College, at Antigonish, N.S. In 1862 he renounced the Church of Rome, and was received by the Right Reverend Dr. Cronyn, Bishop of Huron, into the Church of England, and was appointed to Port Stanley. From 1866 to 1871 he was examiner of modern languages in the University of Toronto, and was subsequently Rector of Trinity Church, Port Burwell. He fell asleep in Christ, at Bismark, on the 15th day of December last, leaving a widow and family to mourn his loss. All who knew the late doctor, will agree with me in saying, he was in many respects a most remarkable man. His deep piety, his vast learning and unaffected humility rendered him attractive in the highest degree, for people felt drawn towards him by the sheer force of his own intrinsic worth. I wish also to record that though superannuated he never for a moment desisted from work; and it was on a Sabbath morning, when preparing to go to church, that the Lord called him to Himself.

**THE REV. RICHARD STEPHEN COOPER.** The Diocese has also to mourn the loss of another well-known member of this Synod; I refer to the late Rev. Richard Stephen Cooper, who for thirty-two years was Rector of the Parish of Invermay, and for a long time Rural Dean of Bruce. He had but lately removed to the Parish of Kirkton, where after a very short pastorate, he was struck down with paralysis, from the effects of which he died on the 8th of last November. He was a devoted churchman, and anxious to do all in his power for her stability and progress. He leaves behind many earnest friends, both among the clergy and laity.

**REV. WILLIAM WOOD.** The late Rev. William Wood commenced service in that part of the Diocese of Toronto, which is now called the Diocese of Huron, as a Catechist and Lay Reader, in the employ of the Colonial and Continental Society in the year 1855. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Cronyn, July 4th, 1858, and Priest in December, 1859. His sphere of labor was wholly confined to the county of Norfolk. There is a record of him that he was never known to be absent from his post. After twenty-three years of service as Catechist and Clergymen, he retired in 1878 into private life. He was much loved by all who knew him. He fell asleep in Jesus on the 30th of last May.

**SUPERANNUATED.**

The Rev. Charles Raymond Matthew, Honorary Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral, so long and so highly esteemed throughout the Diocese has, after thirty years of laborious and faithful service, been placed on the list of the superannuated clergy.

**CLERICAL CHANGES.**

Since last we met in Synod, the following clergymen, ordained by other Bishops, have been admitted into this Diocese.  
1st. The Rev. Benjamin Watkins, M.A., Late Foundation Scholar of Jesus College, Cambridge, and formerly Professor of

Classical in the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, has been appointed Principal of Huron College, in the room of the Rev. Herbert Gordon Miller, M.A., resigned, and Provost of the Western University, now, I am happy to say, in full operation in this city. He has been licenced to the Cathedral.

2nd. The Rev. Alfred George Dann, B.A., of Queen's University, Ireland, formerly Rector of Kilkeedy in the Diocese of Limerick, and Canon of the Cathedral, has been appointed Assistant Minister in St. Paul's Cathedral, London.

3rd. The Rev. Edward Jeffery May, of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge; Late Curate of Pilling, in the Diocese of Manchester, England. Mr. May has been appointed Assistant Minister in St. Paul's Church, Woodstock.

The following clergymen have left the Diocese for otherspheres of labor:—

1st. The Rev. Herbert Gordon Miller, M.A., formerly Principal of Huron College, a man of great ability, and one of whom the Diocese had reason to be proud, has resigned his charge, and is now taking duty in the Diocese of Montreal.

2nd. The Rev. Arthur Grasset Snuth, late missionary to the Munceytown Indians, has removed to the Diocese of Ontario.

3rd. The Rev. Louis Wood, formerly Rector of Wingham, has removed to the Diocese of Toronto.

4th. The Rev. James Thompson, formerly Rector of Kincardine, has left us to study at Trinity College, Dublin.

5th. The Rev. James Arthur Tancock, formerly Assistant Minister in Grace Church, Brantford, has left us to accept a position in the United States.

6th. The Rev. George Andrew Robson, late Incumbent of Bayfield, has left us to accept a curacy at Bridgeport, in the Diocese of Connecticut.

#### THE MISSION FUND.

Concerning this fund, toward which all eyes are naturally turned, the best thing I have to say is that this year the discouraging deficit of the past has not presented itself and that we have the encouragement of knowing that our receipts were some \$200 more than our disbursements.

A short review of our debt may not be unprofitable. It was in the year ending April 30th, 1891, that our unwelcome debt first appeared. At that Synod it was shewn that there was an overdraft of \$4,015.44; 1892 was the year of Consolidation, which apparently wiped out the debt, leaving only the modest sum against us of \$137. In 1893 the \$137 of debt had risen to \$4,605.71. In 1894 this had become \$12,000.80, and in 1895 \$14,693.87. This year, I am most thankful to say, that though the debt has not been removed, yet it has not been increased, but rather is the balance on the other side of the page.

Having now stated so much in the matter of joy and congratulation, allow me to draw your respectful attention to the somewhat serious exhibit of our annual balance sheet.

Surveying the leading funds and collections, both for Diocesan and extra-Diocesan objects, for the past year, we find the following returns:—First, as regards *The General Purpose Fund*.

Contrasting this year with the last, we find that while in 1895 the receipts for this fund were \$5,191.10; for 1896, they are only \$4,464.92, being \$726.18 less. It is, however, only fair to say that some allowance must be made for the new mode of apportionment, which at present regulates this fund, which is, that all unappropriated funds coming into the Synod office are divided strictly according to the following ratio: One-half is given to the Mission Fund, three-eighths to the General Purpose Fund, and one-eighth to the Widows and Orphans' Fund. While this law came into force more than a year ago, there has been only one full year to judge of its results, and though the new method may possibly account for some difference in the receipts, yet the discrepancy is too great to impute it all to the above mentioned cause. Coming now to the *Mission Fund* itself, we find an actual increase. In 1895, the receipts were \$3,924.37, but in 1896 \$4,213.13, being in excess of the past \$288.76. This is satisfactory as far as it goes, but I am justified in saying, that under other conditions, which I hope to mention hereafter; the Mission Fund would be in a far more hopeful position to-day.

#### *The Widows and Orphans' Fund.*

In 1895 the receipts for this fund were \$1,826.61, in 1896 \$1,592.69, \$233.92 less. As this fund has always been extremely popular with our people, some reason has to be found for the diminution, and I think it lies in this, that so long as a bona fide collection was made for the Widows and Orphans of the Diocese, congregations gave as they were disposed toward them, and that was most warmly; when, however, a bulk sum is sent in at the close of the year to the office, it is divided by a cold arithmetical process among several funds, and the Widows and Orphans' Fund loses the whole benefit of the enthusiasm which it always inspires. Synod Assessments have risen under the new law, from \$788.50 in 1895 to \$1,118.60 in 1896.

Turning now to objects other than Diocesan, I observe that the response to the Ascensiontide appeal was this year \$754.16, being \$150.51 less than that of the previous year. This is the more serious, inasmuch as the C. M. S. is withdrawing some of its grants to the North West, at the rate of twenty per cent. per annum; while the S. P. G. has notified me that all their grants to Canada shall cease and determine in 1900, or less than four years from the present date. The response to the Epiphanytide appeal was \$1,150.61, or \$80.04

in excess of last year. I should be most thankful if this Diocese were to wake up more to the great work of Missions, as I am persuaded it is the pathway of blessing; and that as we help others, we shall be graciously blessed ourselves. In this connection I cannot help quoting the words of the present Archbishop of Canterbury, who recently uttered these weighty words: "No Church is living as a Church which is not fulfilling the command of commands. Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature. The first duty of a christian is to make other people christians, and the first duty of a church is to reproduce itself and to make other christian churches."

With regard to the general receipts for the past year, I would like to make the following remarks:—

*First.*—That the sincere thanks of this Diocese are due to the many clergymen and congregations who have with the most praiseworthy diligence, shown their loyalty and devotion by increased subscriptions to the General Funds. Some have not only sent in their required assessments, but largely supplemented them, showing a will which is far more grateful than the gift itself. And even in cases where the amount sent in may have fallen considerably short of the sum designated by Synod, I am sure we all have the generosity to believe that none regret the fact more than the clergy and congregations themselves; deterrent, though unmentioned causes, have hindered the outflow of their accustomed liberality. The matter, however, which will arouse the just indignation of this Synod is this, that notwithstanding all that has been said about the absolute necessity of sending in increased contributions to the General Fund, owing to the serious debt now resting upon it, so many of the Clergy have exhibited not only toward this Fund, which by every consideration they are bound to support, but also toward the expansion of the Redeemer's Kingdom on earth, which surely should arouse the sympathy of every christian, the most utter carelessness, apathy and indifference. The successful working of the Mission Fund depends not so much upon statutory law as on the unswerving loyalty of all the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, and sure I am that if all our people could only see the matter in this light, there would soon be such a response as would cheer and invigorate our hearts. In the meantime I quite agree with Canon Young in his report on Income and Expenditure, that these gentlemen owe the Diocese an explanation for at least the apparent indifference which they exhibited. Certainly this state of things cannot be permitted in the future, as it is not only injurious to the Diocese at large, but most discouraging to those clergymen and congregations who are endeavoring to do all in their power to alleviate the present distress. Let us earnestly hope and fervently pray that by the blessing of God a healthier spirit will soon prevail, and that our only emulation will be to see how much

each one can do for the glory of God and the advancement of His cause. Yet after all, we are bound to remember that the prosperity of this, or any other Diocese, does not depend on the vastness of its numbers, the dignity of its position or the abundance of its wealth, but only on its absolute fidelity and subjection to its Lord and Master Jesus Christ. "Them that honor Me" He says, "I will honor, and those that dispise me shall be lightly esteemed". To the Clergy therefore I would say: Preach Christ in your pulpits, and work for him in the fields allotted to your care. Let His life be seen in you and His glory shine out of you, and as the needle points only to the north, let your whole ministry be a pointing dying men to the Lamb of God who taketh away the sin of the world. We need a ministry that believes in Jesus Christ. I mean a ministry that believes in Jesus Christ against the whole world: That not merely believes that Jesus Christ is a power, or even a great power, but that all power in heaven and earth is His; that He is before all things, and that by him all things consist; that He is not only King, but King of kings, and Lord of lords; that believes as it uplifts Christ, as the infinite Salvation of God; a blessing not only *may* but *must* follow, because He is the Power of God, and because now is the hour when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God, and they that hear shall live. And to the Laity I would say: Lay down your service at His hallowed feet. Let Christ reign as undisputed Lord over thought and word and work, "and as you make His service your delight He'll make your wants His care."

The last and worst thing that can happen us is to grow discouraged. Far more than others our people need education in the matter of giving. Their parents who came from England were accustomed to a State Church, which neither asked nor expected help from its members. Under that system they grew up, and from its effects we are suffering in all our churches to-day; and therefore we must not be astonished if many of our people recoil even yet at the thought of having to support adequately a Church, which however earnestly she may ask for financial help, popular tradition credits with having a silent river of wealth flowing unseen to human eyes into her inexhaustible coffers. No, discouraged we must not and will not be. Through God's mercy all these difficulties will ere long vanish. Only let us get nearer to the Throne of Grace; let us have more of the spirit of our self-sacrificing Master, who for our sakes became poor that we through His poverty might become rich, and then not only will our Diocese sustain abundantly its own Missions, but have much to send abroad for the evangelization of a dying world. Of one thing I am certain that it is the paramount duty of every clergyman and every layman in this Diocese for the glory of God, the honor of our Church, and the future welfare of our people to do all they possibly can, not only to expunge the debt of the past, but to lighten our expenses in the future. A pro rata reduction would create such misery that it should call forth all our energies to avert it.

CHURCHWARDENS—THEIR DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.

I have said so much in the past both to the Clergy and Laity in general on various subjects, that I think a few words of kindly counsel addressed particularly to a most important part of our Ecclesiastical system may not be deemed out of place. When we consider how vast a place Churchwardens occupy in the yearly administration of our Parishes, and how great a power they may exercise, if good for that which is good, if indifferent for that which is evil. I feel sure you will bear with me if I speak freely of a subject too little mentioned in our annual meetings of Synod.

With this preface I shall begin by saying:—

*First.—That all Churchwardens should be regular communicants.*

I say "should be" for two reasons; first because Ecclesiastical law inferentially states that they should communicate at least three times in the year, and secondly because they who occupy so prominent a position, in the Church should at least be examples to the flock at large.

As regards Ecclesiastical Law, the notice at the end of the Communion office says: "*Every Parishioner shall communicate at the least three times in the year, of which Easter shall be one.*" The legal inference here is clear: Every Parishioner must communicate at least three times in the year, and surely a Warden should be a Parishioner; for if he is not a Parishioner, who is he? Surely a stranger and an alien.

There is, however, a deeper and more binding law and that is, that all those who occupy prominent positions before the congregation should not only be moral men, but men in open communion with the Lord Himself, who is not only the supreme Head of the Church, but the eternal foundation on which the whole superstructure is reared. And here I would like to say that this self-evident law should apply to all, and happy would it be for the Church, if all her office holders, wardens, sidesmen, organists, choir members and sextons were required to be men of known piety and in full communion with the Church. History shews us that the Church of the Catacombs, with all its members in the hallowed unity with their Lord, was mightier far than even the throne of the Cæsars backed by all the power of Imperial Rome.

*Secondly.—Churchwardens should be in sympathy with their congregations.*

It is marvellous how much good wardens may do to build up a congregation. They can not only look after the finances, but encourage every good word and work. By active co-operation with the members they can increase the membership, improve the fabric and extend the usefulness of the office they hold in a thousand ways

which will present themselves to every man who really wishes efficiently to do his work. Many a clergyman finds that though he has worked with all his might and main, yet things do not prosper in the parish simply because he had weak and inefficient wardens. It is not that they are in opposition to him, but rather that they let every thing go as it may. If people pay up their subscriptions and actually place them in their hands, all well and good, but if not, no fair and capable canvass is made, and the result is that at the close of the financial year the clergyman is crushed and humiliated by being told that the church is not able to pay its debt, and it goes abroad that he is not a success, whereas poor man he has left no stone unturned to advance the glory of God and the welfare of his church. On the other hand you see some wardens who have the cause at heart, they are out bright and early, saying kind words and good, correcting false impressions, cheering and encouraging, and doing all they can to build up the spiritual and temporal welfare of the church.

*Thirdly.—Churchwardens should be in sympathy with the clergymen.*

Clergymen of all others need sympathy. They are public men, always going before the public, and therefore peculiarly subject to all the criticism and ill concealed hostility of those to whom for one reason or another they may be obnoxious. Churchwardens may cheer them vastly. They can act the good part of Aaron and Hur and hold up their hands, say a kind word and give them the cordial of their sympathy. Among the cares of a clergyman, however, are temporal anxieties. His means are often limited and confined absolutely to what his people give him. Grocers, bakers and clothiers' bills come in with frightful regularity. These he expects to meet with his quarterly allowance from the people, but when the day comes, the wardens have not collected it, and they simply maintain a dreadful embarrassing silence. He is deeply disappointed and has the humiliation of having to tell his creditors that he has further to postpone their payment. But sometimes the wardens say, We have made the effort and people have put us off saying they will give us when they have the means and ask what are they to do in such cases. I answer that it does not seem fair to me when a clergyman has honestly and laboriously done his work, that he should have to wait until every parishioner finds it convenient to pay his quota. Surely it is the parish itself and not the minister who should bear the burden of the delay, and therefore I would strongly advise all churchwardens to make if possible some arrangements by which promptness may be secured, their clergy encouraged and the credit of the Church maintained.

*Fourthly.—Churchwardens should be in sympathy with the Diocese.*

The Executive Committee has helped in the past an enormous number of Parishes in this Diocese; not only to the full extent of its

means, but, I am sorry to say, beyond its means; and now that it has the burden of debt resting upon it, the Diocese turns to you wardens and ask not only for your hearty sympathy, but for your most active co-operation. We feel sure you will extend us both, and if you ask how you are to help us, I would answer by doing all you can to have all the various Diocesan collections sent in from your respective parishes with as great promptness and regularity as your circumstances will permit.

We do not demand, or even expect that they should be great, but we do humbly ask that they should be made, and if you will only assist your clergymen, and grasp the great truth that we are all one Church, working for one end, namely, the common good of the Diocese, I am sure that with the blessing of God all cause of anxiety, at least as regards financial matters, would speedily pass away. One element in the future success of this important Diocese is: That we should have good and efficient wardens.

#### THE WESTERN UNIVERSITY.

Some of you are doubtless aware of the strong desire expressed by the House of Bishops, that the standard of education required of those seeking holy ministry should be raised, and that without any further or unnecessary delay. In order that you may see how strong this desire is, I ask your careful attention to the following resolution agreed to by the House of Bishops, at a meeting held at the time of the last session of the Provincial Synod, September, 1895.

"That the House of Bishops inform those whom it may concern, that in their judgment the time has come when the interests of the Church will not suffer, but be promoted by the adoption generally of a higher and, so far as practicable, an uniform standard of intellectual attainments for those who are to be ordained, and that the House of Bishops do recommend that the Bishops should as a rule receive for their examinations in Doctrine Homiletics and Pastoral Theology, only those who have graduated at some recognised University, taken a Divinity course, and can produce a certificate that they have passed the Voluntary Preliminary Examination, provided under the Canon of Divinity degrees in this Ecclesiastical Province."

In harmony with the spirit of this resolution, Huron College has raised its standard of admission, making it now necessary for a student, if he desire to enter the College, first to matriculate at some chartered University. The further steps of requiring a degree in Arts before ordination will doubtless follow as soon as circumstances will admit.

In connection with this subject, it gives me much pleasure to announce that the Western University re-established in October last its Arts Course, and that it has now completed its first academical year with the greatest satisfaction, not only to myself, but to the many friends who have watched its proceedings. Its prosperity, I am thankful to say, exceeded our most sanguine expectations, for when we thought that if we had twenty students we would be doing well,

As the government of this Institution is wholly vested in the Church of England, and the property ours, I am most anxious that this Synod should not only extend its sympathy toward it, but take part in its government. The Senate of the Western University on the 20th of last March passed the following resolution:—

“That in order to interest the Synod of Huron and its members in the Western University, this Senate is desirous that the Synod at its June meeting should nominate four members thereof, (two Clerical and two Lay) for appointment by this Senate as members thereof. Such Senators so nominated by the Synod and appointed by the Senate to retire annually, but to be eligible for re-nomination and re-appointment. All or any gentleman so nominated by the Synod to be duly qualified according to the Acts and Statutes of the University for membership in the Senate.”

In pursuance with the above, I sincerely trust that the Synod will at this session nominate four members to represent it on the Senate, and thus by this action shew its good will and sympathy in the College.

Having made this request, I would now ask the sympathy of the Diocese at large, and express the hope that the members of the Diocese of Huron will remember that we have now in London a chartered University of our own, acknowledged as such both by the Government and Sister Institutions; where their sons and daughters may obtain the benefits of Collegiate education, and that academic standing which is so essential in many departments of life. I ask in this respect the hearty co-operation of the whole Diocese.

#### HURON ANGLICAN LAY WORKERS' ASSOCIATION.

This Association held a most successful Annual Convention on the 24th and 25th of last October, in the city of Windsor. The attendance was admirable, being increased by a goodly number of friends from the great city of Detroit, immediately opposite. Among the speakers was a most distinguished layman from England, Mr. Eugene Stock, Editorial Secretary of the Church Missionary Society. Among other speakers from abroad were Messrs. R. E. Jamieson and W. Aikman, General Trowbridge and Rev. P. E. Swett, all of Detroit. As usual Mr. Dymond and Rev. John Downie left no stone unturned to make the gathering a success. Great praise is due to these gentlemen for their uniform zeal and self-sacrifice in the cause. The Rector of the Parish, the Rev. Canon Hincks, together with the congregation, received the hearty thanks of the Convention for their uniform kindness and hospitality. The next annual gathering will be held, God willing, in the town of Clinton. I would extend an invitation to all the clergy and laymen interested in Sunday Schools and Lay Agency to be present on the occasion.

## THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

I think that every candid mind will admit, however much may be said to the contrary, that the composition of the Executive Committee is excellent, and fairly representative of the Diocese at large, I have however observed that occasionally a county is forgotten, so that there is no clerical representative whatever from it on the central board. This always produces a certain amount of dissatisfaction on the part of the county omitted, for as Faber wisely says:—

“Little weighs more than much  
“When it has no redress.”

To meet this difficulty no change of any kind is needed in our mode of election. The grievance, whether real or imaginary can easily be obviated, if voters, in giving in their lists, will see that they have nominated representatives from every county. I would particularly request that this caution be taken in all future elections.

## RELIGION IN OUR COMMON SCHOOLS.

If there is one subject more than other which demands the most thoughtful and serious attention, not only of this Diocese but of the whole Canadian Church, it is the religious education of the many thousand children attending our Common Schools. I wish it clearly understood that I am not approaching the subject from any political or popular standpoint, but from the position which I think all right-minded men will occupy, that our Church is bound by every cord of loyalty to her Divine Head to do all in her power to give her children the blessings of sound and religious teaching. I am not speaking now in favor of separate schools, indeed I do not wish to say one word now upon the subject, but rather to draw your attention to the lack of all adequate religious instruction in our Common and High Schools. Permit me to refer you, as necessitating action in the matter, to the weighty words of Mr. Justice Street, when on the Bench in Hamilton. The jury in their presentment had laid the blame of the many instances of juvenile crime on importations of lawless youths from abroad. In reply, the learned Judge told them that having examined the subject himself, he must dissent from their conclusions as he found the boys who committed these crimes were from our Common Schools, where they failed to receive that moral teaching which is so essentially necessary for their proper development.

Words like these coming from the Bench, and from the lips of one honored by all who know him, ought not lightly to be laid aside. In fact any further negligence in the matter will become a crime. Now the facts as to Biblical education in the schools are these: The school is to be opened by the offering up of the Lord's Prayer in the morning, and to be closed in the afternoon by reading a portion of the Word of God, either from the selections made by Government or from the text itself and the Lord's Prayer. object himself to this, some arrangement may be made for its due performance by the Trustees, in failure of which I suppose that even these brief religious exercises would have to be dispensed with. We are also told that no note or comment on the Holy Scripture is permitted, but that if we wish to instruct our children, a clergyman may do so at four o'clock when the school is over. I was not however aware that we are dependent on the School Trustees for permission to teach our children after school is over. I imagine we can then make what arrangements we please. But children at that hour are wearied with the various tasks they have had throughout the day, and are therefore unfit for the spiritual instruction of which we speak. What therefore we need—what therefore we must have, is a statutory right at certain times, and for a reasonable space, to teach our own children in the Common Schools, and train them up in the knowledge of that Blessed Saviour by whom alone they can overcome sin, and live as righteous people amid the trials and temptations of this wicked world. The action I would suggest is this—that this house memorialize the General Synod to take up the whole subject of religious education in our Common Schools, and endeavor to secure, as speedily as possible, such legislation as will enable our clergy to teach our own children in the working hours of the day the principles of eternal truth.

#### THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

I cannot but reflect with gratitude on the work of the Women's Auxiliary in this Diocese. Whether I look on the noble work it is doing in the North West in relieving so many Missions and in cheering them with substantial help, or regard the reflex influence which this activity has upon ourselves at home, I see accumulating evidence as to its internal excellence and to the benefit which it confers on the Diocese at large. I recognize Women's work in the Church as ordained of God, and trust that superabounding grace may be given to all its members to consecrate more and more of their time and talents to the blessed service of their Lord.

#### CANADIAN EDITION OF THE PRAYER BOOK.

I trust that the movement now on foot to procure a Canadian Edition of the Book of Common Prayer will be successful in its efforts. The object of the promoters is to have an edition in which the distinctive prayers and offices authorized by the Provincial Synod may be printed in the text. Such an edition would greatly commend itself to the Clergy of Canada, though I imagine much opposition may be manifested to the scheme when discussed by the Church at large.

## CONFIRMATIONS.

I have held throughout the year 85 Confirmations of which 9 were in Algoma and 76 in Huron.

At these 85 Confirmations I have confirmed 498 young men, and 868 young women. In the Diocese of Huron there were 470 young men, and 823 young women. Total confirmed in the Diocese of Huron 1,293. In the Confirmations taken by me in the Diocese of Algoma there were 28 young men, and 45 young women.

Total number confirmed by me throughout the year 1,366. I cannot but draw the attention of the Clergy to the enormous proportion of young women compared with that of the men. In some instances the classes have only consisted of women. I would urge therefore their thoughtful consideration of the whole matter, to see if some steps may not be taken to gather in more of our young men from the paths of the destroyer.

On Sunday morning, December 29th, I opened an exceedingly graceful church in London—St. Matthew's, on East Dundas Street. Incumbent the Rev. W. M. Seaborn. Dimensions, 76 x 36 feet; accommodation, 350; approximate cost, including lot, \$8000; present liability, \$3,500.

The Rector and Congregation deserve great praise for the zeal and self-sacrifice they have shown in the erection of their Church, and I trust they may see continued blessings for their work.

The Congregation at Wallaceburg have also erected throughout the past year, an exceedingly handsome and commodious Church for which it deserves a very high measure of praise. The Church there has had many difficulties to overcome, and therefore the more honor to it for the good work which it had accomplished. The Incumbent is the Rev. Alexander Corbett, formerly of Thorn-  
dale.

And, now, committing you to the perfect guidance of God, I trust that His most Holy Spirit may lead you to a right judgment in all things to the glory of His Name and the advancement of the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Receiving Report of Executive Committee.

The annual report of the Executive Committee was presented, and printed copies distributed. The printed audited accounts were also placed in the hands of the members of the Synod.

The Executive Committee beg to present herewith their annual report.

The accounts for the year have been audited and printed, and are submitted herewith together with the tabulated statement of collections received from the different parishes in the Diocese according to Deaneries.

TOTAL FREE-WILL CONTRIBUTIONS AND ASSESSMENTS.

It will be observed from the first page of the accounts that the total free will contributions and assessments for Synod, and all other purposes, amount to \$21,277.73, an increase for the year of \$112.26. The contributions for Synod objects fell off by \$328.94, but those for other objects show an increase of \$441.20. The special collections for the Armenians, which were very large in most cases, having amounted to \$1,097.34

It is greatly to be regretted that the collections for the past year were not at least equal to those of the year before. The financial depression and the poor harvests in some localities are no doubt partly the cause of the reduction, but our committee must express their opinion that the chief reason for the above deficiency of \$779.61 is to be found by an examination of the tabulated collection sheets.

The amount of the required contributions from the whole Diocese on the basis of one dollar per family, was \$12,636.63. The amount actually received was \$8,906.01, or about 70 per cent. The percentage for the previous year was 67 per cent, but the number of families returned was larger. The percentage raised by each Deanery for the past and previous year is as follows:

THE GENERAL PURPOSE FUND.

The subscriptions and parochial association collections received amounted to \$4429.92; arrears of W. and O. subscriptions to \$20.00, and a donation from Rev. W. Shortt, Barrie, of \$15.00. Out of this there was paid to Lay Readers, Indian Interpreters and School Teachers, \$756.25; special grants, \$237.50; costs and counsel fees Wye appeal at Kingston, \$564.40; transferred to Episcopal and Archdeacon's Fund, \$387.50; Provincial Synod Assessment, \$150.00, and other items, leaving a balance of \$1382.46, which has been carried to the credit of the Mission Fund.

MISSION FUND.

The subscriptions and collections for this fund for the year were \$3586.93. Collections on Bishop's visits, \$111.74. Bequests and donations, \$429.80. The Women's Auxiliary Missionary Association, for Lion's Head, \$296.50. Interest on Mission Fund Investments, \$194.87. Interest on Sustentation Fund Investments, \$2514.64. Transferred from Commutation Fund, \$4855.83.

The Requests include \$200.00 from late Mrs. Charles Jenkins, Petrolia, and \$25.00 interest from the estate of the late Mary A. Hart, per Ven. Archdeacon Davis, and the donations, \$150.00 from Rev. G. M. Cox; \$45.00 from Rev. W. M. Shore; also \$31.29 from the Wardens of Hyde Park, being a portion of the Mission Fund Grant.

The sum of \$12103.20 was paid in grants in accordance with the provisions of the Mission Fund Canon, and \$896.62 in interest on overdraft, leaving the account overdrawn at the end of the year \$14472.45 as against \$14693.87 at the beginning of the year, a reduction of \$221.42. Had the collections for the year been only equal to last year, the overdraft would have been further reduced by \$633.69.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The sum of \$2017.69 (\$145.92 less than the previous year) was received from collections, etc.; entrance fees and annual subscriptions amounted to \$560.00, and interest on W. and O. Fund Investments to \$3476.64.

There was paid to widows and orphans, pursuant to the Canon, \$5760.00, (being \$520.00 more than the previous year) leaving the balance on hand, \$261.61.

A bequest of \$50.00 was received from the estate of the late Rev. T. E. Sanders, and added to the capital account, which is now \$6705.00.

There are 29 widows on the fund, four having been added during the year, viz: The widows of the late Rev. Dr. Armstrong, Rev. R. S. Cooper, Rev. T. E. Sanders and Rev. Dr. Schulte.

The decreased contributions and increased demands have reduced the balance on hand from \$1032.16 to \$261.61, and every care should be taken that the fund is not overburdened. Your committee would suggest the reconsideration of the section of the construction dealing with the method of making the necessary collections.

## COMMUTATION FUND.

The number at present on this fund is 18, of which 4 are commuted and 14 superannuated clergymen, one of the commuted being also superannuated.

The Rev. Dr. Schulte, who was on the fund, died during the year.

## CONSOLIDATED CAPITAL ACCOUNT.

The rate of interest earned for the year upon the consolidated capital account was a little over 5.46%. The trust funds held for investment have been kept fairly well invested during the year and loans on mortgages made to the extent of \$70806.78.

Receiving Reports of Other Committees of Synod.

1. The Report of the Committee on Religious Instruction in Schools.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :—

1. That agreeably to the power vested in the Committee on Religious Instruction in Public Schools to co-operate with similar Committees of other Diocesan Synods, your Committee met on Thursday, March 19th, and resolved to accept the invitation extended by the Toronto Diocesan Committee, to meet in conference with that committee in Toronto, on April 14th.

2. At this conference, duly held April 14th, members of Diocesan Committees were present from the Diocese of Toronto, Niagara and Huron, and Resolutions were passed as follows :—

(a) That the Conference consisting of representatives of the Diocesan Committees of Toronto, Huron and Niagara concurs in the action taken by the Synod of Toronto asking for an amendment of the School Law of the Province of Ontario, in order to make provision for religious instruction being given for one-half hour daily during school hours, by the Ministers of the various Christian communities, or their representatives, to the children of their own Communion.

(b) Resolved that a Committee be appointed in connection with such other Synods or bodies as will join therein, to wait on the Minister of Education and urge further provisions for religious instruction in the Public Schools, in the Province of Ontario, by giving one-half hour daily, during schools hours, for such instruction, and by the introduction of the Bible as a text book in such schools to be read, memorized and made the subject of examination.

3. In accordance with these resolutions a conference was subsequently held between the Committee appointed April 14th and the Minister of Education, at which the reasons which prompted the resolutions and the results which, if made operative, they were calculated to effect were fully considered and discussed.

4. The Minister of Education expressed his sympathy with the object the Committee had in view, and promised to lay it before the Government for its consideration. He also expressed the hope that the whole question of Religious Instruction in the Public Schools would be presented to the Council for its consideration, and that some basis or system for such instruction would be mutually agreed upon.

5. Your Committee, however, are of the opinion that the provisions asked for, even if granted, could hardly be put into practice, and would scarcely serve the purpose of carrying out the intentions of this Synod.

6. That your Committee would therefore recommend that such steps be taken, as may seem best in the wisdom of the Synod, to make it compulsory to have the Bible, at least the New Testament, read in consecutive order, and that not

less than one chapter be read every morning at the opening of the School, without note or comment, and also that the School exercises open and close with prayer for the Divine blessing.

7. That your Committee is also of the opinion that all candidates for the office of High School or Public School teacher should be submitted to an examination in the Evidences of Christianity.

8. At the date of making this report sufficient time has not elapsed to permit the Minister of Education to report to the Committee the conclusion of the Government upon the subject.

## 2. The Report of the Sunday School Committee.

The Sunday School Committee beg to submit the following report.

1. That the Diocesan Depository has during the past year made substantial progress. A good and carefully selected stock has been kept on hand. The sales have amounted to \$1,641.30.

2. The Committee have heretofore dealt almost exclusively, in the purchase of stock, with the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and the Religious Tract Society, but it is felt, however, necessary to enlarge the variety by purchasing suitable books from other publishers, and steps are being taken in that direction.

3. The Committee would be greatly aided in their work if the Secretaries of the several Rural Deaneries where Conventions of Sunday School Workers are held, would forward to this Committee statistics of the Sunday Schools in their Deaneries, and offer such suggestions as they think would be helpful.

4. The Committee being impressed with the usefulness of Sunday School Conventions, would suggest the advisability of holding, one in every Deanery at least once a year.

5. The Committee recommend the holding of annual examination of teachers and scholars, and that diplomas or certificates be granted to the successful candidates. Subjects of examination—The Scriptures, the Prayer Book, and Church Catechism.

6. The Committee thankfully refer to the success and increasing usefulness of the Annual Diocesan Lay Workers and Sunday Schools' Convention. They are surely an inspiration to all who attend, and we would record our deep affection of and gratitude for the valuable help received last year at Windsor from our brethren of the city of Detroit.

7. The Committee would also gratefully refer to the cordial relations existing between themselves and the Committee of the Lay Workers' Association.

8. In conclusion, the Committee would emphasize the necessity of absolute dependence on the Holy Spirit in the work of the Sunday School, and would urge teachers to begin and end their work in humble reliance on His promised aid.

The Committee appointed at last session of Synod, to consider the advisability and expediency of petitioning the General Synod to take measures for bringing before the next Pan-Anglican Conference, the question of a revision and expansion of the Ordinal for Deacons; begs to report

That the Committee approves of the suggested action to petition the General Synod in this supremely important matter, and therefore begs to submit for the consideration of the Synod, the draft of such petition.

TO THE GENERAL SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN THE  
DOMINION OF CANADA.

1. The Synod of Huron respectfully petitions the General Synod of Canada to take measures for bringing before the next Pan-Anglican Conference, the consideration of the Revision and Expansion of the ordinal for Deacons, with a view to reviving the work of the Diaconate in Church ministration.
2. The results of the working of the Rubrics in the ordinal for Deacons, along with ecclesiastical administration under Canons of 1603-4, No's 33 and 76; the first being on "The Titles of such as are to be made Ministers" and the second on "Ministers at no time to forsake their calling" have had the effect of almost obliterating the Order of Deacons as a substantive order in the Church of England; and consequently in the Anglican communion throughout the world.
3. The external circumstances and position of the Church have so changed since the adoption of the Ordinal, and the enactment of the Canons, that efficiency of Church ministration requires that the Order of Deacons be a living reality, strong in numbers and distinct and permanent in character.
4. The Church must follow the example and obey the commands of Her Lord, in going after lost humanity with His message of Salvation. To do this thoroughly, she requires the full activity of all the Departments of her varied ministry, and she requires—subject to due order—the active manifestation of all the gifts of her members, given them by God the Holy Ghost. In the Apostolic Church this fullness of life is manifest everywhere; but at present the whole work falls; practically upon the Second Order, with the effect of impairing its efficiency. The recent movement in the Church towards the employment of what is called Lay Agencies, shows how the want in the Anglican system is felt, and how the Christian instinct is trying to supply it.
5. Public and official consecration would seem to be an absolute requisite, according to apostolic practice, for public Church work of any kind. If, therefore, the Diaconate were not necessarily regarded as a stepping stone to the Priesthood, and a different standard of educational and other qualifications could be accepted for it, the Order would be largely increased in numbers and composed of Church Workers of all degrees of life; and these, having the seal of authority on them, could bring a constant living influence to bear upon those with whom they come in contact in their daily life. The Order would thus have restored to it something of the variety of functions performed by it in primitive times, and would be of invaluable aid to the Church in dealing with the many complexities and difficulties of modern Society.
6. The Duties of the Deacon, as stated in the fourth and fifth questions of the Ordinal, would not be lessened, but extended.
7. The effects of such a change would be:  
First. To connect Consecration and Church work together, and thus elevate all Church work publicly into its proper position, both with the worker and those to whom he ministers.  
Second. To make a living link between the Presbyterate and the people which modern society is in want of. Personal religion and Church ideas have to be brought home to men by Church persons through the closest intercourse and communication, and this demands services and time impossible for the Priesthood, however devoted, to render.

Third. To greatly further the work of Evangelizing, which has to be carried constantly on by the Church in the world. The experience of bodies that have gone out of the Church of England, shows how persons having Evangelistic gifts, can work effectively.

Fourth. To recognize and provide for the various forms of Church working and workers, by such revision of the Ordinal, and thus to take a great step towards that unity with our separated brethren, that we all desire so much.

8. For these reasons, and others which may present themselves, your petitioners deem it expedient that the whole question of the Diaconate, be brought before the next Pan-Anglican conference, by your authority and initiative, and if any practical conclusion is arrived at, that the General Synod takes such common action with the other branches of the Anglican communion as to give effect to the same.

#### 4. The Report of the Committee on Income and Expenditure.

The Committee appointed by the Synod at its meeting in June, 1895, beg to report as follows:—

1. The subjects referred to the Committee by the Synod were:—

(a) The whole question of the Income and Expenditure of the church in this Diocese, with power to take such action as might be immediately necessary.

(b) Method of dealing with Mission parishes by increase of assessment which fail to pay the required contribution.

(c) The See House Debt.

(d) (By the Executive Committee.) The Superannuation Canon.

2. The Committee, after much earnest consideration, resolved that an effort be made by a general appeal to the Diocese at large to liquidate the whole Diocesan indebtedness, viz:—

3. The method which commended itself most to their minds, was the appointment of an agent, who should meanwhile be relieved of parish duties and thus be able to devote his whole time to the work, with such remuneration as might seem suitable; and the Committee accordingly named its chairman, the Rev. Canon Young to the Executive Committee, and recommended that he be paid at the rate of \$1200.00 per annum for one year, which was unanimously agreed to by the Executive Committee. The Rev. Canon Young having, after consideration, declined the appointment, the work was offered to the Rev. Alfred Brown on the same terms, but finally declined by him; but upon the urgent request of the Committee, he, without remuneration, undertook a tentative canvass of the city of London, and including the munificent donation of \$1000.00 from his Lordship the Bishop succeeded in raising the sum of \$3800.00, the larger portion of which was subscribed conditionally upon the canvass of the whole Diocese being prosecuted. It was then resolved to call upon thirteen other clergymen to do a work in each Deanery of a similar character to that of the Rev. Alfred Brown in London, but the majority of these gentlemen thought that they could not within the time at their disposal, consistently with necessary parish claims, do what was desired.

4. The Committee remaining of the opinion that no mere voluntary effort is equal to the work, appointed the Rev. Rural Dean Ridley its agent to carry it on, and made provisions for the maintenance of the services of the church during his absence, but after consulting his congregation he has notified the Committee that he is unable to undertake the work.

5. While the Committee regret that no greater progress has been made towards the extinction of the debt, they rejoice that the legislation passed at the Synod, 1894, has resulted in practically restoring the equilibrium between Income and Expenditure, and hope that the church at large will be encouraged by this fact to greater efforts.

6. The Committee feels it a duty to bring before the Synod, in a formal way, what must have been noticed by many members of the Synod. The fact, viz: That some parishes, which have for years largely benefited by the Synod Funds, seem very little concerned in the support of the Synod's work, and that other considerable and apparently prosperous parishes either contribute nothing at all or nothing at all worthy of them. It must be obvious that not only is the Synod crippled in its work by the amount which should be, but is not, contributed by them; but unless a remedy can be found it may tend to discourage, if not quench, the liberality of others perhaps far less able.

7. In regard to the superannuation Canon, the Committee has proposed and caused to be inserted in the convening circular certain amendments, which it is hoped may render superannuation less easy and in some cases less attractive than at present, and thus tend to the conservation of the funds.

8. In view of the fact that there is not in the Diocese a Superannuation Fund distinct from the Commutation Fund, the Committee is of the opinion that such a fund should be formed, and would recommend that the Synod invite bequests, donations, subscriptions and collections towards this object, or take any other steps to this end which may in its wisdom seem advisable.

5. The Report of the Committee on Temperance.

1. In submitting their Annual Report to the Synod, your Committee desire to record with deep thankfulness their conviction that drunkenness in Canada is steadily of late years on the decrease. They believe this is largely due to the discussions upon the nature and properties of alcohol, the light thrown upon the subject of inebriety, hereditary tendencies, and cognate points, as well as to the fact that drunkenness has been specially emphasized as being a sin.

2. Your Committee wish also to bear their emphatic testimony against and to express condemnation of the practice of "treating" in saloons and hotels.

3. Your Committee would point out that the recent judgment of the Privy Council, has defined the relative duties and powers of the Dominion and Ontario Governments in respect of the liquor traffic. It is probable that as a result of this judgment, active steps will in the near future be taken to further restrict the sale of intoxicants.

The Church of England has ever taken a leading part in the furtherance of all efforts to free mankind from the baneful effects of intemperance and every excess, and if in this Diocese a further struggle is to be inaugurated against the traffic in the liquors which make the drunkard who is not to inherit the Kingdom of Heaven, then our Church will be found on the side of the Lord, fighting against the powers of evil.

4. It is with much satisfaction that your Committee notice that the Sunday School Lesson appointed by the Inter-Diocesan Sunday School Committee, for the first Sunday in Lent was a Temperance Lesson, and that the International Series of Lessons provided four Temperance Lessons in the year. As both of these series of lesson leaflets are in use in our Diocese, opportunities are by these means given for still further enforcing the performance of the baptismal vow, and for emphasizing the teaching of the Catechism, "to keep my body in temperance, soberness and chastity."

5. While there is not one member of your Committee who holds that the moderate drinking of intoxicants is, *per se*, a sin, yet there are two grounds on which they would venture to urge upon all who profess and call themselves Christians the practice of total abstinence. First—The danger oftentimes to health. When two such eminent authorities as "The Lancet" and Dr. Norman Kerr both raise a warning voice against the habitual moderate drinking of intoxicants, is it not wisdom to give heed? The former says, "Much of that which is considered moderate drinking, is mortal drinking." Secondly—There is the far higher ground, "For Christ's sake and my brother's sake." This is self denial, even from a lawful and pleasurable thing, if it "make a brother to offend." In this connection your Committee rejoice at the words of the Bishop of London, England, who sometime since said "The great and constantly increasing number of men who come up to me for Ordination are Total Abstainers."

## 6. Report of the Huron Anglican Lay Workers' Association.

The Committee of Management of the Huron Anglican Lay Workers' Association begs to report as follows:—

The Association has endeavored during the past year, so far as the means and machinery at its command have allowed, to carry out the objects for which it was established, namely, the enlistment of laymen in the work and services of the church. As pointed out by our own Bishop in his opening address at Windsor last year, and as most forcibly affirmed recently by one of the ablest and most honored of English prelates; without such an agency the Church can never even pretend to overtake the great work of the world's evangelization. Let every necessary safeguard against irregularity be invoked, let every method conducing to due and full qualification be adopted, while the grand obligation of every laymen to submit himself to the Master's call when, and by whatever channel it comes to him, is ever steadily and persistently kept in view.

The Annual Convention for 1895 of Lay Workers and Sunday School Teachers of the Diocese—the fifth of these interesting gatherings—is to be remembered particularly for the assistance most readily and cordially given by churchmen of the neighboring city of Detroit in the form of papers, not more remarkable for the ability than for the devout spirit and fervent zeal for the spread of the truth by which they were characterized. The presence, too, of Mr. Eugene Stock, of London, (England), and his admirably practical address given with the approval of the Bishop, at the service held in All Saints' Church, Windsor, on the first evening of the Convention, were most interesting features of the meeting.

The report of the Association, with a carefully prepared summary of the proceedings of the Convention has been widely circulated, and the communications received in consequence from several quarters show the example set by Huron to be bearing good fruit.

A member of the Committee attended recently, by request, a meeting of the Rural Deanery of Toronto, and gave an address on Lay Workers' Associations. The subject has received further attention in consequence at the hands of that Deanery.

A Church conference is also to be held in Toronto in the fall of the year. One of the items in the programme will be a paper on Laymen's Leagues, which occupy a prominent place in the aggressive work of the sister church in the United States, as a means by which the strength and capacity for organization in populous centres is made available for pioneer efforts at church extension, and the revival of services where such have been discontinued.

**Receiving Petitions and Memorials.**

1. From Ven. Archdeacon Marsh with reference to charge on Archdeacon's Fund.

To the Rt. Rev. M. S. Baldwin, D.D., Lord Bishop of Huron, the Rev. the Clergy and the Lay Representatives of the Diocese of Huron, in Synod assembled:

MY LORD BISHOP AND GENTLEMEN,—

1. On the second day of the Synod meeting, June 20th, 1894, (see page 42) Mr. A. H. Dymond gave the following notice:—

2. "That, until otherwise ordered by competent authority, the sum of four hundred dollars per annum, payable under the award of 1859 to an Archdeacon of Huron, shall, as heretofore, be paid to the Senior Archdeacon for the time being, but less expenses for management, and subject to reduction in proportion to the rate of interest received from the investment of the fund being less than six per cent."

3. First—This motion proposing to make a change in one of the Canons is entirely *ultra vires*, as it should have been printed in the convening circular, and sent to the members of the Synod, fourteen days before the meeting of Synod.

Secondly—It is also *ultra vires*, because it is a breach of the conditions on which we received this fund when the Diocese was formed.

Thirdly—Again it is contrary to our own Canon.

Fourthly—Again, because five per cent. for expenses has been paid each year by the Episcopal and Archdeacons' Fund upon its full income which includes the \$400.00 to be paid to an Archdeacon.

4. On page 56 Synod Journal, 1894, it is recorded, that the above motion, though rather confused, was put to the Synod, and notwithstanding its illegality, was carried.

5. For the past two years five per cent. each quarter has been deducted from what was due to me, making in all forty dollars to April 1st, 1896.

6. I ask therefore that the resolution recorded on page 56 of the Journal 1894, be expunged, and that the Secretary-Treasurer be directed to send me a cheque for forty dollars.

7. It is but right that I should explain why this matter was not brought before the Synod of 1895.

8. I was under the impression that it could be brought up by a notice when the Synod was in session, but when I found that it affected one of our Canons, I thought that the notice should have been sent to the Convening Committee, I may be wrong, but that was the cause of the delay.

2. From the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada :

To the Lord Bishop of Huron and Members of Synod :

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN, —I write for the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada, to make our annual appeal to the clergy and laity of the different Synods of Ontario, in behalf of the cause of prison reform.

With regard to the proposed reformatory for young men which the Dominion Government has commenced to build at Alexandria, I would be glad if your Synod would take the same action as that taken by the House of Bishops, at the late meeting at Ottawa, namely : Firstly—To petition the Government to establish a separate reformatory for protestants near a city or large town, where the inmates may be brought under the religious teaching of protestant clergymen and lay workers ; and secondly to suggest to the Government the propriety of appointing a Commission to formulate a scheme for the management of said reformatories.

With regards to the reforms we are asking from the Ontario Government, we would be glad if you would give us a helping hand in our efforts to procure the establishment of a hospital, reformatory, or farm colony for the reformation of habitual drunkards. We know that the ordinary jail treatment is neither deterrent nor reformatory, whereas, according to the experience of other countries, we believe that a large percentage of inebriates may be reformed when placed in a well equipped and well managed hospital or reformatory.

A petition or memorial to the Ontario Government from your Synod would very materially strengthen our cause.

We also bespeak the kind co-operation of the clergy and laity of your Diocese in our efforts to promote good classification of prisoners in the county jails, and in the establishment of a house of industry in every county.

4. Religious Instruction to be given in all Public Schools from 9 to 9.30 a. m. ## 4. By Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q. C. :

That the General Synod be respectfully memorialized to take such steps as may be deemed expedient and practicable, to have printed a Prayer Book containing all the prayers or other matter framed for the service of the Church of England in Canada, and arranged for convenient use by Churchmen throughout British North America and which may be issued with the authority of the General Synod and used by the various Congregations within its jurisdiction.

## 5. By Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q. C. :

That this Synod views with deep interest the action taken by the Provincial Synod of Canada in 1895, upon the memorials of this Synod relating to two unanimous resolutions in regard to the constitution powers and meetings of the General and Provincial Synod, having for its object the more convenient and less expensive government of the Church of Canada. And while this Synod appreciates the desire of the Provincial Synod to give further consideration to the matters therein referred to, it still adheres to and reiterates the statements and prayers expressed in its memorials, and respectfully draws attention to the action of the Provincial Synod in referring matters affecting the general welfare of the Church to the General Synod as some evidence of the desirability of granting the prayers of such memorials, and this Synod trusts that the General Synod may express its readiness to concur with the Provincial Synod of Canada granting the prayers of this Synod, and may express its willingness to assume (if desired) any duties necessary for the purpose, and that the Provincial Synod may, upon fuller consideration, grant the prayers of this Synod's Memorials in accordance with the expressions contained in such unanimous resolutions. And that a copy of this resolution be sent to the General Synod of Canada.

## 6. By Rev. David Williams :

That all the subjects to be reported on by Synod Committees shall henceforth, be stated in the Convening Circular.

## 7. By Rev. Robt. McCosh :

That the Executive Committee be instructed to take into consideration Canon XXVII, on the Widows and Orphans' Fund, particularly Section 2 in Clause 3 of said Canon, for the purpose of making such alterations and amendments as they in their judgment may deem advisable to render it more just and equitable.

## 8. By Rev. T. L. Armstrong :

A copy of the proceedings of the Synod held in June, 1895, printed under the direction of the Honorary Secretaries, was presented for the approval of the Synod, and being approved by the Synod and the Bishop, and having the seal of the Synod attached thereto, was then signed by the Bishop for preservation as the authentic minutes of the Synod for that session.

**Receiving Reports of Committees.****7. Report of Committee on Statistics :**

Committee on Statistics beg to report that they have carefully examined Diocesan and other statistics, and beg to submit :

*One.*—The last civil census in 1891, showed the Church population of the Diocese to be 110,919. The Clergy returns for the same year showed the Church population to be 59,419; showing that the large number of 51,500 souls were not reported by the clergy. This may be partly accounted for by the fact that there are 34 townships out of 136 townships in the Diocese, in which there are no places of worship.

The clergy in 1894 reported Church population 60,992; and in 1896, 55,683; showing a decrease in two years of 5,909.

*Two.*—The families reported in 1891 were 12,772; in 1894, 13,485; in 1896, 11,540; showing a decrease in two years of 1,945 families. This decrease calls for our serious consideration. It may in part be accounted for by the different interpretations of what constitutes a family, under clause 20 of the constitution. Some of the Clergy reckon only those families who contribute to the financial support of the Church, while others report all families receiving the administrations of the Church, whether contributors or not.

*Three.*—We could draw attention to the decrease in the number of Baptisms, and also of Communicants. The Baptisms of 1896 compared with 1891, show a falling off of 299. This may be accounted for partially, by the decreased birthrate in the Province of Ontario. The decrease in the number of Communicants cannot be explained satisfactorily. In 1891 there were 13,605 in the Diocese, since which time there have been 7,255 persons confirmed and yet there are only 13,362 Communicants returned this year. Thus, notwithstanding the confirmations, there is a decrease in the number of Communicants of 243. This cannot be accounted for entirely by deaths or removals; we can only surmise that sufficient care is not exercised in preserving the newly confirmed in full communion with the Church.

The Statistics of the Sunday Schools show a decrease of scholars of 891 during the last five years.

In view of the increase of the active Clergy during the last five years, the decrease in population, of communicants and Sunday School Scholars, is a matter which demands the most serious consideration and investigation.

We draw attention to the tabulated statistics herewith.

In the event of it appearing from such return, or otherwise, that any Superannuated Clergyman is in receipt of emolument from any employment, it shall be in the power of the Executive Committee to make such reduction off his superannuation allowance from year to year as the Committee shall deem just and expedient.
