




TO STUDY GLACIERS.

United States Expedition Will Leave for Alaska This Week.

Seattle, Wash., June 22 .- The first expedition ever sent out by the Na-. tional Geological Society of Washing-ton, D. C., to study the big glaciers of Alaska, is scheduled to sail from Se-attle on the steamer Portland on Thursday next. The expeditio headed by Prof. R. S. Tarr. of Cornell university, and Prof. Lawrence Martin, of the University of Wisconsin,
