B UT, sir, political eminence and professional fame fade away and die with all earthly things. Nothing of character is really permanent but virtue and personal worth. These remain. Whatever of excellence is wrought into the soul itself belongs to both worlds. Real goodness does not attach itself merely to this life; it points to another world. Political or professional reputation cannot last forever; but a conscience void of offence before God and man is an inheritance of eternity. Religion, there fore, is a necessary and indispensable element in any great human character. There is no living without it. Religion is the tie that connects man with his Creator and holds him to His throne.

If that the be all sundered, all broken, he floats away, a worthless atom in the universe; its proper attractions all gone, its destiny thwarded, and its whole future nothing but darkness, desolation and death. A man with no sense of religious duty is he whom the Scriptures describe in such terse but terrific language as living 'without God in the world." WONDER if there is a person in my audience who owns any books at all, who has never in his life lost a book by loaning it to some one who completely omitted the little ceremony of returning it.
