voted also to request the publication of this paper in the Messenger and Visitor.

#### Monday—Afternoon Session.

Was devoted to hearing of reports by different committees.

The report on Systematic Beneficence was submitted by Bro. Pineo, spoken to by Bros. Grant, Hickson, Pineo, and Thos. Todd.

By a rising vote the Association expressed its sincere thanks to the people of Oak Bay for their cordial reception and entertainment of delegates.

The report on Denominational Literature was presented by Bro. Martell in an excellent address. He emphasized the value of the Bible, a good and pure hymn book, and a denominatoonal paper as helpful agencies in the development of Christian life and character. The Baptist Hymnal and MESSENGER AND VISITOR were warmly commended.

Bro. Grant spoke in behalf of the Baptist Book Room at Halifax. Four reasons were given why it should receive the moral and financial support of all Baptists in the Provinces. 1. Because it keeps a good line of books at reasonable prices. 2. Because it is not a money making concern but for the purpose of spreading our principles. 3. Because of our loyalty to the truth. 4. Because of the Hymn Book it has given us.

Bro. Black, the new editor of the Messenger and Visitor, presented the claims of the paper upon the sympathy, prayers and support of the people. The old Fathers not only laid the foundations for our educational institutions, but also for our denominational literature. Because of their democratic principles, Baptists wanted a paper that would give them some idea of the work being done at home and abroad. The Messenger and Visitor unites in itself these streams of knowledge. It is intended to help to make our people strong and loyal to the truth. It is important because it calls forth the best thought and labors of our ministers and educated laymen. The Visitor is the medium of expression for the ideas of young as well as older men, which may enrich the minds and hearts of our people.

#### Wednesday-Evening Session.

At 7.30 o'clock business was resumed after prayer by Rev. F. D. Crawley.

Report of Committee to nominate all other committees read and adopted. The Circular Letter was then read by its author Rev. T. Todd. The report on Education was read by the Clerk, in the absence of Rev. W. E. McIntyre the chairman of that Committee, as follows :---

First that as a Denomination we should feel highly grateful to Almighty God for his blessing upon this branch of our work. In many respects the past year has been one of rich promise in our institutions of learning. Our Seminary at St. Martins under the management of Rev. Dr. J. E. Hopper bids fair again to play a useful part in the prosperity and advance of our Denominational interests. The attendance of Students has been large, ever beyond expectation. During the year 101 students have been enrolled, 69 of whom have been resi ent.

This fact of itself proves the necessity of maintaining a Baptist institution in this Province, thus deepening the work of our Denomination and laying broad and sure the foundation of futuregrowth.

We trust that many more of the sons and daughters of our people may find their way to this christian home, and there learn the principles and truths of the Baptist people.

The principal informs your committee that during the past year the Seminary has been entirely self-sustaining. Upon the prorerty itself there is still a burdensome debt which hinders the prosperity and endangers the retention of the property by us.

The Board of Directors have determined to make a vigorous effort this year to wipe out this debt and have appealed to the churches of the Baptist and Free Baptist Denominations in this Province to raise in each church an aggregate sum of one dollar per member.

The realization of this plan will provide funds sufficient to free the properity and leave a margin.

It is now or never in this effort.

Our Institutions at Horton deserve special mention.

Acadia College with Horton Academy and the Ladies Seminary have this year surpassed even the high record of previous years.

No fewer than 134 students have pursued the undergraduate cuurse at the college, and nineteen have graduated the present vear, the *largest* class of graduates from any Institution in the Maritime Provinces.

In the Young Ladies Seminary 84 have been in attendance and in Horton Academy 75. making in all a grand total of 293 young men and women under the tuition of the instructors at this Jerusalem of our faith.

We are thankful for blessing and fovor and trust that we may as christian people long continue to support and patronize these schools, and to make them more even in the future than in the past, enlightened strongholds of the doctrines as we believe the Master has given to his people.

All of which is respectfully submitted on behalf of Committee.

# NOVA SCOTIA AFRICAN.

THE NOVA SCOTIA AFRICAN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION convened with the Digby Joggins Church in its Thirty-seventh Annual Session, on the 6th day of September, 1890.

The session was called to order at 3 p.m. Rev. Dr. Jordan in the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted for an hour awaiting the arrival of several of the delegates.

The list of delegates was prepared, and reported nineteen delegates representing eleven churches.

#### OFFICERS ELECTED FOR 1890-91,

Moderator,-Rev. A. W. Jordan, D.D., re-elected, Assistant Moderator,-Rev. E. Dixon. Secretary,-P. E. McKerrow. Assistant Secretary,-James Gabourel.

Treasurer,-P. Buttlei.

#### Saturday—Evening Session.

A Conference meeting was held, led by Rev. J. E. Jackson. Short prayers and exhortations offered by nearly all present.

Special prayers were invoked for blessings on the sessions now held, and on the denomination at large, which were interspersed by good singing. Committees were appointed. The committee on Arrangements reported for Sunday services and for the business of the Association on the subsequent days.

Prayer meetings were held each morning during the session, and proved of much profit to the members.

MONDAY FORENOON the Associational Sermon was preached by Rev. F. R. Langford, from 1 Sam, xvii. 37. Hence "Israel's happy deliverance from Philistia's cruel grasp." Prayer and benediction by Rev. J. A. Smith.

MONDAY AFTERNOON the reading of letters from the various churches, and discussion on the same, occupied this session, with the Circular letter which was read by the writer, and on motion, ordered to be printed. Benediction by Rev. Bro. Dixon.

### MINUTES OF THE AFRICAN ASSOCIATION.

MONDAY EVENING—A Missionary meeting largely attended. The needs of many of the churches were made known. Rev. F. R. Langford reported of his labours, which elicited much sympathy from the large audience. He made the brethren understand that he received assistance from the Home Board, and it was the duty of every church to send in a collection monthly or quarterly, to the Secretary of the Board to assist the cause let it be ever so small.

Bro. Jas Gabourel gave some remarks relative to his labors in Halifax County.

Bro. Jas. Flint, (Lic.) and others occupied the balance of the evening. A collection was taken and supplemented, and Fifteen Dollars sent to the Treasurer of the Home Mission Board.

Committee on Missions report in part as follows :----

It is with deepest regret that we must chronicle the large falling off of membership in the body, which we attribute to a lack of missionary work among the churches generally. Too much being expected of the ministers, when in fact the revival of the Spirit rests greatly with the individual members.

TUESDAY FORENOON—Session opened with prayer by Deacon Anderson. Minutes of previous session read and approved. The Moderator's report from the Convention was read and discussed by Rev. H. H. Johnson, Bro. Jas. Gabourel and spoken to at considerable length by the Moderator.

Several names from the Obituary list were familiar to nearly all present, viz. : Fathers Rand and Parker were household Lames, also Bros. Kempton and Macleod were well known to many of the brethren, and feelings of sympathy were manifested for the bereaved families. The Secretary's annual report was laid on the table to be taken up in the afternoon session. Closed with benediction by Rev. E. Dixon.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON—Opened with prayer by Bro. Powell. Minutes read. Committee on Education reported, and strongly urged on the young men aspiring for the ministry to take the advantage now offered them at Acadia College.

Committee on Sabbath Schools reported with regret the closing of so many of the schools that offered so much work of usefulness on the Lord's Day, and recommended that the delegates on their return use their endeavours to re-open them whereby the churches might be strengthened by their presence.

Committee on Temperance reported and offered the following resolution :

Whereas, The curse of intemperance can only be obliterated by united effort. We the delegates of the Association set before our churches the need of keeping ourselves unspotted from the world:

And whereas, We are conscious of its evil to mankind by the use of alcohol, the health is destroyed; prosperity blighted; peace and tranquility in families put to naught

Resolved, That we commit ourselves to the entire Prohibition of its use, and each member male and female pledge ourselves against the traffic.

Reves. Dr. Jordan, Jackson and Dixon, and Bro. Jas. Gabourel were speakers to the report, which was adopted.

The Secretary's Annual report contained a considerable number of useful points for the churches throughout the Association to consider, was discussed by Rev. H. H. Johnson, Bros. Langford, Bros. Gabourel and Dr Jordan, and afterwards ordered to be printed in the minutes. Session closed with prayer by Dea. Biddle.

TUESDAY EVENING-Opened with singing. Prayer offered by the Moderator. Minutes read and confirmed.

Financial committee reported a large falling off in the letter monies from the churches, and the delegates were given strict charge to urge upon the churches the necessity of contributing more liberally to advance the cause of Christ. Bro. Gabourel was appointed delegate to the Convention. The Moderator suggested that a district ministers' conference be held for the purpose of diffusing more church polity among the brethren generally which was concurred in.

Votes of thanks to the good people of the Joggins for their hospitality, and the various public carriers for reduced fares.

The session closed to meet at Preston in 1891. The thanks of the Association were also tendered the Moderator and his assistant; also the Secretary and his assistant for their duties performed so satisfactorily.

The business being over a temperance meeting was conducted, and a really good one it was. Strong resolutions were made in private with some who used the social glass, now resolved to adopt prohibition.

Meetings were held on the day before the Convention at Yarmouth. Papers were read by Prof. R. V. Jones, Ph. D., on "A Layman's views of the relation between pastor and flock"; by Rev. D. A. Steele, on "The Messianic Kingdom"; by Dr. Welton on "The Second coming of our Lord and the end of the World," and by Dr. E. M. Saunders on "The Scriptures studied according to a plan," also a paper by Rev. R. H. Bishop on Heb. vi. 1-10.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE MINISTERS' ANNUITY FUND OF THE BAPTIST CONVENTION OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

1. All legacies, donations, or contributions of any kind made to the Board for the capital of the Ministers' Annuity Fund shall constitute the capital and shall be kept invested in good securities.

2. Ministers' rates, donations or contributions made for the purpose, and the interest on investments, shall be the fund for paying annuities; but any surplus may be added to the capital by the Board. No part of the capital shall be used for paying annuities.

3. Any ordained Baptist minister in regular standing, and engaged in ministerial work within the bounds of the Convention, by complying with the Constitution, shall have a legal right to his annuity. Exceptional cases may be considered and judged by the Board.

4. If any minister, having a right to this fund, shall leave the denomination, he shall forfeit all claims on the fund but he shall receive back half the amount paid by him in yearly dues.

5. If a minister ceases to labor as a minister, and engages in a secular calling, except from some physical disqualification for continuing his ministerial work, he shall forfeit his claims on the fund, but shall receive back one-half of the amount paid in yearly dues.

6. Ministers removing beyond the bounds of this Convention must have the anction of the Board in order to retain their claims on the fund.

7. Any minister who shall fail to connect himself with this fund so soon as he is eligible, shall not be received unless he pays the rates and the interest thereon at six per cent. for the time he has neglected to join himself to the fund,

8. Any minister who, on account of accident or ill-health, ceases to receive his ordinary salary, or any minister who being 65 years old. or upwards, resigns his position as pastor, missionary or teacher, and ceases to receive his ordinary income for his labors, shall be entitled to his annuity. Every application for an annuity shall be made in writing, either by the applicant or by some person on behalf of the applicant; and shall contain satisfactory information respecting the grounds of the claim.

9. No person can have a right to an annuity unless all his dues are paid.

10. Annuities shall be paid half-yearly, on the 1st of July and the 1st of January.

11. Any minister can at any time commute his yearly rates, and secure his claims to the benefits of the fund by paying a sum judged by the Board an equivalent to all his possible rates. The payment of such a sum may be spread over two or three years.

12. Applicants when eligible for membership may be admitted on the first day of Jan ary or the first day of July, at which times their yearly rates are due in advance. Any minister whose rate is not paid in the first three months after it is due, shall be notified of the same by the Treasurer, and he shall pay, in addition to the regular rates, the interest at 6 per cent. on the rates for the time of his neglect of payment. If the rate is not paid for one year, the person shall cease to be a member, but shall receive back half the amount of his paid-up rates. His re-admission to membership shall be by special action of the Board.

13. No minister receiving an annuity shall be required to pay dues; neither shall he be a member of the Board.

14. The annual rate is ten dollars.

15. The maximum annuities for the present, shall be for a minister, \$150; for a widow, \$75; each child of a widow, \$12,50; but no family of children shall receive more than \$50. If both father and mother are dead, and there is but one orphan, it shall receive \$40 if there are two orphans, they shall receive \$40 each; or if a greater number, they shall receive \$100 equally divided among

them. No child shall have any claim on the fund after becoming sixteen years of age. If the fund should not be sufficient to pay the annuities above specified, then a proportionate amount of the available fund shall be paid.

16. If a widow receiving an annuity shall marry, she shall cease from the date of her marriage to participate in the fund; but the children of her former husband shall continue to receive their annuities the same as if their mother had remained a widow.

17. Any society, church or person, by paying the rates required of a member, shall be entitled to nominate, as a recipient of the benefits of the fund, any minister within the bounds of the Convention not already connected with the fund, and qualified according to the Constitution; and such minister and his family shall have a right to participate in the fund as if he himself had paid the required dues.

18. No minister can join this fund after he is sixty-five years old.

19. No alteration or addition shall be made to this Constitution except it be recommended by the Board, or, at the instance of a member of the Convention, who shall give a year's notice in writing to that body of the proposed addition or change.
