WITNESS TO BE JOINED AGAINST MR. BLAIR'S WILL

Warm Party Discussion Was Precipitated in the House on L.C.R. Affairs.

Ottawa, March 19.—The same program of the budget debate was broken in upon today by the warmest party discussion that has enlivened the session so far. Orated with pretty boulevards, the gift of Mr. Blair of Pelee to the members presented rather a peaceful front than otherwise when the House convened. But the red and white emblems of the Yorks and Lancasters, so fiercely did the bearers of them cut and thrust when once the contest started.

LARGEST ATTENDANCE IN LATE YEARS

Reference Made to the Loss Sustained By the Order Through Deaths of Officials.

Smith's Falls, March 19.—The Provincial Grand Lodge of Ontario East opened its annual session here this afternoon. The attendance is one of the largest of recent years, the commodious Workmen's Hall being inadequate to accommodate the large crowd present, and for to-morrow it has been decided to meet in the Town Hall.

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DR. CLARK'S EXPLANATION

Exclusion of Press Representatives Led to the Sending Out of a Sensational Despatch.

Guelph, March 19.—Dr. Clark of London, Eng., formerly Consul in South Africa, has arrived here from Chicago, and gives a full explanation of his meeting last Friday in Chicago with the Boer envoys. He states that Mr. Van Vliet, with whom the Boer envoys took luncheon at the Chicago Athletic Club room, is, and has been for some time, a personal friend of his. When Dr. Clark met that gentleman in Chicago a few days ago he was pressed to join him and his Boer friends in the luncheon. A number of newspaper men who had been seeking an interview with the envoys also sought admission to the informal luncheon, but as the meeting was of a private social character, the press representatives were excluded. The cheque was drawn "payable to the order of Dr. Clark," and the sensational despatch published throughout the country, in which the inference was drawn that the party had met by previous arrangement.

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TERRIBLE MINING ACCIDENT

Four Men Badly Injured by the Premature Explosion of a Charge of Dynamite.

Winnipeg, March 19.—A terrible accident occurred at Big Master mine, Cold Rock, Monday night. When the men were clearing up at the bottom of the shaft, 180 feet deep, it is supposed a pick or a shovel struck an unexploded charge of dynamite, which discharged, causing terrible injuries to the miners. The men were brought to the surface in the cage, and messengers were despatched to Wabigoon, where they arrived, dressed the wounds and brought the miners to Wabigoon on mattresses. The injured are: John Archibald, leg broken, hands and face badly cut, will lose eyesight; John Starnard, jaw broken, one eye endangered; Malcolm Speers, face cut, eye endangered; George Robinson, badly bruised about the chest. All four men will likely recover.

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SENATE IS STILL LIBERAL

Private Count of Noses Gave Government a Majority of Two Yesterday.

Ottawa, March 19.—A private count of noses in the Senate today is said to have shown a Liberal majority of two. The count was taken after the report of the Striking Committee, giving the Liberals the greater number of members on the Railways and Canals and Contingencies committees, came up for consideration. Sir Mackenzie Bowell alluded to the count in his speech on the question of its adoption. He pointed out, however, the unfairness of the government's action in claiming that as the Senate stood at present, the Conservatives had a majority of five members in a full House.

QUARANTINED AT DURBAN

Ottawa, March 19.—On the "Ovens of the day" being called in the House to-day, Lieut.-Col. Sam Hughes arose and drew the attention of the government to an item which appeared in The Evening Citizen, to the effect that smallpox had developed among Canadians in South Africa. He read the item as follows: "Smallpox has developed in the second section of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, and the troops are said to be in quarantine at Durban for three months. Relatives in the town of the contingent have received no word of them since they left, and the fact goes to confirm the rumor that they are in isolation, pending the stamping out of the disease."


One Leaf Missing.

ELECTED 52 NEW MEMBERS

Toronto Board of Trade Has Now a Membership of Nine Hundred and Four.

IMPORTANT TOPICS DISCUSSED

Scheme for Commercial Federation of Great Britain and Her Colonies Outlined. At a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Board of Trade Council a resolution was presented from the Halifax Board of Trade, advocating the subsidizing of a fast Atlantic service. The communication was referred to the Railway and Transportation Committee. A resolution received from the Board of Trade of St. John, N.B., to the effect that the government call in all worn and mutilated coins and redeem the same, was referred to the bankers' section, who were also instructed to take up the matter of the government calling in all soiled and torn bills.

A pamphlet was received from the firm of William Patterson & Co., Montreal, outlining a scheme of commercial federation for Great Britain and her colonies and containing a paper, read by Alfred Bignell, a well-known Liverpool manufacturer, before the Liverpool and District Packers' Association. The pamphlet will be looked into by the special committee appointed to deal with preferential trade matters. The Legislation Committee reported that the bill asking for the incorporation of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of America had been withdrawn, and as a result the Ontario Society of Chartered Accountants had dropped their objections to the proposed bill.

NO DEFENCE WAS REQUIRED

Thomas Hunter's Suit Against Late Constable Boyd and Insurance Agents Dismissed.

JUDGE MADE IMPORTANT RULING

Chester D. Johns Found Guilty of Neglecting to Support His Wife—Other Cases. At the conclusion of the plaintiff's case and a lengthy legal argument, Chief Justice Meredith in the Assize Court yesterday afternoon dismissed with costs the action of Thomas Hunter against the estate of the late Constable W. T. Boyd and Messrs. J. H. Ewart, J. E. Reed, R. N. Gooch, Alfred W. Smith and Alex. Dixon, insurance agents, to recover \$25,000 damages for alleged malicious prosecution. His Lordship held that the plaintiff had neglected to show the absence of reasonable and probable cause for laying the information charging Hunter with false pretences. The evidence also failed to prove malice on the part of Constable Boyd and connection between the insurance agents and the prosecution.
