Sir,--Can you inform us who is to blame for the existing inefficient service in connection with the W. & A. R. and W. U. telegraph office in this town?

It is possible that this, one of the most important stations on the line, cannot afford an assistant to the already over-worked agent? We think not.

The W. & A. R. management should at once awake to the necessity of providing an assistant agent and operator here.

Under the present arrangement the agent has to act as freight, baggage and ticket agent, telegraph operator, messenger, office boy, etc., and has more than he can handle with justice to himself and satisfaction to the public.

It is no unusual thing for merchants and others to have to make two or three trips after a certain lot of freight, to send a telegram or to get information, owing to the agent being absent at meals, or delivering telegrams at points more or less remote from the office.

The popular management of the W. & A. R. have given us a station we are proud of. Will they not give us an efficient office service to keep up the good reputation they have gained with us?

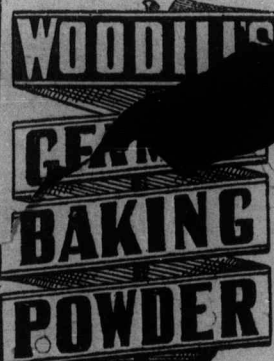
