ALL SAFE ON WOLVERINE  
OPENING OF PARLIAMENT

Missing Steamer Was Caught in Moving Ice on Lake Winnipeg. — Abandoned by Crew and Passengers.

Selkirk, Man., Nov. 19.—Chief Engineer Seaman, T. Waterson and J. J. Ratt of the steamer Wolverine arrived here this morning, reporting that the crew and boat are safe. The Wolverine, which left here about three weeks ago, was en route to Snake Island, but on account of striking heavy storms, was forced to return to Black River for wood. From there it started north, but was compelled to go to Swampy harbor for shelter. On entering it struck a rock, breaking the wheel and rudder, leaving the boat directly at the mercy of the waves. The anchors were lowered and fortunately the wind was blowing towards the island as the anchors were torn and the boat pitched in that direction. To avoid being beached she was partly sunk, where she will remain for the winter.

On board were sixteen people, two being stewardesses.

Caught in Moving Ice.

Of the sixteen, seven left Swampy Island with their yawl and crossed a distance of ten miles to Commissioner Island, waiting there for about twelve days for the freeze-up. After getting provisions they left Commissioner Island for Gimli, but were forced to return, as they were caught in moving ice. After waiting a few days, the ice got in good condition, and they made the trip to Gimli, some 150 miles from here. When there they took the train to Selkirk.

SUNDAY SENSATION.

Hamilton Man Arrested on Charge of Disturbing Sunday Worship.

Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 20.—A peculiar state of affairs was brought to light this evening by the arrest in Victoria Avenue Baptist church of Gerald F. Dunn, at the instigation of the pastor, Rev. H. Edgar Allen. Dunn was for many years the Winnipeg agent of the Karn Music Co. Two years ago the prisoner caused a sensation in the church by accusing Thos. Gillard, president of the oldest members, of appropriating money from the collection plates and at an indignation meeting shortly after Dunn was struck from the church membership. Every Sunday night since, Dunn has occupied the front pew, and at the most solemn moments of the service would interrupt the pastor by loud articulations. The board of managers sent letters threatening him with arrest for disturbing public worship, as also did several lawyers, and at last Magistrate Jelfs wrote to him. This did not have any effect, and this evening the climax was reached in Dunn's arrest. The prisoner is over fifty years of age. Each Sunday Dunn had his wife and two children with him to church.

CITY PLANNING AND BUSINESS BUILDING IN CANADA

In considering city planning schemes, and especially questions of salary of city planning, administration becomes the most important, which calls for careful municipal administration to consider the cost before the undertaking any scheme. The cost of a city planning scheme may be briefly described as follows:

Cost of a municipal city planning department.

Cost of a city plan.

Cost of a model.

Salary of chief of the department, or commissioner. Many of the older men or citizens selected to represent the interests of the different wards in the form of a board of control; this power to guide and control the methods under which all the extensions of our cities are made would undoubtedly be the most of laying the foundation for their future greatness and prosperity.

The sense of civic responsibility is happily a growing one in Canada, and it may therefore be regarded as certain that within the next decade, city authorities will speedily realize that the preparation of a city plan is as much a civic need as the possession of water, power, open spaces and other civically owned necessities which it is the aim of a good city plan to secure.

The Danger of Over-Crowding.

The modern city planning scheme, when in the hands of wise municipal administrators, will be of invaluable service to the community by preventing all the evils of over-crowding of houses on land, which is so marked in the estates developed by real estate owners in many of our large cities.

Some instances in Great Britain, as many as thirty, to forty houses have been built on an acre of land. Fortunately this terrible state of affairs will not be permitted under the recent housing and city planning act which grants very large powers to the local authorities concerned.

There is no reasonable excuse why the Canadian authorities should fall into the same error. Here we have vast undeveloped sections that have not been built upon, and which are not admirable residential districts. Notwithstanding this we have slums in Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg and Vancouver that would certainly be an easy first try anything in Great Britain. That this is recognized is borne out by the fact that city improvement committees in our cities alluded to have wisely taken in hand schemes to minimize this undesirable feature in the otherwise splendid and progressive cities of Canada.

It citizens build wisely with a view to the beautiful as well as the practical, it will bring in its train physical development, and a high standard of citizenship. In this building it is necessary to make a study of the future requirements by larger thoroughfares, and to provide for the future needs of artisans' dwellings, making their section just as beautiful as others. By aiding and leading such movements, every citizen will be contributing in a very marked degree to the happiness of our people and the future citizens of great centres of commerce and industry.

Business Building.



A majority contest between the present occupant of the office, Mayor Williams and P. McAra, Jr., is now assured.

Geo. Moretti, the forger, who gave himself up at St. Louis, was sentenced to nine months imprisonment by Magistrate Trant.

Ernest Thompson Seton, the well-known naturalist, gives matinee and evening lectures in the Regina city hall tomorrow.

The new C. P. R. line to Prince Albert will be known as the Regina, Saskatoon and North Saskatchewan branch.

The Saskatoon sleeper and cafe car on Tuesday's C. N. R. train from the north were derailed at Bethune by the spreading of rails.

The court of revision for Regina started its sitting today in the Dominion Lands Office building. Judge Hannon is presiding.

In order to relieve the pressure upon the jail accommodation, the old Indian industrial school will be used as a place of detention.

The city hockey league was re-organized on Monday night. Four teams will compete, the 95th Regiment, Collegiate, Calumets and Capitals.

Opponents of local option held a meeting in the east end Saturday night, while the "drys" gathered in the city hall Sunday afternoon.

The annual meeting of the rate-payers in connection with the city schools, will be held in the city hall on the evening of December 3.

Mrs. Watson, widow of the late Dixie Watson, Clerk of the Supreme Court of the North-West Territories, died on Friday in the Grey Nuns' Hospital.

D'Arcy Tate, solicitor of the Grand Trunk Pacific, was in Regina this week in consultation with the city officials regarding the entrance of the railway to the city.

Dr. Ayre, who was the victim of a runaway accident some months ago, suffered the amputation of his left leg on Tuesday. He is doing as well as could be expected.

The first ice-track matinee of the season takes place on Wascana Lake on Thursday at 2.30 under the auspices of the Capital City Driving Club. There is a strong list of entries.

For assaulting Sam Gould, a restaurant proprietor, who advertised "no Chinese employed," a local Chinik paid \$10 and costs and 4 others \$5.00 and costs. The case attracted much interest.

The wedding took place in St. Mary's church on Tuesday of Miss Helen Bartz and John Lucas, Rev. Father Reidinger officiating. The bride was a popular member of St. Mary's choir and the groom is also well known in the city.

### CANADA'S MILITIA

Sir John French, Insp. General of Imperial Forces, Submits A Report in Which Criticisms Are Made.

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—The Minister of Militia today made public the report of Sir John French, Inspector-General of the Imperial forces, upon the work of the Canadian militia. Sir John French begins by emphasizing the value of the militia as a reserve force. A sound system of organization, he says, is the corner stone of all military matters. Individual excellence in commanders, staff or bodies of troops will not compensate for a want of it.

He criticized the Canadian organization on two lines. The proportion between the various arms of the service is not correctly adjusted. There is too much infantry and heavy artillery and only half as much field artillery as is advisable, while the engineers and supply services are too weak. The distribution of troops is faulty. The distribution of troops in regard to divisions are faulty in the corps which would serve together in peace. General French next advocates the drawing up of a scheme of mobilization which would include the establishment of a railway war council, prepared over by chief of the general staff and including among its members managers or representatives of the principal railways of Canada. In this connection he says: "The work of mobilization, of providing, of insuring the provision of transport for equipment, stores and supplies, of preparing the necessary regulations and instructions, of drawing up tables showing the war equipment of all units, is a labor of very considerable magnitude. In the Imperial army for the United Kingdom alone, this work has occupied the undivided attention of five or six officials for nearly 20 years, while the duty of keeping the arrangements up to date, entails continuous work upon all officers of the army, both staff and regimental."

CONSULS PIQUED.  
Refused to Attend Governor-General's Drawing Room.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The feature of the drawing room held in the senate chambers on Saturday evening by the governor-general and Countess Grey was the renewed refusal of the consuls-general of foreign countries to attend. The senior consul-general in Canada is Col. J. G. Foster, representing the United States. In Ottawa besides him there are representatives of China, Japan and Belgium. In Montreal there reside the consuls of Germany, France, Holland, Argentine Republic, etc. The question is one of precedence.

The consuls are offended that they are placed after the mayor of Ottawa in the order in which they are presented to the governor-general. They claim that their mission to this country is diplomatic, and that accordingly their status in this country is higher than mere trade representatives. However, Canada being still a colony of Great Britain in a technical sense, the government of Canada does not recognize them as diplomatic representatives, although on occasions they have acted on diplomatic missions, as for instance when Col. Foster took part in the recent negotiations regarding the tariff between Canada and the United States. The drawing room was the last their excellencies will hold and was the smartest in several years.

SPLIT WAS AVOIDED  
Between the Labor Unions of the United States and Canada

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 22.—A threatened split between the labor unions of the United States and Canada was smoothed over this afternoon in the American Federation of Labor by the action of President Gompers and his friends. The discussion, which at times was heated, grew out of the resolutions of the special committee which recommended the maintenance of the autonomy of the international union in Canada and confers the sole right in the assurance of local union charges upon the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress and gives the Canadian central body the privilege of affiliation with the federation at discretion. Several delegates made speeches in support of the resolutions which finally were adopted.

Line to Australia  
Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 22.—Specifications are now being prepared for liners to operate between Vancouver and the Antipodes which will be twelve thousand ton vessels. When the company bid for the renewal of the service at Ottawa, Sir James Mills submitted to the federal authorities the views of his fellow directors and he has received the assurance that the contract will be of such length as to justify the company building 12,000 ton steamers for the Vancouver service. While Canada has come to a decision, Australia remains to be heard from. Sir James has just sailed from San Francisco for Sydney.

Chinese Investigation  
Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 22.—Mr. Justice Murphy has just received from Ottawa his commission for supervising the enquiry into the subject of Chinese immigration into British Columbia and also into the opium traffic and has named December 15 as the opening date of the investigation. The scope of Justice Murphy's commission is very wide and includes all B. C. ports.
