





The plant and apparatus cover about an acre, two miles from the centre of the city, and although there are residences near by, no inconvenience results. The tourists affirm that if they had been conducted through the works blindfolded, they would have been unable to tell the nature of the process going on.





CHICAGO GOSSIP.

Wheat opened lower this morning. The selling was scattered, but Bartlett & Fraser were conspicuous at times. There was good business and an easy feeling. The buying was principally by the St. Louis and Northwest crowd. Foreigners were buyers in New York, but trade there was in smaller volume. Big commission houses who sold wheat from 66c down have been covering, and the short interest has been reduced. It is impossible to predict what the visible supply will be, owing to the liberal movement of wheat from lake ports. English houses continue to report small stocks everywhere. The position looks strong to us, and we see no reason to change our views.

The sentiment this morning was decidedly bearish, and there was considerable short wheat put out by local traders. The news was not particularly bearish. Thoman's report was buillish, but as it was a feature in yesterday's advance it seemed to lose its power today. Sinall shipments from this country last week, Bradstreet's placing them at 1,236,000, was looked upon as a bearish feature, but the same people who said wheat on it will probably buy on its reflection in the light world's shipments Monday. Market acted in a very similar manner to yesterday. The shorts attempted to cover when advices were received from the Northwest reporting more rain in the Red River Valley, and the market took a sudden spurt of ½c. Realizing, however, was too large, and there seemed to be a steady stream of May wheat on sale. The market lost about all the advance, closing steady. Gable news quiet and nothing reported for foreign account. Argentine shipments were 624,000 bush. Receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth this week were 2,097 cars, against 2149 last week. Total primary receipts in same period of time were 2,163,000 and 1,964,000 bish respectively. We think the immediate course of the market will depend on the weather and crop reports.

Provisions—Market opened lower on larger receipts of hogs and liberal movement expected next week. This had considerable influence on the market, as also the continued selling by May longs and changing over of July and Sept. Packers were liberal sellers. Eastern orders were here to buy Sept. pork and ribs at the close Gudaby was a liberal seller. Market closed steady.
