These carting contractors were advised from time to time by a man named Denver, to deliver the cases of ammunition to a cycle agent in Edinburgh and as their money was always forthcoming, they too, considered the transaction one of the ordinary course of trade. But after the finds of ammunition in Newcastle and Glasgow they got uneasy and gave the Edinburgh police a hint of what was going on.

OTTAWA, May 8.—The high prices of imported coal in the middle provinces of Canada, the depletion of our forests, together with the increasing value of the fuel in recent years, consequent on labor conditions, are causes which have again prominently brought forward the question of utilizing the peat bogs of Ontario and Quebec for the production of marketable fuel and other purposes.

The estimated area so far reported distributed over the different provinces of the Dominion is 37,000 square miles, with an average depth of from 8 to 10 feet. Further investigation will undoubtedly prove that this estimate represents but a fraction of the total area of available peat.

The comparative fuel value of coal, peat and wood is: One ton of coal is equal to 1.8 tons of peat or 2.5 tons of wood.

The recent improvements in gas producers and gas engines have opened up a new field for the utilization of peat and lignite. A power plant located at the peat bog, using producer gas derived from peat, may furnish electric energy and be transmitted to the market in the same way as in the case of hydro-electric energy. Other industries in Europe using peat as a raw material are at present either developed of in progress of development, such as the manufacture of peat coke, wood alcohol, moss litter, etc.





business of picking them up. This is done without regard to the markings on the logs, and a flat rate of 25 cents for each one is paid. Latterly there has been a very noticeable increase in the numbers of these so-called drift logs, and the mill men have ample evidence that the prospect of making 25 cents on each one is inducing several boatmen to pick up logs which are not actually adrift. Many cases are known in which rafts or joints lying in the mill ponds have been tampered with, logs rolled off and allowed to float out into the river for the purpose of being picked up. The mill men befloat out into the river for the purpose of being picked up. The mill men believe that their policy to pay for these drift logs has encouraged stealing, and they have decided that after today no more logs will be purchased. Everything that goes adrift or goes down river without someone to look after it will be allowed to go out into the bay. There is no fear that the mill men will sustain any loss by this course, for they are firmly convinced that they are now losing three times as much by stealing as they will lose by the logs going out. At the present time between 3,000 and 4,000 so-called drift logs are sold each year to the mills in
