This is all on what is known as the burnt district, very few having yet ventured into the bush, it being so much more difficult to clear up but when cleared it will doubtless give far the best return. Now I think that any person who is desirous of obtaining land and wishes to remain on British soil could do worse than turn his attention to Manitoulin Island. Good land can easily be obtained, also steady employment and good wages during the winter months from the lumbering companies. The climate in summer is cool and pleasant and in winter not much colder than Bruce and Grey. The Island is an excellent place to spend a few weeks in summer in recruiting health and energy.

During His Excellency's absence from Ottawa, the Rideau Hall has been renovated and improved. The improvements consist of a curling and skating rink, a conservatory on the new plan, a telegraph office affording connection with the several lines.

Mary Ellis, the Toronto shoplifter, has made a bold escape from custody of the Toronto police, by jumping out of a window on Adelaide street, twenty feet from the ground. A confederate was below with a buggy, who handed her in and the two made good their escape.

The Whitty magistrates have been investigating a local scandal which has caused much sensation in the town. A Mr. Robt. Campbell accused his wife of infidelity, and turned her out of the house, together with her mother and visitor. She was lying dressed on the bed at the time, and resisted. He pulled her off, and forcibly ejected her from the house. She brought an action against him, and on Tuesday the judgment of the court was given, (Mr. W'cox dissenting) sentencing the case for trial—defendant to enter into his own recognizance—\$200, and two sureties in \$100 each.

Groups of Counties have been designated by Order in Council as flour inspection districts under the provisions of the Act 36 Vict. cap. 49. The 7th of these districts is composed of the counties of Wellington and Waterloo. At the Examiners' meeting held in Montreal this last week the following standard of flour were selected and approved viz.:—Superior extra, extra spring, extra superfine fine middlings, pollards, and strong bakers'. It was decided to purchase five barrels of each brand, and to recommend to the Government that half a barrel of each be forwarded for the use of the examiners and inspectors of each Board of Trade mentioned in the Act.

Why Boys Hate Farming.—A gentleman who understands what he is talking about, tells, in the Vermont Farmer, why farming is not very pleasant to boys. He says among other things: "Boys generally have poorer tools to work with—we do not take pains enough to furnish them with those that are suited to their age and strength. They have to use a worn out scythe, a clumsy fork, a hoe that has been thrown by as unfit for use, and then are often censured because they have not done more work. And then with chores in the house, as well as out of doors, they usually work more hours than the men, while they should not work as many. They are often sent to do disagreeable jobs alone, picking up stones, clearing the fields of brush and picking up stones, or pulling weeds among the potatoes. All this is necessary to be done, but we should work with them. Boys like company, and if we send them to do this work when we go to the village, it will create in them a dislike for the work. We give them too few play days. Their very natures demand an occasional release from work and a day for enjoyment in their own way, even though it will be harder for them than work. There must be relaxation for them other than we give them."

Flora Mechanics' Institute.

The annual meeting was held last week, Dr. Pentland, the President, in the chair. The by-laws were amended to admit persons under 18 years of age as junior members in certain circumstances.

The election of officers for the incoming year resulted as follows:—President—D. Boyle; Vice-Presidents—First, John McDonald; second, Rev. C. E. Thomson; Secretary and Librarian—R. Mitchell; Treasurer—J. Godfrey; Committee—E. H. Newman, H. Clarke, J. H. Kenning, W. R. Pentland, M. Deane, J. Smith, W. Snyder, J. Chambers, W. Crackle, M. O. Macgregor; Auditors—W. T. Smith, T. Connon.

The following resolution was also passed:—"That the Committee be authorized to open a reading room provided that 50 subscribers be obtained therefor, at \$1 each if members of the Institute, or \$1.50 if for the reading room only."

The library now comprises 1,400 volumes. 879 of these have been added by purchase and donation during the year. There have been over 2,000 volumes taken out of the library during the year. The lectures last winter were not appreciated, neither were they successful in organizing classes. Owing to a desire to obtain from Government as large a grant as possible, the Institute spent more for books than their resources allowed, and are behind in making up the Librarian's salary.

There are now on the roll 134 names, of these 4 have never taken out any books and 4 or 5 more have only taken out very few, which will make the number of regular readers 125, giving an average for the year of 19 volumes to each of those 125. The kind of books most called for is light reading, but the desire seems to be growing for works of a more substantial character.

The Treasurer's book showed the total receipts of the year to be \$555.65, in addition to \$10.08 on hand from the previous year; and the payments \$541.01, leaving a balance on hand of \$21.72. But there are liabilities amounting to \$46.70, making a deficit of \$24.98.
