

Inquiries show, however, that it has been common knowledge in the petrol trade for a long time that a "cut" was to be made at the end of the present

Opinions differ as to the amount of effect that it will be as much as 8d. a gallon, which would mean an annual saving to motorists of something between £20,000,000 and £25,000,000. "There is no doubt," said one big

garage owner, "that a substantial decrease in prices for what may be called the standard oils is long overdue. "There is a great surplus of petrol in America, and not only its initial cost, but the cost of freightage has

been reduced. "I am not alone in believing, too, that the hands of the combine companies are being forced by the noncombine firms, who are importing and selling spirit at 1s. 5d. a gallon, as against the trust's 1s. 11d.

#### Advice Required

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir.—Can any person in auhority give us some definite information regarding the somewhat alarming outbreak of "Summer Complaint," which has occasioned much suffering amongst us during the past weeks? Several reasons have been advanced for this epidemic e.g. the Water Supply, Milk and New Vegetables. A chemical or bacteriological analysis of the water and milk would determine if it is necessary to boil or otherwise purify these supplies before using. It seems unlikely that the new vegetables are entirely to blame, as the outbreak appears to be confined principally to the city. Some guidance and advice from the Public Health Department of the Medical Profess would be greatly appreciated and ould, I feel sure, have a marked efect on the health of the community.
