EXTEND I.C.R. TO QUEEN CITY

Minister of Railways, Reviewing the Past Year, Hopes to See Government Road From Sea to Sea.

Ottawa, March 22.—(Special.)—The extension of the Intercolonial Railway to Toronto was the hope expressed by Hon. H. R. Emmerson in reviewing the year's business of that road to-day. He also said he looked forward to the day when the road would stretch from sea to sea.

The minister of railways claimed a surplus of \$1,915 on the year's operations. Mr. Emmerson made his annual budget speech. He pointed out that heretofore this speech had been confined to a financial discussion of the I.C.R. He felt that this year the speech should be extended to a review of all the more important work of the railway department. It was a vast department, employing nearly 14,000 men, and under its jurisdiction were included not only the government railways and its system of canals, but also the new trans-continental railway.

The expenditures upon canals were large, and the money was voted without complaint by parliament. During the past ten years there had been expended upon capital account not less than \$24,000,000. During this period, \$14,000,000 had been expended on the Lachine Canal, \$1,000,000 upon the Sault Ste. Marie Canal and \$5,000,000 upon the Welland Canal. Upon the Trent Valley Canal now open from Healy's Falls to Lake Simcoe, there has been expended during the past ten years \$12,285,000, which included the cost of surveys.

Mileage of Canadian Roads. Turning to railways, the minister pointed out that the total mileage of Canadian railways in 1896 was 16,387 miles and subsidies granted by the Dominion government between 1887 and 1896 amounted to \$90,295,892. In 1906 the total mileage had increased to 24,114 miles, and the total subsidies from Confederation to 1906 had increased to \$105,784,201.

Expansion of I. C. R. Referring again to statistics, Mr. Emmerson pointed out that the mileage of the I.C.R. had increased from 172 miles in 1884 to 14,770 in 1906. In 1898 there were 204 locomotive engines; in 1906 the number had increased to 4,000. The number of cars had increased from 927 in 1896 to 10,519 in 1906.

From Sea to Sea. There were several propositions. One was to divide the system between the C.P.R. and G.T.R. He asked if this policy was favored by the opposition. Personally, the minister looked forward to the day when the Intercolonial Railway should stretch from sea to sea, but soon, and very soon, he hoped to see it stretch west. He hoped soon to see it extend to the Intercolonial Railway and then sought to forecast the future of the road.

STREET CAR CUT OFF BOY'S HEAD

Baby Ronald Young, Struck by Trolley, Caught by Fender, Carried Sixty Yards and Then Thrown Under Wheels.

Ronald Young, the 4-year-old son of Albert Young, 1087 Davenport-road, was run over and killed by a south-bound Davenport-car in charge of Motorman William Hurst, 40 Hamburg-avenue, at Hallam and Davenport yesterday afternoon.

The baby's head was severed from his body and his right arm was crushed. Little Ronald was playing on the sidewalk in front of his home. He wandered down the street and made for the tracks.

He waited until the northbound car had passed and then started across the tracks behind it. Southbound No. 884 was traveling at a pretty fair rate of speed, and before the baby saw it he was struck by it and fell on the fender.

Motorman Hurst was talking to a policeman in the vestibule and did not see the accident. Several passengers standing at the corner of Hallam-street noticed the child on the fender. So did John Mann, who was working on a scaffold on the west side. He yelled at the motorman. The people on the corner did everything to attract Hurst's attention, but to no avail. The car came on and, as Hurst applied the brakes, 60 yards below where the child was struck, the car threw the baby off the fender under the wheels.

The dismembered body was picked up by loving hands and carried into the home of Mrs. Churchill, at the corner of Hallam-street. Mrs. Young rushed to the scene and was carried away in convulsions. All night long she raved: "My baby, my baby! It can't be true."

Two young men called at the house last night and informed Mr. Young that they had heard the baby crying. Little Ronald was a very bright child and was a general favorite in the neighborhood. Mrs. Young gave himself up at Police Station No. 7 last night, but was not detained. Coroner Graham will open an inquest at Matthews' undertaking parlors at 11 o'clock this morning.

PEASANTS DRIVE OUT 10,000 JEWS

Four Hundred Homes Devastated and More Than a Hundred Shot Down by Troops in War on Farming Trust.

Vienna, March 22.—The seriousness of the situation in northern Moldavia, growing out of the agrarian disorders, has not been exaggerated, according to the latest telegraphic reports reaching here from Czornowitz, on the border.

From the estimates of the damages made to-night, it appears that 400 farms in Moldavia have been devastated, 8,000 fugitives have fled over the Russian frontier into Austria, and a total of 10,000 Jews left homeless. The number of dead and wounded cannot be given accurately, but the reports of to-day give a total of about 85 men killed and 150 wounded.

The outbreaks have been partially suppressed to-day. The Roumanian government is still sending troops into the afflicted district. Practically the entire Province of Moldavia has been involved.

Revolt Against Trust.

The movement is really more agrarian than anti-Semitic. The peasants are in revolt against the great farming trust, which has leased half the cultivable land in Moldavia. The absentee landlords who control the trust are Jews, which fact brings the ire of the peasants down upon any and all Jews that they meet, and to this animosity is added strong racial feeling.

On Thursday 500 peasants tried to invade Michailoni. Despite the fact that there were sufficient Roumanian troops there to stop the rioters, the peasants at first got the upper hand, because the soldiers, acting upon the orders of the prefect of the town, were not permitted to open fire.

In the face of the menace of the furious peasants, however, some of the rioting British consuls at this point, the occasion of the first announcement about a new safety detonating fuse which he has invented after ten years of experimenting.

The dinner was held in the Hotel Astor and was in recognition of what Sir Percy has accomplished while consul-general here. After Sir Percy had responded to the several complimentary speeches, Mr. Maxin made his announcement. He recalled that several years ago he made the Canadian society dinner the vehicle of the news of his invention of the high explosive now known as maxinite.

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The fighting lasted over an hour before the rioters retreated. They had forty-two men killed, sixty-seven wounded and 250 carried off prisoners. The troops had eight killed and twenty-seven wounded.

The estimate of 10,000 Jews, without homes, is considered here to be conservative. Most of these fugitives saved nothing, barely escaping alive. Four thousand Jews fled to Bucharest, where the authorities were making every effort to assist them. Nevertheless, they are almost all obliged to sleep in the open air.

WAR DEVICE ANNOUNCED TO NEW YORK CANADIAN CLUB

Hudson Maxim Declares New Fuse Will Explode Shell as Desired in Any Part of Armor.

New York, March 22.—Hudson Maxim, inventor of high explosives, made the dinner tendered by the Canadian Club to-night to Sir Percy Sanderson, the retiring British consul-general at this port, the occasion of the first announcement about a new safety detonating fuse which he has invented after ten years of experimenting.

He declared such a device has been the aim of inventors for years. By means of it he said, it is at last possible to send an armor-piercing shell thru armor and cause it to explode at exactly the distance behind the armor desired by the gunner. It will not matter whether the armor is one-inch or 12 inches in thickness, the inventor asserted.

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SENTENCED TO DEATH IN TRIAL LASTING ONE DAY

Horace George Rayner Pleads Insanity, But Jury in London is Out Only Nine Minutes.

London, March 22.—After a trial lasting a single day Horace George Rayner, the slayer of William Whiteley, the well-known merchant of Westbourne Grove, whom he professed to believe to be his father and claimed to have shot under stress of brain trouble, was convicted of wilful murder by a jury to-day, whose deliberations lasted nine minutes.

Lord Chief Justice Alverstone immediately pronounced the sentence of death. The defence was insanity. Among others who spoke were: Col. Sir Henry Pellatt, Col. Mason, Major Davidson, Sergt-Major Bob Young, Major Mercer, Sergt. W. Green, ex-Capt. Barr and Major Rennie.

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NOT ONLY A JOB BUT A WELCOME IS NEEDED

Some New Citizens Arrive in Canada Eager to Work, But Without Means of Placing Themselves Pleasantly.

KEEP UP THEIR ENTHUSIASM!

No Question Raised About Efficiency of Official and Charitable Bureaus; Plea Made for Unfortunates.

How's Edward John Lewis? Taken care of to his own satisfaction, apparently. How, is his own private business. The World was told officially and privately a dozen times yesterday that it had been duped. But for each time that the truth of the story was doubted, more than as many more persons came forward to corroborate the story with experience of their own, or with evidence of their own gathering.

In particular, complaint came from two sources. The colonization bureau of the Ontario Government complained by letter. In justice to the department, that letter is printed in full hereafter.

The other complaint was made to a member of the staff in denial of statements made by The World yesterday morning. It came from a religious organization and it will be dealt with fairly when The World is in possession of all the facts.

Following the complaint of the colonization bureau appears a letter received yesterday afternoon from a citizen. It speaks for itself and is indicative of other letters, phone messages and cables with members of The World staff bearing upon the same question.

Interference Not the Idea. Let it be distinctly understood, The World does not purpose interfering with the colonization department, the different bureaus organized to help immigrants and the like. The purpose of The World Welcome Bureau is to extend the "good hand" to the men, women and children entering upon conditions unprepared for what they may find, and for such as appeal to us.

There seems to have grown about the word "immigrant" an atmosphere of gloom. These newcomers, they spend days impatiently aboard ship and land, awaiting their arrival in the country. They step into Canada with the same British privileges and the same right to the pursuit of happiness as the equivalent of whatever they may receive.

What if they aren't able to make good where they are placed first? All that should be the personal hand of sympathy, not pity, be extended to them.

Make Newcomer Productive. The problem is not: Can John Jones from England give satisfactory service at this or that sort of employment? But rather, the placing of him where he can be an effective, productive citizen. If Canada can't find a place for him, then Canada has no right to permit him to leave Great Britain or elsewhere in the first place.

Once more, whether he be sane or simple, whether he be husky as Goliath or a plummy, whether he be deeply religious or a moralist, it matters no matter what he may be, it is our duty to make a good citizen of him if we can. Give them at least a fighting chance to learn their way. Take care of them as you would your own.

Give Them a Chance. Keep one important fact in mind: These new-comers never have worked exactly as you may want them to. They need time to learn how to practice our methods. Many of them are tackling a new line of work. But they're willing, more, they're even eager to make good, or they wouldn't have taken chances in a new country. Give them at least a fighting chance to learn their way. Take care of them as you would your own.

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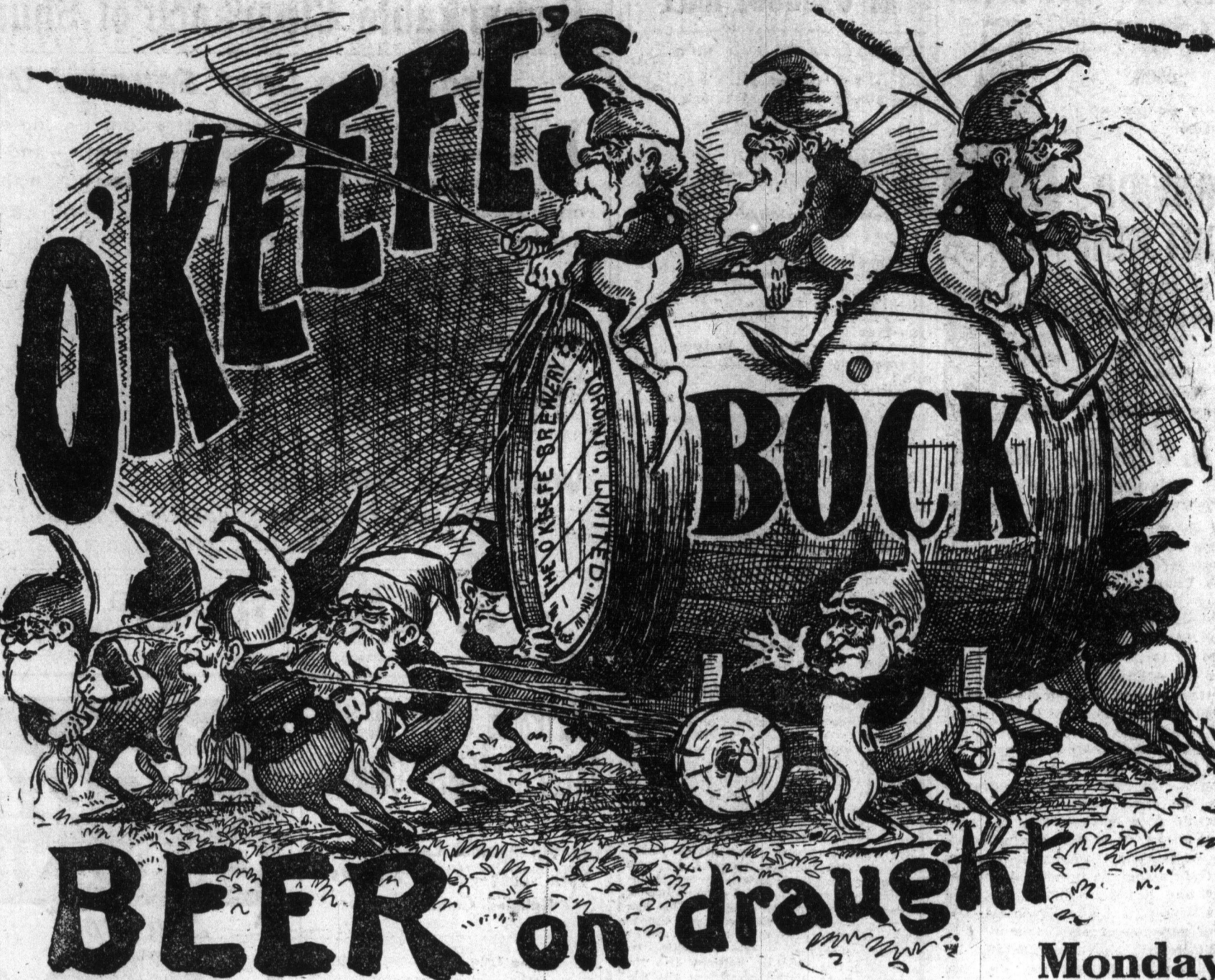

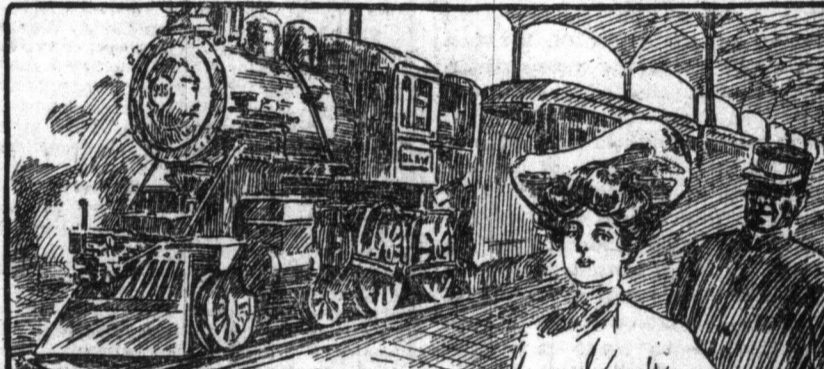

199 LIVES AND 54 SHIPS LOST ON ATLANTIC COAST

Nova Scotia the Most Disasterous, With Newfoundland Ranking Second in Accidents.

Boston, March 22.—A total of 199 lives and 54 ships have been sacrificed to the storms and treacherous coasts of New England and the maritime provinces for the winter just ended.

No account has been taken of the dozens of vessels driven ashore but later refloated, and the figures do not include the loss in Connecticut waters.

The long list of dead is swollen out of all proportion to those of many previous years by the sinking of the steamer Larchmont in Block Island Sound the night of February 11, with an estimated loss of 150 lives.

This was the one great disaster of the year in these waters, the largest loss of life in any other single wreck occurring in the founding this month of the Newfoundland schooner Harry Louis, with her entire crew of eight men.

As usual the Nova Scotia coast has proved the most disastrous to shipping this year, claiming 11 vessels, but Newfoundland was not far behind, with 14 craft. The American coastwise fleet was the heaviest loser, with 35 ships and 175 lives, while the British loss was 15 ships and 24 lives.

WROTE 80 WORDS A MINUTE. Three-Time Winner of Typewriting Contest Now Ours Cup.

Chicago, March 22.—Miss Rose L. Fritz, twice winner of the championship typewriting contest, at the Coliseum last night won the championship for the third time, winning permanently the silver cup offered and breaking the world's record for copying dictation from shorthand notes.

The record she established last night was 245 words in 30 minutes. This is 200 words better than her last record a year ago in Madison-square Garden, New York.

WIRELESS PHONE WORKS. German Count Hears Speech Two Miles Off With 30 Foot Pole.

Berlin, March 22.—Count Arco, in his wireless experiments, has succeeded in obtaining distinct exchanges of words in a tolerably natural voice at a distance of two miles, by using poles 30 feet high.

Rear Admiral Manney, who was a delegate to the United States to the international congress on wireless telegraphy at Berlin, and Lt.-Commander Howard U.S.N., the American naval attaché here, have been present at a series of private exhibitions of the wireless telephone apparatus and have been able to talk with each other at somewhat less than three miles.

JURORS INDICT THEMSELVES. Every Member Pays Fine for Violating Sunday Liquor Law.

Rollingford, Miss., March 22.—Every member of the grand jury in the circuit court here yesterday indicted himself for violating the Sunday liquor law and each appeared before Judge Booth and was fined \$10, with a lecture from the bench.

The self-indicted grand jurors also returned bills against several petit jurors for the same offence.

FAMILY FROZEN TO DEATH. John Comeau Tried to Move Them, But Got Lost in Storm.

Bathurst, N. B., March 22.—(Special.)—On Wednesday afternoon, during a heavy gale, the roof and the upper portion of John Comeau's house was blown down. The family had to leave the house.

Comeau took one child to the nearest house, a quarter of a mile distant, and was returning for the rest of the family when he got lost in the storm.

Reaching the house the following morning, in a very exhausted state, he found his wife and three children in the snow, frozen to death.

Burton Released in Missouri, But Fine is Held Over Him.

Ironton, Mo., March 22.—Joseph Burton, former U. S. senator from Kansas, was released from the county jail to-day, having completed his sentence of six months, imposed for violating a federal statute by appearing before a government department as the paid representative of an alleged "get rich quick" concern of St. Louis.

Burton's sentence also includes a fine of \$2500 and the statute under which he was convicted debar him from ever holding an office of trust or remuneration under the federal government.

The fine, which has not been paid, will be held over him as a civil judgment.

ACTRESS "BEATS" CUSTOMS. Refuses to Pay Duty on Fur and Buys It Back at Auction.

Port Huron, March 22.—(Special.)—A young man from Serbia appeared at the government's auction sale of smuggled goods to-day and bid in a seal skin coat for \$300 against all comers.

It was learned that the coat was seized a year ago, when Mrs. Hamilton of Brantford, a pretty Canadian actress, tried to cross the border with it in company with her fiance, a Brantford physician. She refused to pay the duty.

The coat cost her \$400, originally, but, even with the extra \$200, she believes she has beaten the customs for once.

ALLEGED COUNT FLITS. Skips From St. Kitts With Team of Livery Horses.

St. Catharines, March 22.—John Moreland, an alleged Russian count, who secured a position as a window-dresser and has been cutting a considerable swath in social circles here the past few weeks, is gone. His popularity led him into all kinds of excesses and he "flitted" last night.

Yesterday he hired a team of horses and drove to the Falls. He didn't return and the team was located at the bridge.

Moreland is supposed to be a graduate of a Swedish university.

EXPROPRIATION CLAUSE STANDS TILL WEDNESDAY

Small Attendance of Committee Reason for Delay—Railway Escapes Higher Penalty.

When the city bill came up in the private bills committee yesterday, Chairman Lucas announced that the clauses dealing with the expropriation of the Toronto Electric Light Company would be left over.

Mr. DuVernet, who appeared for the Light Company, protested that it was not fair to take the shareholders of the company in that way. This committee-room was crowded with ladies and gentlemen, and, presumably, of the company.

Chairman Lucas said the matter was before the government. He had informed Mr. O'Brien of the Light Company the previous evening of the proposed adjournment, and he made no objection. They would set a day when everything was clear for the hearing.

Mr. O'Brien explained that there had been an opportunity to notify the large company. Mr. Fullerton thought that their appearance would probably have its intended effect.

Chairman Lucas mentioned the very small committee gathered as a reason for postponement. There should be a full attendance to consider such an important question.

Mr. McDougall asked if the other side had consented to the adjournment. The city had not asked for an adjournment, replied the chairman. The committee had only nine members present, and the government had the question under consideration.

The continuation of Bloor-street east across the Don to Danforth-road was next taken up, but the opposition was so strong it was decided to leave it over till next year. As the city grew north the need for

CITY AND GAS CO. TO UNITE AGAINST C.P.R. AGGRESSION

Have Common Cause in Protecting Front St.—James St. Extension Petition Again Falls.

The city will vigorously fight before the railway commission the application of the C. P. R. for the right to lay a branch line along the south side of Front-street from a point near Beeschell-street to St. Lawrence Market, and in doing so will find an ally in the Consumers' Gas Company. The board of trustees yesterday reaffirmed its position of hostility, after receiving a report from the city solicitor and a communication from Manager W. H. Pearson of the gas company, which asserted that the proposed tracks would do serious damage to large mains.

Mr. Chisholm's report said, in part: "Under the Railway Act of 1903, the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada may give power to a railway company to construct a line along a street, but I think it extremely improbable that such permission would be given in a case like the present, except with the consent of the municipality."

Would Injure Mains. In his letter Mr. Pearson said: "I may say that it is our intention to oppose this application. We maintain running the whole distance along Front-street, over which the proposed line of the C. P. R. is being broken the pipes, and it would be an exceedingly difficult matter, owing to the rails being over them to get them repaired in such an event."

"Opposite to my view, we have no less than five main pipes, three of which pipes are on the south side of the street, and a number of cross-connections. In addition to this, the running of trains in part of our works and across Trinity, Parliament and Berkeley streets would probably cause serious obstruction to our business, as we have a large amount of traffic to and from our customers in these streets, and would prove a source of danger to the lives of our employees and citizens in general."

Controlled by Board. Controller Hubbard recalled that the late Hon. A. G. Blair, chairman of the commission, had once given the opinion that the railways had no power to take over Esplanade-street, and that there was a difference between allowing a railway to cross a street and allowing it to lay tracks along that street.

Petition Strongly Opposed. The board showed decided lack of sympathy with the petition against the extension brought forward yesterday. The petitioners took the stand that the works committee in declining to report the petition to council had exceeded its powers, and requested that the board forward it on to Monday's council meeting.

The city grant asked would only cover about half the cost, the remainder to be made up by private contributions.

Mr. Kelly emphasized the fact that the hospital offered facilities for clinics to students, who attended in large numbers, and that the hospital staff were always available for emergency cases. In the majority of cases no return being received. The city will not be able to obtain the services of Engineer W. F. Tye to assist the city engineers and C. E. Smith, C.E.M., in preparing a report on the Esplanade problem, including the viaduct. A letter from Mr. Tye, received by the board, intimated that the writer, who is in Mexico, will be there for some time, and, hence, unable to act.

Permission was given the Confederation Life for the construction of an eight-story office building on the southeast corner of Queen and Victoria-streets. After a consultation with Engineer C. E. Smith, it was decided that, on Tuesday next, at 10 a.m., the board should start out on a drive over the ground outlined in the city's alternative plans for an eastern entrance of the railways.

Option on Park Land. The mayor's idea, made public some time ago for the purchase of land west of Lee-avenue for park purposes, is responsible for negotiations now in progress between Assessment Commissioner and the city. The property, that would be acquired, if an option satisfactory to the city can be obtained.

The block of land extends from Queen-street to the lakefront, and is bounded by Lee-avenue on the east and West-avenue on the west. The most serious obstacle in the way appears to be the fact that the city in expropriating would have to pay for about fifty houses situated on the property. The waterworks department reports that the use of meters, about 180 of which were installed last year, has been entirely satisfactory, the revenue having shown an appreciable increase.

From May to October a steamboat line runs along the lake stops at the company's wharf.

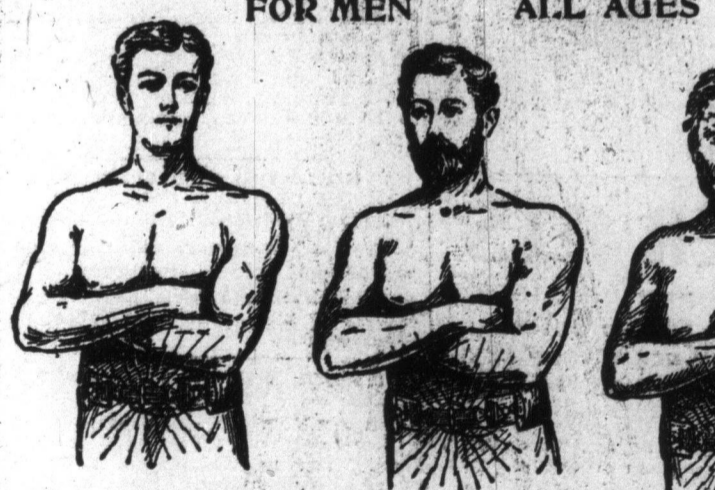

and connects at Keppawa with the Canadian Pacific Railroad. It is expected by June 15 that there will be a station of the latter railroad on the property, so that it can be reached by thru car from Montreal in 14 hours. On account of the plentiful supply of timber and water the working conditions are exceptionally favorable for mining operations; \$12,000 to \$15,000 have been spent in the development of the property to date, bringing it up to a point showing ore in place, the gold values being from \$5 to \$20 per ton, and the silver up to 400 ounces. Assays taken show 17 per cent. copper. Platinum traces are found irregularly through the main strike of the territory and it seems to be combined with nickel, arsenic and cobalt ores, which are found across the lake in the townships of Coleman and Lorraine. The active development of the property is now being arranged for. It will be equipped with heavier machinery, capable of sinking to a depth of 300 feet. Ore in the main veins of the property has been traced for over two miles. The silver veins have been found under a capping of cobalt. It is proposed to build a reduction plant as soon as the commenced development work is sufficiently advanced.

T. H. & B. ASK FOR POWERS THEY CAN'T GET AT OTTAWA

Illustration of Effect of Conflict of Jurisdiction With Dominion, Says Whitney.

Dr. Clapp of South Bruce was the only member of the private bills committee yesterday to protest against granting rights to the Hamilton, Grimsby and Beamsville Railway, which they could not get from the Dominion. This is Hon. J. M. Gibson's company, and the City of Hamilton minority shareholders opposed the motion on the ground that it is intended to swallow the road in the Hamilton radial system.

Hon. Mr. Hendrie thought the bill passed at Ottawa incorporating the Hamilton Radial Railway would enable this to be done.

"It is not absurd," he suggested, "to pass legislation to-day and immediately allow railways to go out of our jurisdiction."

George Lynch-Staunton argued for the railway that they would have no power to amalgamate with other roads until and unless the provincial government gave the power.

Two years were given for the completion of the road. Three had been asked. The Sunday rest law will apply to the railway, and the company must observe the general act as to rates.

"It is one of the strongest possible illustrations of the indefensible conditions now existing with reference to the consequences of the conflict of jurisdiction between the Dominion and the province," said Premier Whitney yesterday, speaking of the Hamilton

Valuable Souvenirs Bequeathed by Late Capt. E. B. VanKoughnet.

The Provincial Museum is richer by several valuable souvenirs bequeathed to it under the will of the late Capt. Edmond Barker Van Koughnet, R.N., C.M.G., son of a former minister of agriculture for Canada.

The articles include:

(1) Gold tray presented to him by the Point Farms of Port Natal. This is composed of gold, the base being formed of Kruger sovereigns.

(2) A silver trowel, presented to his father, the Hon. P. M. Van Koughnet, minister of agriculture, by the local committee of the Provincial Agricultural Association, Toronto. This trowel was used by his father in laying the foundation stone of the old Crystal Palace, July, 1858.

(3) A silver cigar case, presented to him in 1860 by King Edward, who was then the Prince of Wales, as president of the royal commission of the Paris Exposition.

(4) A paper note of Gordon's money, signed "C. E. Gordon," with his seal.

The other articles presented are: A diploma and silver medal from the Paris Exhibition; a silver inkstand; silver claret jug; silver snuff-box, and gold pencil case.

STOP GRIND IN SCHOOLS MEMORY TRAINING HURTFUL

"Drop Your Frills" Advice of Trustee Parkinson to Toronto Teachers.

The feature of Friday morning's session of the annual meeting of the Toronto school teachers in Ryerson school was an address of ex-Principal Parkinson on school work in general.

"Drop your frills," said the ex-principal, "and substitute work with a purpose, instead of being out of date and out of touch with the child's life." He condemned memory training, much of which was only calculated to grind the life out of the pupil and the teacher as well. Much of the time now taken up with arithmetic, drills, history and geography was wasted. The election of officers resulted as follows:

J. P. Downey moved and obtained the consent of the house to reconsider the bill to incorporate the Junction Terminal Railway, which was thrown out on the previous day, in order that interested parties might be heard.

APPEAL FOR JAMAICA CHURCH

Fifty Anglican Places of Worship Destroyed by Earthquake.

An appeal is being sent out by the archbishop of Toronto to all the clergy in the diocese, soliciting their hearty co-operation toward securing funds for the relief of the Anglican Church generally in Jamaica.

The archbishop's action was taken at the instance of the bishop of Jamaica, together with the archbishop of the West Indies, who sent a detailed statement of the conditions at the present time. It is stated that fully fifty of the Anglican churches have been destroyed.

The archbishop will personally receive subscriptions, or any amounts left at any branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, will be duly acknowledged.

QUALIFICATION OF TEACHERS

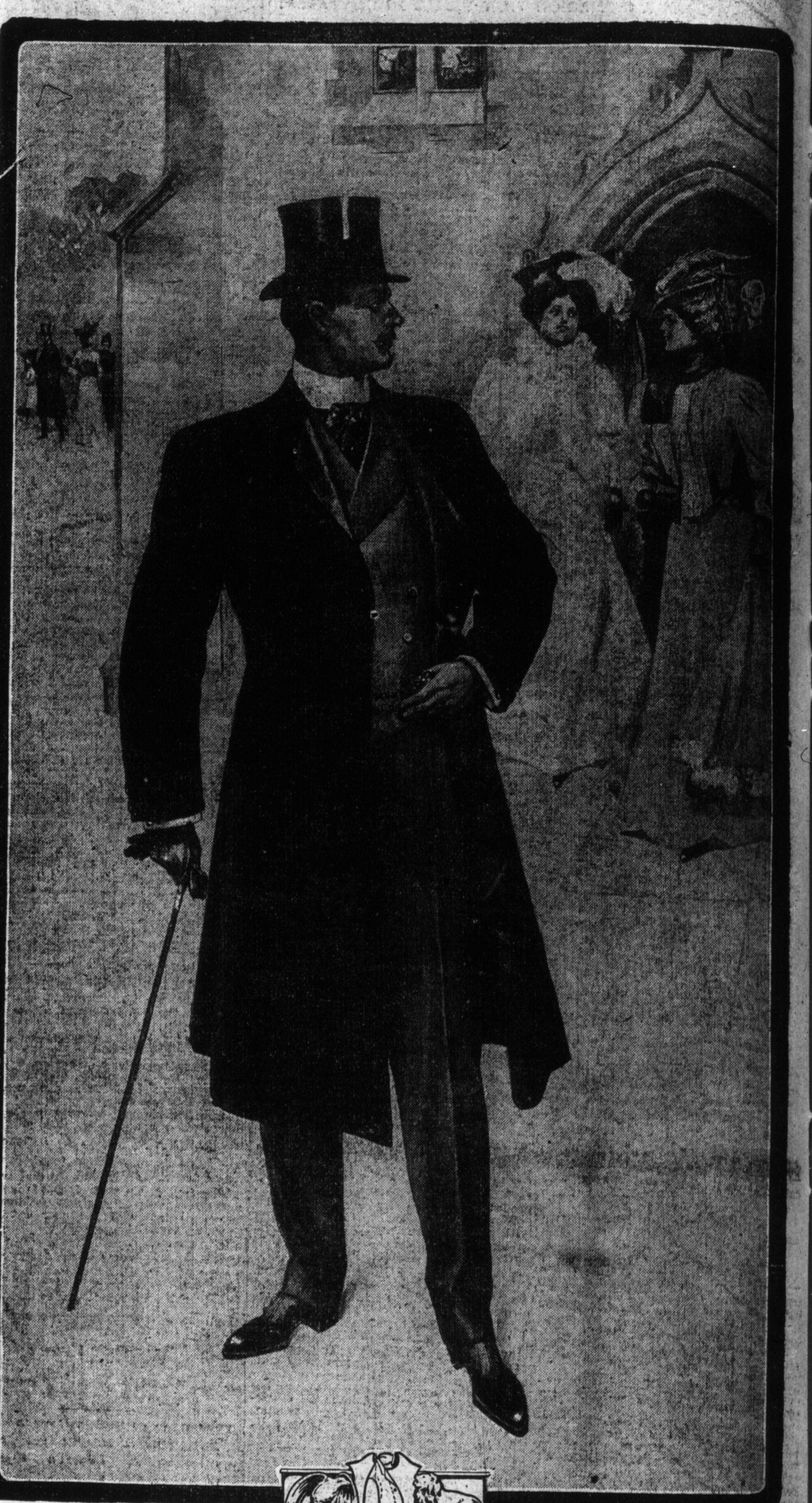
Cabinet Considering Giving Effect to Privy Council Judgment.

Premier Whitney declared yesterday that no action had yet been decided upon by the government with regard to the qualifications of teachers who are also members of religious societies.

"Some time since the privy council ruled that all teachers must qualify according to the standard set by the education department. Whether legislation will be required to give effect to this judgment is being considered. It is likely that teachers of ten years' standing will be allowed to continue to act, but those of less experience will be required to qualify within two years."

At the evening session Dr. Winslip gave an address on "The Latest and Best in Education," to a large gathering of the city teachers. He stated that a daily medical inspection of the schools of Boston, established at a cost of \$10,000, had decreased the percentage of scarlet fever 6.6 per cent.; diphtheria, 2.3 per cent.; and other diseases in general 10 per cent. 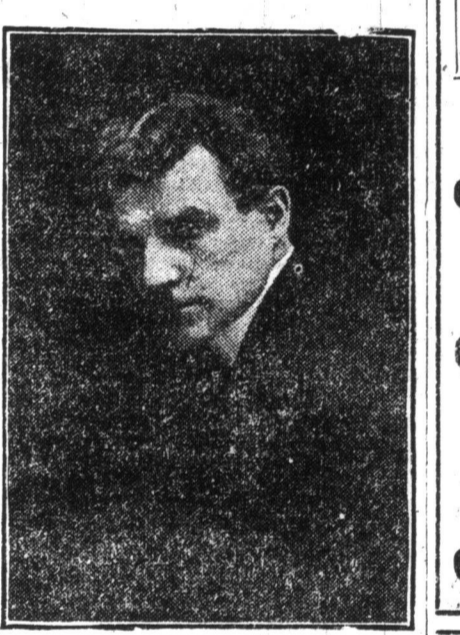

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

RIVERDALE ORGANIZES PUBLIC OWNERSHIP LEAGUE

Aid James Wilson Chairman of Committee to Act With Central Body.

A well-attended meeting of the Riverdale public ownership supporters was held last night in Dingman's Hall to discuss the question of organizing a branch league.

J. M. Wilkinson presided and explained the objects of the meeting. He said the movement was not a party one and the man who was hunting votes or places was not wanted.

It was a moral movement and appealed to those who placed the public welfare above party interests.

J. McPherson Ross moved a resolution that, before proceeding with organization, some of the speakers from the Central League be heard.

Aid. Bengough asked the meeting to hear Frank Tyson on "The Referendum and Public Ownership."

Mr. Tyson said the matter was not a new one; it was but an extension of what was on our statute books.

The principle of the majority's right to rule was in force, and starting from that point, much was to be attained.

If a town council wished to grant a monopoly franchise to any corporation the people ought to have the right of saying "Yes" or "No" to it.

That was one of the first things to be fought for.

A referendum should be given, and the reply of the people should be mandatory.

The legislature of Oregon had done much in this way, and had recently, by these means, passed a law permitting towns to amend their charters.

This was a sure and certain way of securing public ownership.

Endorsement of the principle of public ownership of natural monopolies. He said he had long felt an interest in the question.

It meant merely that the public should own its own property. That was its justification.

Public property should be held as a trust for the public as private property was for the individual.

What a man made was his to hold and benefit by. What God gave for the benefit of His creatures no man was to monopolize.

Franchise values were made by the people. The world itself was worth nothing to people who were not in it.

It was the people who made Manhattan worth \$5,000,000,000, and Juan Fernandez practically nothing, the Juan

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BONUS IS NOT A FACTOR IN BUILDING SMELTERS

Several Plants Are Already in Process of Construction or in Contemplation.

With the close of the winter season and increased activity in mining operations at Cobalt, the whole question of smelting gains renewed and practical importance. The last weekly returns showed 322 tons of ore shipped from Cobalt. Practically all of this is shipped to the United States and most of the output for some time to come will go to the same destination. The interests involved are much too valuable to the country for this long to continue. Already a number of smelting projects have been inaugurated, and the last Sunday-World, the interesting plans of the German-Canadian Smelting and Refining Company, Limited, were described and their intention to use the secret Schneck process at the Sault Ste. Marie plant, which they have leased.

What extent such developments may be due to the government's offer of a bonus is a question that is difficult to specify. Some of the largest concerns in discussing the matter declare that the bonus is a negotiable quantity. They disregard it in planning and calculating for the establishment of such industries. At the same time the sum of \$17,000 a year set aside by the government may be taken as a guarantee of the encouragement of the province to give to these industries. The provincial government has announced on several occasions that a straight bonus to a smelting concern would not be considered.

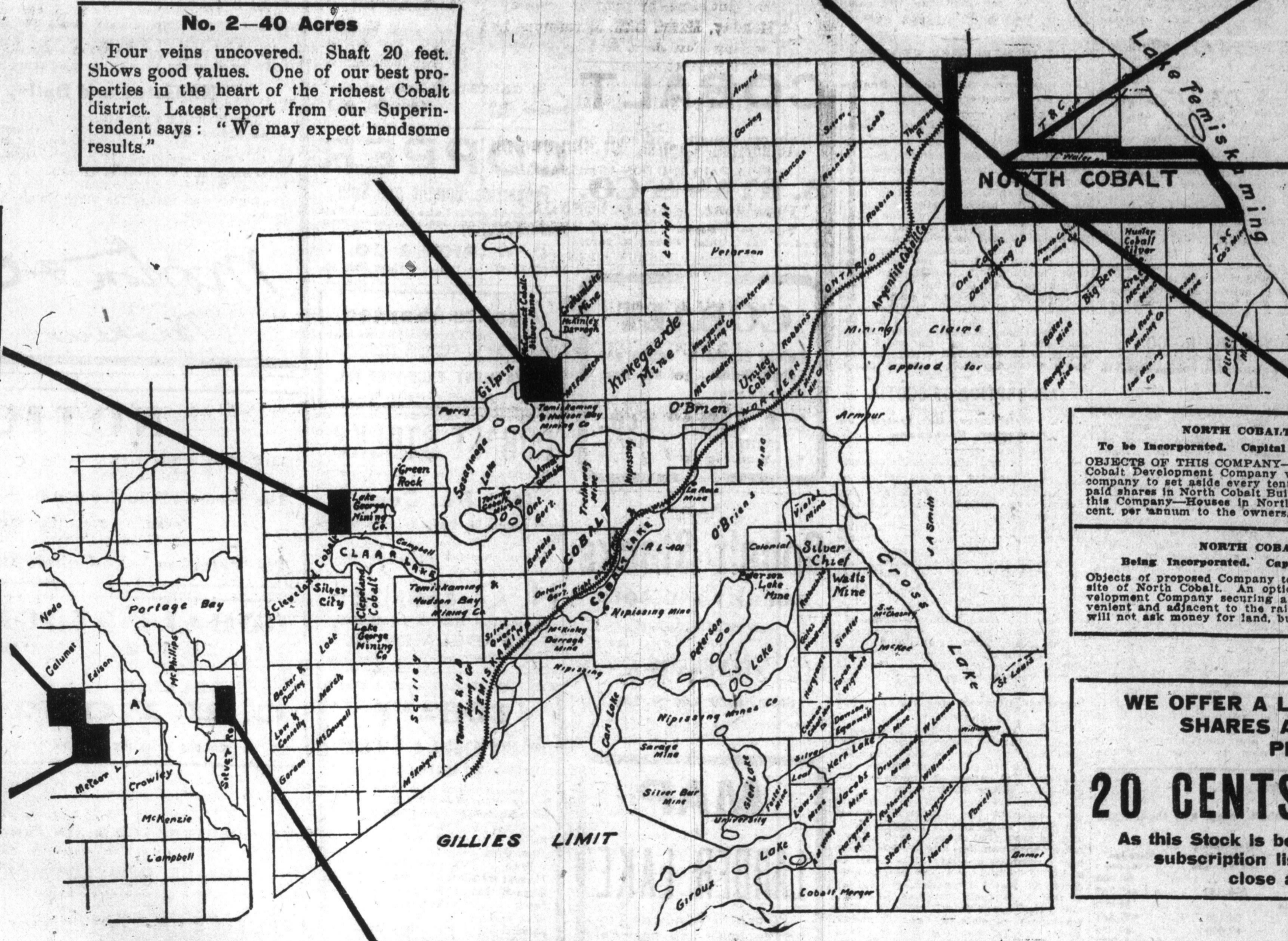

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OTTAWA CLERGY COMPLAIN
OF SHUNTING ON SUNDAY
 Agitation Against Manner in Which
 Lord's Day Act is Observed
 by the Railways.

Ottawa, March 22.—(Special)—There
 is an agitation going on in Ottawa
 against the manner in which the Lord's
 Day Act is observed by the railway
 and transfer companies. The clergy-
 men of the city are meditating action.

Supt. Donaldson of the Grand Trunk,

BELL GETS FRANCHISE.
 Gives Barrie \$300 a Year and Four
 Phones for Exclusive Privilege.

Barrie, March 22.—At the last regu-
 lar meeting of the town council a com-
 mittee brought in a report in favor of
 granting a five-year franchise (exclu-
 sive) to the Bell Telephone Company,
 to run from April 1, 1908 last, on the
 following terms:

(1) The town to grant the Telephone
 Company an exclusive franchise for five
 years from April 1 last (being the date
 that the old one ran out).
 (2) The telephone people to guaran-
 tee uniformity of rates all over the
 town and include Altondale (which is

a part of Barrie since the amalgama-
 tion).
 (3) Grant the town the use of four
 phones free.
 (4) Pay the town \$300 per year in
 cash.

Some discussion took place, and in
 the face of the fact that last year's
 council fought the Bell Company tooth
 and nail and made most strenuous ef-
 forts to secure an independent company
 to come in here, the majority of the
 council seems to be in favor of a five-
 year franchise, but with six free phones
 instead of four, and an amendment to
 that effect was passed, but the agree-
 ment has not been signed as yet.

What a great many think in this
 town is, that we should not bind the
 town for five years, or really four
 years now; that the pittance sum of \$300,
 as agreed upon, is in itself not a sixth
 of what it should be, the people think,
 and that we should not grant any more
 exclusive franchises.
 Complaint is made that the Bell Com-
 pany have acted very arbitrarily in the
 past, putting their poles on boulevards
 in front of private houses just as they
 pleased.
