PERSON OF THE WEEK

Nineteen Seven Days of the Session at Ottawa and Very Little Done—A Lamentable Spectacle—Jim Sutherland is Loaded Up

With All Kinds of Work and Cog-Wheels Are Sticking—But Henderson Made a Big Hit—He Spoke for the Farmers and Presented Some Staggering Questions.

Ottawa, April 20.—(Special.)—To-day was the nineteenth day of the session, yet what a lamentable spectacle was presented by the Government. Hon. James Sutherland, more noted for his smooth way than for his knowledge of departmental duties, appeared as acting Minister of the Interior, Postmaster-General, Minister of Public Works and Minister of Agriculture, all rolled into one, and the amount of information he was able to furnish was meagre.

Mr. Henderson had an ovation. Mr. Henderson was given an ovation when he arose at 4, and a good house followed. He declared the Government had not returned to its duties, and enumerated those violated. Where he was particularly strong was in answering the question: What share of the preference have the farmers obtained from the Liberal tariff? He read a list of 30 articles imported by farmers, upon which the preference did not operate.

What the Government did for the farmers was to place articles of little use under the preference. He enumerated 50 such articles, and showed that in 1899, \$2,414,842 duty had been paid on them, which was \$472 less than would have been paid under the Conservative tariff. This represented a gain to the farmers by the preferential tariff of 44¢, or about 1.9 of one cent to every farmer in Canada.

Mr. Henderson apologized the old farm wagon, told of its many uses, and declared that the farmer had the best and burden of the day, it had been neglected by the present tariff, and to-day, as under the Conservative rule, a duty of 25 per cent was attached to it. It was the old farm wagon that the speaker used, and he was not entitled to it. The farmer, as a rule, gauged the tariff. The duty on the farmers' friend-in-comparison with the duty on innumerable other articles not hankered after by farmers, showed that the preferential tariff had done little or nothing for the farmer.

The Fences and Fences. "What gets the benefit of the tariff?" asked the speaker. "Simply the fences and summers of the giddy and gay, that are not entitled to it." The fences and summers consisted of jewelry, precious stones, toys, badges, belts, blouses, hosiery, etc., all of which were lower in duty than the old farm wagon. The duty on the fences and summers was 15 per cent, while that on the old farm wagon was 25 per cent.

Where Sutherland Got Tangled. This was where Mr. Sutherland, acting for the Minister of Agriculture, got into a bit of trouble. 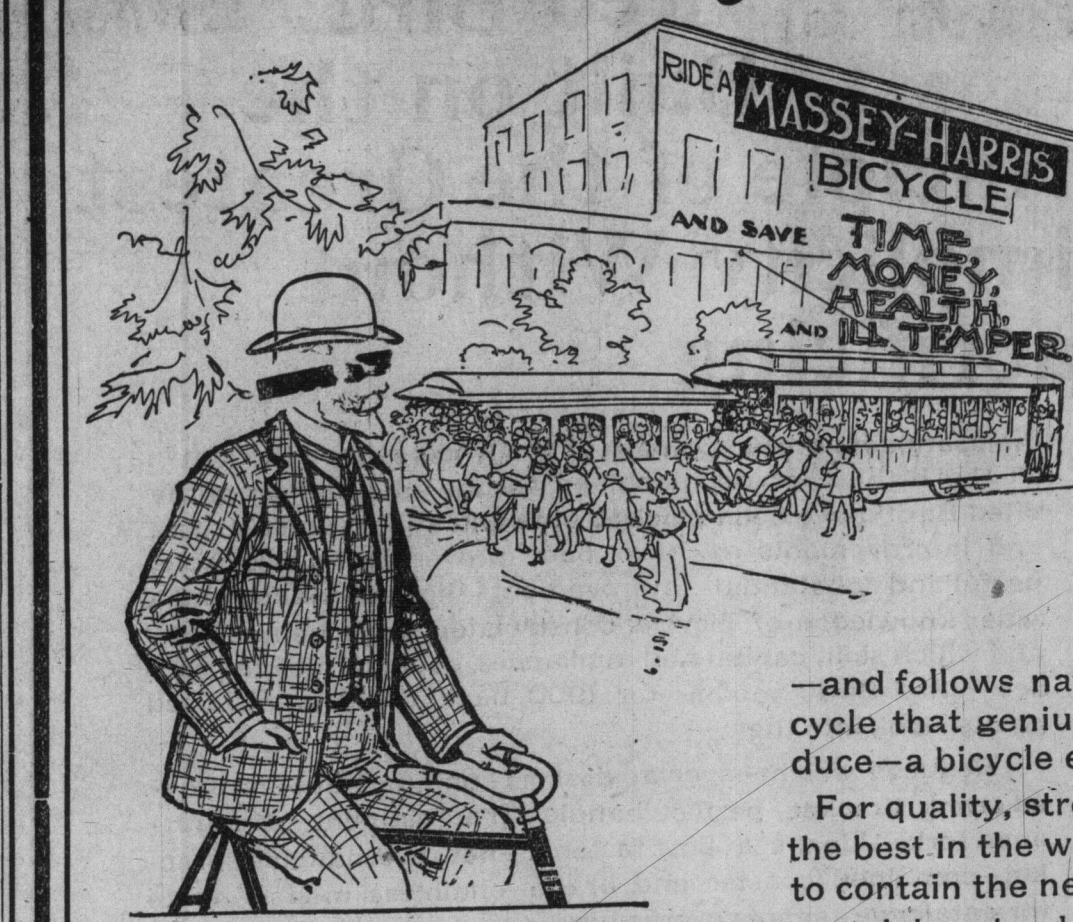

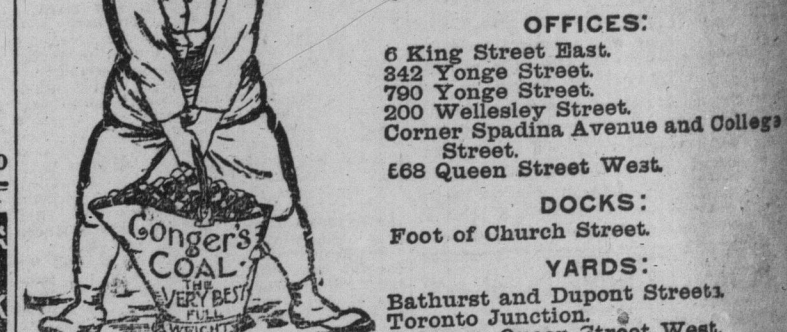

Board of Works Discussed a Basis of Agreement With the Metropolitan Railway.

REPORT SENT ON TO COUNCIL,

Altho Not Agreeable in Some Ways to the Company's Representatives—City Hall News.

A special meeting of the Board of Works was held yesterday afternoon to consider the report of the sub-committee, which recommended that the city consent to a connection being made with the Metropolitan Railway and the C.P.R. at North Toronto on certain conditions named in a basis agreement submitted.

The Original Report.

The report, which was originally as follows, was adopted with several amendments: That the City Council consent to the junction of the Metropolitan and the C.P.R. on the following basis of agreement:

What the City Council consent to

1. The city to maintain the highway and the company to pay \$1000 per mile per single track per year for part of highway within the city limits occupied by the tracks.

What the City Council consent to

2. The Toronto Railway Company shall, if the city requires it, but not otherwise, be permitted running rights on the lines of the Metropolitan Railway Company.

What the City Council consent to

3. The Metropolitan Railway Company to give a two-cent return fare from the present C.P.R. tracks to and from Mount Pleasant and Mount Hope Cemetery gates.

What the City Council consent to

4. Electricity to be used as the only motive power for cars on city streets.

What the City Council consent to

5. No freight to be loaded or unloaded on Yonge street.

6. The City Engineer to exercise the following control: Control of tracks, condition of streets and all points of connection to be used on street; regulation of time for speed and service; regulation of time for the classes of freight and passenger traffic on Yonge street.

7. This agreement to be null and void if the Metropolitan Railway Company should be permitted to run a service of light cars.
