They propose to offer land to the men who will agree to stay at home. Meetings of land-holders have been recently held, in order to consider the condition of the labouring class, and appeals have been made to the Government for the adoption of measures to facilitate the aquisition of small holdings. It was argued, with much force, that if the Germany peasant could obtain his plot of ground, he would not only become a permanent resident, but would also be the foe of the International Society—an organization which has awakened more apprehension in Germany than in any other country in Europe—and such cogent reasons as these are likely to produce the desired effect.
