





COST OF ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS TWO SETS OF TENDERS.

Who Will Compete?-Alleged Combin Setween Two Companies-Street Railway Company Expected to Enter the Field-Animated Discussion Yesterday

ing of the Fire and Light Committee The other members present were Ald. Bailey, Murray, Foster, Hubbard and McMurrich. The Chairman said the council had sent back for recommendation the reports re the co t of constructing and maintaining a mulcipal electric lighting plant, and had also referred to the committee a motion of Ald. McMurrich calling for tenders for electric lighting. lectric lighting.

It was agreed that the latter be first condered.

Whereas the city is paying under the existing contract for electric lighting an amount much in excess of what other citles are paying, and whereas from the report of the City Engineer and whereas from the report of the City Engineer and the secretary of the fire and light department, showing the cost of operating (including interest and cost of plant) is much below the rate charged under the existing contract;

Be it therefore resolved that this council call for tenders forthwith to supply the elty with from 1300 to 1500 electric lights at a price per light per annum for the term of five years from the expiration of the present contract, and in the sevent of the rejection of all tenders then the council do proceed forthwith to submit a bylaw to the ratepayers for the purpose of issuing deneutures to provide funds for the purchase of the necessary plant to provide the city with the above number of lights.

poles." In the event of the city undertaking

The Chairman's Retort, Ald. Stewart: We are not here to consider the interests of the Toronto Electric Light Company, or any other company. We are here in the interests of the ratepayers to make the best bargain we can for the city. We don't want to consider them any more than you, Ald. McMurrich, would consider us in making a bargain.

Ald. McMurrich: Nor more than the Toronto Street Railway Company, which we are encouraging to contract.

The Chairmar: You want to creats a monopoly. It should be open competition—the Street Railway Company, or any company.

This would show the committee had done something arising out of the two reports.

Ald. Hubbard was in favor of adopting the Engineer's report and calling for tenders for electric lighting only. This would be a simpler issue for the ratepayers, to whom the
