A SNOW LOCOMOTIVE.
The locomo ive that is to be used in hauling logs on the head waters of the St. Johu is after the following description
The engine weighs ${ }^{5}$ 5 tons and will be geered sn as to run on two giant "bob" sleds, and will be propelled by a spiked wheel seven feet in diameter and seven feet in width. The sleds will be titted with steam stearing apparatus, and the propelling wheel will be used as a surface condenser, the exhaust steam from the engine being converted into water in i and re-enters the boiler. A very sall quantity of water will suffise to run the boiler each day. It will be e guipped with two 75 horse power en. gines with vertical boiler, working at a pressure of 160 pounds. The machine when set up will be 32 feet long and 10 feet wide, and the gauge of the sleds will be $6 \frac{1}{2}$ feet.

## A Fearful Curse.

Paul Beaupre, or Bo Peep, as he was nick namod, is making more stir in French-Canadian Maine since his death than he ever did with his snakeski:1 charms and inspired prophecies while in life.
Four years ago, he was taken ill with pneumonia while staying at a camp on the East Branch and died inside of a week.
Before his death be expressed a wish to have his body taken to Montreal for buriai, pronouncing a fearful rurse upon those who neglected to obey his last request. Among other catastrophes that were to follow a denial of his wish were the suddon death of the camp foreman, the loss of the year's cut of logs, and the burning of the camp. He also said that if he were buried in the woods a living cross would grow up from his grave, which should serve as a perpetual warting to all unbelievers.
Beaupre died in November, 1894. His body was sewed up in new blankets and carried to a rocky point above (trindstone, where the bearers placed it under the roots of a great yellow birch tree which had lately been overturned in a gale. When the remains had been duly disposed of in the stony
opening one of the men chopped off the falien tree trunk with an axe, allowing the stump to fly back, thus filling the hole and burying the body under tons of earth.
Two weeks later the camp boss was killed by a falling limb The following spring the logs were hung up for want of water, and while they were lying on the shore waiting for rains a furest fire swopt through the woods, burning the logs and the camp where the men had worked. This fall a party of Frenchmen who had been hunting deer stopped at Peep's grave and were surprised to find that the yellow birch which covered his remains had sprouted from the stump, sending up three shoots which had interlaced so as to form a cross about 10 foet tall. When they saw that the last of the dead man's predictions had been fulfilled they came out and circulated the story all over Eastern Maine, since which time the grave has been visited by scores of French-Canadians, all of whom believe that a miracle has been wrought above the dead.

The Sun wastes its rare genius and valuable space on an editorial touching the Hartland bridge. Our brilliant city contemporary is manifestily quite ignorant of the government's concession to the Hartland Bridge delegation of last winter, or else it wantonly distorts the truth. The Emmerson government has agreed to guarantee both the bonds and the interest on the same, if the people of Hartliand chose to form a company and build a bridge. Hartland people look upon the offer as a generous one and have accepted it. In the fate of this fact why ueed the Sun troube itself? It further says "The Ilartiand people ought to understand that they are suffering-!" Suffering, indeed! Well, perhaps we do-a few suffer in being led astray by the Sun and the rest with a more or less mild form of "swelled head," the outcome of the village's rapid advanement.

THE I. U. R "DEFICIT."
The "Sun" quates figures to show that Blair's management of the I. O. R. is a failure. It says that in 1893-4 there was a surplus of $\$ 5,834$, while in 1898 there was a deficit of $\$ 139978$. It was wrong that the "Sun" should so endearour to make it appear that there was such a vast difference, without saying something about the way the deficit occurred. One reason why Mr. Blair's expenses were more is that Mr. Hag. gart, his successor, had been in the habit of making road repairs late in the year. As tha spring is the proper time to do this work, Mr. Blair last year made the repairs carly. As a result the cost of repairs for two years are given in the tigures the "Sun" yuotes, and this adds $\$ 150,000$ to the ordinary expenditure which more than accounts for the deficit. Beside this Mr. Blair has renewed and repaired the rolling stock which Haggart had allowed to become sadly dilapitated. The opening of the Drummond road did not take place early enough to figure very largely either way.

MR. costigans views. Uon. John Costigan has declared himself in favor of the Emmerson government. He says "the Conveution did not attack the policy of the government either in whole or in part, but indicated a desire simply to turn it out in order to run local politics on Dominion party lines." Mr. Costigan says if he is in this province at the time of the provincial electicu campaign, he shall certainly give the Emmerson government his support. He has repeesented Victoria Co. at Ottawa centinuously for thirty years, and as a cabinet minister was esteemed highly by both parties for his integrity.
