ANGLICAN SYNOD OPENS DISCUSSES MISSION WORK

Resolution is Also Introduced Looking to Suppression of Race Track Betting in Canada.

The Incorporated Synod of the Diose of Toronto convened at St. James' School House yesterday after a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Cathedral. There was a full attendance of clerical and lay delegates, and the morning was consumed in greetings. The first order of business was the report of the committee on credentials, which was presented by C. R. W. Biggar and Rev. A. H. Baldwin. A large number of parishes were reported as having failed to pay Synod ported as having failed to pay Synod collections, and the representatives were therefore debarred from voting, including in Toronto: St. Thomas, St. Bartholomew, St. Mary's, St. Magdalene, Church of the Messiah and St. Mark's (Toronto Junction.) The report was referred to the Court on Contested Seats, which appointed this morning at 10 a.m. as the time for hearing claims.

Increase Stipends for Rural Clergy The Right Reverend Arthur Sweat-man, D.D. D.C.L., Bishop of Toronto, who presided, then made his opening

The Right Reverend Arthur Sweatman, D.D., D-C.L., Bishop of Toronto, who presided, then made his opening address. He referred feelingly to the death of several members of the Synod during the past year, and especially to that of Mrs. Williamson, president of the Women's Auxiliary. Turning to his personal work, he gave details of four ordinations, 76 confirmations and 1594 persons confirmed. There had been an increase of 1720 in church members, and of 799 in communicants. The total parochial contributions during the year were \$276,638.

The Bishop referred to the streat inducements offered to young clergymen to cross the line into the United States, he having seen 57 leave the Canadian church during his incumbency. He spoke of the small stipend which was to be expected in this country, and urged the necessity of dealing with the rural clergy in a more liberal spirit. He also referred to the lack of zeal shown in regard to raising \$17.000, alto the stream of the secure of the missionary purposes. 
