RAMBLIRG NOTES BY A TRAVELLING CORRESPONDENT.

London, July 15. 1788.

FARMER HARDSCRABBLE,

My last gave you some idea of the famous old Westminister Abbey, and the magnificence of the structure, exterior and interior of the British Parliament House, properly called Westminister Palace. In my judgment the eye of no tourist of any nation or people ever looked upon or into any work of man of equal splendor. No person on our side of the ocean can form any thing like a correct idea of its truly grand proportions and exquisite beauty of design and finish, from any description which can be given of any tourist; therefore, I leave you to imagine as best you may, its wonderful grandeur and beauty.

After the feast of pleasure I enjoyed in going around and through it, I started for St. James' Park, where it was understood that our revered and christian Queen would be at four o'clock, on her way for a brief visit to the Prince of Wales at Mariborough House. The city was all on tiptoe to a large extent, to catch a view of the person and features of their revered Queen, as she resides chiefly outside the city some miles, at the Windsor Palaco, and such opportunity seldom occurs.
