RIGHTS FOUR; KILLS ONE: BARK BURGLARS ROUTED: Plucky Teller at Lancaster, Alto Badly Assaulted, Turns Tables on Bad Gang.

Lancaster, April 26.—Burglars broke into the Merchants Bank, Lancaster, about 1.30 this morning and dabbled the teller, Herman Von Metzke, over the head.

He finally got hold of his revolver and shot one of the men, whose dead body was afterwards found on the platform of the G.T.R. Depot.

The bank is located on McArthur's Bank building, Main street, and Von Metzke slept in a room at the rear, which was a store room.

This door was smashed in with a heavy beam, and when Von Metzke opened his eyes four men were standing over him, one of them holding a torch. They clubbed him over the head with a ledge to build a barricade.

The teller managed to get hold of his own revolver, which was in a yellow, and was firing against the body of one of his assailants, who was stooping over him, fired.

The others then rained blows on his head and wrested the gun from him, and he was again being clubbed, and the bullet lodged in the wall.

When Von Metzke picked himself up he was staggered over to Dr. Harkness' house, 50 yards distant. Several citizens rushed to the bank and found the bedroom in flames, which were extinguished.

The unfortunate teller has nine or ten ugly wounds on the top and front of his head. The gang urged the assistants to "hit harder" and "kill him."

In the shuffle the lamp, which had been lighted by the gang, was overturned, and the flames were extinguished.

The burglars left behind a bulge of eye lantern, several chisels, a slide and other blacksmith tools, a sledge and a hammer. They also left behind a huge 44-caliber revolver, but carried off the teller's gun.

The body found in the G. T. R. Station platform was that of a medium-sized young man, about 30 or 35 years of age.

He was fairly well dressed, with a dark suit with a small stripe and a striped shirt. His head was long and was covered with wavy brown hair. His teeth were filled with gold.

His friends evidently removed all money and papers, for the pockets, when found, were empty, excepting a small pin.

He was recognized as a man who stayed around the village for several days, and was registered at Leduc's Hotel as J. Dixon, St. John, N.B., and a friend who registered as J. R. Tully, of Valparaiso, also came here on Monday. Von Metzke is 26 years old and comes from Tatamouche, N.S. He is a fine looking young man and very active, weight about 160 lbs.

ST. PETERSBURG HEARS OF TRIUMPH OF LINEVITCH AND TOKIO ALSO GETS GOOD NEWS

St. Petersburg, April 26.—(Special).—General Linievitch, in a despatch dated April 25, says: "Our advance posts of April 22 forced the enemy successively to evacuate the fortified villages of Manchoung and Nennanpoimeng. The Japanese occupied a fortified position, but were driven out of Nennanpoimeng, but our artillery fire and the appearance of a Russian force in the vicinity of Kayancheng, caused them to retreat to Kayancheng. The same day Russian advance guards captured the Chinese, about 15 miles above The Pass, which is strongly fortified and occupied by the Japanese. The Russian force was about 1,000 men and it was apparent that the place was strongly held our troops retired. Our representative destroyed the connection between Kayancheng and Changtu."
