Charron, who was the only witless to be heard until the case, adjourned until Tuesday, is resumed, seemed much affected and his voice was trembling when he told of the violent happening in the North country village. The spectators, most of them weather-beaten woods men, wearing mackinaw coats and high boots with the trousers tucked in, squeezed in everywhere so much that the prisoners were hidden from the judge's view on two occasions, and he preemptorily ordered the clerk of the court to point them out

The McGuire brothers, stocky and clean shaven, and tanned from outdoor life, appeared to be very calm and collected and laughed several times when the Magistrate seemed uneasy as to their whereabouts.

Charron, after placing his bearskin cap beside him, swore the oath and proceeded to tell what occurred, questioned by T. P. Phillippe Brais of Montreal, who is appearing as crown prosecutor, together with Ernest Hebert, of this town. Between 9 and 10 o'clock Friday night, said the witness, he was sitting in Tyhurst's private office. The latter was seated before his desk, his head and bust clearly silhouetted against the window which faces the lane Charron was sitting opposite, and was about to leave for his night's rest in another room of the house. 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



The letter has caused a stir, because of its personal attack on the President, who is accused of failing to fulfil his oath of office and to enforce the law against drinking. It requests the President to divorce the administration of the prohibition law from the authority of Mr. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury, to whom it

alludes as the "ex-distiller." Broadly speaking, the United Committee declares that prohibition, because of its non-enforcement, has brought about little improvement as regards crime and drunkenness of the conditions prevailing under the old licensing system. It describes the country as "being debauched with a flood of poisonous liquor smuggled over the border and over the water, or manufactured by brewers under Federal permits, or in countless barns, cellars and garrets."



"This being so, no one in this counry desires in practice any change in the direction of republicanism. There would be no advantage in substituting election for heredity in the choice of a man whose duty is to represent the dignity rather than the power of the State; and there would be plain dis-

"It would, to say the least, be difficult to discover by means of a popular vote any great figure-head who would understand the obligations and limitations of his office so well as they have been understood, in precept and practice alike, by Queen Victoria and her descendants. Our hereditary monarchs are trained from childhood to appreciate not only the broad duties but the subtleties of the great office which in due course they are to fill.

"There is no danger of any of them attempting to usurp functions which in a democratic country cannot belong o the Head of the State. They are able, moreover, to win the personal respect and affection of their subjects, wholly irrespective of party sentinent, as no President ever could uness he had no 'past'-and if he had

"And this consideration is of quite that great agglomeration of nations which makes up the British Empire. It is necessary not only that the official head of such an agglomeration should enjoy the confidence and respect of his subjects, but that his office should be invested with the greatst possible glamour and prestigesuch as cannot be won by 'elected

"The British Monarchy is essentially an empirical device, and as such it works admirably. It embodies the principle of 'dignity without power' nore successfully than any other derice that has ever been proposed.

"All hereditary offices, of course, involve certain drawbacks. We cannot be perfectly sure that all the future descendants of King George V will recognize the essential conditions of their constitutional tenure as clearly as he and his immediate predecessors have understood them. But we can see no present ground for alarm on

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

Vanishing Sea Beaches

SHORES CLEARED OF SAND AND

BLAMING OUR MILDER WINTERS A mystery of the sea, hitherto batfling all attempts at solution, is enand engineers.

Hundreds of millions of tons of shingle and sand have disappeared from the coast of England-no one knows where: no one knows why. It is the coast from the Bristol Channel round the Lizard to St. Margaret's Bay, in the east of Kent, that is

At Sidmouth, Devon, practically all foreshore, leaving the town defenceless against the assaults of the sea; at Lyme Regis, Dorset, the cliffs are crumbling and the promenade collapsing; and at Swanage, Dorset, the bay has been robbed of great quantities of its wonderful sand. What has been said of these places applies to nearly every coast town 'from Minehead, in Somerset, to Dover. 20 Years' Record

These are the facts, as ascertained by Mr. Ernest Latham, an authority on coast erosion, whose advice is being sought by many of the local authorities in the threatened area. Mr. Latham states that he has discovered that during the last 20 years the foreshore from Somerset down the coast of Cornwall and up the English Channel to Kent has disappeared to a depth of from 2ft. to 20ft.

It has been suggested that the southern portion of England is tilting or gradually subsiding, but Mr. Latham does not support this theory. He has discovered that high-water mark is to-day no nearer the top of sea walls or groynes than it was 20 years ago the difference is that there is more water hammering at the cliffs and defences, the "bottom" being so much lower down. Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir.-Permit me to reply to he "Workingman" who wrote in Saturday's Telegram, from Grand Falls. Ordinarily I take no notice of a man who will anonymously attack another, But I desire to dispel the illusions which "Workingman" perhaps was the cause of creating in some people's

In the first issue of my paper, I printed special messages of greeting from the Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay Mac-Donald, Hon. William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor; Mr. Tom Moore, President of the Trades' and Labor Congress of Canada; and His Excellency, General P. E. Calles, Labor President of Mexico.

"Workingman" seeks to maintain that President Calles is a Bolshevik or Communist. Under his government says "Workingman," things have been done as bad as in Soviet Russia. Premier under President Obregon, ran for President last summer under the banner of the Partido Laborista Mexicana (Mexican Labor Party), and with the endorsation of President Obregon. He was opposed by de la Heurta, and by a candidate of the Communist (Bolshevik) party. He was elected by 1,700,000 votes out of 2,-000,000 cast. It was the first regular election for many years in Mexico. Present at his inauguration in Mexico City last November were retiring President Obregon, who formally welcomed him; official representatives of the American and other Governments; the late Samuel Gompers, President of the A.F. of L., who was America's outstanding opponent of Communism. Just before being installed in office, President-elect Calles visited the United States and was escorted into New

York harbor on a battleship, placed at his disposal by the U.S. Navy. He was formally welcomed by representatives sent by President Coolidge, Governor Al Smith and Mayor John F. Hylan. When President elect Calles visited America he was jeered and insulted by the Communists and Reds there. President Calles is no more a Bolshevik or Red than are Mr. Baldwin or President Coolidge. I admit readily that President Calles has been and

ed his policy too far. He has reduced the standing army. with police headquarters. He has cut expenditure in two. He has stiffened discipline in the public services. He has given vast encouragement and help to education (he is an ex-teacher). He has greatly helped the farmers. These things are in his favor. It is a pity that he should spoil his good work by harsh treat-

ment of the Churches. I interviewed President-elect Calles in New York last fall. I grew to admire the sturdy determination and efficiency of this ex-Machinest, Teacher, Governor, Premier. With all his defects he is a sincere man. And he is Mexican Labor's favourite.

ASH Wins Remarkable Brake Test in Toledo



"Primarily, perhaps, it is due to the fact that ever since States began they have been in peril, and have trusted to force for their safety.

"With war and preparation for war have gone the strategems of diplomacy, the dropping of the ordinary code of morals, a holiday for truth, nd an aftermath of cynicism.


