The Teachers Turned Down a Somewhat Extreme Resolution.

WILL NOT BAR OUT HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY

The Close of a Very Successful Educational Convention.

The first annual meeting of the Alberta Educational Association is now a thing of the past, but its influence will be indelibly stamped on the educational history of the province.

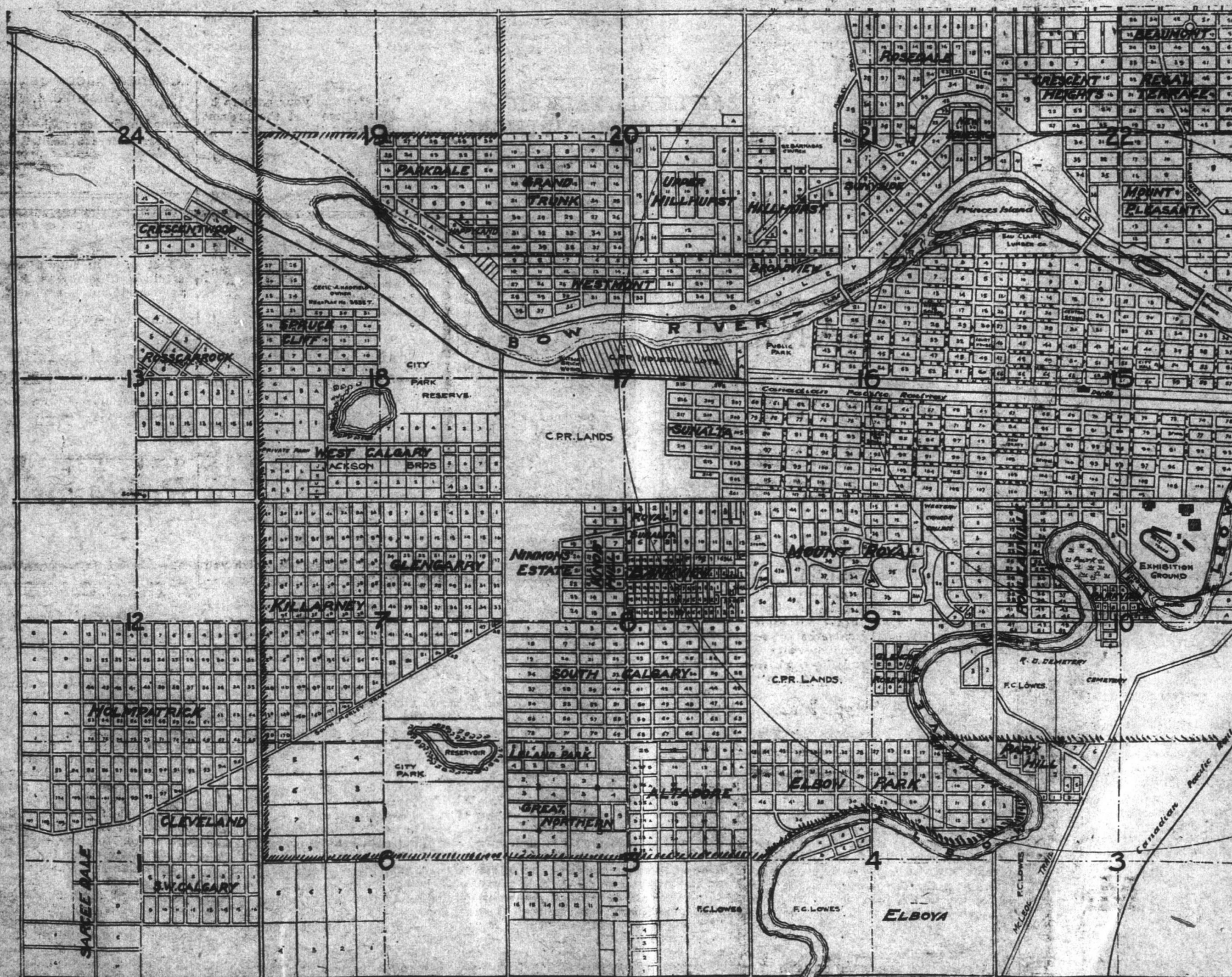

CITY CLERK GILLIS HELD BACK MAP FROM CITY COUNCIL

(Continued from page 1.) "We want to see the plans of that railway," chimed the meek and lowly in-mission. "Yes, I believe that there are some plans. I saw them two days ago, I think it was two days ago. I cannot say why the city clerk held the map and plans and did not place them before the council on Tuesday night."

The Public Wants to Know. But it will take more than these explanations to satisfy the outside public and the members of the council. The council has been absolutely ignored in a very autocratic manner by the city clerk lately and this third offence, even if otherwise regular, is very much like rubbing it in. Placing the best construction upon his conduct, the aldermen say that the reason that the plans were sent to the city was in order to get the opinion of the members of the council upon them and to invite any suggestions.

It will be seen by the following interviews that they are all pretty much of one mind. The interview: Commissioner Clark-What I want to know is why these plans were not shown to us first. A newspaper man tipped it off to us that they were in the office of the city clerk. We did not know it before that. Hadn't heard a word about it. They got to show me why, the idea of this information being given to real estate men and held back from the commissioners is the limit and this sort of thing has got to stop. Those plans should have been laid before the council on Tuesday night. There is no authority for keeping them back. It is rotten business, and we are going to have an explanation and a good one. Commissioner Graves-There certainly is something wrong with this. We received our first intimation that the plans were here from a reporter. We have got to have some explanation for this. The plans should have come to us as soon as received by Gillis. He had no authority to hold them. Alderman C. T. Jones-I am chairman of the railway committee of the council, and I should have seen that plan in the first place. It should have been placed before the council on Tuesday night. It belongs to the city and not to Mr. Gillis. He had no business to hold it. Under clause C. of the 36 of the acts of Alberta of 1908 it is especially provided that all matters appertaining to new industries and railways shall remain solely vested in the powers of the city council. There surely is an explanation coming, and I am afraid the subject will require some very lucid explanations.
