CLINTON AND VICINITY.
Far Carter Show.—The annual show under the auspices of the F. I. S. Society for the exhibition of fat and other stock, will be held in Clinton, on Wednesday, Dec. 1st, 1875.

RETIRES.—H. Small, Esq., has determined to retire from the honorable, though somewhat onerous position of a town councillor. This step has many friends and supporters will regret to see him leave the position, and has intelligently performed his many and varied duties to their entire satisfaction, which is evidenced by his annual election for the long period twenty-two years without even a dissenting vote.
CHIPPING ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday, while ploughing in Mr. Geo. Fullerton's field near the town, the eldest son of Mr. John Chipping nearly severed his foot, the axe cutting all the cords and bones in the instep. He had so profusely bled, that after receiving medical assistance, he was doing as well as could be expected.
BARROW ESCAPES FROM AN ENRAGED BULL.—On Thursday the 18th ult., Mr. Peter Cole, of Goderich Township, had a terrible encounter with an enraged bull, by which he received several bruises and had one of his thighs penetrated by the horns of the bull. On that day Mr. Cole had constructed a stall for the bull, and after calling his son to assist in putting it in, he attempted to drive the bull towards the stable, and while so doing the bull became refractory and turned on Mr. Cole, who endeavored to escape by running, but the bull was too quick for him and gave him a tremendous blow on the back, following up with a series of pitches and tosses in a similar way to that in which a cow is driven in a pen. After a few minutes of this kind of play, which was witnessed by Mr. Dickson, who was on the road, and running to his assistance, the bull ceased, and Mr. Cole got out of the way of further injury. Medical aid was once obtained and his wounds dressed. The bull was shortly afterwards shot.
LOSS OF SHEEP.—Messrs. Ross & Lee of this town, who have only been engaged in the business during the past season, have gathered and shipped 1500 sheep to the coast.

SHIPMENT OF CATTLE.—On the 18th ult. Messrs. Spooner & Moony shipped 220 young cattle—from two to three years old—via the G. T. Railway. This is the largest drive of cattle ever shipped from this place, and required ten cars to hold them.
BURGLARY.—These items are becoming alarmingly frequent. On Tuesday night of last week, two burglaries were committed, one on the store of Mr. L. Jackson, from which several pairs of boots and rubbers were taken, and the other upon the butcher shop of Messrs. Teweles, from which a quarter of beef was taken. The shop of Mr. Jackson appeared to be first entered, and a pane of glass in the show window, and then the back door was opened. The butcher shop was entered by raising a window.
