"But I do," said Jack, fighting against his anger. "Miss Delman has gone to London on her own business, and beyond giving her a little friendly advice, I have—"

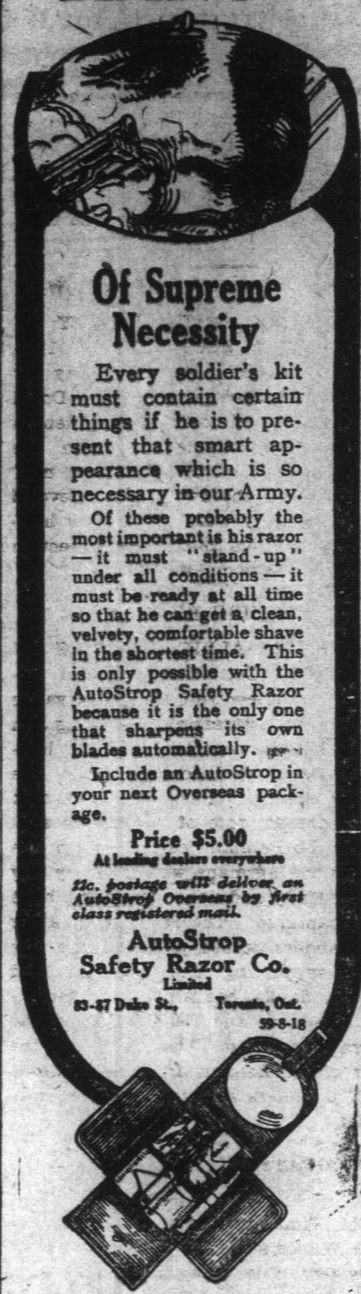
But Fleming would not wait for the conclusion of the sentence.

Belgian King and Queen in German Land

TWO MILE ADVANCE.
LONDON, Oct. 17.—The attack by the British south of La Cateau to-day has resulted in an advance of two miles. The manoeuvre is still progressing.

BEHAVING STRONG REARGUARDS.
WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN THE LILLE SECTOR, Oct. 17.—The Germans in the Lille sector are leaving strong rearguards in selected places in an effort to protect their being comrades. These rearguards have orders to inflict the greatest number of casualties possible. Outstanding tactics are usually sufficient to clear up these strong points. The Germans on evacuating the Channel port and submarine base of Ostend left behind them rearguards all of which were killed or captured. British marshals landed forces in the town of Belgium aviators alighted in the place.

RETIREMENT WELL ORGANIZED.
BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FLANDERS, Oct. 17.—The German retirement appears to be methodical and well organized. How far or how fast is going remains to be seen. The enemy is putting a strong delaying action so as to cover his flank. Belgian and French troops pivoting on Lombartzde early to-day began to push steadily northward toward the Belgian coast. The Belgians in their rapid drive northward in Belgium have captured Ostendes and have passed beyond that town. Belgian infantry is now less than six miles from Ostend. The Belgians are reported to be well west of Thieit and to have reached a point west of Pitthom. Cavalry patrols have pushed far forward in Eeghem district. The Belgians are driving northward for the Ghent canal.

ATTEMPT ON TIZA'S LIFE.
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 17.—As Count Stephen Tiza, the former Hungarian Premier, was leaving the Lower House of Parliament at Budapest, Wednesday, a youth approached motor car with a revolver, according to a despatch received here from the Hungarian capital. Count Tiza's chauffeur struck the would-be assassin down before he was able to fire.

NEW ATTACK ON WIDE FRONT.
WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Oct. 17.—In conjunction with the British First Army, the French attacked this morning over a wide front. The attack is progressing favourably.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Tidal waves, which followed the earthquake in Porto Rico, added to the death toll and devastation, the Am-

erican Red Cross was "advised" to-day in cablegrams from San Juan. The city of Mayaguez, the third largest in the island, practically was destroyed by the rush of water, while the town of Aguadilla was badly damaged. Other towns on the western part of the island were damaged by the earth shocks, and the death list is placed at more than 100 with probably 400 injured. Hundreds of families are homeless, and the property loss is estimated at from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000.

**KING AND QUEEN OF BELGIUM IN
OSTEND.**
PARIS, Oct. 17.—King Albert of Belgium and Queen Elizabeth entered Ostend this afternoon.

BELGIANS REJOICE.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Great excitement was created in Antwerp when President Wilson's reply to the German peace note was received, according to an official despatch to-day from Amsterdam. The Belgian flag was hoisted on a house top in defiance of the Germans, and kept there for an hour. Belgian flags were kept flying all day in villages near Antwerp, Charleroi and Namur.

NEARING BRUGES.
BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN BELGIUM, Oct. 17.—The Allied troops are within five miles of Bruges.

BRITISH ENTER DUAL.
LONDON, Oct. 17.—British troops entered the town of Dual to-day, after overcoming the enemy resistance on the line of the Haute-Deule-Canal, according to the official from the war office to-night. The Fifth British Army have encircled and captured Lille.

BELGIANS IN BRUGES.
WITH THE ALLIED ARMIES IN BELGIUM, Oct. 17.—Belgian patrols have entered Bruges and cavalry is operating on both sides. Belgian guns are now firing from south of the city.

COUTRAI ENTERED.
LONDON, Oct. 17.—British forces entered Courtrai during yesterday's fighting according to a statement issued at the war office to-day. Over twenty villages were captured by the Allied forces in Belgium during the day.

GRAND PRE OCCUPIED.
WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTH WEST OF VERDUN, Oct. 16. (By the A.P.)—The American troops to-day occupied the town of Grand Pre on the north bank of the Alsne River, north of the Argonne forest. Grand Pre is the junction of the railway feeding a great part of the German army and lies at the foot of the

valley extending northward at the entrance of which the Germans have fought so stubbornly. On the western side the French have advanced along the roads making possible a junction of the American first army and the French fourth army.

4,000 GUNS CAPTURED.
PARIS, Oct. 17.—The guns captured from the Germans by the British, French and Americans in the last three months, number 4,600. This represents one-fourth of all their artillery.

**GERMANY'S SURRENDER PRE-
DICTED.**
LONDON, Oct. 17.—Rumors relative to the course Germany may take towards replying to the note from President Wilson, form the main feature of the morning papers. Some are convinced that Germany's unconditional surrender is coming. Although the statement issued at the Foreign Office last night shows that yesterday's rumors were premature, extraordinary reports concerning international conditions in Germany are printed. Some newspapers take it for granted that Emperor William will abdicate. The Express claims to have trustworthy information to the effect that Germany's surrender is imminent, adding, "Information of an astonishing kind has reached England, indicating a desperate political position in Germany. This is even more serious than the military situation, and is responsible for the coming debacle. A great civil upheaval is beginning. The Socialists of Germany, fearing anarchy, are about to act, and desiring to save the country from Russia's experience with the Bolsheviks have prepared a scheme of Government to take the reins if, or when the Kaiser abdicates, in order that it may exercise an immediate, steady influence.

BOUMANIA COMING BACK.
PARIS, Oct. 17.—Outbreaks against the Germans have occurred in Northern Roumania in the province of Modavia, says a despatch to the Journal from Zurich.

MAINTAINING CONTACT.
PARIS, Oct. 17.—On the entire front of the Oise and the Serre where the Germans are being driven from the pocket north of Laon, the French last night maintained contact with the enemy, according to to-day's war office report.

EMPTIED OF CIVILIANS.
WITH THE ALLIED ARMIES IN BELGIUM, Oct. 16. (By the A.P.)—Bruges, Turoing and Roubalx have been emptied of all civilians and the Germans have removed their military establishments from these cities. All submarines have been hastily removed from the U-boat base at Ostend and it would appear from information that German bases all along the Belgian coast are either being moved or are being made ready for instant removal, probably in the rear of the German mine fields in the North Sea.

**DECLINED TO ACCEPT RESIGNA-
TION.**
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 16.—The Austrian Emperor has declined to accept the resignation of the cabinet of Premier Wekerle, according to Budapest advices received here. The Emperor said he had full confidence in the cabinet.

GERMAN REFORMS.
COPENHAGEN, Oct. 16. (By the A.P.)—Germany's Federal Council has accepted the proposed amendment to the constitution article 2 making it read: "The consent of the Federal Council and the Reichstag is required for a declaration of war in the Empire's name except in a case where imperial territory has already been invaded or its coasts attacked. Section five of article two is amended to read: "Treaties of peace and treaties with foreign states which deal with affairs coming under the competence of the imperial law giving bodies require the consent of the Federal Council and the Reichstag.

GERMANS CAUGHT NAPPING.
WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTH EAST OF VERDUN, Oct. 17.—When it was seen last night that the Germans had effected a concentration in the Bertheville Wood for a counter attack on the Cote de Chatilles which the Americans had captured, the American artillery opened up heavily. The pounding resulted in the Germans falling to leave their trench. Rainy weather continues to interfere with the operations on this section.

BRITISH OCCUPY OSTEND.
LONDON, Oct. 17.—Admiral Keyes, of the British Navy, landed at Ostend this afternoon, says an official announcement from the Admiralty. The statement reads: Royal Air Force contingents working with the Naval, landed at Ostend this morning and reported it clear of the enemy. Vice-Admiral Sir Roger Keyes commanded the Dover patrols' force landed at Ostend at 12.35 o'clock this afternoon which is rapidly being

PIRET CAPTURED.
PARIS, Oct. 17.—French forces have entered the city of Piret, in Serbia, according to an official statement issued at the war office to-night. Piret is on the railroad between Nish and Sofia and is twelve miles from the Bulgarian frontier.

BEFORE LILLE-DOUAI RAILWAY.
WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN THE LILLE SECTOR, Oct. 17.—South of the city of Lille to-day the British are before the Lille-Douai railway along almost its entire length and probably have crossed it in the neighbourhood of Oignies about midway between the two cities. Several hours ago they were only a few hundred yards from the northern section of the line east of Harnin.

FREED BELGIUM.
WITH THE ALLIED FORCES IN FLANDERS, Oct. 17.—The Allied infantry in the centre of the advance against the retreating Germans on this front was reported to-day as having re-established contact with the fleeing enemy. It is considered that if the present rate of advance is sustained the Belgian coast should be free of the Germans within a very few days. Many additional prisoners have been captured. The British operating in Flanders whose principal job has been supporting the Belgians and French flanks, has alone captured 4,000 prisoners and 150 guns since the operations began. The roads in the rear of the Belgian army are jammed with prisoners and captured war material.

GRATEFUL TO WILSON.
LONDON, Oct. 16.—The Times commenting on President Wilson's answer to Germany says President Wilson has interpreted with remarkable accuracy the minds of all the Allies and we are grateful to him for his admirable spokesmanship for the common purpose.

NELDR. GASED.
OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—G. W. White, Bay Roberts, Nfld., Canadian infantry, is reported as having been gassed in to-day's casualties.

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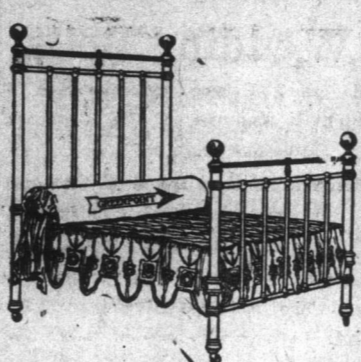
LILLE CAPTURED.
LONDON, Oct. 17. (Reuter's)—The British have captured Lille.

APPEAL FOR HELP.
NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—With more than 100 persons dead and thousands without shelter, food or clothing as a result of the earthquake which shook the entire island last Friday, the Government of Porto Rico to-day appealed to Congress and to the American Red Cross for assistance, in a cablegram received here and forwarded to Washington.

MARCHING ON OSTEND.
LONDON, Oct. 17.—The Belgian forces under command of King Albert, which crossed the Yser River, are marching on Ostend.

FACTORY BLOWN UP.
LYONS, France, Oct. 17.—Fire, followed by an explosion in a munition factory at eleven o'clock last night, caused important material damage. Another and more violent explosion occurred at midnight when the magazines blew up the buildings which were still burning to-day. No lives were lost.

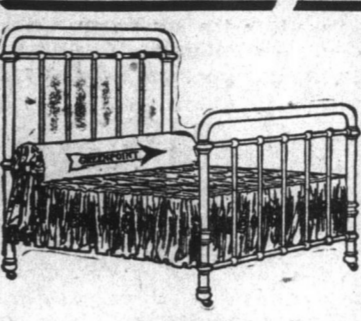

RUTH CAMERON

War is a stimulus, an exaggerator, an intensifier of both good and evil. It intensifies virtues and it intensifies faults. A particularly common example of this latter kind of intensification is the increased activity of the person who is always afraid someone else isn't doing his or her duty. In former times this consciousness concerned itself with all his neighbors' varied obligations, but today it is poured into one channel—the sense of responsibility for his neighbors' relation toward the war.

The natural result of such a concentration of diffused emotion, is to produce a very turbulent force. If the War lasts Much Longer She Will Be Worn Out. I have a neighbor who belongs to this class. If the war lasts much longer I am afraid she will be worn out. Her vicarious conscience keeps her in such a state of moral indignation.

She is continually disturbed about someone who isn't doing his or her duty. For instance, she cannot see how the S-s can bear to spend so much money eating in expensive restaurants at a time like this.

Again, she wonders at Mrs. R—who is not willing to let her son volunteer.

Is He Afraid Mr. M. Is Trying To Escape His Income Tax. And she has the most serious kind of doubts as to whether Mr. M. isn't trying to escape part of his income tax.

Can it be that her circle of friends below the average of patriotism? Or can it be her conceptions of patriotism are exceptionally high?

Not because I have done my neighbor an injustice. I don't think I have. But because I am afraid that those who read will see in my neighbor someone who has criticised them and will feel justified.

No Negotiated Peace.

(From the New York Times.) Some of our readers and good friends have very evidently misunderstood a recent editorial article published in these columns. If there was in that article any warrant for the impression that this newspaper has in the slightest degree changed the attitude it has consistently maintained from the beginning of the war we wish to disclaim absolutely any purpose of that nature; if such an idea did anywhere find lodgment, it should be dismissed forthwith as contrary to every purpose and policy in this war which The Times has sustained and does sustain.

The Times regarded the Austrian proposal as a confession of defeat, we construed it as an offer to surrender. If we erred, it was in putting that construction upon the invitation from Vienna, for that was the foundation of our comment. It is very evident that Washington did not accept that construction, the country does not accept it. This lends confirmation to what we said in the beginning of this article, that the reputations of the Teutonic Powers is so bad that even when they want to surrender the world believes they are shamming. For this they can blame only themselves and they must realize that further humiliations and more explicit terms of surrender will be demanded, with guarantees. Construing the note as a surrender, we entertained the belief that the proposal might be considered, but only on the principle long ago laid down by President Wilson, that the result should make it everlastingly sure "that this agony must not be gone through with again." We declared that was "the foundation principle." The article continued:

A peace that left Germany master of the East would be a crime against ourselves and our posterity. Over the lands of the Near East and the whole of the old Empire of the Czars she can be permitted to have no domination. Control of vast regions where she could renew her now diminished might she must once and for all time renounce. The restorations and reparations to be decreed in the west are equally indispensable, but reiteration has made them familiar. It is in the East that the new danger will arise, there with iron resolution it must be destroyed.

This is the very substance of the conditions reported by The Associated Press to have been "authoritatively" laid down at Washington as preliminary to any discussion. Washington proposes them as conditions to be imposed beforehand, a suggestion which The Times had made in advance of any knowledge of the statement from the National Capital. That we should have been misunderstood in a matter of so great importance is regrettable, and we desire to remove the misunderstanding by the unequivocal declaration of the firm belief we have always held that no peace should be made with our enemies save on the principle laid down by President Wilson. There can be no negotiated peace.

Early Closing.

It is probable that an order will be issued in London providing that during the Winter months all shops shall be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon, with the exception of those which sell food, tobacco, newspapers and the like. Many shops close at ready at 5.30, but the saving of heat and light for an extra hour and a half in respect of thousands of shops is a matter of no small importance in England.

His Editor's Tribute.

(From the Toronto Globe.)

British newspaperdom has furnished the human pages of war's tragedy with one of their most inspiring incidents. One morning, not very many weeks ago, the Managing Editor of a London paper found in the Honor Roll of those killed in action a name he knew. It was that of his former office boy, a lad who had graduated to a junior place on the staff. The following day there appeared as an editorial leader on the Children's Page of the paper the following tribute, penned by the man whom the boy had long looked up to as his chief:

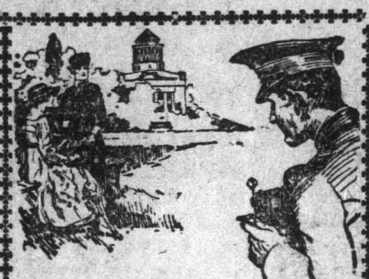
"Humphreys is asleep in France. Most people do not know Humphreys. He was only a boy—the merry boy of the staff. He grew up with it. He was a member of the League of the Helping Hand. He made the world seem bright on its darkest day, for Humphreys knew the Joy of Life."

"He was the very pick of English boys, fearing nothing. He would do anything for anybody, and do it willingly. He would go anywhere at any time, and go cheerfully. He would put a lock on the door, or mend a desk, or look up the population of China, or the distance round the moon, or the greatest depth a submarine can dive, or any of the countless things an editor wants to know at a moment's notice—or he would go to fight a dragon."

"And he did. He called and enlisted one day on his way to the office, quietly and without a word to any human being. It was work for a boy, he thought, and he did it. He was in the trenches for years. He hardly ever had a rest. He was as happy there as anywhere, and everybody loved him. He would write back after a wound and make merry over his piece of iron. He would talk quietly of France, as if he were on a holiday there. But never a word would he grumble. He loved the world, and he loved what- ever he was doing in it. A great English boy was Humphreys."

"And now he is gone—one more on the long, long roll of England's heroes; one more on the long, long road that leads to everlasting life. The life of the earth is poorer, but the memory of Humphreys is something rare and rich."

"Humphreys is gone—but the rest of us must carry on."

The story of the Editor's personally-penned tribute to the "cub" of his staff is told by a colleague in the recent issue of My Magazine, a British publication for young people. It was an editorial which stamped both boy and man as "big."

Poppies and Battlefields.

Apparently there is a strange relation existing between battlefields and wild flowers. Macaulay tells how after the battle of Landon, in the Netherlands, in 1693, between the French army and the British under King William III, where more than 20,000 men were left unburied on the field, the soil broke forth the following year into millions upon millions of scarlet poppies, covering the entire battlefield as if with a vast sheet of rich blood.

An identically similar occurrence is reported to have taken place 120 years later in the same region, when in the summer of the year following the victory of Waterloo the entire battlefield was ablaze with scarlet poppies.

Chilean Won Marathon.

As a result of the recent Olympiad held at Buenos Aires, the Athletic Federation of South America has been formed, with headquarters at Santiago, Chile. The president of the new organization is Leopoldo Falconi and the secretary is Carlos Fanta, both of Santiago. The next Olympiad will be held at Montevideo in April, 1919.

The chief event of the recent Olympiad was the Marathon race in which there were nine entrants from Chile, Uruguay and Argentina. The event, 42,000 metres, was won by Juan Jorquera, a Chilean, in two hours, 23 minutes and 5 3-5 seconds, which is reported as a record. Jorquera is a noted runner and has won many matches in Chile.

On his return from Buenos Aires with the record he was acclaimed throughout the republic and given an ovation equal to that of a national hero.

Kept on Shooting

Commenting on Lloyd George's speech at Neath, G.B., in which he said that there should be "no vengeance" in the final treatment of Germany by the Allies, the London Daily Express says: "We are quite satisfied that there shall be no vengeance—so long as there is a good deal of effective shooting. What Mr. Lloyd George means is that there shall be no vindictive spirit behind our inevitable chastisement of the Hun. Punishment has got to be meted out. We are quite willing that the Allies shall purge themselves of any desire for vengeance so long as the punishment is such that Germany will never again exalt the sword; so long as there is never again a Zabrera; so long as it shall never again be possible for a civilian to find himself hustled off the pavement by his 'superior' fellow being the officer. These are the things that have bred the monster. These are things that must be eradicated, not by vengeance, but by stern, unrelenting justice. If the punishment which is meted out looks like vengeance it will not be our fault. They have asked for it."

Senator Lodge is Disappointed.

Washington, October 13.—Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, republican leader of the Senate, declined to comment on the German reply. In a statement issued when President Wilson sent his communication of inquiry to the German Government, Senator Lodge expressed himself as "keenly disappointed that the President should at this stage enter into a discussion with the Imperial German Government."

Hairy Heroes.

It is one of the peculiarities of modern days that hair is rather at a discount where fighting-men are concerned. However you may have plucked yourself on your flowing locks when you wore civilian garb, you must "get your hair cut" when you join up. Why?

Short hair does not spell courage, for we read in classical history how the three hundred Spartans who held the Pass of Thermopylae, and thus won an immortal fame, were seen combing their long hair, making themselves like "nubs," because they were going to fight to the death against invaders. If the pictures our artists give us of the Vikings are at all like the real thing, those sea warriors wore their hair long also. It is quite certain that the Cavaliers who fought for Charles I. wore abundant locks to distinguish them from the Roundheads of Cromwell, who were well-cropped. Then we know our soldiers came back from the Crimea with beards and long hair, and that they did more than anything else to bring beards again into fashion.

But they, poor fellows, had no option. Probably having scarce a rag to their back, they grew their hair for warmth. However, we may take comfort from the fact that Abasco seems to be the only recorded instance of a soldier dying of long hair.

He drew out a little silver crucifix which he pressed to his lips. Feebly, but clearly, he began: "Hail Mary, full of Grace."

"The Bavarian opened his blue eyes, which were already glazed with approaching death, turned his head toward the Frenchman, and with a look, not of hate, but almost of love, finished in a moment of prayer, 'Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of death.'"

"The eyes of the two men met and they understood. They were two companions in like misfortune desiring to die believing according to their faith. The Frenchman held out his crucifix to the other, who kissed it, and taking him by the hand, said: 'Having served our countries, let us go to God reconciled.'"

Omits Word

"Imperial." In The Channel.

(From the Boston Transcript.)

A radio officer on a transport plying between this side and Great Britain, who has been quoted several times in this column, in speaking of the English Channel as he has frequently seen it, says: "That channel is a desolate looking place. As you go down it you see on all sides the bones of ships, from the majestic liner to the slow going old cargo ship and sailing vessel, from the destroyer to the cruiser. You will see their jumbled masts and rigging protrud-

ing above the surface, all a mockery on man's handwork. In fact, the water is so shallow in places that you would be surprised at the number of ships, part which stick above the surface, part which are sunken. It is a very exciting aerial battle between four British naval seaplanes and German. One of the German crashed into the water and died and the others were driven off. They were trying a raid on the East Coast. We were almost directly underneath them and saw it all."

Forty Years in the Public Service—The Evening Telegram

At the City Hall.

The Municipal Council held its regular weekly session last evening. The Mayor presided and all the members of the Board attended. After the reading of the minutes, etc., the following matters were disposed of:

P. J. Shea wrote complaining of the bad condition of the sidewalk opposite the premises occupied by the Acadia Engine Co. The City Engineer is to report on the condition of this sidewalk for next meeting.

Wood's Candy Store applied for a half inch service from the main on Holdsworth Street, to operate a carbonator. The City Engineer will report fully on this matter.

E. Bowering made application for permission to repair building in Hutchings Lane and also to install machinery for a wood-working factory. After some discussion it was ordered permission could not be allowed.

R. Bowering also asked to be given street line on Waterford Bridge and Topsall Roads. The City Engineer will give the street line and he is also to report on the cost of laying sidewalks in this locality.

G. H. Thomas, Freshwater Road, complained of cattle roaming round that locality and doing damage to the property there. The Impounder will be asked to give attention to this matter.

N. S. Fraser wrote as to the advisability of placing placards on the most used streets to regulate pedestrian traffic. This occasioned much discussion and it was decided the Secretary would write the Inspector General to say the Council endorsed Dr. Fraser's letter, and asking if he would direct the police to give attention to the matter.

Geo. W. B. Ayre requested permission to plant some ornamental trees on the edge of the sidewalk fronting the British Hall; the planting to be subject to the City Engineer. Mr. Ayre will be given all the encouragement possible in his project.

W. & G. Rendell wrote complaining of water in the cellar of the house at the corner of New Gower and Linc Streets. The City Engineer reported this was caused by surface water, and as the lane in the rear of this property is a private one, the matter cannot be remedied by the Council.

The St. John's Gas Company asked permission to open Water Street to overhaul the gas main near Bowering Brothers' premises. They agreed to put the street in good condition after repairs were effected. Request granted.

William White called the attention of the Council to the condition of the street at the junction of Long's Hill and Queen's Road and the necessity of a proper crossing there. A catchpit will be built here in the centre of the street car track to carry off the surface water. The Reid Mfd. Co. will be sent bill of the expenses for this work.

Arthur Ebsary requested permission to erect a plant for the purpose of refining cod oil on the premises next Monroe & Co., Southside. He is to be asked to submit ground plan showing exact location of proposed plant.

J. Cocker applied for permission to install a gasoline tank underneath the footpath opposite his garage on Gower Street. Permission was granted subject to the Inspector General's approval, and an agreement for its removal should it prove to be undesirable.

H. D. Reid submitted plan of a temporary shed east of the Railway Station for the purpose of handling their increased express traffic. The Council were unable to grant this application.

Plan of a small shed on Pleasant Street for Patrick Kelly, passed.

The City Engineer reported on grading at Patrick's St. and Barnes' Road. He also reported on the condition of the Southside Road. Repairs were ordered to be made in accordance with his suggestions, to this locality. He said work on Barter's Hill sewer was completed, a number of gullies required to be cleaned, and the sewer at Brazil's Field was opened during the week and flushed.

The City Engineer also submitted estimate of the cost of work to be done for the Board of Works at the Boulevard, Quidi Vidi Road. The Secretary of the Public Works Dept. will be sent this estimate.

The Health Officer's and Plumbing Inspector's reports for the week were submitted.

After passing the pay rolls and bills and disposing of some other routine business, the meeting adjourned.

CABLE NEWS.

RUN CRUELTY.

LONDON, Oct. 17. (Reuters)—Heart-rending stories of the sufferings experienced by British prisoners during the offensive last spring are recorded by a committee presided over by Mr. Justice Younger. Evidence was collected from seventy prisoners who managed to escape from enemy custody, preferring to run the grave risks attending such attempts to being starved or exposed to British shell fire. The report gives several cases where men were not only forced to work within the firing line but were actually made to serve German guns on pain of summary execution. The prisoners' camps were often located within the firing line, resulting in many being killed or wounded. The men had to wear their wet clothes if rain fell.

The inhumanity to which the men were subjected even at the hands of the doctors is exemplified by the case of a medical man at the Valenciennes hospital. A private suffering from a bullet wound in the lung lay undressed for several days. He was then taken to see a doctor. The man's agony was such that he was compelled to cry out. Whereupon the doctor punched him hard on the jaw and sent him back to the ward. The man returned crying and died next day. The mortality of the Valenciennes hospital was unjustifiably high.

Judicial Inquiry in Railway Accident.

The inquiry was continued yesterday afternoon before Judge Morris, when the following evidence was taken.

Herbert Russell, sworn and examined by Mr. Mews, B.L.—I am Superintendent of the train service with the Reid Newfoundland Company. Reports of accidents with the train on the railway are made to me. The reports are made by the train conductors. The operator at the other end would send notes in answer to questions. This is the message that was received at our office from the operator at the wreck. (Message put in marked "H.R.I.") Message with reference to the injured passengers was received from the conductor. (Message put in marked "H.R.2.") I was not on duty at the office that day. I was on the Trepassey line. I keep a full record of accidents that happen on the railroad. I have to send a report of accidents on the railroad to the Government at the end of every year. We have had accidents or run-offs before. The reports sent to the Government Engineer are full of reports of accidents stating the cause as far as can be ascertained.

Mr. Higgins, K.C., Counsel for the Reid Newfoundland Company, does not cross-examine.

James Dave, sworn. Examined by Mr. Mews, B.L.—I am operator with the Reid Newfoundland Company. I was on the express train which left St. John's on September 24th last. I was on her at the time of the accident. I remember the accident. At the time of the accident I was standing in the baggage car. The baggage car was attached to the second class car and ahead of it—between the tender and the second class car. I was inside the baggage car looking out through the window of the door facing the second class car when the second class car left the track. I saw the second class car bumping over the sleepers. Brakeman Rossiter was standing nearby me at the time. The second class car may have run over three or four ties. As soon as Rossiter saw her running on the sleepers he pulled the emergency brake cord. It would be only a second. I looked through the end door until I lost sight of the car, then I ran to the side door of the baggage car and I saw the second class car sliding down on her side over the embankment. To my knowledge the second class car did not stop until she got down into the dump. I was standing right near Rossiter when he pulled the emergency cord. As soon as he pulled the

That very important unit the field battery, is composed of 195 men, a machine gun battalion of 236, an ambulance company 66, an engineers regiment 1098, and a field hospital 55. A Major-General commands a field army and also an infantry brigade, a Colonel is at the head of each regiment, a Major heads each battalion, a Captain each company, a Lieutenant a platoon, while a Corporal is a squad officer. The Divisions run in numbers from ten thousand to nearly three times this number of men, according to the nationality of the army, the division being a complete army unit, embracing all branches of the service.

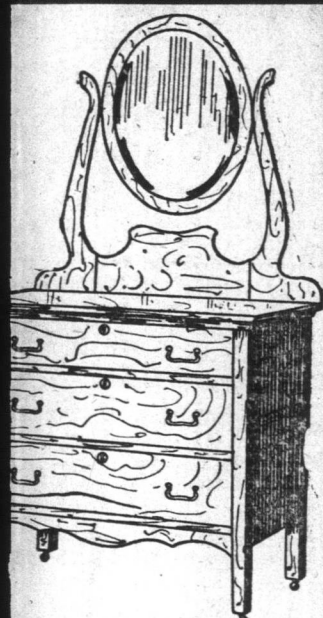

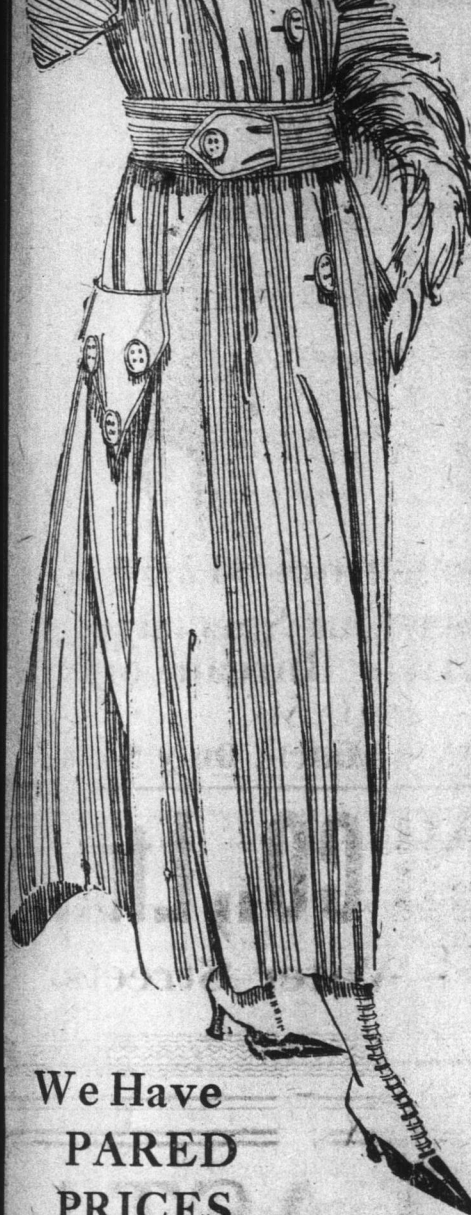

No Compromise.

London, Oct. 13.—The sinking of the steamer Leinster gave a stunning blow to whatever feeling existed in England for a peace of reconciliation. The affair caused more indignation than any submarine exploit since the sinking of the Lusitania. The contrast between Prince Maximilian's benevolent utterances and Germany's day-by-day military and naval policies is the text for most of the newspaper sermons on the situation. Not only the slaughter of women and children on the Leinster and the Hiranu Maru, but the German refusal to exchange prisoners, and the stories coming from the front of the needless devastation of Belgium and Northern France, are working together to put a damper on any sentiment of leniency toward the Central Powers.

It appears plain that the German peace proposals are regarded with more disfavor here to-day than they were a week ago. Even some prominent papers with pacifist leanings are demanding punishment for the violations of civilized warfare as a necessary part of any peace terms. The words expressed by Arthur J. Balfour, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, were symptomatic of the public feeling. Mr. Balfour is usually most scrupulous in his observance of the traditions of diplomacy for polite phrases under all circumstances. The public interprets his remarks as a sign that the Government does not carry any leanings toward a compromise with Germany.

A Great Editor.

(From the New York Times.)
The retirement of Mr. Robert Donald from the editorship of The London Daily Chronicle, which is implied by the sale of the paper to Sir Henry Dalziel, is a loss to journalism and to public life. It is not without interest to America especially, for Mr. Donald as a controller of one of England's great newspapers was a warm and consistent friend of the United States. A stalwart Liberal, he was never afraid to say a good word for his opponents in politics when he thought the occasion warranted it. A whole-hearted supporter of the war, he has on more than one occasion criticized the Government, even criticised his long-time friend, Mr. Lloyd George. Holding strong and steady beliefs, he was the creature of no man and no party. Mr. Donald, who is a Scotsman, began life as a young reporter, made steady headway, and presently as editor of The Municipal Journal in London showed a grasp of public affairs and a capacity in administration which eventually took him to the editorial chair of The Daily Chronicle. He had a wide experience in his younger days, for he served in Edinburgh, London, New York and Paris. For a generation The Daily Chronicle had been a famous property. Under Mr. Donald it has grown still more powerful and respected. His paper was characteristically devoid of flashiness. He never attacked for the sake of attacking, and never took up a cause because it was popular. The consequence was that The Chronicle maintained and extended its influence as a sane, practical, and far-seeing Liberal journal. He had as his friends philosophers, statesmen, famous authors, and the captains of industry. It is safe to say that no British editor in recent times had so wide a range of respect from leaders in the various fields of thought and action.

Irish Roused.

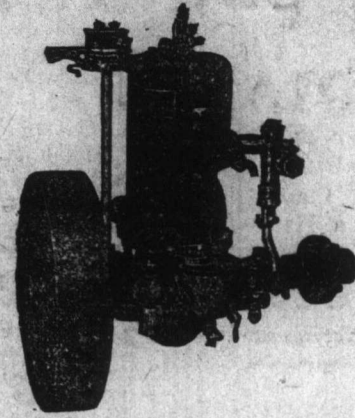
London, Oct. 13.—(British Wireless Service)—Dublin is in deep mourning for the victims of the torpedoed Irish mail boat Leinster and flags are at half-mast everywhere. The mortuaries both at Dublin and Kingstown are crowded with dead, while in the hospitals there is barely room for the injured.

Vessels bound in through the channel report having sighted man-of-war amid floating wreckage. These are being brought in by Admiralty drifters.

The Nationalist papers express their abhorrence of the deed in the strongest language. "Any nation," says the Independent, "which condones the perpetration of a crime so cruel puts itself outside the pale of civilization. Indignation at the enemy's act should powerfully stimulate recruiting throughout the country. The impulse to exact retribution for the murders of the helpless passengers and crew of the Leinster will not, we believe, exhaust itself in idle denunciation of a crime so horrible."

The Freeman's Journal declares that "the hideous facility of these atrocities is enough to make the blood of even the coldest boil, and the deliberate fashion in which it was planned and executed will rouse against the perpetrators the indignation not only of the Irish people, but of the whole world."
