#### Co-Operative Experiments ın Weed Eradication, 1916.

During the past, four years the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union have carried on co-oper ative experiments in the eradication of weeds. Some fifty eight farmers have taken part in these experiments and some very interesting and valuable results have been obtained. The weeds experimented with were Per ennial Sow Thistle, Twitch Grass, Bladder Campion, Wild Mustard and Ox eye Daisy. The results obtained may be summarized as fortows:

That good cultivation, follow ed by rape sown in drills, provides a means of eradicating both Peren nial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass 2. That rape is a more satisfactory grou to use in the destruction of

Twitch Grass than buckwheat That rape gives much better results in the eradication of Grass and Perennial Sow Thistle when sown in drills and cultivated than it does when sown broadcast. 4. That thorough, deen cultiv-

ation; in fall and spring, followed by a well cared for hoed crop, will destroy Bladder Campion.

5. That mustard may be prevented from seeding in oats, wheat and barley by spraying with a twenty percent solution of iron sulphate without any serious injury to the standing crop or to the fresh seedings of clover.

Those who took part in these experiments profited by the experience; although these figures chiefly repre-sent wheat. The present rate of ed the field experimented upon, demonstrated to their own satisfaction the effectiveness of the method this rate it would require nearly 200 tried, and at the same time the results furnished practical information to others.

These Co-operative Experiments in Weed Eradication will be continued this year (1916), and it is hoped that a large number of men will take part in them in order that sufficient information may be gathered to warrant definite statements being made in regard to the best methods of controlling these pernicious weeds. The experiments for 1916 are as follows: 1. The use of rape in the des-

truction of Perennial Sow Thistle. 2. A system of intensive cropping and cultivation, using Winter Rye followed by turnips, rape or buckwheat, for eradicating Perennial

Sow Thistle. The use of rape in the destruc

tion of Twitch Grass. 4. A method of cultivation and cropping for the destruction of Twitch Grass.

A method for the eradication of Bladder Campion or Cow Bell. 6. Spraying with iron sulphate to destroy Mustard in cereal crops.

7. A method of cultivation and cropping for the destruction of Oxeye Daisy.

Those who are troubled with any of these bad weeds are invited to write to the Director of Co-operative Experiments in Weed Eradication, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph Ont. He will be glad to furnish full information concerning these experiments and to supply application blanks for the same. All experimenters will be supplied with full and All experimdetailed instructions for carrying out the experiments selected, and with blank forms on which to report the results of the same. All interested in clean farming are asked to cooperate in this work. Address all communications to J. E. Howitt, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.



Foote and Quinn both were noted actors in their day and the nonsensical passage probably was the outgrowth of some convivial contest of wits between them.

It used to figure in school rhetorics. to illustrate the difficulty of memorizing something that had no sense to it.

COLORING METALS.

Almost Any Hue, Bright and Lasting, Quickly Imparted to Brass.

It has been found that metals may be colored quickly and cheaply by forming on their surface a coating of a thin film of a sulphide. In five minutes varying from gold to copper red, then to carmine, dark red and from light aniline blue to a blue-white like sulphide of lead and at last a reddish white, according to the thickness of the coat, which depends on the length of time the metal remains in the solution used. The colors possess a very good luster, and if the articles to be colored have been previously thoroughly cleaned by means of acids and alkalies they adhere so firmly that they may be operated upon by the polishing

To prepare the solution dissolve half an ounce of hyposulphide of soda in one pound of water and add half an ounce of acetate of lead dissolved in half a pound of water. When this clear solution is heated to from 190 to 200 degrees F. it decomposes slowly and precipitates sulphide of lead in brown flakes. If metal be now present a part of the sulphide of lead is deposited thereon, and according to the thickness of the deposited sulphide of lead the above colors are produced. To produce an even coloring the articles must be evenly heated. Iron heated with this solution takes a steel blue color and will retain the coloring unless some abrasive is used to remove it.-London


