LONDON CHEERFUL OVER THE RUSSIAN SITUATION

Entire Russian People Determined to Fight Until Victory Won—Believed Negotiations With Bulgaria Entering Decisive Stage

London, Aug. 9.—The morning newspapers look upon the Russian situation more optimistically than they have for several days. The Times declares "While the position of certain portions of the Russian forces still remains critical, there is every reason to believe the excellent order with which they withdrew has been executed thus far, will be maintained until all have reached the new line of defense."

GERMAN VERSION OF ADVANCE IN POLAND

Berlin, Aug. 8.—(By wireless to Sayville)—An account of the conditions under which the German and Austrian armies are advancing through the districts of Poland, devastated by the Russians before their retreat, was given out today by the Overseas News Agency. It follows:— "The colossal scale on which arrangements were made to supply the armies caused a sensation in the towns evacuated by the Russians. Hundreds of thousands of troops between the Vistula and the Bug are being fed as well as given warm meals daily. Great herds of cattle are driven behind the advancing troops."

MORE MEXICANS CROSS THE BORDER

Several Hundred Are Invading Texas THE NORIAS RANCH FIGHT Meagre Reports Tell of Attack by Bandits—Driven Off With Loss of Several Killed—U. S. Soldiers Wounded

Brownsville, Texas, Aug. 9.—With the expectation that United States soldiers might be sent to the border to relieve the situation, caused by the attack of Mexican bandits, border officials here yesterday received information that 800 Mexicans had crossed the border in Hidalgo county, Texas, and were making their way to a concentration point. What this portended, none of the officials would say.

Husbands Will Not Need Consent Of Wives To Enlist

(Special to Times) Ottawa, Aug. 9.—Objections by wives to their husbands enlisting for overseas service will no longer be regarded by the Canadian military authorities. Neither will the objections of parents to minor sons serving, providing they are over 18 years of age. It will not be possible hereafter for an enlisted Canadian to buy his discharge for \$15. When war opened the Canadian enlistment began General Hughes as minister of militia had regulations made under which the written consent of a wife was required to legalise a husband's enlistment and that of the parents for minor sons. Many capable men were refused places as a result of this regulation.

S., and thence to friends here, he tells of his thrilling adventures, which include a narrow escape from a "listening post" of his own battalion while out in front of the line with a reconnoitering party at night and also of having a hole shot through his haversack by a sniper.

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French Armies Check Fresh German Advances

Paris, Aug. 9.—The French War Department today gave out the following official statement: "There was much going on last night in the Artois district. In the sector to the north of Arras, a German attack at a point north of the railroad station of Souchez was repulsed. In the sector of Neuville St. Vaast, to the east of the road to Lille, the Germans, after exploding a mine, bombarded our positions violently and endeavored to come out from their trenches. They were at once checked by the fire of our infantry and our artillery. "In the Argonne, not far from the road running from Viellen-Le-Chateau to Binarville, the enemy last night delivered an attack on our advanced posts and trenches, making use of hand grenades and bombs. They were driven back to their lines by our fire. "In the western section of the forest, which extends from Haule Cheveche to Vaunoy, there was fighting with bombs, hand grenades and rifles which lasted a portion of the night. "In the Vosges a fresh German attack delivered at about one o'clock in the morning but was a complete failure. A curtain of fire maintained by our troops inflicted perceptible losses on the enemy."

TRENCH LIFE DESCRIBED

Letter of Interest From Lieut. Theo. R. McNally to Mother

Lieut. Theodore R. McNally, formerly of the 19th Battalion, but now in France with the 1st Battalion is a letter to his mother, Mrs. C. McNally, of Fredericton, gives the following interesting account of life in the trenches.

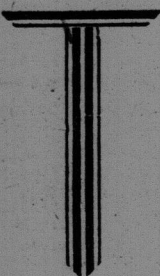

MORNING WAR CABLES

London, Aug. 8.—Reuter's correspondent at Petrograd transmits the following: "The Bourne Gazette learns from an unimpeachable source that the German emperor made an offer of peace to Russia last week, through the King of Denmark."

London, Aug. 7.—The correspondent at Amsterdam of the Exchange Telegraph Company hears from Berlin the early resignation of Gottlieb Von Jagow, the German foreign secretary is probable.

The foreign secretary's successor, the correspondent adds probably will be Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, under secretary of foreign affairs.

London, Aug. 8.—The Germans continue to make progress in all directions in their efforts to cut off the retreat of the Russian army from the Polish salient. They have commenced an attack on the fortress of Kovno and Osowets, which are among the obstacles they must overcome in order to reach the railway running from Warsaw through Vilna, and Drinsk to Petrograd.

They have taken in the minor fortress of Serock, at the junction of the Narw and the Bug, and have crossed the Vistula in the vicinity of Warsaw. Further south General Woytko is advancing eastward, but Field Marshal Mackensson is being stubbornly resisted and apparently making, at the best, very slow progress.

On the eastern front the daring scheme mapped out by the Germans as a grand sequel to the capture of Warsaw—the destruction of the Russian army—is unfolding itself slowly, as must be the case from its very magnitude. With the three main railways, besides those built since the war, it is in military circles here that the Grand Duke Nicholas was able to exist in the Warsaw army. The events in the east, however, will continue to rivet the attention of the world on them for some time to come.

Famous Actor Actor to Play With Fox Co. in Modern Drama

NOTES OF STAGE AND SCREEN

The latest recruit from the legitimate stage to the movies is Robt. B. Mantell, an actor, who is well known in St. John. He has signed with the William Fox Motion Picture Company to act in the pictures of the modern drama.

Mr. Gardner said he was born in Fifth Avenue, New York, and was a member of the original "Belle of New York" Company. He had been twenty-four years in England, touring with various companies, and he had visited Grimsby several times. He understood that a German had played Carl von Pumpernickel, but that the man had been in the land since the war. As an American an alien was necessary.

The magistrate said it was a serious matter for an alien to be found within a prohibited area, but having regard to Mr. Gardner's nationality and his long residence in England, he imposed only a nominal fine—one guinea.
