It appears that General Von Keller, who is believed to be a Russian nobleman of German descent, is at the head of the movement, and it is charged that the German occupation troops under General Von Der Goltz, who recently was recalled from the Baltic on the demand of the Allies, are working with Von Keller.

Previous reports in despatches to the British war office given out in London on August 18, reported that the Bolsheviki had been driven from Odessa by the populace.

SOME INFORMAL FEATURES IN THE PRINCE'S WELCOME

Small Boy in Bathing Suit Among Thousands Who Shook Hands at Public Reception-Out of His Berth to Speak at Smith's

Toronto, Aug. 25—From out amon the many incidents of this day—probabl the busiest that Edward Albert has spen since the inception of the present tour-stands out boldly this fact, that his royal highness is not only a soldier prince, and a fighting soldier at that, but that he is also intensely democratic and most

loveably human.

Of the half million population of this city, probably two hundred and fifty thousand today have seen the prince, or at least had a glimpse of him. Many of these had the pleasure of hearing him speak; a few were fortunate enough to grasp the hand of the coming king. These few included all classes of persons, from a score or more of belted knights to a little barefoot boy, clad in a bathing suit, who mixed up with the throng at the public reception in the city hall this evening, dodged between a policeman's legs and shook hands like the rest, when his turn in line came.

The prince laughed heartily at the rather unconventional evening dress, and remarked:

That was one incident near the close of a heavy day. Another was in connection with two shell shocked soldiers, who just after passing and shaking hands with the prince fainted and had to be carried into an ante room of the city council chamber, where the reception took place. When the time for the public reception was concluded, and the party had to leave, the prince declined to leave the building before he personally visited the two veterans and made sure of their comfort.

In Captain's Uniform.

The state dinner at Government House the concluding feature of a strenuous day for the heir to the throne. It started soon after 10 in the morning, when the royal train arrived. His royal highness immediately hit a responsive chord in this city of sixty thousand war veterans— mostly army veterans—when he ap-peared for the first time on this side of peared for the first time on this side of the water, in his military uniform, as a captain in the Welsh Guards, with whom he served in Flanders, side by side with the Fighting Canadians. From that hour, Toronto's tumultuous welcome grew, until in front of the city hall tonight, there was a near riot, as the police tried to control the crowds, who crushed and crowded for an opportunity to get into the public reception. "'Who is it?' asked General Scott, with a note of anticipation in his voice.


