### Town and County News.

The *Elora News* says that Miss Robb, daughter of Mr. S. Robb, Pilkington, was thrown out of a sleigh on Wednesday, falling on the shoulder and breaking her collar bone. Dr. Savage is attending the sufferer.

We regret to announce this week the death of Mr. R. C. Newman, well and favorably known in Elora, where he carried on the business of a druggist for many years. He died in Toronto on the 9th inst., aged 54 years.

**Y.M.C.A.** The weekly meeting was held in the rooms last evening, the President, Dr. McGuire, in the chair. After devotion, proposing new members, and the usual routine, it was resolved to appoint delegates to co-operate with the Good Templars at their meeting in the interest of prohibition, to be held on Tuesday, 18th inst. Collecting committees were appointed for each ward. Mr. Hall then read an essay on "Christianity versus Infidelity," which was not only ably and instructively written, but showed on the part of the writer an amount of experience and a warmth of love for Christ that were of themselves proof of his arguments, showing that Christianity alone can do what Infidelity cannot, viz: "elevate and ennoble mankind."

**THE FAIRBAIN CONCERT.**—Last night the Fairbain Family gave a concert in the Town Hall. The audience was not as large as might have been expected, nor as it ought to have been, considering the character of the entertainment. **Wellington Spring Assizes.**  
March 14, 1873.

The Spring Assizes for the County of Wellington opened to-day, at 1 o'clock, Mr. Justice Gwynne presiding. Mr. John McKeown acted as Crown prosecutor. The Bar was well represented, the local members and those from a distance being in full force. The Grand and Petit Juries were empanelled, and the business proceeded with.

His Lordship, in addressing the Jury, said that he had great pleasure in informing them that there was almost nothing to come before them. There was the case of a man who was charged with having committed a common assault in his own family, but who was supposed to be insane. If he really was insane he will require to be sent to an asylum.

The other case is one of a much more serious nature, and offences of this description, he was sorry to say, were becoming too common occurrence. Rape was a crime that must be put down by the strong arm of the law; woman's chastity must be kept sacred. The person upon whom the rape was said to have been committed, is a respectable married woman, and the perpetrators of such diabolical crimes must be characterised as ruffians. If capital punishment were the result of such crimes, there would, in all probability, be fewer of them. The prosecutor, through indisposition, could not attend the Court, and the case might not come before them. He hoped to be able to dispense with their services early in the coming week.

**Local and Other Items.**  
A TELEGRAM from Chicago, says:—A Pullman Palace Car on the Chicago & Lake Michigan Railway, was burned at four o'clock Wednesday morning, two miles north of Poland, Michigan. The car was full of passengers, who barely escaped with their lives, losing baggage and some clothing. The loss is estimated at \$30,000. The origin of the fire is unknown.

**SUDEN DEATH.**—Early on Monday morning last the wife of Mr. Samuel Heath, of this town, died very suddenly, in consequence of which it was deemed necessary by Coroner Cook to hold an inquest on the body, which resulted in the following verdict:—"It is the opinion of the Jury by the evidence given in the case of Amy Heath, that she died from the effects of over excitement."

One of the Jury disagreed from the above verdict. *Paris Star.*

**CATTLE FAIR.**—The Waterloo *Chronicle* says that the fair last Tuesday was quite successful. Over a hundred cattle were brought out, and a good many were in pretty good condition. Prices too, ranged higher than last time, from 1 cent to 41 cents being freely paid. The latter figure was given in several cases for cattle fit to kill. Crowds of people were in town, and business men looked animated and true was bright. We anticipate a capital Easter Fair.

**FATAL ACCIDENT.**—A sad, and fatal accident took place in Paris last week, Joseph Qualtrough, son of an eminent clergyman in the Isle of Man, landed in Canada about a year ago with the intention of learning the system of Canadian farming. He engaged with Mr. John Wallace, and after fulfilling his terms, he visited his brother in Paris, intending to remain with him a few weeks and then return home. In attempting to part a yoke of oxen, his hand caught in the chain and was horribly torn. After a few days of intense suffering, lock jaw set in, which resulted in his death. The deceased was much respected and is deeply lamented.

## Social and Concert.

The social and concert, given by the Independent Order of Good Templars, came off in the Good Templars Hall here, on Thursday evening. The attendance was very much larger than expected, the hall being crowded to its utmost capacity. Tea was served from six to eight o'clock, and judging from the tenor of the audience during the remainder of the evening, was first-class.

The programme for the concert was opened by Lawrence's Silver Cornet Band, playing a Quickstep in a manner which elicited applause. Zulo Zong, by Misses Smart and Harris, of Elora, was excellently rendered, and was encored to the echo. Misses Wheatley and Oldham sang the duet, "What are the Wild Waves Saying," very sweetly and correctly. It was appreciated by the audience. "Come Birdie, Come," by Nellie Foster, a little girl of six or seven summers, completely electrified the audience, and the encore was the most hearty to which we have listened. No affection, perfectly natural, and the sweet and innocent voice, bird-like, charming all within its compass; no wonder the audience felt happy.

The Guelph Novelty Band was a novelty indeed, and fairly brought down the house. Exquisite music was played upon two tin whistles, a mouth organ, and Mr. Smith "assisting" with a pair of bellows, a spoon, a pipe and a glass of water, varying the exercise with "the bones." It was really a treat to hear them perform, and was a happy hit in the programme. It was really worth the admission price to hear the Novelty Band play.

The instrumental music given by Miss Carrie Campbell received, as it deserved, an encore.

The dialogue, "Before and behind the Scenes," by members, was very well given. Messrs Reid and Hutton sang a couple of good songs. Mr. Charles Maddock gave Mrs. Caudie's "Wedding Dinner," and Mr. Walter Maldoock, "The Begone."

The piano used on the occasion was a splendid instrument, kindly loaned for the occasion by Mr. Rainer.

**The Agricultural Farm Debate.**  
From the London Advertiser of the 13th.

A lively debate took place last night in the Ontario Legislature on the Government's solutions to abandon the Mimico site and to locate the Model Farm and Agricultural College at Guelph. The discussion continued till 12:35 this a. m. The Government resolutions were finally sustained, though by a smaller majority than on any other question this session.

There are several reasons for this result. Toronto influence desired to have the institution as near the city as possible; the Opposition members resisted the proposed change because it selected on the wisdom of the Patent Combination; their some persons are peculiarly sensitive about interfering with what has been once done, whether right or wrong; and another class are indifferent, if not hostile, to the proposed farm and college. These reasons are quite sufficient to account for the vote of last night.

With regard to the merits of the question, we heartily commend the course of the Government. Ministers never did an act more certain to bring them credit when the present breeze has passed by. There can be no question of the superiority of Guelph over the wretched plot for some inscrutable reason selected at Mimico. If we are to have a Model Farm and Agricultural College at all, we want a good location and first-class land, and nowhere can these be better obtained than at Guelph. It may suit the howling derelicts of the Bykerk-Lauder school to fancy facts and deal in insinuations; but no Government ever took ground so defensible, or acted from a sincerer desire to do their duty to the whole Province, than did the Reform Government of Ontario in the resolutions which last night passed regarding the Model Farm and Agricultural College.

**The Health Inspector.**  
An efficient Health Inspector, in the person of Mr. John Stephens, has been appointed for the town. He is determined, without fear, favor or affection, to strictly enforce the sanitary regulations. Those who wish to avoid the consequences of being found napping, will find it to their advantage to secure the services of a member of the Ho Boy Brigade before the Inspector commences duty. The warning note has been sounded, and the more thoughtful will heed it without further delay. Cleanliness is next to godliness.

**ATTEMPT AT INCENDIARISM BY A PRISONER IN HIS CELL.**—On Thursday morning about three o'clock the fire alarm was given and the fire turned out to be in the Firemen's Hall, Petrolia, in the rear of which are two or three cells, one of them being occupied by a man who was arrested for being drunk and disorderly. The prisoner, in order to make his escape, cut small shavings off his bench, dropped them down between the cracks of the wall and then set fire to them. It appears he failed in this attempt, when he resorted to another mode, namely, the cutting of a hole in the double pine wall. He got it cut about half way through and then piled the shavings back where they came from, and set fire to them. Again he managed he get the fire pretty well started, and, finding it too hot for him, gave the alarm. Fortunately the night-watchman of the G.W.R. heard his cries and proceeded at once to the police and gave them the alarm, thereby saving the man's life and valuable property. The fire engine was on the spot and quickly quenched the fire.

### The Gladstone Administration

#### The Press on the Situation.

#### Conservatives Unwilling to Accept Responsibility.

London, March 13.—The London journals of this morning comment at great length on the defeat of the Government, on the Irish University Education Bill, and speculate upon the course Gladstone will pursue.

The *Times* says: The Cabinet will probably resign to-day, and Disraeli will be called by Her Majesty to form a new ministry; in which event Parliament will be dissolved and general elections ordered.

The *Post* says the Government has not determined whether it will resign or dissolve the Parliament. The appeal to the country on the vote on Gladstone was a great surprise to the cabinet and liberal members of the House of Commons. The latter are desirous of upholding the Ministry by a vote of confidence. The Conservatives are unwilling to accept the responsibility of a dissolution of Parliament. The session of the House of Commons is looked forward to with great anxiety. Gladstone will then announce the course decided upon by the Ministry.

New York, March 14.—A special from Paris says that President Thiers sent a note to Berlin, through Count Von Arnim. In it the French Government proposes to complete the payment of first half of the fourth milliard by the end of April and the second half by the end of July, to further pay two hundred and fifty millions and give financial guarantees for the balance. The final evacuation of French Territory to begin on the first of September.

San Francisco, March 13.—A despatch from the front says the Morozos had not been seen, and there were no hopes that they would come into the camp. Gen. Canby's troops are moving, and the belief is general that a fight will soon take place, although there is

Defeat and Resignation of the Gladstone Ministry.

The people of the Dominion have been surprised to learn of the defeat and resignation of the Gladstone Ministry. The government bill, proposing radical changes in the organization of the University in Dublin, seems to have been a very unpopular measure, and Protestants and Catholics alike condemned it.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

March 13. Mr. Cauchon presented a petition from Col. Guy against Chief Justice Duval, of Quebec, calling for his removal from the Bench.

Several petitions were presented for the Prohibition Liquor Law. From Mr. Blake rose to call the attention of the House, as a matter of privilege, to the South Renfrew election case. He reminded the House that the position taken by the gentlemen on his side of the house was that the House should not be made the theatre for the investigation of disputed facts, and he did not intend to depart from that position in this case.

Mr. J. H. Cameron all the terms of the petition made it such that it ought to be tried under the controverted election law, and the returning officer was entitled under that law to be present at the sitting of the Committee for the trying of such cases, and have his objections to the result of that committee made known.

Mr. John A. Macdonald argued that if the petition was received contrary to law the House would at once refuse it. It was of great importance that the petition should be received in due time.

Mr. J. H. Cameron moved that the petition be referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections, with instructions to report their opinions thereon, and the evidence taken by them.

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there was very little work and that of no great importance in the Executive Council Office.

After some further discussion that and other items passed, and the Committee rose.

Mr. Hodgins moved the third reading of Bill to amend the several Acts relating to the Credit Valley Railway.

Mr. Boulbee strongly opposed the confirmation of the Peel By-law, which he claimed had been obtained by fraud.

Attorney-General Mowat said he did not hesitate to say as head of the Government that he strongly disapproved of this species of legislation, and in future, he was prepared to state, he would set his face against it; but he did not think it was right to lay down such a rule arbitrarily during the present session, seeing that much legislation of this kind had taken place, and no notice had been given that it would be stopped upon general principle.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

The Cloven Foot.

The Manitoba Free Press of the 22nd February says that Attorney-General Clarke made his debut in Manitoba "breathing out threatenings and slaughter" against all principles of right and justice, and therefore, attained a celebrity little less enviable than the most superlatively despised man that ever trod God's footstool.

On Tuesday last, in the House, Attorney-General Clarke said, in effect - "Keeping men imprisoned for months, on the verge of starvation, with handcuffs literally freezing into the flesh, for no offence but loyalty; and substituting a rebel flag for the British flag in '69-70, were justifiable." He also said, in substance, that the treason of Scott was a "black blot."

Herein was the cloven foot made visible, which re-awakens the country to the real character of the man, undermentioned. It reminds the people that Attorney-General Clarke is the same individual—void of honor, and lost to the slightest appreciation of the principles of morality—as when he first came into the Province, warm from the hands of Sir George E. Cartier, the special agent to the bidding of the perpetrators of the cruel and bloody outrages, which even to this day, he has the hardihood to stand up in Parliament and extenuate, justify and applaud.
