**REHEARSAL OF THE EGLINTON TOURNAMENT.**—On Saturday, 30th July, there was a grand rehearsal, with tents and barriers, and the adjuncts of the lists. The knights first filled at the quaint figure, and then at the heavy block figure. The tilting practice, during which the men were only partially in armour—only Lord Alford and Lord Glenlyon, to the best of our recollection, have worn helmets—was succeeded by jousts between two knights at a time, armed cap-à-pie, in full plate. The first succession of courses was between the Earl of Eglington, the Lord of the tourney—and Lord Alford. The former was apparessed in a gorgeous suit of burnished brass, with the coronet of his degree on his helmet; his plume and housings being of the colours of his lively, blue and gold. The latter was in bright steel, bearing on his helmet the crest of his name, with plume and housings of his proper tinctures, blue and white. The success of the joust was with Lord Alford, who planted one more attain on the shield of his adversary than he himself suffered. After this Lord Glenlyon and Mr. Gage entered the lists; but even the beautiful horsemanship of the latter was unable to bring his horse up to the charge. Nothing could induce the animal to face his opponent; and so much time was lost in the attempt, that the concluding joust between the Marquis of Waterford, and we believe, Capt. Maynard, was of necessity postponed—it being then eight o'clock in the evening.

Lord William Bentwick has scarcely left his equal among the Liberal Aristocracy.—In varied and arduous situations at home and abroad, he "kept the whiteness of his soul." With opportunities of amassing wealth such as few have enjoyed, and the offer of that advancement in the tanks of the Peerage which his "order" so eagerly covet, he preferred to remain a man of the people, with a moderate fortune. There has been and are many more noisy professors of attachment to popular interests, but few have acted up to their principles as steadfastly as the late member for Glasgow. What he promised he performed. He held out no false expectations; and if his constituents were somewhat disappointed in his Parliamentary career, they will not fail to bear in mind, not only the moderation of his professions, but the unfortunate state of health which kept him back on many occasions when inclination might have prompted him to take an active part in the business of the House of Commons.

A trial, I need hardly say, must have resulted in their acquittal; because we have no producible witnesses of their guilt; and because, after all that had occurred, such a prosecution would have been justly regarded with the utmost disfavour by the Court and Jury. The result is, that they have been released on the conditions mentioned in the letter, from the Home Office. Her Majesty's Government have used every exertion in their power to avoid a result which they lament; as it may prove embarrassing to your administration, and perhaps to the tranquillity of Upper Canada. I trust, however, that when the real state of the case is known in the Province, any excitement which may have been raised by this decision will subside—and that it will be in your power to disabuse the public mind of the opinion, that Her Majesty's Government regard with indifference, or are disposed to treat with a misplaced lenity, such crimes as those of which the prisoners in question are self-convicted.

THEATRE ROYAL.—Miss Davenport continues to attract numerous admirers to the Theatre; we cannot speak of last night, not having been present. On Wednesday evening, this extraordinary young lady acquitted herself to the perfect satisfaction of the audience, in the difficult character of Young Norval; and in the after-piece—"Old and Young"—she severely taxed the chthonian powers of "old and young" in the Theatre. This evening, Miss Davenport will appear in two pieces, as a country bumpkin in one, and as the spoiled child in another.

Aurora Borealis.—Tuesday night, the heavens presented an appearance of unusual splendour. Early in the evening the Aurora slightly illumined the North and South East; it continued to increase in brilliancy till towards 1 past 9, when it presented a scene of magnificent grandeur. In the zenith a bright radius of light was centered and shot out its oblique rays with various primitive colours, and occasionally appearing as a deep crimson and green, intermingling and crossing each other until about 10 o'clock, when it gradually disappeared.

On Saturday last, His Excellency the Governor General left town for Sorel, by way of Chambly; and we understand, that before his return, he had quitted, His Excellency will proceed to Quebec, and review the troops in garrison there.—Montreal Gazette, Tuesday.

A fire took place at Kingston, on the 30th August, which was not extinguished until it had consumed a dozen of families, and burned eight habitations, which were principally built of wood. The papers speak in the highest terms of the assistance rendered by the military in arresting the progress of the flames.

THE REGATTA.—The Rowing Matches only came off yesterday as there was no wind, indeed it was nearly dead calm, and the sailing matches were postponed till today. The result of the rowing matches was as follows:—

The 1st. Class four oars race was won by the Quebec Rowing Club's new rig Red Rover, built at Greerock, beating the 71st's boat Thames by 1 minute 16 seconds. The 1st Class 6 oared race was won by the Quebec Rowing Club's boat Flamingo beating the 63 oared boat of the Officers of the Coldstream Guards, by about the same time. In the second Class race for 4 oared boats, Mr. Cotman's boat came in first, but the race was given against him from having the foul of the other boat, rowed by men of the 71st Regt. The second Class six oared race was won by a second boat belonging to the Quebec Rowing Club, manned by soldiers of the Quartermaster General's boat's crew.—Mer.

THE ARMY.

On Saturday night last, the Rural Police, St. Cesaire Station, under the Superintendent of W. J. Chaffers, Esq., Stipendiary Magistrate, succeeded in securing three deserters from the 60th Regiment, 2 of them young men of 18 or 30 years old, and arrived with the last draft from England; two of them had their arms and some ammunition with them. They had left Laprairie on Monday evening last, got across the Richelieu below St Johns by swimming, and becoming bewildered, instead of steering for the States, they took quite a contrary direction. They had suffered much from hunger and cold, their shoes and stockings were worn out, and they declared they had tasted nothing but wild berries for upwards of two days. With every outlet to the United States so well guarded as at present it is folly for our soldiers to attempt desertion, they only bring disgrace and dishonour on themselves by the attempt.—Montreal Herald of Tuesday.

Kingston, Aug. 31st.—We are glad the inhabitants of this district will be sure to learn that Col. the Hon. H. Dundas, C. B. has returned from Lower Canada, and that he will remain our Military Commandant until next May at all events.—Chronicle. Lieuts. Wilder and Radcliffe, Dr. Light-hall, and 73 non-commissioned officers and privates of the Royal Artillery, arrived at this post on Thursday last. The Doctor and 41 privates went to Toronto.—Id. Contracts.—Fresh Beef for one year for the troops in this garrison, has been taken at a fraction under 30s. currency per 100 lbs. Baking Flour for the consumption of the troops at 120 lbs. of bread for every 100 lbs. of flour.—Kingston Chronicle.

To the Editor of the Quebec Transcript. Sir,—In your paper of Friday, the 23rd August, there appeared a communication, said to be an "Extract taken from Appendix D. to Lord Durham's Report, containing Mr. A. Buller's Reports on the state of Education in Lower Canada." The "details" given in that extract are in my opinion of little or no importance, and would have been passed over by me, as they have been by many, as altogether unworthy of notice, had not a foul calumny appeared in the last paragraph—a calumny, to say the least of it, of a very injurious nature to a class of

men, whose great misfortune is that they are engaged in the humble though honorable employment of teaching "the young idea how to shoot." Even granting that the "Gentleman" who hunted out the schools found one, or two, or even three persons, whom he considered unqualified to teach, still it is unfair, and unjust, thus to hold up to public contempt, the "many" for the incompetency of the few. "Many," says Lord Durham in his Report.—"Many masters and mistresses are utterly incompetent." Now, as his Lordship has adopted the Report of the Commissioner of Education as his own, he having pledged himself for the accuracy of it, I as one of the public Schoolmasters in Quebec would ask—upon whose authority does he make the assertion that his own masters are incompetent? Is it from his personal knowledge?—No, for he has been candid enough to say, that it is not from his own personal observation, but from that of another. Is it upon the authority of the Commissioner of Education?—No; for if I am not misinformed he never visited any of the schools which he held that office. But whether he did or not, I can only say he never visited the school I have charge of; and I do not hesitate to state that this circulator of what the uneducated vulgar would be apt in their ignorance to call an untruth, never examined me, consequently he is totally ignorant of my qualifications as a teacher. I dare not rely on his Lordship to prove what he has thus circulated under the sanction of his "mighty name," but also the Commissioner himself, who by the by was thought by the majority of the citizens of Quebec to be better fitted for the race-course, the wrestling and boxing rings, than for devising plans of education for enlightening the illiterate inhabitants of Lower Canada.

Is it upon the authority of the "accurate gentleman" in whom Lord Durham has "complete confidence"? As that gentleman is still in or near Quebec, I in my own name, and also that of the "many" who are of the same profession, call upon him either to retract what has been published, or point out by name all those "masters" that "are utterly incompetent" so that the public may judge whether his report be "accurate" or not. As a gentleman of honor he cannot shrink from this. It would only be an act of justice to the schoolmasters who have been either intentionally, or to put the most charitable construction on it, inadvertently exposed to public reproach. He, however, I am afraid, will find it easier to make an assertion than prove it. In a word, the Education Commissioner, as well as his associates, appear to have viewed every thing through a distorted medium; for not contented with exposing the ignorance of the country schoolmasters and belabouring them most unmercifully, they imagined, I doubt not, that their work would be incomplete unless those in the city had at least a share—thus verifying the old adage, "Qui vult cadere caecum, facit insensit fastid." SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.
