Our brethren are generally familiar with the steps leading to the very hopeful inauguration of the work in London since the last Annual Meeting. When the meeting house was secured, the Co-operation was asked to assist in supporting a preacher, and so was the G.C.M.C. of the United States. Both responded favorably, one liberal brother offering to meet \$200 of the pledge made by the Board on behalf of the Co-operation. Steps were at once taken to find a suitable preacher, and about January 1st, 1892, Bro. T. L. Fowler was employed.




